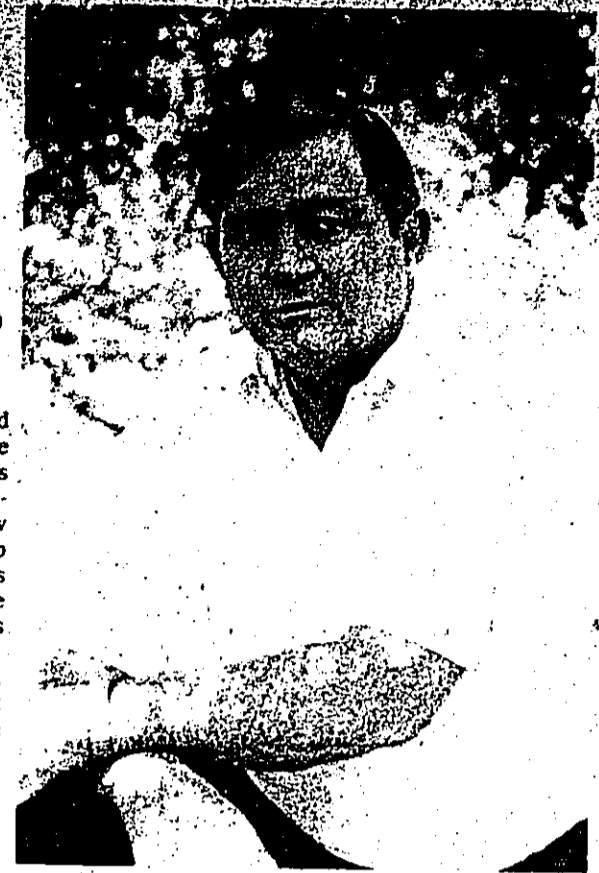
Fifty-two year old Hale has fifteen years experience as a public school coach and teacher, most recently for the Colmesneil School District for the past three

Women's Caravan Here Thursday

The Governor's Commission on Women's East Texas Caravan will hold a public meeting Thursday night in the District courtroom of the Tyler County Courthouse between 7:30 and 8:30 p.m. The purpose of the meeting will be both to inform area citizens of the services available to women from the State government and also to collect suggestions and information from the public as to what needs of women and children are not being adequately met by government according to Justice of the Peace Pct. 1 Wanda Brasher, along with county Chairman Betty Ray are coordinating the commission's local meeting and other activities.

Among the priorities of the commission according to Brasher is the establishment of a statewide Crime Victim Assistance Clearinghouse whose purpose is to link victim/witness programs and services in the state with a special emphasis on the needs of women and child victims of crime. In addition, the commission will be interested in addressing issues affecting women such as

education, domestic violence, displaced homemakers, women's health, legal rights for women, child care, sexual assault, sex discrimination, and seeing

that women's needs are addressed in planning for Job Training and Community Block Grant Programs. The Governor's Commission for Women was formed by Governor

Mark White in April, 1983. Twenty-nine women were selected statewide for a two-year term. Attending the Woodville meeting will be commission members Carol Nasworthy of Beaumont, Martha Whitehead of Tyler, and Gay Erwin of Austin the Executive Director of the Commission.

Shooting Investigation On

Partnership Act Job Training Offered

Governor Mark White announced July 27, 1984 that \$1,744,756 will be used for job training programs for economically disadvantaged, unemployed, and underemployed Texans in the Deep East Texas area. The Governor has approved the expenditure of these funds for job training programs in

Angellina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity, and Tyler counties. The Texas Department of Community Affairs has executed a contract effective July 1 for the provision of a job training program under the Job Training Partnership

Act (JTPA). "The Job Training Partnership Act is a catalyst for integrating the private and public sector in developing skills needed by Texans for productive employment and economic self-sufficiency," Governor White said. Under the Job

Training Partnership Act, local elected officials in partnership with private industry councils composed of business and community representatives, plan and provide programs best suited for residents of their area. Program services include basic education skills training and job placement.

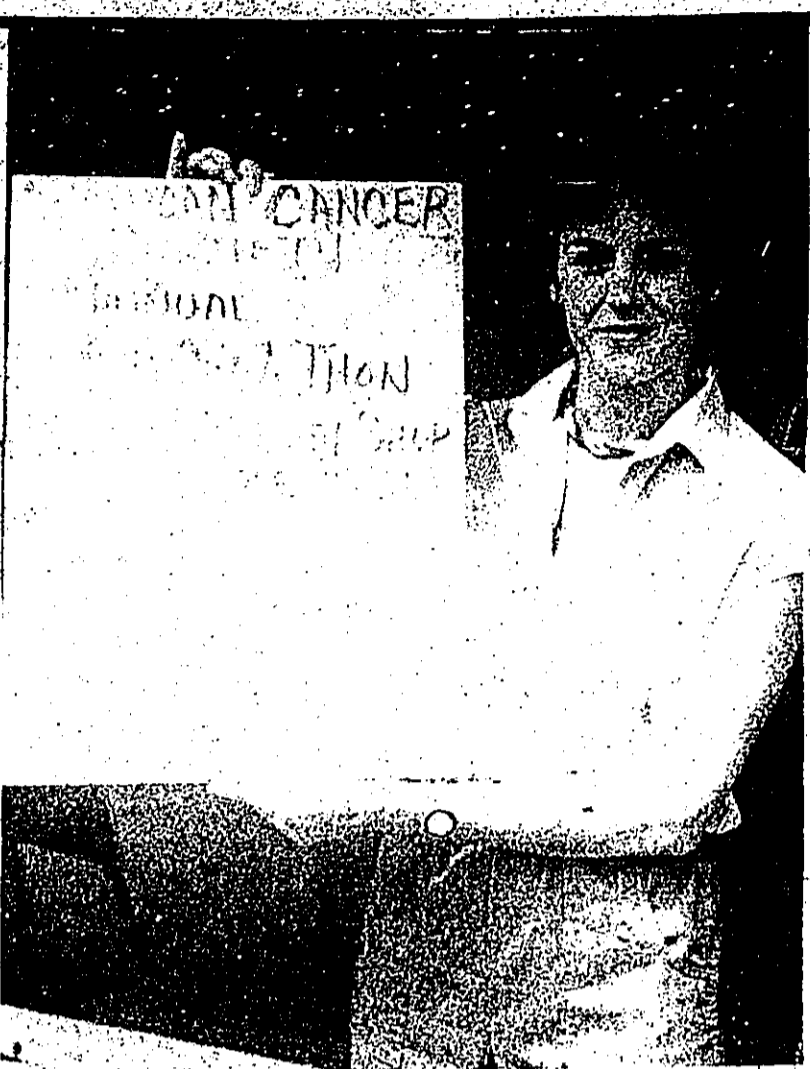

Lamar Is On The Move

The Lamar University Cardinals will begin facing the challenge of bringing the school its first winning record in five years here Wednesday when some 80 freshmen men hopefuls will report for fall practice. Included in the 80, who will take physical examinations on Wednesday before beginning workouts in shorts on Thursday, are 27 scholarship players, including Burton Murchison of Woodville, representing head coach Ken Stephens' second recruiting class. The rest will be walk-ons also in to earn spots on the youthful Cardinal roster.

On Saturday, the upperclassmen-some 65 strong-will report, and they'll undergo physicals on Sunday, August 12. They will join the freshmen in two-a-day workouts (10 a.m. to 6 p.m.) on the practice field adjacent to Cardinal Stadium on August 13.

They players, who will be trying to improve upon last season's 2-9 finish, will work out in full pads for the first time on Thursday, August 16. Press and photo day is scheduled for August 18, at 4 p.m. in Cardinal Stadium.

Thirty-eight lettermen from the 1983 team are among the upperclassmen. One other letterman-offensive tackle Danny McFarland of Beaumont-French is returning after sitting out last season with a knee injury.

The Cardinals' strength will be on defense where seven starters return, including Division I-AA first-team All-America linebacker Eugene Seale. The 5'10", 226-pounder from Jasper shattered the school record for tackles last year with 170 and was named the Defensive Player of the Year in the Southland Conference.

Other returning defensive starters are tackle Phillip Mack, a second-team All-SLC choice a year ago; noseguard Kyle Bolyard, 6'10", 314-pounder; and linebacker Mike Ceburn, 6'0", 220-pounder, cornerback Billy Bell, 5'10", 162-

and safeties Micoal Darthard, 5'11", 187, and Jamey Sherman, 6'2", 196.

Five starters return on offense where Stephens junked the Pro-I alignment in favor of a split-back, veer attack in spring training. They are running back George Landry, 5'8", 177; tight end Danzell Lee, 6'2", 233; right tackle Todd Hogge, 6'7", 255; and guards Kevin Discher, 6'4", 244, and Steve Becker, 6'0", 221.

Punter/placemaker Ricky Fernandez, who averaged 40.1 yards per punt last season, also in to earn spots on the youthful Cardinal roster.

"We don't even want to talk about the upperclassmen-some 65 strong-will report, and they'll undergo physicals on Sunday, August 12. They will join the freshmen in two-a-day workouts (10 a.m. to 6 p.m.) on the practice field adjacent to Cardinal Stadium on August 13.

"We expect to be better this year than we were last year, mainly because we'll be more experienced. We're still not a championship-caliber club yet...not even close...but we intend to be in a position to be legitimately competing for out-league championships by the time today's freshmen and sophomores are juniors and seniors."

One of the Cardinals' question-mark areas for the coming season is at quarterback. The only returnee who played the position last season is junior Rodney Clay, who has moved to flanker. Dennis Haskin, 5'9", 163 lb., walk-on who lettered as a kick receiver last season, won the starting job in spring training.

"Dennis is a good athlete and not a bad punter," said Stephens. "We're looking for a quarterback who can be an adequate passer and still run the option. We're hoping that Dennis can fill this order. He certainly won the confidence of the other players during spring training."

The comprehensive guidebook covers 171,226 acres of East Texas timberlands owned by Kirby Forest Industries, St. Regis Corp. and Temple-Eastex, which are open to the public at no charge for hunting and other recreation.

Additionally, the '84 TFA Hunting and Recreation Guide includes the 55,286 acres in International Paper Company's three wildlife management areas which require paid permits to be obtained from the company.

I hear several people caught fish in the deer stand area above Hanks Creek.

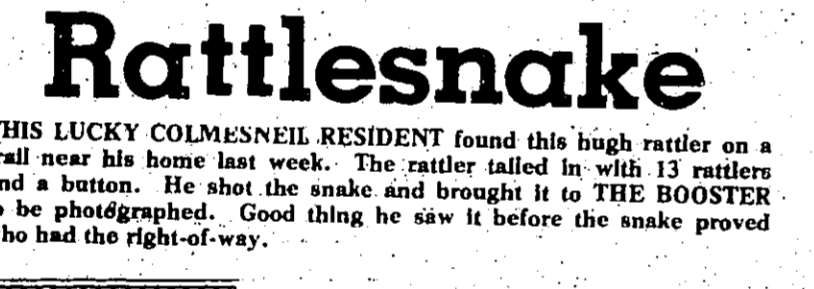
Bass Club Report

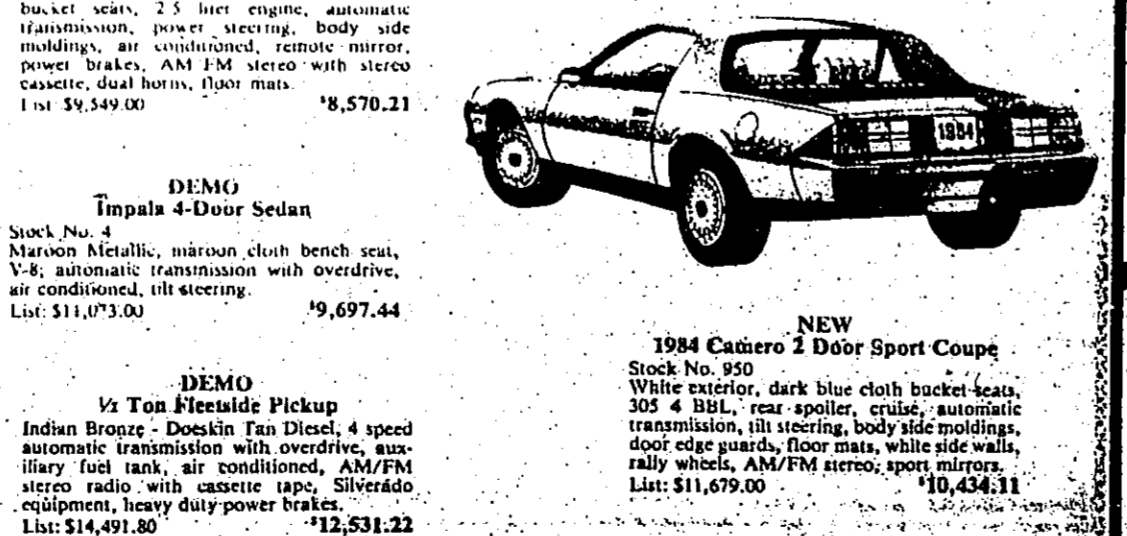

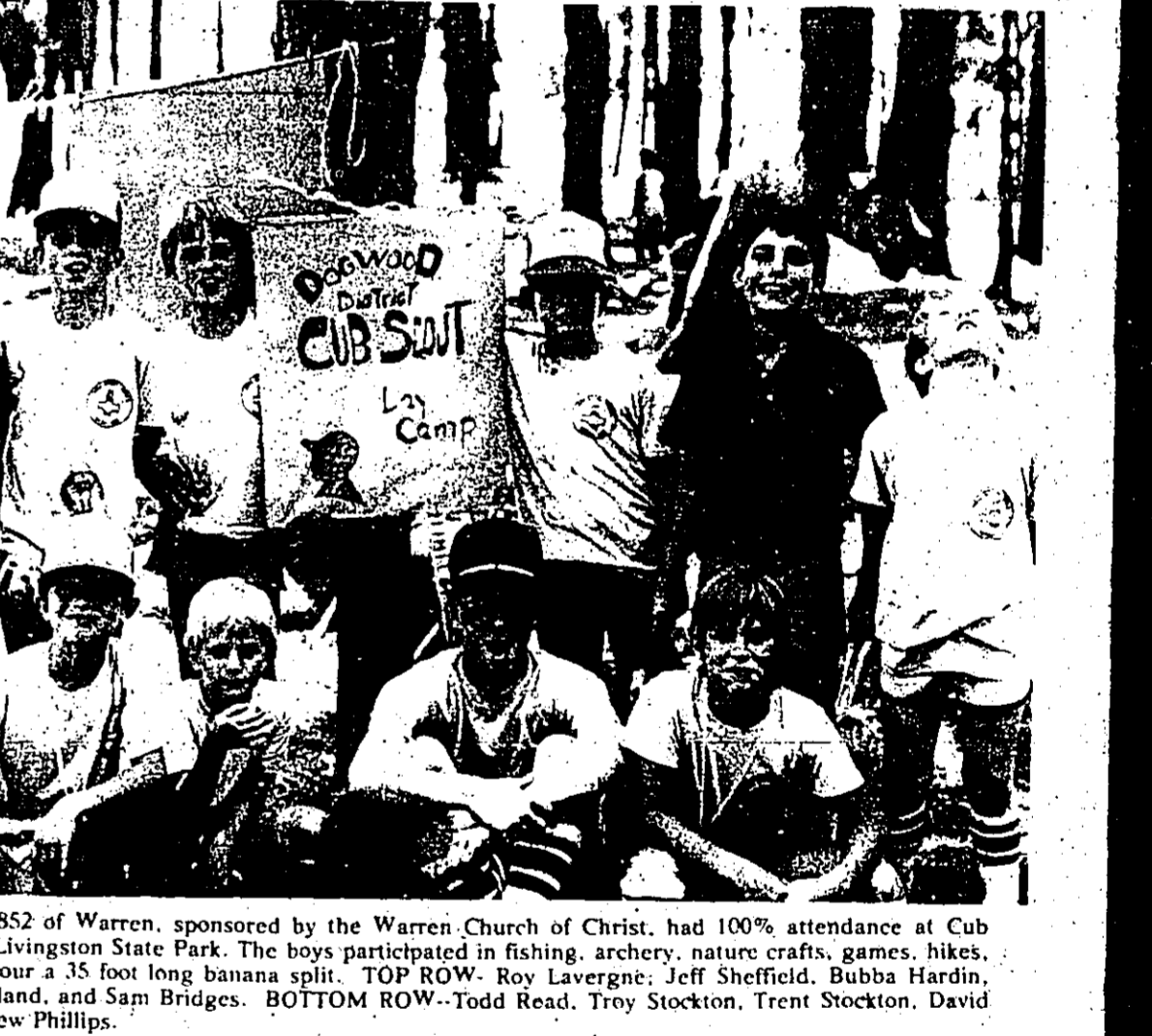

NOW: Since the International Whaling Commission (IWC) banned catches of great blue whales and humpbacks in the mid-1960s, formerly-depleted whale stocks are recovering. There are over 3 million whales and there is no danger that any species at stock will become extinct as a result of commercial whaling. Current catch levels, about 12,000, are established annually by the IWC for only those species known to be abundant, and are scientifically determined to be at or below the net reproduction rates.

State Human Resources Urges Volunteer Assistance For Low Income Families

A volunteer project involving area citizens in the delivery of income assistance services to low income families is being initiated by the Texas Department of Human Resources. The TDHR Region 10, which covers 15 East and Southeast Texas counties, more than 65,000 persons depend on food stamps for at least part of their monthly food budgets. AFDIC, the only cash assistance program in Texas, benefits single-parent families where the caretaker, usually the mother, has no income and few job skills. About 19,000 recipients in the region depend on AFDIC. According to Linda Sparkman, project chairperson, the high rate of unemployment, particularly in Jefferson, Orange, and Hardin counties, drove case loads upward at the same time the agency was cutting back staff due to tight state and federal budgets. "Sweeping changes in state and federal regulations also had a tremendous impact on the staff's ability to handle all the cases by dramatically increasing paperwork and other requirements in processing each case," Ms. Sparkman said. She said TDHR hopes to recruit more than 150 volunteers in Southeast Texas who will be assigned such tasks as interview assistants, clerical assistants, and casework assistants. These jobs will give volunteers valuable experience in office work, and some hands-on experience in the use of computers. Some of the volunteers will also deal directly with clients, collecting the information necessary to determine benefit eligibility. Ms. Sparkman said there are also plans to use volunteers to supervise a children's play area for the children of clients who are being interviewed for services. Each volunteer will be trained in the tasks he/she will perform and will be given an overview of all DHR services. Volunteers will be asked to work a half-day each week. Interested persons should call their local Texas Department of Human Resources office and ask for the Income Assistance programs.

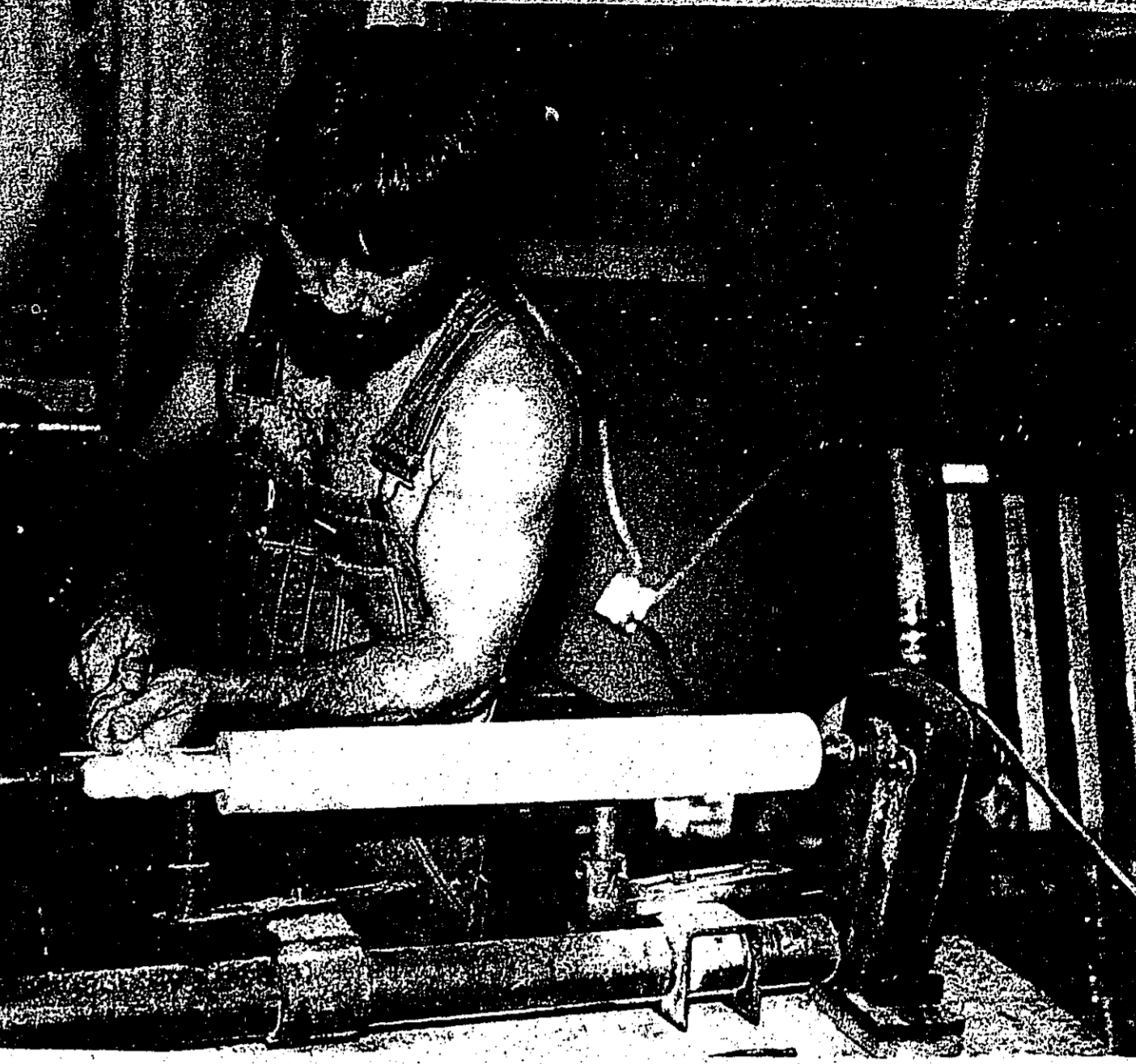

Fire Ant Infestation Is Dangerous

The fire ant was accidentally introduced into the United States in Mobile, Alabama in about 1918, from Brazil or Argentina. By 1940, the fire ant had infested five southern states, and by 1977, the insect

covered most of nine southern states, including 100 Texas counties. In 1983, more than 30 percent of all homes in the Southeast/Southwest reported a serious fire ant problem. Fire ant mounds can be six to eighteen inches high, two to three feet in di-

ameter, and contain fifty thousand to two hundred and fifty thousand ants each. The mounds can cause equipment breakage in farm fields, and prohibit or limit the homeowner's enjoyment of his backyard. Colonies of fire ants build and live in mounds

in fields and yards. When disturbed the ants will aggressively sting the animal or human intruder. Fire ant stings are very painful, producing a fiery, burning sensation. The stings have caused death to allergic humans and small farm animals.

A single county in Georgia reported more than 700 thousand dollars paid by residents in 1980 for the treatment of more than twenty-eight thousand five hundred fire ant stings.


Fire ants are migrating west and it is believed they will eventually cover the entire sun belt and west coast, because of their strong tolerance for the high temperature of the area.

The available fire ant killers were difficult to use and usually ineffective for killing the entire mound. Some home remedies have damaged the lawns. Labels have been confusing and difficult to read. Active ingredient levels were too low or too high to effectively kill the whole mound. Active levels which were too high caused rapid abandonment of the mound before the insecticide could fully work. Home remedies of boiling water or oil lacked the lasting strength necessary to kill the entire ant colony.

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
