Ultrasound Added To Hospital

The Tyler County Hospital Auxiliary has come up with another innovation for Tyler County Hospital which places the 49 bed facility in Woodville far ahead of some of our neighboring counties.

General Electric Ultrasound Diagnostic machine has been pressed into service this week with another machine which actually looks into the body.

Mrs. Dana Odom, who is also an employee in the bookkeeping department of the hospital and expecting in June, said "I'm very comfortable as Dr. Gordon Jones used the sound scanning device to produce a picture on a screen which represented the form of a child in her womb."

"The best part is when the child is moving," Mrs. Odom said. The father, Randy Odom, is and employee of the Tyler County Juvenile Probation Department.

According to Jones the machine can also be used in diagnosing problems in many vital organs in the body.

DeDe Cordes, coordinator of the Country Caper a Barbeque, Barn Dance and Auction this year scheduled for Saturday, June 2nd at the S Bar W Ranch should result in large earnings for the charity group which specializes in programs which help the hospital in making needed material purchases.

The auction is a silent auction which will feature items and/or services donated by Dick Cordes, hospital administrator said the doctors are really in favor of the machine and expect to use it alot.

BOY OR GIRL? That's the question most asked when Dr. Gordon Jones, Chief of Radiology employs the new Ultrasound diagnostic machine at the Tyler County Hospital. Monday, Dr. Jones and maternity patient, Dana Odom along with Gayle Vinson, Radiology technician and DeDe Cordes, President of the Tyler County Hospital Auxiliary (all shown below) are now in the business of looking inside a patients body with a sound device which records images through bodily fluids and a special oil that's applied to the skin. Patient Dana Odom, who's expecting in June, said the best part is when the machine is used in a way which shows the baby moving. Dr. Jones said the machine can also be applied to determine problems in other organs throughout the body such as the gallbladder, the pancreas, liver, spleen, lymph nodes, kidneys, adrenal glands, and other portions of the body.

Caucus Key To Demo Presidency

The names of Democratic Presidential contenders will not appear on the May 5, 1984 Texas Democratic Primary ballot.

Texas Democrats will express their preference for the presidential candidate by attending their precinct conventions on Saturday, May 5, 1984.

Democratic Precinct conventions will be held across the state beginning at 7 p.m. on Saturday, May 5, 1984 in Texas' nearly 7,000 precincts. The location of the precinct convention is usually at the polling place where Democrats voted earlier in the day. However, Democratic voters should check with their Precinct Chair or Election Judge when they vote on May 5th to confirm the exact location of their precinct convention.

Precinct conventions will be called in the order by the Democratic Precinct Chair. If the Chair is absent, however, any qualified Democratic voter may convene the convention.

In order to attend the precinct convention a voter must have voted in the Democratic Primary, May 5 - either in person or absentee. At the time of voting the individual's blue voter registration card is marked "voted democratic primary."

This stamped voter registration card or other evidence of having voted is the "ticket" for admission to the Democratic Party precinct convention.

Precinct Convention attendees will caucus by candidate choice and uncommitted preference to elect their proportionate representation.

In fact, even the political campaigns seem to be old news. No one of the Democratic candidates seem to be able to build a fire under their own candidacy, but it isn't for lack of try-

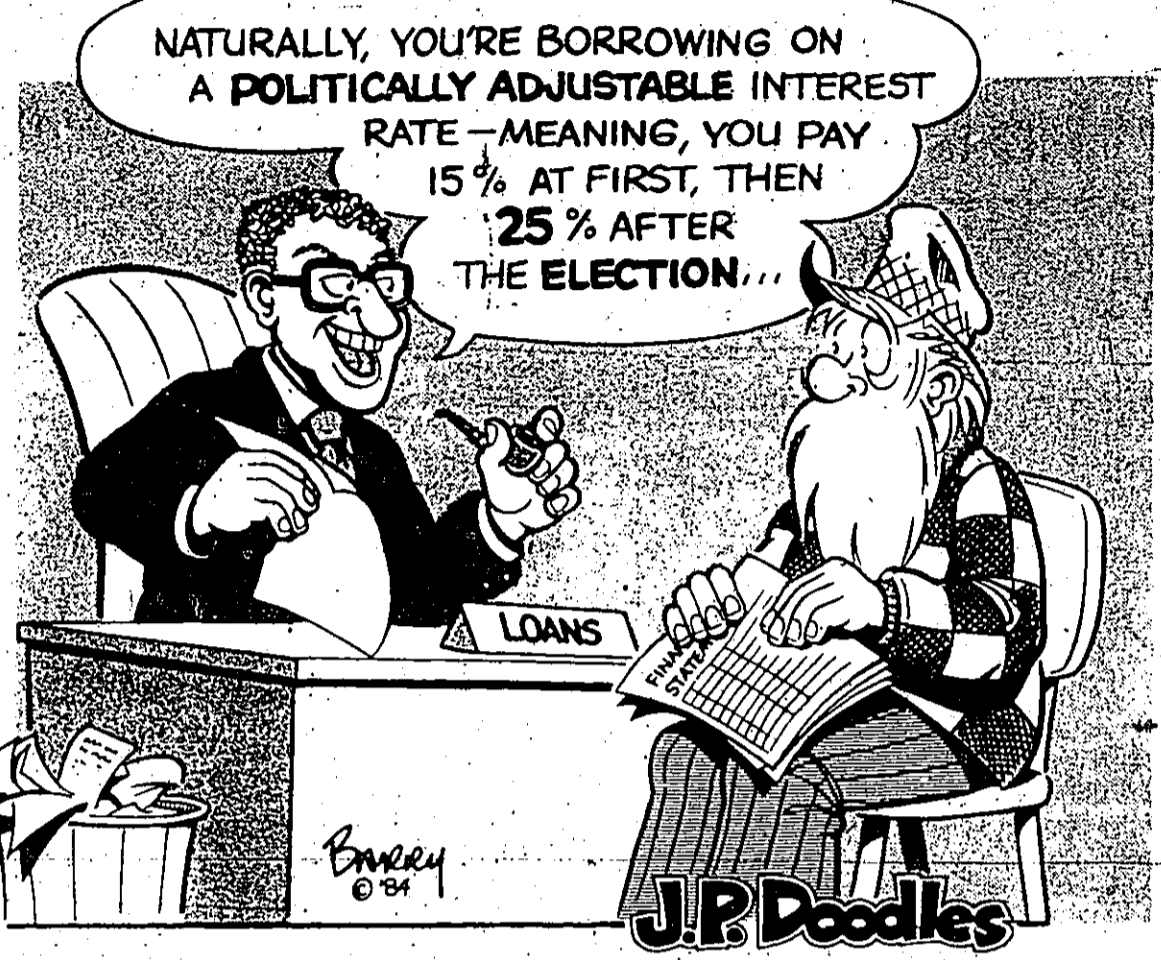

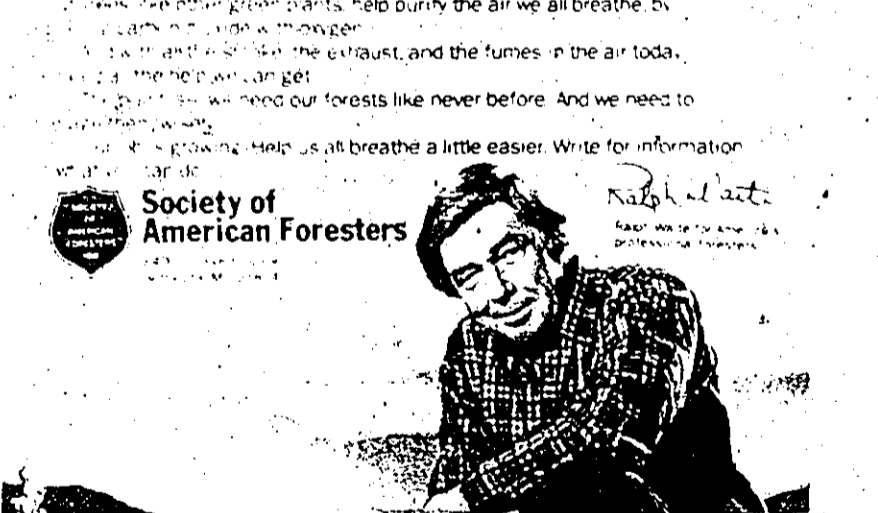

**May 15 Declared
'Band Day' At Warren**

In honor of the High School's first Sweepstakes Band in the district's history, the Warren Board of Trustees passed a Resolution proclaiming May 15, 1984 as "Band Day." The Resolution recognized the accomplishment of each participant in the Warren High School Band. Band Director Don Stokton, and Assistant Director Russell Cronin, in winning the Sweepstakes Award. "Band Day" will be highlighted with a Concert on the night of May 15 by all the Warren Bands.

The Board gave final approval to two new policies regarding promotion retention at Elementary School and Junior High School. Both policies will go into effect in 1984-85. In Elementary School, a first grade student who has not mastered the primer shall be retained. In the remaining elementary grades, retention will be recommended if a student is one semester behind in reading or mathematics.

In Junior High School, if a student fails two or more academic subjects (i.e., Language Arts, Math, Science, Social Studies, or Reading), the student shall be retained in that grade level. In Elementary School, Junior High School, meetings will be held during the year with the following student's parents and teachers at the

end of the first reporting period, near the end of the first semester, and late April/early May after the 5th reporting period. Additional meetings may be held if it is deemed necessary.

The following additions were made in the Student Discipline Policy regarding offenses for which a student may be suspended by a principal or his delegate for a period not to exceed ten (10) school days, or expelled by the Board of Trustees for a period of one (1) school year or less:

E. Violation of dress code, which shall include but not be limited to the wearing by a student of one sex of an article of clothing normally worn exclusively by a member of the opposite sex, e.g., earrings worn by boys.

N. Any conduct which tends to create a disruption, on school premises or during a school-sponsored activity, of sufficient severity to impede the normal business of the school or to impinge upon the rights of other students or members of the faculty or staff, including but not limited to making a bomb threat.

O. Possession at school or at school-sponsored functions of a gun, knife, or any other object capable of inflicting bodily harm to another person.

Talking Real Estate

Colleen Blackwell, expert. Here are some tips taken from the Book, "The Complete Guide to Co-ops and Condominiums" (Price \$7.95) by David T. Goldstick, an attorney and Carolyn Janik, a licensed real estate agent.

Because real estate is a local business, your agent should live in the area where he or she sells and should know it intimately. If an agent has to study a map to find a home you are going to visit, be wary, he or she should already know the way. In fact, Janik and Goldstick say the best agents drive each route and inspect the property before taking customers out. If you also are looking for homes in a location more than 20 miles away, get another agent to show you homes in that area.

Look for someone trained in more than the art of just selling. One of the most important functions of the real estate agent is to determine how much he or she can afford to pay for a home. To qualify a customer, they explain, "the agent must spend some time in the office taking down essential financial information and adding up the figures. Then he must come up with an accurate estimate of how much that customer can afford to pay monthly for housing." Even if you are a buyer, they advise, don't shy away from the agent who asks questions about your financial status. The agent needs such information for negotiating a price for you - and to help you avoid a turnaround when you make a loan application.

Look for an agent who determines a profile of your needs and wants and doesn't try to get you to change them. If you are the seller, you want an agent who inspects your property carefully, asks many questions, and is accurate and honest in evaluating the worth of your home. Good negotiating skills are also essential - that is, someone who can get the buyer and seller to come to a meeting of the minds.

The National Association of Realtors and Texas Association of Realtors offer excellent opportunities for continued education through designated programs, seminars, regional activities, and regular publications and updates. Realtors are real estate professionals who are members of the National Association of Realtors and subscribe to its strict Code of Ethics. Not all real estate brokers and agents are Realtors. To be sure you're working with one, look for the federally registered membership mark, Realtor. If you need help in buying or selling property in Tyler County, contact one of the members of the Tyler County Board of Realtors.

WORKAHOLICS CAN BE HAPPY!

When Marilyn Machlowitz was in college, she was accused of being a workaholic. Marilyn decided to do her doctoral dissertation on the subject and, subsequently, to write a book called *Workaholics: Living With Them, Working With Them* (Addison-Wesley, 1980).

One of the first surprises turned up by Ms. Machlowitz's research was the discovery that, as a group, the workaholics she interviewed were "remarkably satisfied with their lives," and she concluded, "Satisfactions with work and with life are more apt to be intertwined than mutually exclusive."

According to Ms. Machlowitz, four basic elements in workaholics' lives determine whether the individuals are contented or unhappy: (1) the manner in which their families accept their work habits, (2) the amount of autonomy and variety that exists in their work, (3) the degree to which their personal skills and work styles match those required by their jobs, and (4) their general state of health.

The workaholics who were satisfied with these four aspects of their lives generally felt good about themselves, also. But those who'd had difficulties with one or more elements were risking what might be termed the three occupational hazards of the intensely self-driven worker... burnout, family problems, and heart disease.

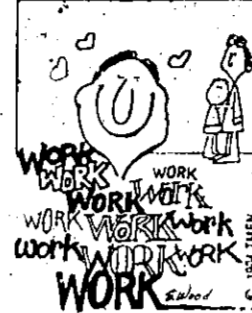
Psychologist Herbert J. Freudenberger is a specialist in burnout. He calls it "the consequence of a work situation where the person feels he's banging his head against the wall day after day, year after year." Burnout is likely to occur when nonstop labor and devotion fail to produce the expected satisfactions or rewards.

One of the most striking findings of Marilyn Machlowitz's study was that on a day-to-day basis, it's not the workaholics who pay the biggest price for their busy lifestyles; rather, it's the people who live with them who suffer most. Dedicated doers tend to spend less time at home than most people. As a consequence, their families often feel that the workaholics don't want to be with them.

Being a workaholic may or may not increase a person's risk of developing heart disease. According to cardiologists Meyer Friedman and Ray Rosenman, much depends on whether the individual is a "Type A" or "Type B" personality. The hallmarks of the former class are excessive competitive drive and intense time urgency, characteristics common to the problem workaholic. Type B individuals, on the other hand, may also be hardworking, but are more easygoing; they exhibit no excessive competitiveness or overwhelming sense of time pressure.

In many ways, satisfied workaholics are lucky people. Not only do they tend to love their careers, but the "rewards" for their characteristic problems—which involves learning to relax, take vacations, and spend more quality time with their families and friends—can be rich with opportunity as well. Those workaholics who are able to make needed changes in their lives before serious physical or emotional problems arise can quietly agree with Winston Churchill's observation: "Those whose work and pleasure are one are Fortune's favorite children."

WORKAHOLICS CAN BE HAPPY!

When Marilyn Machlowitz was in college, she was accused of being a workaholic. Marilyn decided to do her doctoral dissertation on the subject and, subsequently, to write a book called *Workaholics Living With Them, Working With Them* (Addison-Wesley, 1980).

One of the first surprises turned up by Ms. Machlowitz's research was the discovery that, as a group, the workaholics she interviewed were "remarkably satisfied with their lives," and she concluded, "Satisfaction with work and with life are more apt to be intertwined than mutually exclusive."

According to Ms. Machlowitz, four basic elements in workaholics' lives determine whether the individuals are contented or unhappy: (1) the manner in which their families accept their work habits, (2) the amount of autonomy and variety that exists in their work, (3) the degree to which their personal skills and work styles match those required by their jobs, and (4) their general state of health.

The workaholics who were satisfied with their lives generally felt good about themselves, also. But those who had difficulties with one or more elements were rickety what might be termed the occupational hazards of the intensely self-driven worker.

Psychologist Herbert J. Freudenberger is a specialist in burnout. Burnout is likely to occur when nonstop labor and devotion fail to produce the expected satisfactions or rewards.

One of the most striking findings of Marilyn Machlowitz's study was that on a day-to-day basis it is not the workaholics who pay the biggest price for their busy life-styles; rather, it's the people who live with them who suffer most. Dedicated doers tend to spend less time at home than most people. As a consequence, their families often feel that the workaholic does not want to be with them.

Being a workaholic may or may not increase a person's risk of developing heart disease. According to cardiologists Meyer Friedman and Ray Rosenman, much depends on whether the individual is a "Type A" or "Type B" personality. The hallmarks of the former class are excessive competitive drive and intense time urgency, characteristics common to the problem workaholic. 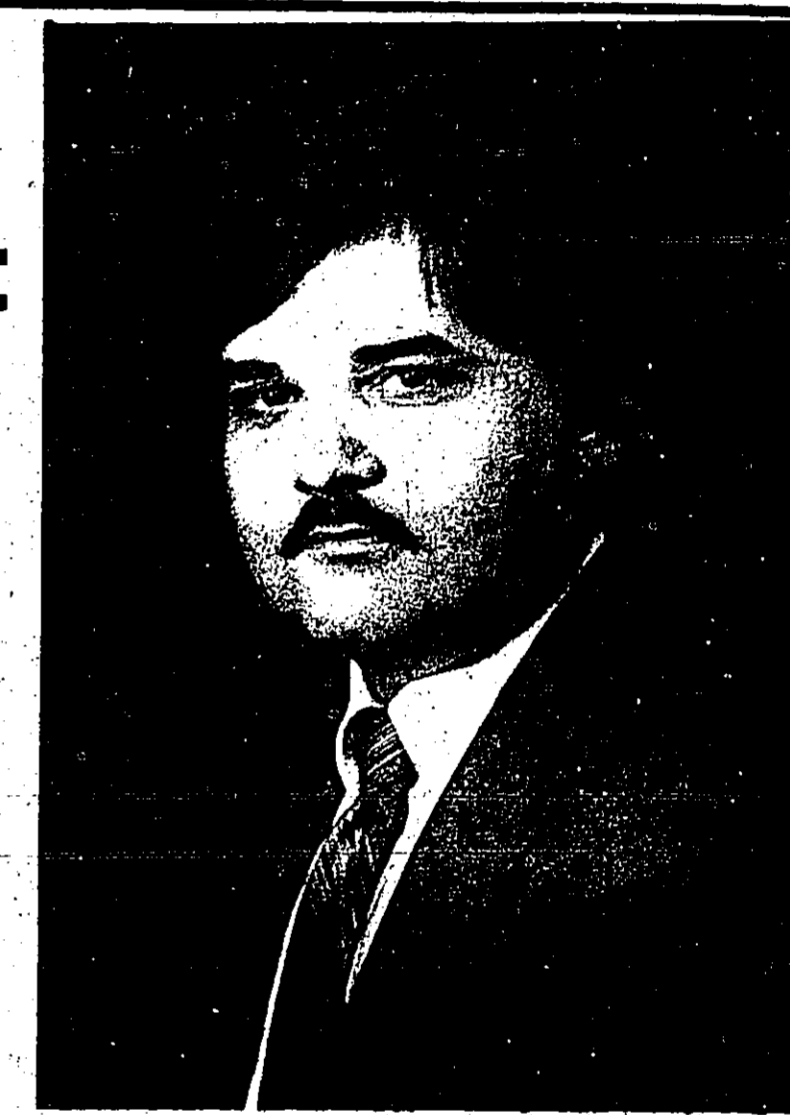

"THE GOVERNMENT IS BROKE!"

Never before has the federal budget been so far out of balance. The fiddler must be paid. The longer we wait, the higher the price will be. The national debt now stands at nearly 1.4 Trillion Dollars or some \$6,000.00 for every man, woman, and child in this District and in our Nation.

The more the government borrows, the less there is for us to invest in our business and our country. What is the answer to dilemma? 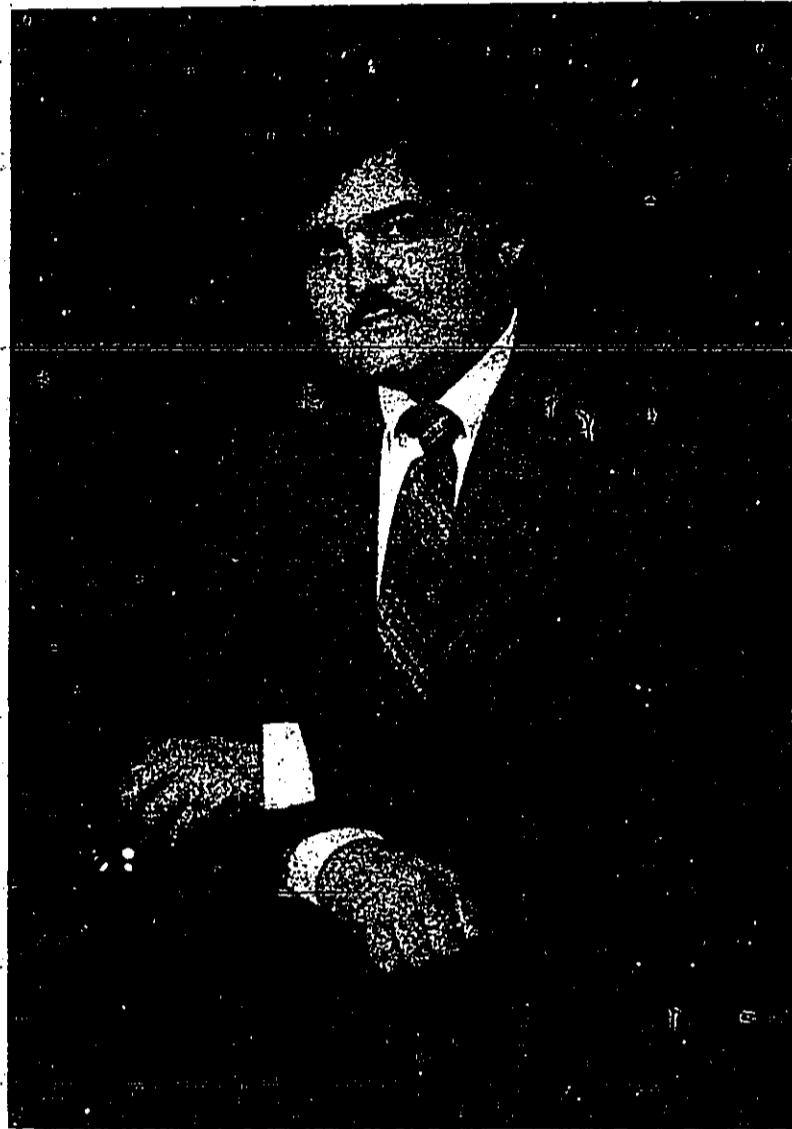

This plant can produce between 150,000 to 200,000 vehicles annually, anything from tanks to rocket launchers. In fact, the plant turned out military equipment used during the invasion of Afghanistan. The Kama River Plant was a very dumb risk. If their people are hungry

---Let's feed them. If they have no clothes ---Let's clothe them. But! Don't give them the very sword to slay us with! There are many kinds of strengths and no one kind will suffice—above all, words alone are not enough. The U.S. is a peaceful Nation. And where our strength and determination are clear, our words need merely to convey conviction, not belligerence. If we are strong, our strength will speak for itself. If we are weak, words will be of no help.

We need a nuclear arms control. We must emphasize negotiations with the Soviets in preventing the use of nuclear weapons as well as limiting the numbers of nuclear bombs and support a verifiable, a verifiable, freeze on all nuclear weapons. A Nation whose children have nuclear nightmares is not a secure Nation. The National defense needs more effective, more maneuverable, conventional forces rather than a too sophisticated, multibillion dollar weapons system.
