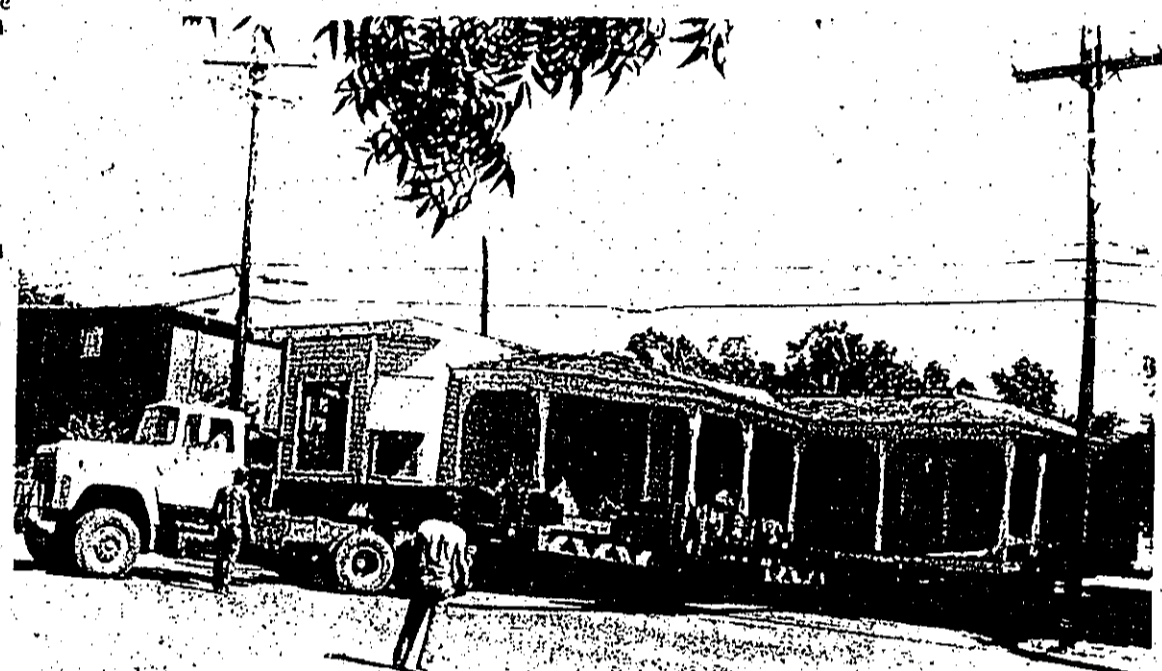
Graham, Young Winners

Approximately 2480 voters of Tyler County's electorate determined the outcome of two county Democratic primary races and contributed the margin lead of Lloyd Doggett over Kent Hance in the state-wide race for the Democratic Senate candidacy. The Colmesneil won with 722 or approximately 59 percent of the Pct. 3 vote to incumbent Commissioner Jerry Maham, also a resident of Colmesneil, totaled 501 or approximately 41 percent of the votes. County-wide Tyler County Democratic voters gave U.S. Senate Candidate Kent Hance a 1593 or approximately 66 percent of the vote compared to Candidate Lloyd Doggett's 811 votes or 34 percent of the county total vote in the Senate race. State-wide pending results of a recount requested by Hance; Lloyd Doggett won by a state-wide margin of 509 votes. In run-off elections for two State Court of Criminal Appeals positions, Tyler County voters gave W.C. Davis 1124 or 55 percent to R. Greenwood's 915 or 45 percent of the vote for position #2. In position #3 vote, candidate Bill White collected 1431 votes or approximately 70 percent of the vote to Thomas Thorpe's 603 votes or approximately 30 percent of the county votes cast.

vote count represents 21 percent. In the Precinct #1 race for Democratic candidate for constable, Warren's John Young garnered 411 or approximately 61 percent of the Pct. 1 vote over Hillster resident W.B. Bailey's 260 or approximately 39 percent of the vote.

Young interviewed Tuesday stated, "Bailey and I had a good race. I'm glad I won, but I want to thank Mr. Bailey for the clean race he ran. There was no mudslinging." In the heavily contested race for Commissioner of Pct. 3, challenger Willis Graham of

Dennis Findley, state statistician, presented the award to Fowler at the annual June Enumeration Training School in Austin.

Fowler, who is a member of the Texas Veterinary Medical Auxiliary, has worked for the TCRS since 1980.

She is one of over 100 field enumerators across Texas who personally interview farmers and ranchers for information about their crops and livestock. Hang on to your pocketbook and wallet. Taxes are comin'.

It's time to pay the piper. We've heard for months now how sorry teachers salaries are. We're tired of dodging potholes on the state highways. Almost every school district needs funds for new curricula to keep up with all the technology our kids are supposed to be familiar with.

And there aren't billions of barrels of oil out there in West Texas or anywhere else to pay the freight, they tell us. So as the State Legislature moves into special session, watch the headlines and see where you're going to get bit.

Meanwhile the Federal Government up in Washington is still spending money like there was no tomorrow, so they will be raising taxes, since nobody up there has found any way to cut the budget, this being an election year and all.

We all have the gimmies, and somebody is going to pay for it. Sin taxes are a favorite with both the Congress and the Legislature. You see it only affects those sorry ones of us who drink whiskey and smoke cigarettes. So look for Austin and Washington, D.C., to tax booze and butt, and that won't raise an awful lot of tax money you understand. But it does make the legislators feel good that they are really doing something to keep sin down to a minimum among their constituents.

And if you're still wondering what other pocket will be picked, keep an eye on the prices at the gas pumps. Look for an increase in state taxes on gasoline. Can't really carp on that one too much. Texas has perhaps the lowest state tax in the country. It's just that all those big trucks from up north have been beating our highways to a pulp of asphalt and cement dust.

The rest of us have been buying smaller cars, using less gasoline, and all of a sudden the tax dollars from that source are getting slim. So we'll jump the tax and see if we can't get some money spent on our road system.

The feds already socked it to us a lot of months ago, but your good friend Tip O'Neill tied that bill up until he could grab the lion's share to build a tunnel under Boston.

Some talk about increasing the state sales tax. And don't think that won't meet some resistance in Austin. Cities and counties have already been tapping that till and there are a lot of exemptions from the sales tax that tax raisers will be taking pot shots at.

And the horrors of that many raise it's ugly head is a personal income tax or a corporate income tax.

You have gotten used to sending the IRS money every April. Maybe there will be another letter in the mailbox to send more to the State of Texas. A lot of states have a personal income tax, so there aren't many places you can run to avoid it. The only hazard we can see to that is that once it's on the books, we ain't ever going to get rid of it, and it will probably keep increasing as the years go by as we find our way again that two and two is five.

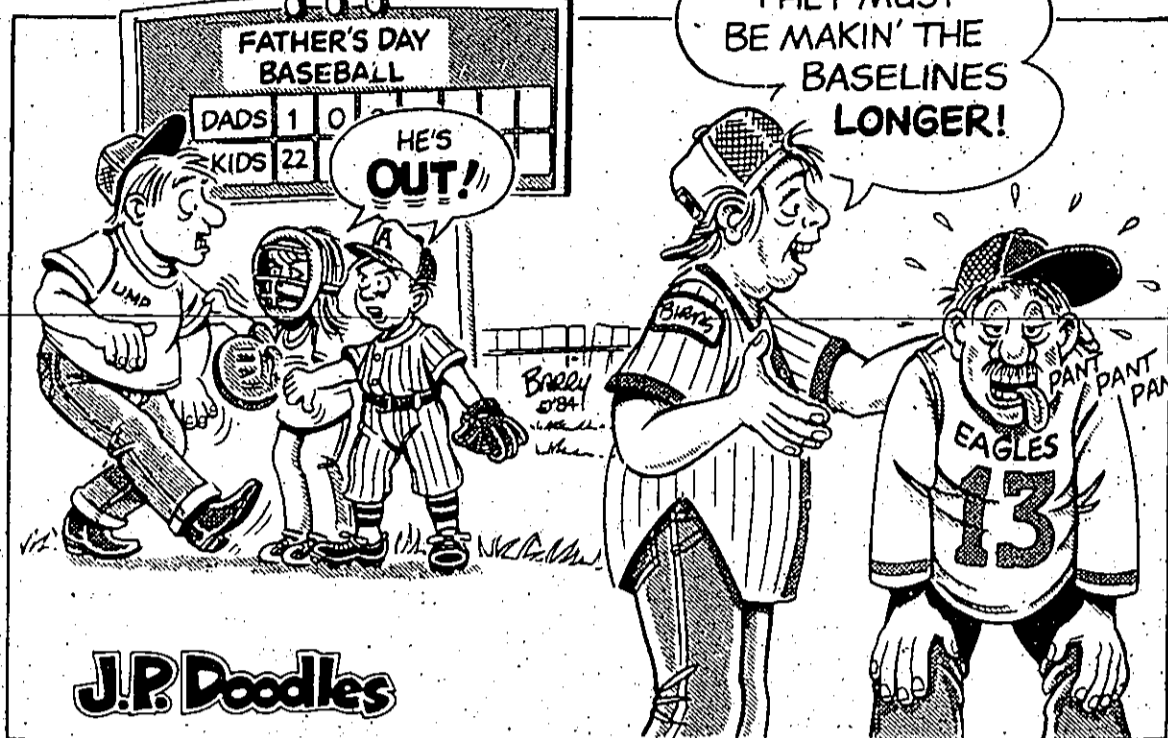
The corporate income tax is less painful than the common folks out there. But again, you're adding to the cost of doing business. Whatever that corporate makes will cost more, and he will either be competitive or you'll be seeing many more "made in Taiwan" widgets on store shelves, or worse, manufacturing folks looking elsewhere where tax rates might be

more attractive. We keep hearing that there's a tax revolt out there. That folks are tired of paying more and more. We have a hunch that's true as long as your individual gimmies won't be affected. Certainly the majority of folks who talk to Congress want more of everything, or they wouldn't keep passing all those appropriations. So just cinch the belt up a little more. Because the new taxes are coming, and all that money isn't buying howitzers to blow away Central America, or save the Saudis fleet of oil tankers.

It's paying other folks to do a lot of things we should be doing ourselves. As the old fable has it, most of us are grasshoppers, letting fewer and fewer ants do all the work.

And as more and more of us find out it's a lot easier to live on federal and state entitlements than it is to go to work in the morning, taxes are going to keep climbing whether the Russians have another submarine off the Atlantic COAST OR NOT.

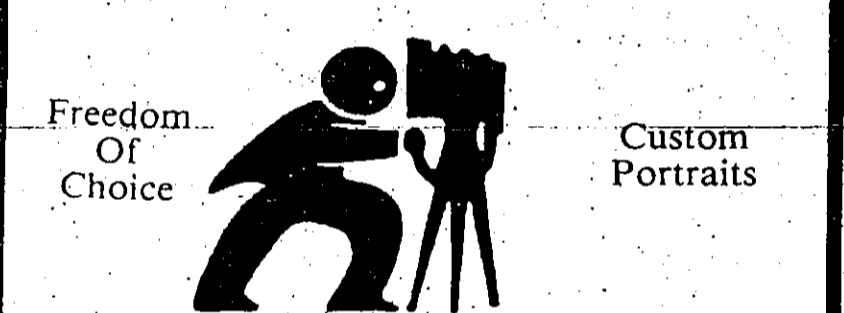

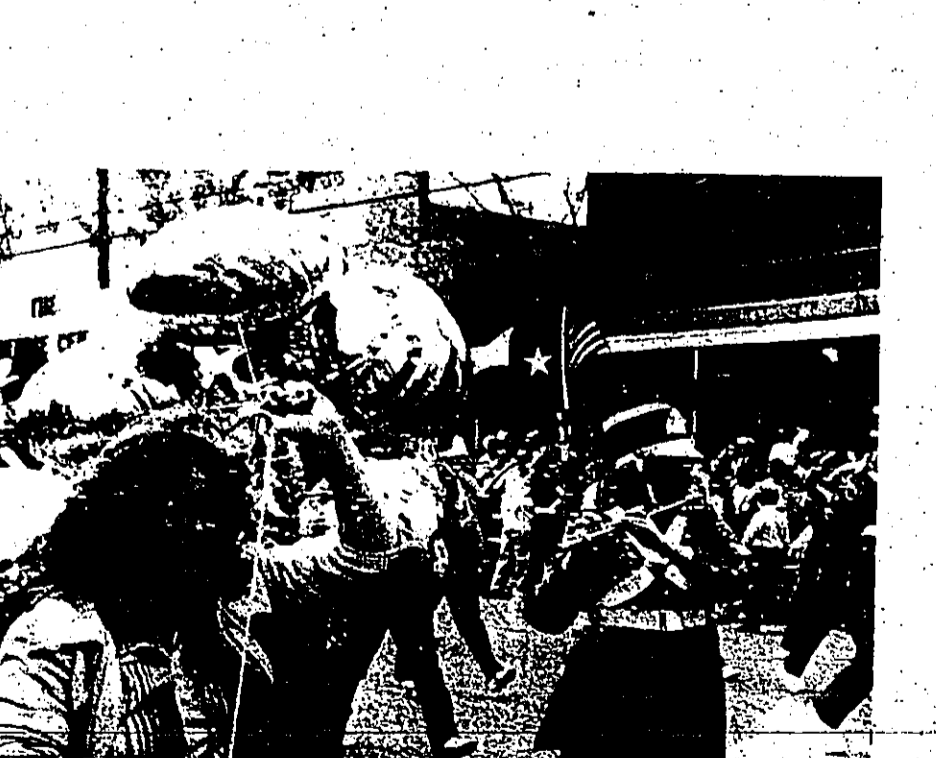

Olympic Moments Historical Highlights

The track shoes that carried the legendary Jesse Owens to fame in the 1936 Olympic Games also helped a youngster named Harrison Dillard escape the cement playgrounds of Cleveland and become the greatest hurdler of his time. It was the year 1940 and Owens, a national hero as a result of his Berlin triumphs, spotted the kid they called "Bones" in a playground track meet. After the meet, Jesse presented Dillard with a pair of the shoes he had worn in the Olympics. "Stick with it, kid," Owens said. It was as if the young runner had suddenly grown wings on his heels. Wearing Jesse Owens' spikes, he raced to national fame as a high hurdler. By 1948, he was the best in the world; he had won 83 straight races and his specialty. But shockingly, Dillard failed to qualify for his favorite event in the Olympic trials - and he made the London-bound U.S. TRACK SQUAD ONLY by virtue of a third-place finish in the 100 meters, a race he rarely ran. The Senator said it all was very legal. All he did was make a couple of phone calls to the California that were calling his lunch and was trying to find some way to peddle the property so he could afford the house payments he was making in Washington.

So when the heat got a little intense, Senator Metzbaum has second thoughts, and returns the \$250,000 with interest.

If anything, the episode just illuminates the lawfulness that has become a part of the Washington scene.

For the most part, all members of the President's staff in whatever administration represent some pretty sound, sensible and financially well-off individuals. Not many high school drop-outs or all out scoundrels making it to the White House on the coattails of an incoming President.

And most of us guests are forced to live a little high on the hog because of the company they keep. A guy needs at least a change of shirts and an extra pair of trousers while the other pal's at the cleaners.

Senators and Congressmen pick up a lot of walk around money through the pay they get for making speeches to the local party organizations and corporate gatherings around the country. Defense contractors are pretty good meal tickets, as are farm organizations, public utilities and the like, anybody with their nose in the public trough.

We aren't trying to say that Mr. Messer was wrong, or that Mr. Metzbaum was wrong. Both were doing nothing illegal. And that's where both of them made their personal judgment. Whether they were able to shave in the morning without being embarrassed at looking at themselves was the moral standard they accepted.

Most of us break the speed limit. We know it's illegal, but since everybody else's doing it, that makes it all right. It's just the difference between sixty miles an hour and \$250,000. It's all in your point of view.

Maybe Senator Metzbaum will think again before he throws rocks at somebody for purely political reasons. He can't believe Ed Messer was doing anything wrong, or he wouldn't have been so quick to accept \$250,000 for picking up the phone.

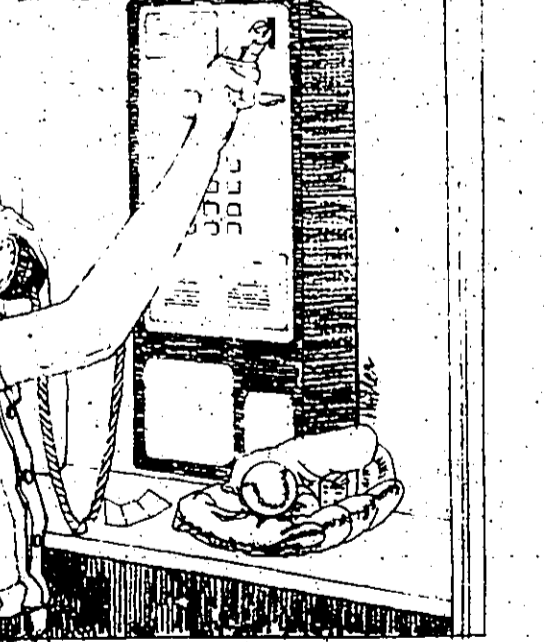

Foresters Hear Pine Beetle Report

The bi-monthly meeting of the Southeast Texas Chapter, Texas Society of American Foresters was held at Owens-Illinois Lodge near Jasper, Texas.

At the meeting foresters were given an informative report of Southern Pine Beetle by Joe Pace of the Texas Forest Service.

The meeting was kicked off by a dinner provided by Owens-Illinois, after which Chairman Lou Sloat opened the business portion of the meeting.

Gary Burns, State SAF Chairman, gave a special report on the condition of the State and National Society of American Foresters.

The Foresters were presented a program dealing with the major forest pest in Texas, the Southern Pine Beetle, by Joe Pace.

Mr. Pace discussed the areas in Texas that the Texas Forest Service believes will have the most problems with the beetles this year.

A slide presentation, by Mr. Pace, illustrated the problems the United States Forest Service is having with the Four Notch Wilderness area due to the Southern Pine Beetle. This beetle problem area has killed 2,000 acres of valuable and beautiful forest, and is still growing. It was pointed out during this presentation that control of this spot would have been easier had the area not been a wilderness, thus preventing the U.S.F.S. from initiating proper control measures.

The Texas Society of American Foresters represent foresters throughout Texas with over 500 members state wide.

The next meeting will be held at Kirby Forest Industries lodge on July 10, 1984.

At this meeting, Congressman Charles Wilson will be the guest speaker.
