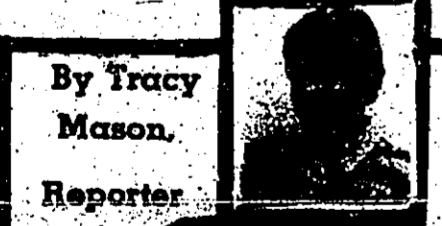

"No, but public workers should have some form of arbitration to work out differences." Gwen Sterling, Medical Lab Technologist, Woodville



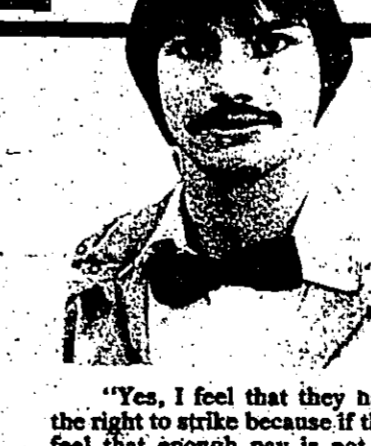
"Yes. They have their problems just like anyone else. If striking would get attention they need, so be it." Mary Taylor, Housewife, Woodville

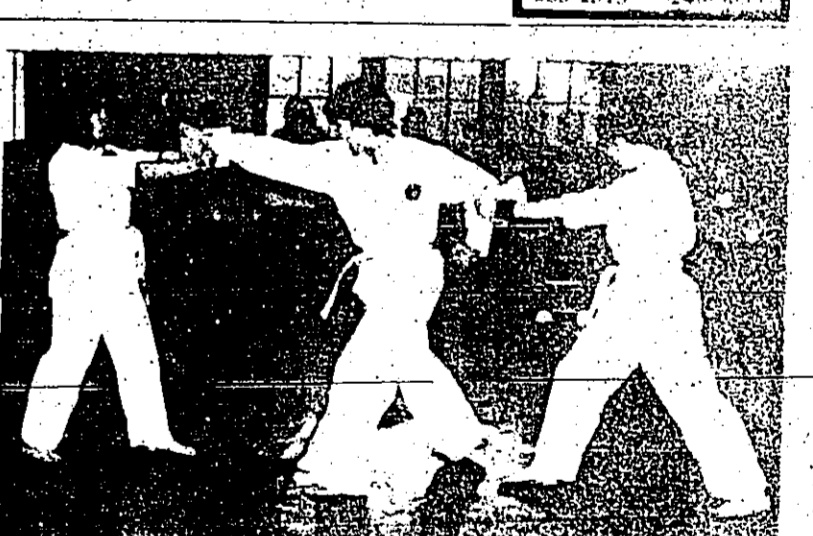

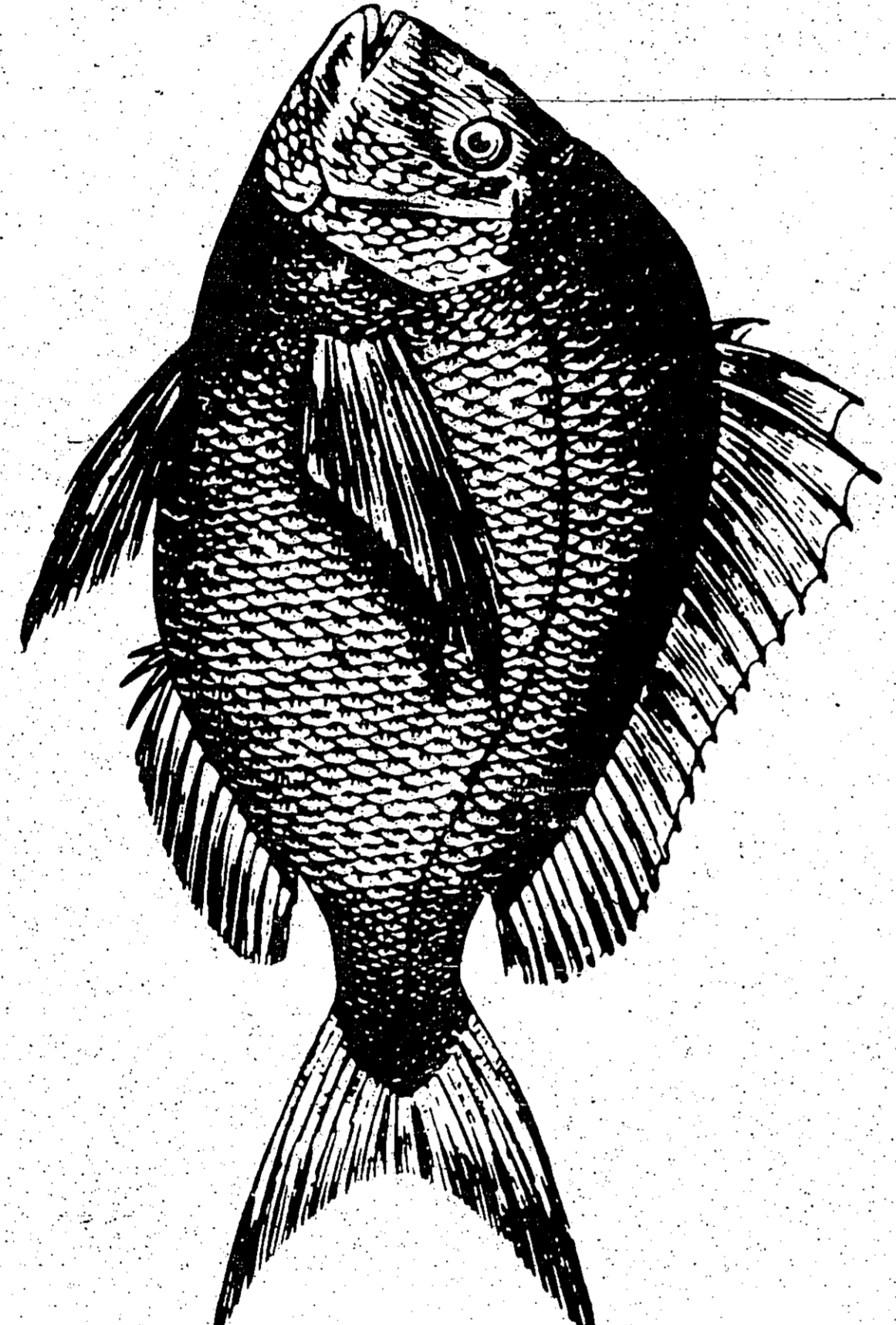

Families Taking New Forms

By the year 2000, if current trends continue, families will come in three major forms: first-marriage families, single-parent families, and remarriage families.

First-marriage families are not predicted to die out, but they will not necessarily predominate either, says Dr. Delores Steglin, a family life education specialist.

These marriages will have one, two, or less frequently, three children. A sizable minority will remain childless.

The greatest problem facing first-marriage families will continue to be the balance of work and family responsibilities, says Steglin, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

With one out of two married women now working outside the home, and a projected increase of working mothers by the end of the century, the issues of childcare and housework in families will be increasingly important, she says.

If current divorce rates remain the same, half of all marriages begun in the early 1980's will end in divorce. Since divorce tends to occur early in marriage, three-fifths of all divorces involve couples with children living at home.

Divorce, along with births to unmarried women, has led to a steady and continuing increase in the number of single-parent families. The result is that about half of all children will spend some time in a single-parent family before they reach 18.

According to Steglin, the most significant problem for single-parent families will probably continue to be income. Less than half of the divorced women receive child support payments, and those who do receive an average of about \$1,900 per year.

Although a great deal of publicity has been given to joint-custody arrangements, the wife retains custody in nine out of ten cases, the lack of a male figure in the home is also a significant problem for single-parent families, notes the home economist.

Remarriage families will be increasingly common as three out of four divorced people remarry and half of these marriages take place within three years of divorce. While remarriage solves many of the economic problems associated with single parenthood, it also requires blending two families together into parent and blended families formed by their relatives or friends.

Although the divorce rate is expected to remain high, Americans from either or both spouses' grandparents are expected to remain high, says Steglin. "The question is whether we as Americans will live in a society that can find ways to support families -- no matter what form they evolved with single take."

An important deadline occurs next week for property owners in Texas. Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board, reminds Texans that local property taxes assessed for 1983 are due by the end of January.

"Taxes not paid before Feb. 1 are delinquent and begin to accrue penalty and interest," Patterson says. He points out that delinquent 1983 taxes will incur a six percent penalty and one percent interest charge on Feb. 1. Charges continue to add up at the combined rate of two percent per month or portion of a month that the taxes remain unpaid, until they reach a total of 18 percent on July 1.

After that, interest accrues at one percent a month. Taxes delinquent for a year would incur penalty and interest charges of 24 percent of the original tax. Under Texas law, according to Patterson, taxes are owed on property whether or not the owner receives a tax bill, and there are only three exceptions to the rule: 1. delinquency date; 2. when the option of split payment is offered by a local government; 3. when tax bills are mailed after Jan. 10, or when a tax-rate rollback election succeeds in lowering a tax rate after the split-payment date. When the option of split payment is initially mailed, the tax bills are mailed after Jan. 10, or when a tax-rate rollback election succeeds in lowering a tax rate after the split-payment date, half of the 1983 tax must have been paid before Dec. 1, 1983. The second half is due before July 1 this year.

Penalty on a delinquent second half-payment is 12 percent of the tax due, and interest will be added at one percent a month from July 1 on.

In some taxing units, tax bills may have been mailed after Jan. 10, or a successful tax-rate rollback election may have necessitated mailing corrected tax bills by a unit other than a school district. In both cases, the delinquency date is postponed and the new date must appear on the most recent tax statement, but penalty and interest will be added if taxes aren't still owed on the property and continue to increase until paid or until the property changes hands.

Another option, but one which must be in a written agreement between the tax collector and property owner, is to pay delinquent tax, penalty and interest in installments over a period of not more than 36 months. With this option, too, the tax is still considered due until paid, and penalty and interest accrue on any unpaid balance.

Under certain conditions, a tax collector may choose to follow steps allowed by law and to find out if collection for taxing units in property, which is then sold to satisfy delinquent taxes. Property owners or a particular appraisal districts should contact their tax office.

Average Person Has Over 50 Moles

Moles. Everyone has them. In fact, the average person has 50 of them appearing everywhere from the face to the feet, ranging from tiny black specks to large pink blemishes. But an ordinary, harmless mole on one person may be the beginning of skin cancer on another.

Moles are bumps or spots on the skin, usually brown or pink, that develop during childhood. As long as there is no change in the mole; there is no reason for concern.

Only a small percentage of moles develop into a form of skin cancer called malignant melanoma, said Leonard Goldbert, M.D., Baylor College of Medicine dermatologist. But a change in the appearance of a mole may be

The new bank offers many fine services including a drive-in window at the rear of the facility. Officers and directors say it won't be long till the temporary structure will be replaced with an

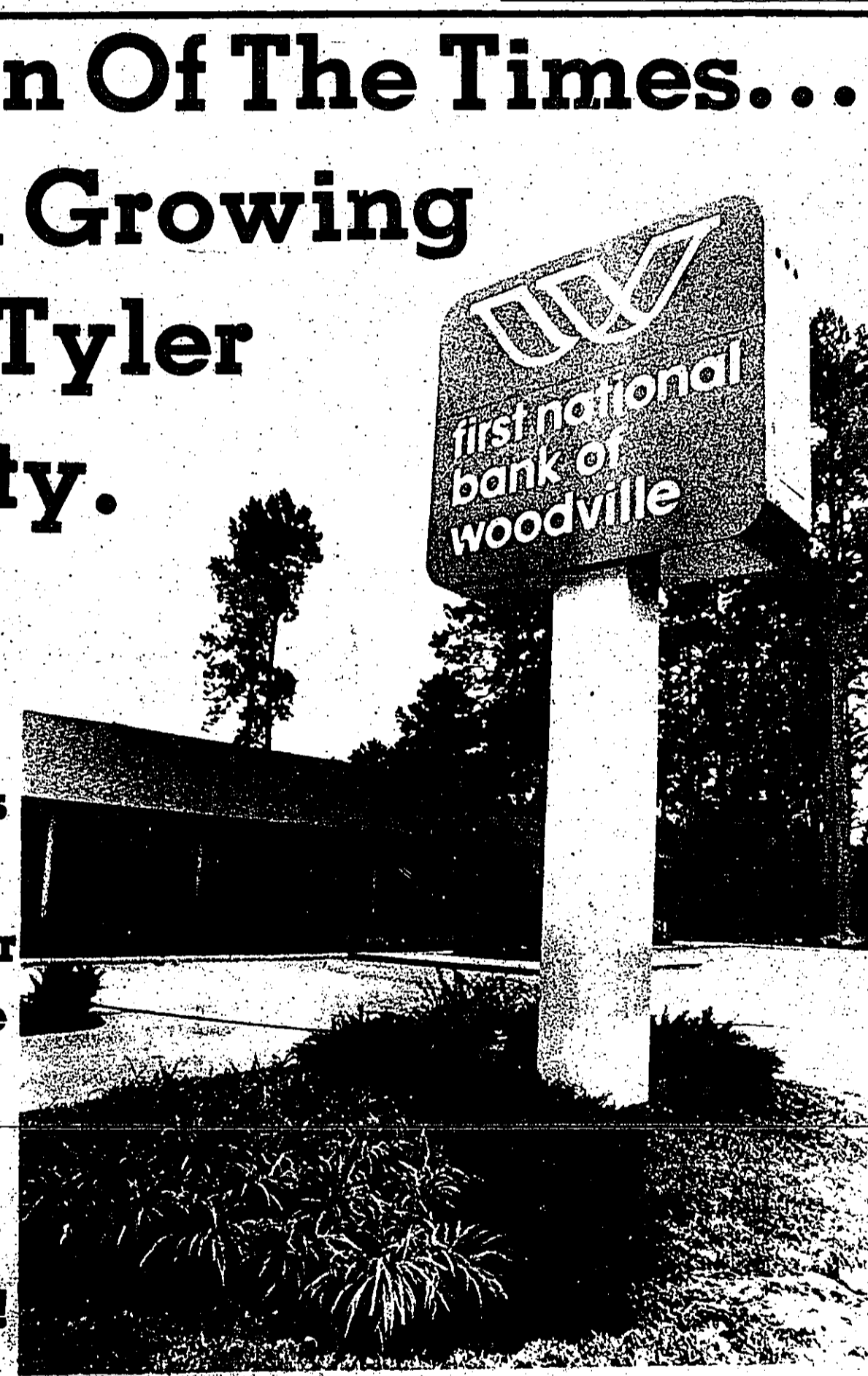
