Wilson, Blake, Fowler, Brasher, Tolbert Win

Tyler County Democratic Primary results Saturday, which were canvassed early Tuesday were declared official by Democratic chairman Morris Clemmons finding only a one-vote discrepancy in a race which was uncontested.

Largest vote-getter was Incumbent Sheriff Leon Fowler who gar-

nered 4,425 for a whopping 85 percent of the total vote of 5,265. The total possible vote was 11,415.

Runoffs are scheduled also in the Precinct #3 Commissioner race between Jerry Mahan who earned 526 votes to the 388 vote total of Willis Graham.

A runoff is also likely in the race for Constable

Precinct #1 between John Young of Warren who earned 534 votes and W. B. Bailey who polled a total of 399 votes.

Other interesting races locally saw Incumbent Congressman Charles Wilson outlast a strong local effort to seat Nacegdoches businessman Jerry Johnson. In Tyler County, John-

son outperformed all surrounding counties in that unsuccessful attempt. Vote totals show Wilson winning with a 2691 total to that of 1648 for Johnson. Others in that race included Lloyd Dickens, a former school superintendent and Mitch Hickman a Silsbee Realtor and William Duncan a Lufkin foreign car dealer.

The State Senatorial race saw Incumbent Roy Blake retain his Senatorial seat despite a strong push by Tyler's John McDonald.

Blake earned a total of 2948 votes while McDonald earned 1905. In the overall District wide tabulating Blake earned 58 percent of the vote losing his home county, Angelina County, to blacks and heavy industry interests," he said.

For the State Board of Education Wayne Fredrick defeated Bernard Packard.

Incumbent Tax Assessor Collector Barbara Tolbert was reinstated in office with a resounding defeat over Paul E. Smith. Tolbert earned a total of 4086 to a total 924 for Smith.

In the Justice of the Peace Precinct #1 race Incumbent Wanda Bra-

sher defeated former J. P. Justice E.A. Sturrock who had served for a period of eight years here. Brasher earned 996 votes to Sturrock's total of 399.

In the Constable Precinct #2 race Lynn Clamton defeated Melvin Tarver by a vote total of 694 to 318.

Constable Precinct 3 voting action saw Incumbent Harley Crews defeat Joe K. Hughes. Crews earned a total of 803 votes while Hughes earned a total of 552.

In the Commissioner Precinct 4 voting activities, James (Bo) Jordan earned 740 votes to the nearest contender Clyde Street who garnered a total of 215 votes.

Constable Precinct 4 polling saw Incumbent Arthur Gilchrist win out over J.L. Fowler by a margin of 594.

\$50 Million Wood-Fired Boiler Soon At Evadale

Temple-Eastex Incorporated chairman and CEO, Joe C. Denman, Jr. announced today that the Temple-Inland board of directors approved construction of a \$50 million wood-fired boiler and turbine-generator at Temple-Eastex' pulp and paperboard mill at Evadale, Texas.

According to Temple-Eastex group vice president David L. Ashcraft the boiler will consume 480,000 tons of wood residues a year and make the mill 80 percent energy self-sufficient. The new facility will replace two existing boilers, and a new master control room will centralize operations

and permit effective utilization of mill energy. Ashcraft also noted that the new boiler would allow the paperboard mill to use available and less costly wood wastes in place of natural gas. "This project keeps us cost competitive in the manufacture of pulp and paperboard and will allow us to be stronger competitor in the world market."

Rust International, a division of Kellogg-Rust, has been retained as project engineer. Construction will begin immediately with start up scheduled for the fourth quarter of 1985.

Annual Beef And Forage Field Day May 12

The Agriculture Committee, Orval Hanson, chairman and the Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation District, Val Blanchette, chairman are pleased to announce the Annual Beef and Forage Field Day to be held Saturday, May 12, 1984. The tour will be held at the Sonderegger Ranch (Thomas Fortenberry) 7 miles west of Warren. The Field Day will start at 9:30 a.m. at the ranch. Directions to the Sonderegger Ranch, go 4 miles west of Warren in 1943 FM road turn right on Lindsey Cemetery Road (dirt road) go 3 miles. Sonderegger Ranch on right.

At the Field Day we will see coastal bermuda pastures over seeded with crimson clover. Mr. Fortenberry is following a planned grazing and haying rotational system. By this system he says he controls most of his weeds. We will observe Mr. Fortenberry's pens and corral for handling his cattle. We will have a set of Texas A&M corral plans available for you if they meet your needs. Mr. Fortenberry's herd is made up of F-1 Brahman Hereford Cross mother-cows and bred to Simmental bulls. We will also see Mr. Fortenberry's catfish lake. Dr. Sim Reeves, Agronomist from Texas A&M will be on hand to answer questions and make comments during the day. He will discuss pasture and hay management and chemical weed control. The Long Leaf Soil and Water Conservation District will sponsor a charcoal hamburger for lunch. Mr. Fortenberry will sponsor the cold drinks. Orval Hanson, chairman of the field day, is sponsoring the tomatoes. Everyone interested in beef cattle and forage production is welcome to attend the Field Day. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

Doucette Homecoming May 20

The belfrey of the Old Community Church at Doucette will be filled with the pealing of the old brass bell on Sunday morning, May 20. It will be calling the "mill Hands" home for the twentieth annual Doucette Homecoming. The activities, under the direction of Eileen Pope, Janie and Wayne Herndon, will be held at the Old Community Church; identified by the towering steeple and bell tower which reaches into the silence once

shared by smoldering smoke stacks and the giant stilted water tank overlooking southeast Texas' largest sawmill. Doucette was known as the "Eldorado" of company towns on the sawmill circuit. It was the home of the Tyler County Allstars, a very formidable foe for Sabine and Houston area ball clubs of the era. The Chautauqua, a travelling entertainment and educational company made Doucette almost every summer.

Among the lectures for the company was Percy Foreman, Dean of Texas Lawyers. Mr. Foreman and Dr. John Tate, former exporter and Detroit Tigers pitcher, who attained recognition as a semi-pro player, have been invited as special guest for the occasion. A barbecue dinner with the trimmings prepared by the ladies of the town; will be served at noon on the church grounds. All former and current residents are

invited. Kermit Parker is in charge of the entertainment and Mrs. Lawrence Upchurch is food coordinator for the event. There will be a display of old pictures, plaques and newsletters in the church building which has been recommended as a historical landmark. The committee hopes to have the work completed this year.

Sap should be up on pine timber about this time of the year to make a pole peeler needed. He picked up a lot of ticks and red bugs on a pole peeling good. A lot of people have worked the woods and hotter at Jim Sullivan one way or the other while he was a railroad switch loading in the timber business. There were no easy jobs in the timber; you had to be a peeler. About ninety cents a day was my average. A cypress tree was different to peel. You get a piece of bark about eight inches wide started and you could pull it off with your hands. A pole peeler, mostly hand made from a piece of a cross-cut saw, an axe can't hook and a jug of water was all the tools

Vestal Flowers sawed down many log trees in his time and no telling how many logs he would of sawed down if he had ever got his cap on his head straight. Ben Nugent was one of the best pole peelers ever hit the woods. I found Frank Grimes.

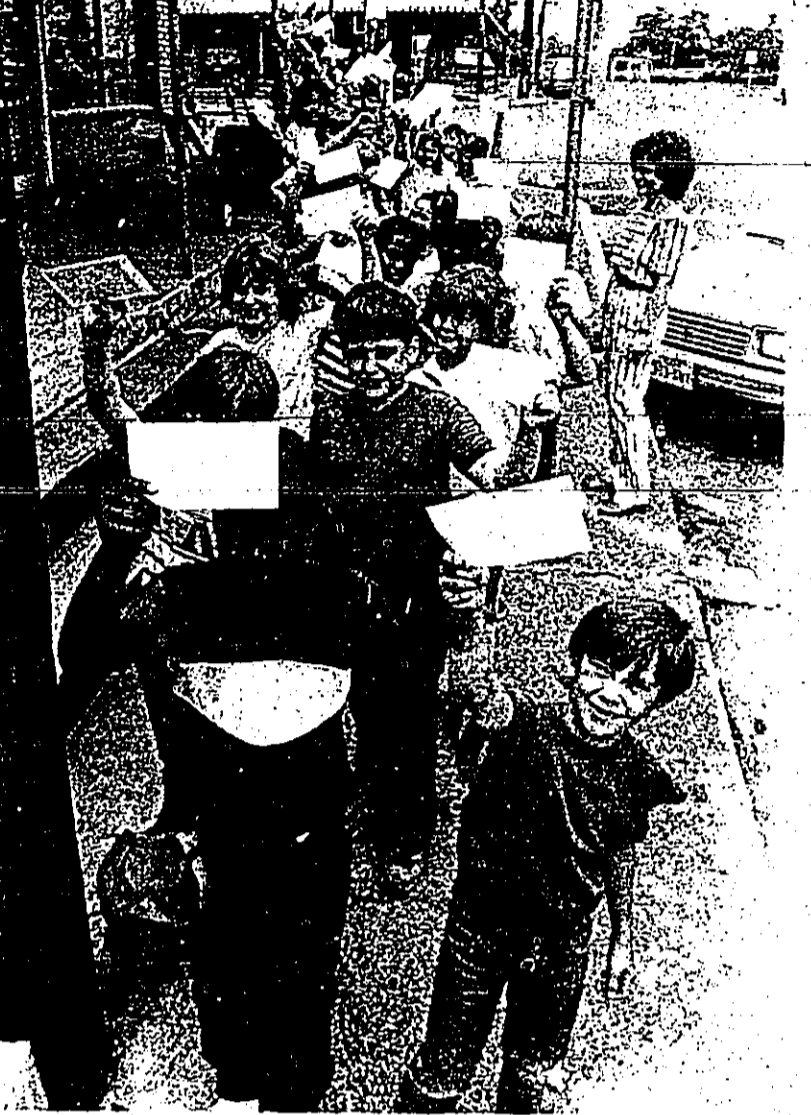

You've all been reading about the folks across the country who have been getting \$100,000 and more in billing charges from their friendly telephone company.

There are bad folks out there who find out your telephone credit card number, and the first thing you know you receive a shoe box full of telephone bills to all places in the world, running into the tens of thousands of dollars. And they aren't calls to your Aunt Minnie in Nacogdoches.

The only thing you've got going for you is that you don't have to pay for those calls if you didn't make them.

On the other hand, if you're a company like Exxon you can get your self mailed with a \$16 million dollar water bill, and Tom where it stands in court, Exxon might have to sell a bunch of gasoline to pay off that runaway meter.

Here's how it all started, and when you stop and think about it, it's really kind of funny in a way.

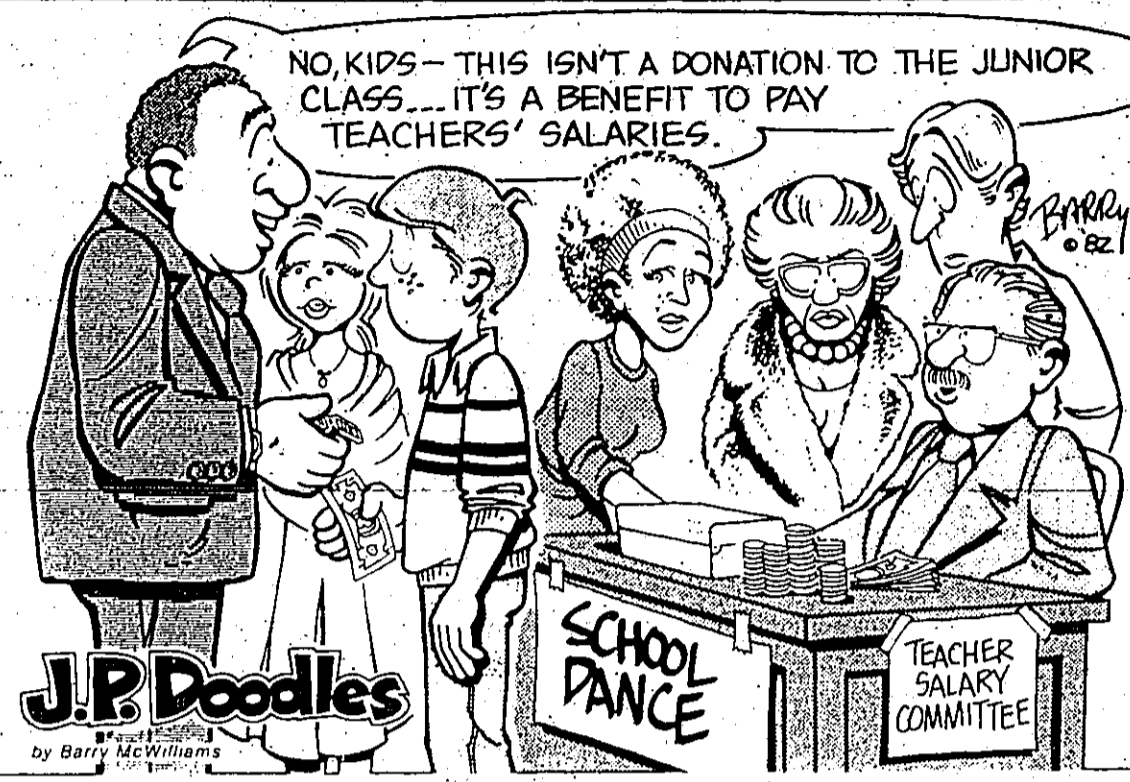
Exxon has an oil refinery in the Caribbean. Located on a little bit of island called Aruba. Now Aruba is noted for having an oversupply of fresh water, being surrounded on all sides by salt. And running a refinery we understand does take a lot of water, fresh water that is.

So Exxon figured out kind of a slick way to resolve part of the problem.

When their ships were moving from Aruba to Poughkeepsie, they carried salt water ballast. As they moved up the Hudson River they discharged that salt water into the river, and refilled their ballast tanks with fresh water, which they then carried back to Aruba, used most in their refinery operations, and sold the rest to an Aruba water works.

This has been going on for years, the suit the state of New York filed the other day says ever since 1971.

For twelve years, Exxon tankers have been leaving Caribbean salt water in the Hudson River, and carrying Hudson River water to Aruba. Kind of a New York to New York, and New York to New York. Now they know how well figure that a tanker load of salt water

Letter To The Editor

'Volunteerism Most Equitable'

Dear Mr. Editor:

I am a private practitioner in the small East Texas town of Woodville, Tyler County, Texas. I would like to take this opportunity to take a position on how I stand with the court-appointed attorneys and the role they play in the criminal justice system.

I have a local law office which is made up of 95 to 96 percent civil practice. I am forced or conscripted, if you will, to serve as court-appointed counsel to represent people who at least in the past have all been found guilty except for a few occasions when the case was dismissed.

I am a Christian, an American, a Texas, a father and a husband, in that order. I have this list of roles that I play in that of a lawyer.

I was ordered, at least during my first year, to represent people who have perpetrated crimes upon the innocent American public. I have no choice in this matter. If I elect to reduce to represent these people, I thereby subject myself to contempt of Court and a probably jail sentence and/or fine.

This unwanted task that I carry out as court-appointed attorney on criminal cases creates a great inconsistency in my teachings and relationships with my children. I try to teach my son and daughter to tell the truth, to believe in God and pursue correct ethical and way of life. It is difficult to stand in the courtroom as

all day, among my peers, and represent people who have perpetrated crimes against the people of the State of Texas and then go home in the afternoon or at night and attempt to teach my children about honor, ethics and the pursuit of right.

I think that our county, as in most Texas counties, has very good law enforcement and prosecution. Also, the Judges in our county, like most Texas counties, are hard working, conscientious individuals who are doing the very best job that they can with a bad situation. The "bad situation" that I refer to is the one whereby the Judges are obligated to appoint indigent defendants an attorney in criminal cases. So therefore, I do not fault the Trial Courts for the position that we are trial lawyers are in. It is certainly not their fault that a lawyer may be appointed to represent someone who is absolutely guilty. It is also not the fault of the trial Judge when the same criminal defendant files a writ against his attorney for ineffective assistance of counsel when the lawyer did not want to take the case in the first place at a rate of pay that is far below what is billed a paying client.

For example, for the last court-appointed criminal case I tried I was paid about ten (10) cents for every dollar I billed the county.

It is my feeling that if the Trial and/or Appellant Courts find that the attorney thought the defendant was your door, or greets you at one of the local stores - please, continue to help us help. BUY SOME LIGHT BULBS - God Bless You and Thanks.

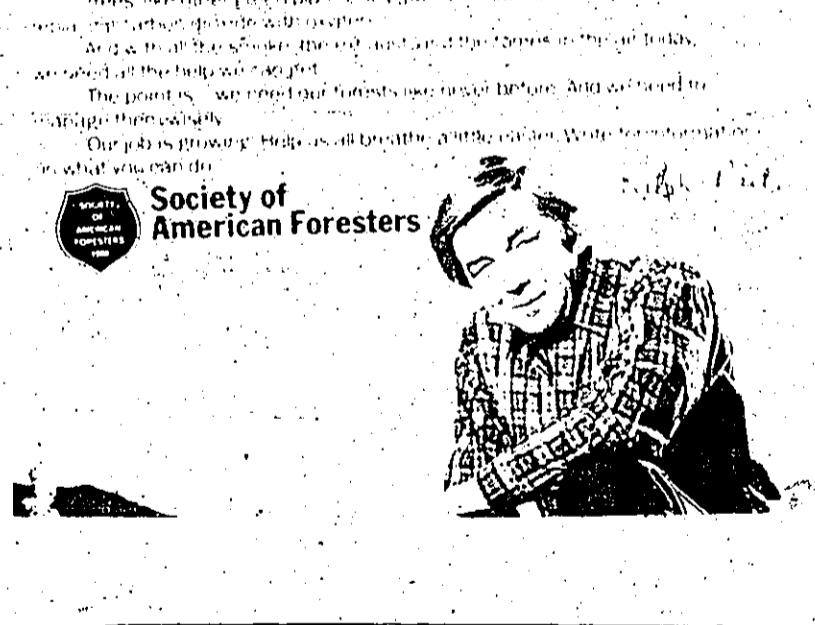

Texas Youth Commission Feeling Juvenile Surge

Fewer Texas juveniles (youth aged 10-17) are being arrested, but the number of those committed to the Texas Youth Commission (TYC), the state's juvenile corrections agency, has continued to increase for the past 10 years.

The increases in total TYC commitments were in non-violent offenders (youth who committed property crimes, such as burglaries and car thefts). That figure has increased 50 percent since 1975: from 1,021 to 1,522 in 1983.

The number of youth committed to state authority for violent offenses, however, has been gradually decreasing for the past decade, said Ron Jackson, Executive Director of the juvenile system for the past ten years.

Juvenile violent offenders who were sent to TYC in 1976 numbered 240. In 1983 that number was down to 197.

Unlike adult criminals sent to the Texas prison system, juveniles committed to the Texas Youth Commission do not receive specific sentences. The amount of time juveniles must spend in TYC facilities is not determined by the committing judge, but is left up to Commission authorities.

Youth who have committed murder must be incarcerated at least two years, according to TYC policy. Other violent offenders (those who have committed such crimes as rape, armed robbery and aggravated assault) must remain at least one year in a secure institution.

Youth who have committed violent offenses are placed at the TYC training school located at Giddings—the

most secure facility which is surrounded by a 14-foot fence.

Non-violent offenders (those who have committed property crimes) are placed in four other training schools—located at

Brownwood, Crockett, Gainesville, and Poyote. Houses are located in or in TYC Halfway Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Harlingen, residential centers, Richmond and San Antonio. These small TYC programs provide care for 24 youth each.

Two additional TYC Halfway Houses will be opened soon. In addition, the Youth Commission places some non-violent offenders in outdoor camping programs.

The length of time a non-violent youth remains in a treatment program varies from four months to about eight months. All juveniles committed to the Youth Commission remain under the Commission's jurisdiction until they are 18 years old. Most, however, do not stay incarcerated in a TYC program that long. If

they are released before they are 18, they then continue under supervision of a TYC parole officer until they are discharged by law at age 18. While on parole, most youth are returned to their homes—and remain there unless their parole is revoked, and they are sent back to a TYC training school. Juvenile parole is generally revoked only if further crime is committed.

While in a TYC residential program, all juveniles attend academic school, receive vocational training, or work toward obtaining their G.E.D. Extensive recreational programs are available, on-campus and off-campus employment is possible and individual and group counseling is done.

Only about 10 percent of the juveniles committed to the Texas Youth Commission are females. "A typical TYC youth is a 15-year-old male, a member of a minority, from a broken family in a metropolitan area, in the lower socioeconomic class, and has completed the seventh grade, generally through

"social" promotion. He is behind in math and reading skills, and he has been arrested an average of seven times BEFORE being committed to the Texas Youth Commission," said Jackson. How can juvenile delinquency be curbed?

"A number of studies have been done to determine the effectiveness of rehabilitation of juveniles," said Jackson. "Several researchers have suggested that rehabilitation should be focused on the less serious offenders," he explained. "A relatively small number of juveniles commit a large amount of crime, and studies suggest that these youth are poor targets for rehabilitation. The only effective method for stopping their criminal behavior is incarceration."

Select Committee Charts New Course For Public Education

AUSTIN The Select Committee of Public Education held its final meeting last week and took a series of hard choices to set a new course for education in Texas.

The Select Committee's recommendations for higher teacher pay, increased state equalization and for poor school districts, smaller classes in early grades, and greater attention to the disadvantaged took shape after 10 months of hard work.

The committee's report embodies a plan to restore academic excellence and achievement, one that recognizes today's economic realities without shortchanging either our teachers or our children.

Its conclusions reflect the input of many Texans who attended a series of public hearings in different parts of the state. While the public found much to praise in our schools, their criticisms touched on common weaknesses in our educational system: low teacher pay, poor student performance on basic skills tests, too lit-

tle time spent on core academic subjects, during the school day, class-room discipline problems, school districts with too many children and too few dollars.

Now it is the Texas Legislature's turn to transform this blueprint into a workable agenda for our educators and students. As a state, we have an exciting opportunity to redirect our priorities and renew our commitment to academic excellence.

I am confident that, by late May, a majority of the Texas House and Senate will unite behind an education reform package that will help reduce the economic incentive for our most talented and experienced teachers to leave the classroom for better paying jobs in private industry.

We are in a unique position to clarify our goals for the managers of the largest public school network in the nation. The work begun by the Select Committee on Public Education can serve as a departure point for legislation as significant as the Gilmer

Aiken bill that improved the system of channeling state dollars to local school districts.

Every Texan owes a debt of gratitude to our predecessors in the Legislature who had the foresight to create the Permanent School Fund, and investment of state assets that channels millions of dollars regularly into public school education.

Today, we are asking more from our school system than ever before. New sources of revenue are needed to help operate our schools, but new dollars alone will not solve all problems in the classroom.

Technology is changing on almost a daily basis, and Texas is emerging as a leading competitor among the 50 states for high tech and computer industries. We must have an educational system flexible enough to train our students to meet this challenge.

A special legislative session early this summer can represent a major milestone for education in Texas. We cannot afford a missed opportunity.
