Weapons Found In Spurger Case

Quick action by the Tyler County Sheriff's Office has resulted in the capture of a prime suspect in the murder by knife and gun of a 57-year-old Spurger woman, Imogene Sears on Thursday, Jan. 12.

The offense was reported by Pete Hemmingsway of Vidor, a neighbor who saw through the victim's window and saw a body lying near the refrigerator. After entering the home, Hemmingsway reportedly tried to revive the woman using CPR then called for the Sheriff.

According to the Sheriff Leon Fowler, who arrived on the scene at 5:40 p.m., officers began

to search for evidence at the victim's home and interrogated Timothy Wayne McFarland, 17, who was reported to be the last known person to see Mrs. Sears alive.

Officers took a statement from McFarland the following day in which he reportedly confessed to the crime and then led them back to the Sears home and allegedly took them to a sand pile in the rear of the home and uncovered a knife he said he had buried there.

The Sheriff's office requested and was given a .22 cal pistol by the McFarland family and after searching the suspect's room, discovered six spent .22 cal "short" shells.

Precinct 1 Peace Justice Wanda Brasher arranged, Timothy Wayne McFarland on charges of first degree murder.

Lawmen discovered that McFarland had also been registered at a Port Acres school under the name of Timothy Jackson Bryan.

An autopsy was ordered by Judge Brasler in the case and District Attorney Pat Hardy says he expects the case to come up before the March Grand Jury.

By constantly working these three most important steps we are better prepared to defend ourselves against the first drink. And only by working these steps on a daily basis are we able to continue any length of sobriety. It is when the alcoholic fails to work these steps he becomes weak and the possibility of relapse sets in.

Too, there are other things we must be on guard against which I did not mention in last week's article. The one I am going to relate now is a definite must for any alcoholic. It is the same time there are many substitutes that your doctor can prescribe. "If he is aware of your addiction to alcohol," the doctor must

medication. The physician should inform any doctor who goes to that he is an alcoholic, that certain medications can be harmful, particularly drugs for pain or drugs for "nerves". One of the worst medications an alcoholic can take is valium. This particular drug in case after case has resulted in devastating relapse, and sometimes even death for the alcoholic user. It is of prime importance to put aside embarrassment and to prevent it, no matter how drastic the efforts. It is far easier to do this if we go back to practicing the steps of admission, 2. belief, 3. decision. One day at a time... It would be wise if we bore in mind at all times that a person who seems unable to stop drinking, who cannot do so whether he wishes to or not, or a person whose

ROTARY'S YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Every year, more than 5,000 young people become Rotary youth exchange students. Sponsored by Rotary clubs and districts around the world, they spend an exciting year holding in another country, learning of life and culture.

One Rotary youth exchange student, Nancy Till Hackett of Houston, New Jersey, wrote of her stay in Tasmania, Australia: "My year was not only a lot of personal achievement and the learning of a new culture, but it has also opened a whole new world of people to me."

Annually, some 1,500 of the high school students involved in the Rotary program are from the United States. As youth exchange students, they live with families in their host countries and attend school when the length of their stay permits. Often, Rotary clubs will offer special opportunities for their visitors.

In South Africa, the Rotary Club of Empress Natal, took students from other lands on a six-day tour of a local game preserve. Students from Texas were given a tour of England's West Country by local Rotarians. U.S. students visiting Finland were given a chance to visit Lapland and Leningrad.

In Japan, Martha Green, a local fire prevention worker, while Joanne Chocovias of Dearborn, Michigan, went to play the 13-string koto in Japan. Mary-Ann, a local volunteer, worked in a "social orphanage" during her stay in Brazil.

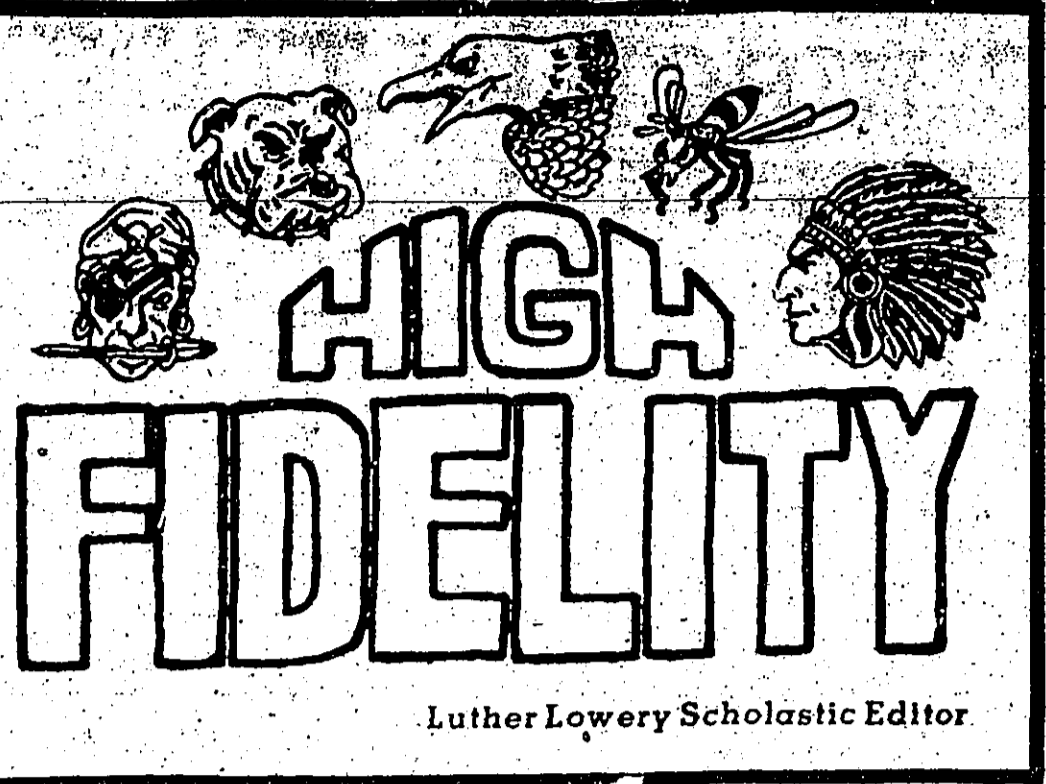

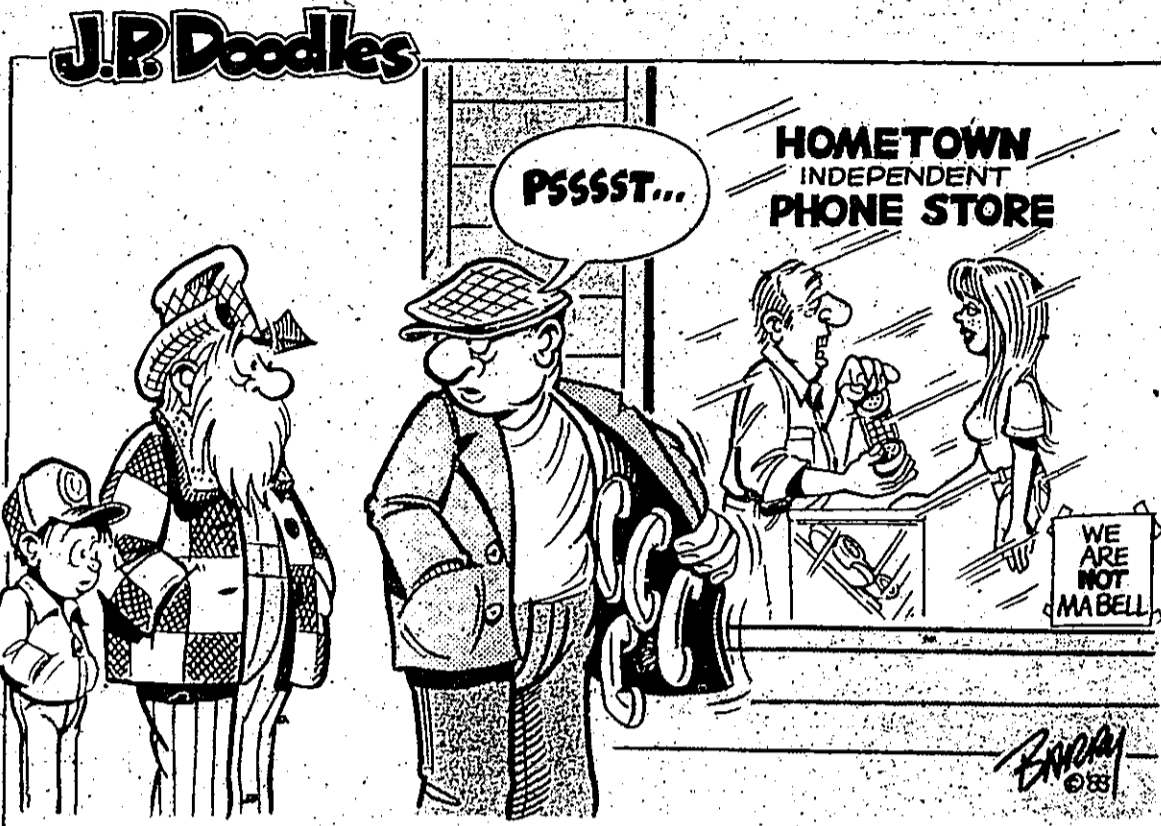

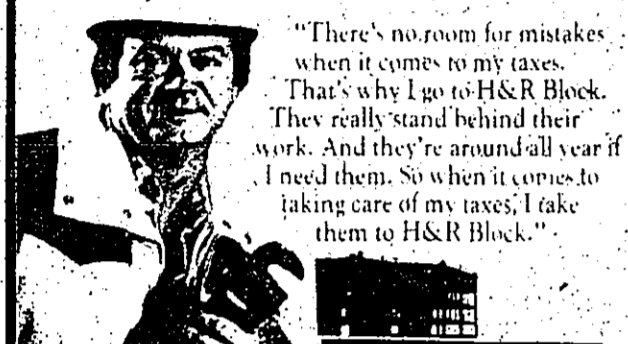

ORGANIZING YOUR LIFE TO REDUCE STRESS
Eliminating the unhelpful stress caused by a poorly-organized life. Frequently just a matter of reorganizing a few simple techniques. If you feel that you could benefit from a bit more order in your day-to-day existence, make a firm commitment to put your hurried past behind you... and use the following tips to guide you toward better organization and less stress.

Q: I have been named executor of an estate with a value of less than \$50,000. How can I go about getting the necessary legal information to sell the real estate involved? I am not on the deed and my wife is.

A: Section 31 of the Probate Code allows an executor to apply to the probate court for an order to sell property of the estate. All persons with an interest in the estate are to be issued citation by the County Clerk, and if opposition is shown, a hearing will be held. After such hearing, the probate court can deny the request or make an order for the sale of the property.

Q: If a person is charged with a crime, and the story is carried in a local newspaper, and then later the charges are dropped, what recourse does the person have to get the newspaper to print a retraction?

A: None. A newspaper is a privately owned entity and is not bound by the provisions of the First Amendment. The newspaper's business is to inform its subscribers of newsworthy events of public concern. The publication by a newspaper of a fair and impartial account of proceedings in a Court of Justice is protected by the First Amendment.

Q: I need some help! I am 35 years old and I need a birth certificate to get a driver's license. I was born in a rural county and all my known relatives are dead. The Bureau of Vital Statistics, a part of the State Department of Health, can be called in Austin at (512) 458-7111. They will supply Form 122 which lists several alternate names that can be used. I will need to have your application for a Delayed Birth Certificate. You must have three records, and they may include a hospital birth record, a physician's office report, family Bible entries, a baptismal record, a federal census record, draft records, marriage or divorce papers, marriage or divorce records, or an affidavit of personal knowledge.

Q: I have two choices. I may petition the court to remove the disability of minority, thereby allowing you to assume the obligation of providing for your support and needs. Alternatively, the person who has cared for you can be appointed Guardian and family law. The responsibility of providing for your support and needs. You will have to consult a lawyer to help you choose between these possibilities. Call the statewide Lawyer Referral number for an attorney who handles general law at 1-800-252-9690.
