

Warren Cops Sweepstakes



WARREN BAND: "It's Quality...Not Quantity!"

In the recent U.I.L. band contest, the Warren band earned the coveted sweepstakes award. No Warren band has ever earned a sweepstakes. A sweepstakes is given for a combination of 1st division in marching, 1st division in concert, and 1st division in sight-reading all in the same school year. Past Warren bands have earned 1st divisions in each category, but never all in the same year. The last Warren band to earn a

1st division was the 1972 marching band. Of the 44 bands in AAA, AAAA, and AAAAA, only 6 earned a sweepstakes. These were Warren, Woodville Hardin-Jefferson, Little-Cypress, and Westbrook. 15 bands earned 1st divisions for their concert performance, 10 bands earned 1st divisions for their sight reading performance, and 9 bands earned 1st divisions for both concert and sight reading.

Some of the judges comments were: "Nice solo work and over all good job", "Nice march style", "You have done some great work band. Your outstanding director has done a fine job of preparing the little details, and you have done a great job preparing your individual parts." "Congratulations on a really fine team effort." The sight reading judge wrote, "Excellent instructions by director. Band, you do many

things really well, I'm impressed! This (sight reading music) was as close to right as I have heard this piece played. Congrats." The Warren band was the last band in AAA to receive a 1st division in sight reading. Band director Don Stockton said, "I am extremely proud of this band. They have been working very hard this year. Each student has put forth his maximum effort. Last year when I came to Warren, we

set a goal of sweepstakes. Now we have reached that goal. Our next goal will be to earn a 1st division at a national contest and possible region U.I.L. AAA honor band for this year. The students are thrilled and should be. It is a great honor to earn a sweepstakes, especially the first ever. Hard work does pay off." 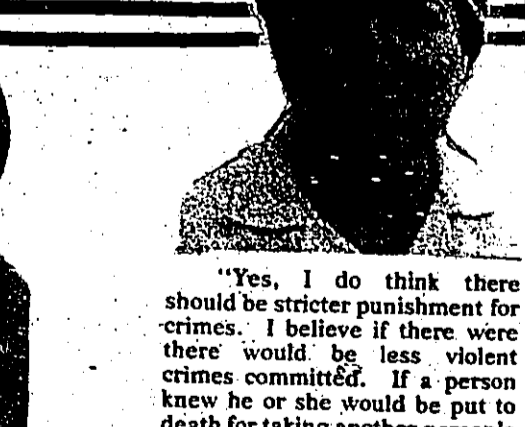



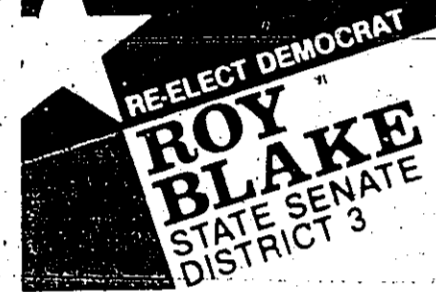

GSU And Scouts Team Up

Gulf States Utilities, in partnership with Gov. Mark White and the Public Utility Commission of Texas, is preparing its customers for summer by showing and telling them how to take control of their energy bills, according to Wyatt Bell, GSU Manager in Woodville.

Greg Shepard, supervisor of energy audits for GSU's Beaumont Division, noted that the governor announced his "Residential Energy Cost Control" program last month. In cooperation with the state's utility companies, White is encouraging every Texas to use less electricity by using it more efficiently, especially now that summer—the season of highest electric use—is just around the corner.

Shepard said the Three Rivers Council of Boy Scouts of America this month is selling water heater wraps that can be installed on both electric and gas water heaters.

"Next to your heating and cooling, water heating is the biggest energy user in your home," said Shepard. "By installing one of these jackets, you should be able to save about \$20 a year on your water heating costs."

Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts are now going door to door in the area, taking orders for the wraps which will be distributed later. Cost is \$8.50.

Next on the governor's and GSU's agenda are free home energy check-ups that will be offered in May. Customers can call their local GSU office and make an appointment with an energy specialist who will make a visual inspection of the home. After the walk-through, the auditor will make recommendations on how the customer can save both energy and money.

"What the auditor will be looking for," said Shepard, "are things like dirty air conditioner filters, cracks

around doors and windows that could be fixed with caulking and weatherstripping and dripping faucets that keep the water heater operating for longer periods of time. Any of these will cause you to use more energy than you need to."

The program kicked off in March with local dealers offering air conditioner check-ups. Shepard pointed out that a demonstration study sponsored by Louisiana State University and GSU last July and August showed that good maintenance "is profitable for the homeowner." The five homes used in the study averaged a savings of almost \$33 a month.

To reach wider audiences, GSU has speakers available to give programs on "Budget Your Energy Use" to local clubs and organizations.

Contact Shepard or Carol Morris, supervisor of consumer information services, at the GSU Beaumont

office or the local GSU office for a speaker.

As part of the statewide effort to make consumers aware of saving energy, a portion of GSU's telephone tape library, "Energy Talks" has been made available to customers of six other utility companies in the

state through the end of May. The telephone tape library service was installed last June and the information covers a wide variety of energy and energy-management topics.

The toll-free telephone number for "Energy Talks" is (800) 231-3080.

"We are delighted to work with the governor, the Boy Scouts, the other utility companies in the state and the customers in helping Texans 'tune up' their air conditioners, 'wrap up' their water heaters and 'check up' their homes," said Shepard.
