By main-taining a cumulative master list of jobs that need doing, problems to be solved, and goals you'd someday like to reach.

The next morning, put numbers beside the different jobs to: . rank them in order of importance. Ask yourself, How would I like to spend the next five, ten, or fifteen years? If I knew I were going to die in six months, what would I want to do between now and then?" Write them down in your planning notebook, and review them from time to time ... just to keep Use an appointment calendar, ... and schedule time for self-care. A daybook can help

you remember meetings, bill payments, and such. Be sure, too, to allot time for relaxng, reading, exercising, or whatever, and for simply being with your family and riends. Also try to structure breaks for yourself during working hours. Do your best w quit working at a fixed time each day, too: Establish a regular planning time. Once a day, sit down and review your cumulative list of tasks and complete your "to-do-tomorrow" roster. Once a week or so, you'll want to hold a long-range planning session. Examine how you use your days. If you keep a detailed time log - that is, if you write down precisely how you spend your minutes and hours—over a period of three


