Woodville Hires New Principals

Hiring of three new principals for the Woodville school District was announced last Tuesday night following a Woodville Board meeting which included an upward revision of income received from district property tax revenues, purchase of a mini-computer, and complaints of "unfair treatment" from a parent.

Burkville Curriculum Director Larry Dickerson will assume the position of Woodville High School principal in July. Dickerson has served as Curriculum Director for the past two years and has previously served as an assistant dean at McLennan College in Waco, an instructor and program director at Southwestern Oklahoma State University and a high school science teacher at Burkville. Dickerson, his wife, Sharon, and two sons, Marcus, age 9 and Jason, age 6, will be moving to Woodville this summer.

Woodville sixth grade math teacher Bob Borel was named Woodville Intermediate School (grades 4-5) principal, a position he will assume in August. Borel has taught 6 grade self-contained math and served as Title I reading coordinator and taught in Woodville District for the past ten (10) years. Borel and his wife, Jan, have three children; Eryn, age 8, Robert, age 6, and Jason, age 4.

Principal selected for Woodville Elementary school (grades 1-3) was Delbert Murphy, currently elementary teacher with Kountze Schools. Murphy has previously taught an elementary teacher for Evadale and Chester schools. Murphy and wife, Linda have two children; Robert, age 14 and Chadwick, age 10.

The Woodville School District revised previous incorrect estimated tax income for the school district. Those estimates had not included the partial payment of property taxes by several area timber companies who are currently involved in a lawsuit with the Tyler County Tax Appraisal Board. "If the remaining unpaid balances (approximately \$26,000) are paid by the timber companies when the suit is settled, we will have more than enough for our budget" according to Woodville Superintendent Aubry Bradley.

On recommendation of Monroe Prescott, Woodville Trustees accepted the bid of \$46,395 for a 512K, 40 mb NCR Minicomputer and software for payroll, Accounting, fixed assets, personnel, attendance accounting, grade reporting, scheduling, and transportation software packages submitted by EDP Enterprises of Longview, Tx. A Tax department accounting system also was contained in the bid which was traded for additional terminals or other hardware. Prescott estimated the 5 year cost of the NCR system as \$63,987.

Prescott also compared five other bids including TECS of Austin, Texas (\$55,613) and Longhorn Data Systems (\$54,763) using an IBM Minicomputer, Central Data Systems of Dallas, Texas (\$42,000) using Texas Instruments hardware Day Mfr. System of Sherman Texas (\$26,870) using IBM PC micro-computers and continued purchase of Data processing services from Region 5 Service Center (\$19,512) of the Education Agency. Prescott had extensively compared the systems and checked with other schools using the systems-bid before recommending the NCR System. The IBM PC Micro-computers were not considered as adequate to the school districts needs and the cost of use of Region five did not include the commuting cost to Beaumont or the amount of staff time or other costs involved in using those services. Complaints to Trustees by Helen Celestine of "discrimination" by the Woodville ISD athletic program staff and particularly football coach Melvin Houston in alleged harsh treatment of student Jimmy Celestine, she said after he was absent for reported "legitimate" reasons from football practice and further allegations.

Demo Caucus Draws Crowd

"This seems like ten times the number of people we usually have" said Tyler County Democratic Chairman Morris Clemmons describing the turnout when Democratic delegates and alternates elected by the counties precinct caucuses May 5th in the Tyler County Democratic Convention last Saturday morning in the District courtroom. The approximately 93 Democratic delegates and alternates elected a slate of 8 delegates and alternates to the State convention which will be held Friday and Saturday, June 15-16th in Austin.

In addition, the County convention, passed a resolution requesting the State Democratic Party to not select the party's Presidential candidate in Texas using the precinct caucus but to place the presidential preferences on the Primary Ballot and allow the Voters to select the candidate by secret ballot. Final language in the resolution recommended that the party allocate the county's Democratic Delegates to each Democratic Presidential candidate based on his or her percentage of the primary vote in that county.

Houseparents Hired

The Board of Directors of the Tyler County Youth Development Association met Thursday, May 17th to Division of the Texas Department of Human Resources "licensing" to review the progress of the center to begin sheltering 10-17 year old adolescents for crisis intervention needs "no longer than 30 days".

Executive Director Richard Bowen stated the Center would be staffed Friday, June 1st and would probably be licensed to receive children by June 15th. He presented the Board with a list of short-term, intermediate and long-term needs for the Center facility and a Board-requested terms for a \$2,672.60 "line of credit" with Citizens State Bank Plans for in service training for staff were discussed. A financial report

was submitted to the Board of Administrative Secretary Beth Spahn showing deposits of \$3,745.92 and expenditures for May \$2,795.20 leaving a balance of \$950.72 on May 17th. Minimal estimated expenditures for May are \$1,225.51 and \$1,922.23 is available as revenue from Department of Human Resources grant plus a local match of \$213.58 added to that total, she said.

After Board Vice-president Ron Willis and President Brad Smith praised Bowen for "so much work done in such a short time" the Board went into Executive Session emerging to announce "a strong vote of confidence in Director Richard Bowen". The next meeting of the Board is scheduled for May 31st.

The County was eligible for one delegate for each 300 votes cast in the Democratic primary. Six delegates were elected from caucuses of 1 to 3 precincts, with the Spurger Box being the only democratic box casting over 300 votes in the Primary. Three additional delegates were elected by the entire convention. In addition at least one third of the delegates were required to be women.



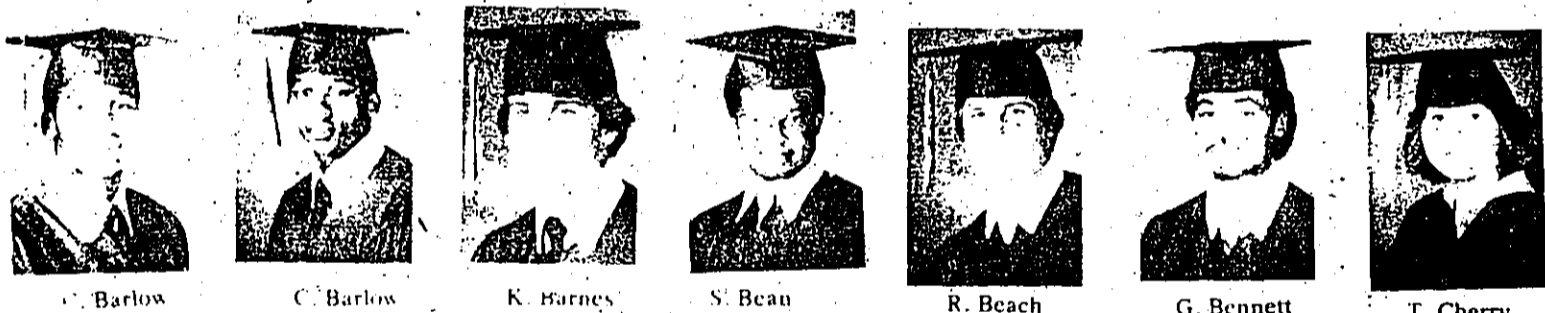
The memories of the days gone by passing through your mind again you remember them. The times you got into trouble for, pass through your mind. Knowing of my freshman year I am now "Having my turn."

I Can't Be An Alcoholic Because...

I CAN'T BE AN ALCOHOLIC because of heart disease, liver disease, high blood pressure, brain damage, over fifty percent of the traffic fatalities on the highways of this country. America. The alcoholic faces death or insanity, or even prison if he cannot find help for his problem. Alcoholism? The deadly disease that strikes society at every level and respects no person, place or thing arrested and untreated it causes its alcoholic victims to become a social liability in most all areas of his life style, in industry, the professional world, at work, at play, at home, or even in his neighborhood he becomes a social burden to all who come in contact with him. No body wants to work for them, no one wants to be seen with him when he is drinking, (except his fellow drinkers), he isn't even welcome at his church anymore, or for that matter in the local jail. Now stop and think for a minute, suppose you suddenly went blind because you went blind from the waist down, or got both legs cut off? Would you expect the treatment described above? Not hardly! Certainly you wouldn't be kicked out of church because you went blind. And they don't put people in jail for getting their legs cut off! So what do you do for a suffering alcoholic? Confine him in a mental institution for the rest of his natural life? Set him in a room full of booze and let him drink himself to death? Lock him in jail for thirty days every time he drinks? Think about all of these things for a bit and we'll

come back to it a little later. Now the alcoholic's family and alcoholism. What about them? What all this alcoholic chaos doing to them? At first the family will try to hide the drinking problem from everyone else, the old social stigma rears its ugly head and, "Ah, he's just a drunk, a lush that can't hold his booze." The neighbors seem to love this kind of gossip and little child - can be real cruel about it, and he because they don't understand what's wrong with the alcoholic in the first place. The alcoholic himself doesn't know what's wrong with him! Alcoholism is one of the most mis-understood diseases in society today! And one of the reasons its mis-understood is because society kept it hidden away as a moral issue instead of recognizing its social disease and needs to be treated as such! No wonder the alcoholic has been in jail for thirty days every time he drinks? Think about all of these things for a bit and we'll

be arrested! And it may save the life of someone very close to you if you make an effort to help him or her help themselves! I say this last because it happened to me. My wife had the courage to ask for help for me and then to follow through on it, and its the best thing that ever happened to me... Because through her initial efforts I came to the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous, and I found acceptance of what I am, an alcoholic, and a way to live with the disease of alcoholism. And live without the use of alcohol to the problem. You see readers, there is no such thing as stability in the alcoholic family. It is an unreasonable, selfish, unending stream of disappointment and fellow-suffering. It works this point in this weeks for writing. What can we do? Recognize alcoholism for what it is! A crippling, killing mal! How wonderful it is to wake up in the morning and know I am free and needs help, call free from slavery to someone! Alcoholism hold and ready to live to cannot be cured, but it day...To its fullest... can be treated and it can all day long.

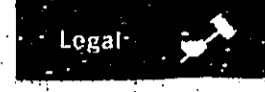
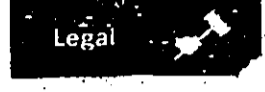
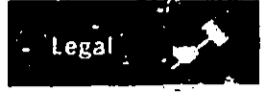
DPS Director Col. Jim Adams Receives Award

AUSTIN--A Texas Department of Public Safety officer has been honored for his contribution to the establishment of a new DPS traffic warrant service system.
 Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, presented Highway Patrol Captain Ed Pringle, 58, of Waco

with the Medal of Merit during recruit graduation ceremonies in Austin on May 11. Pringle is a 35-year DPS veteran.
 "This award is in recognition of Captain Pringle's leadership in implementing a computerized data bank for DPS traffic warrants," Adams said. "Formerly, when these warrants were issued, DPS troopers attempted to physically locate the violators. Considerable time was expended to find the drivers who failed to respond to traffic charges. By utilizing this new system, we've been able

to save manpower while significantly increasing the number of warrants served."
 A total of 18,205 Highway Patrol warrants were served in the first three months of this year compared to 6,918 served during the same period in 1983. Thirty

troopers who had been serving traffic warrants after falling to respond to the DPS traffic citations assigned to other duties. When these persons come into contact with police officers, the warrant data bank is constantly updated with the names of persons for whom warrants have been issued. If it is determined that a warrant exists, the violator will be taken before a magistrate unless he chooses to pay the fine set by the court.
