Hicks New Chamber Exec.

Debra Hicks, of Spurger, has been appointed the new Chamber Executive Secretary as a result of action Monday at the regular noon luncheon meeting of the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce.

Debra, who is a volunteer exercise instructor for the First Baptist Church of Spurger, says she loves her new job. She brings experience to the Tyler County Chamber from former employers Gulf States Utilities, Southwestern Bell and the Santa Fe Railroad.

Debra and her husband, Phil, have two children. Along with discussion thus far on securing a \$3 million bond to the E & L Lumber Company through the resources of the Tyler County Industrial Financing group the Chamber also discussed progress to date on the Texas Metals ground clearing. Chamber Secretary Hicks said the Chamber was already

accepting applications for the metal flange producing company. Rainey Air Conditioning was selected to receive the monthly beautification award.

A September 12 visit from some 30 of our nation's tour guides is expected in Tyler County at the Woodville Motel with Chamber Executives to act as hosts.

The chamber will introduce the professional tourists to local art and artifacts. Lunch will be provided to the group by Emily and Otha Sumner at the Homestead in Hillister.

County Hears Auditor Changes

Tyler County Commissioner's Court Monday August 27, received recommendations of Independent Auditor C. L. Kennedy on the fiscal operations of the County needing improvements. Among the recommendations of Kennedy were for the establishment of a materials requisition and purchase order system for non-bid supply purchasing, the transfer of "idle" funds from the Tax Assessor-Collectors Office to the treasurer's office so these funds for investment can be used in interest earning accounts, and the re-negotiation of present contract of the county Treasurers' office with the present depository bank Citizens State Bank of Woodville because "The county treasurer is not able to earn maximum interest available under the present depository contract.

A previous estimate from the County Auditors office indicated approximately \$48,000 loss in revenue for the year ending December of 1983, according to Com-

missioners. Also recommended were the development of a job description and classification system for administrative and clerical employees of Tyler County and provisions of more working space for the County Clerk, Sheriff and Commissioners. Commissioner's accepted Kennedy's report but postponed consideration of the recommendations pending further study of the report.

Commissioner's accepted 2,000 yards of iron ore gravel valued at \$7,000 for Pet. #2 and 1,100 yards valued at \$3,929.80 from Kirby

Company property. Commissioner's approved the paying of additional bills, and approved July's County Treasurers Report.

Commissioner's also considered replacement of the County Radio system damaged several times recently by lightning for approximately \$16,000. Also being considered is addition of a lightning grounding system for the Doucette Radio Tower which would raise the cost of system replacement to approximately \$20,000 according to Motorola representatives.

School Board Hears '85 Budget Increase

Woodville school trustees Tuesday night, August 21, were presented a tentative 1984-85 budget of \$5,071,307, an increase of \$884,717 or approximately a 21 percent increase over last year's budget of \$4,186,590. Most of the increase is attributable according to Superintendent Dorman Jackson to the pay increase mandated by House Bill 72 and much of the increase will be paid this year by the additional \$686,200 in state aid funded by House Bill 72.

Jackson stated that with the state aid increases, "we're in good shape this year but not for the two years after

that. House Bill 72 will require us to spend an additional \$214,000 in salaries next year and \$200,000 in salary increases the year after that and give us \$132,000 in added funds each year to pay those with. That leaves us \$81,000 short just next year and that's only counting the salary increases.

In other business, the

Woodville School Board appointed Superintendent Jackson, Middle School Principal Gene Isabel and Elementary Principal Delbert Murphy as Level II Teacher Career Ladder Selection Committee members. The three administrative members of the committee will select two Level II teachers as members of the committee, according to Jackson. The district must award \$51,800 or 25 teacher's will be nominated to receive the Level II \$2,000 supplement in salary. "If we have more than 25 teachers who meet the qualifications for Level II then we will have to add to the qualifications."

Initial indications are that approximately 38 district teachers might meet the minimum qualifications for the Level II career ladder designation.

Board members heard reports on the districts application for \$100,428 of Chapter I Federal funds for improvement for "educationally deprived students at the first and second grade level. Also on Application for \$12,986 which will be applied to purchase

A TOY WORTH REMEMBERING

Wheel rolling is one of those old-timey games that's become a pleasure obsession. Keeping a hoop straight and moving it all sorts of ways is a fascinating and challenging outdoor activity. For thousands of years it's been a simple pastime, and for centuries, above 20 years of age it can even provide important aerobic exercise.

In spite of all their wondrous working powers, the instruments of wheel rolling are very easy to make or find. Simply speaking, that moving circle of delight is less a wheel than a rim (preferably a metal one) that's smooth both inside and out. It's propelled and guided by a "paddle" made of stiff wire.

You don't, of course, just go out and buy a wheel. You have to recognize it in another form and then rewire it for your own ends. A thin sheet of eight-inch diameter iron pipe, an ornamental wire circle from an old steering wheel, a bicycle wheel with the spokes removed, a hoop from a discarded metal keg, or even the round tubular footrest from a bar stool. Whatever their origins, hump or exalted, the best wheels are those between 8 and 12 inches in diameter and an inch or less wide.

Paddles can be made from any stiff but bendable size of drinking straw thickness. Start with a piece that's 37 to 40 inches long. A good paddle, when gripped, should extend from your hand to your ankle.

The end of the paddle that touches the wheel should be bent into a U shape, about four inches deep and just a bit wider than the wheel's rim. It should be held parallel to the ground when in operation. The top (five-inch) section of the upright shaft is doubled over to provide a grip, which keeps the wire from turning in the operator's hand.

Back in the heyday of wheel rolling, when many of today's grandparents were youngsters, hours of juvenile wizardry often went into the construction of "special" paddles. An old shoe tongue, punched with two holes along the cutout edge, made a racy mud flap when the U of the paddle was passed through the holes. "Hindpans" were modified with squirrel tails that whipped in the wind, and a few artists tied chicken feathers along the length of the shaft to create a bristling war-bonnet look.

It may take a while to judge how much paddle pressure is needed and where it should be applied to keep the circle rolling. The bottom end of the "control stick" should almost touch the ground as it propels the hoop along. The back of the U pushes the wheel, and the sides, rubbing gently against the spinning rim, guide and brake it.

To add spark to the game, race the wheel through labyrinthian obstacle courses. See if you can become so adept at manipulating the hoop that you can snag the ring with the end of your paddle, give it a flip, and start it whirling without ever touching the hoop with your hands. Or just stand still and coax the wheel around your feet by passing the paddle from one hand to the other.

Wheel rolling isn't a new game, but it's still one that children of any age can enjoy!

'Big Sam' Tops Bass Tournery Survey

Sam Rayburn Reservoir has failed to grab many headlines in the fishing journals during the past decade, but higher water levels and a resurging largemouth bass population apparently pushed the old lake to the top of the charts in 1983.

The 114,000-acre East Texas reservoir was the most productive tournament lake in the state during 1983, according to results of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's annual bass tournament survey.

The postcard survey analyzed the results of 93 tournaments held by 113 bass clubs at most popular fishing lakes across the state. Each lake was rated in five categories: percent fisherman success; average weight of bass caught; number of bass per fisherman; pounds of bass per fisherman; and hours required to catch bass six pounds or heavier.

Overall, the survey gives high marks to the Texas bass fishing reservoirs, with no indication of a decline in numbers and quality of bass caught during the past several years.

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Clunn Set B.A.S.S. Record

Ricky Clunn of Montgomery, Texas won the Bass Masters Classic with a record shattering catch of 75 pounds and 9 ounces, the three day tournament was held in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, with each fisherman restricted to seven fish each day. He caught 23 lbs. 8 ozs., 24 lbs. 10 ozs., and the final day he caught 27 lbs. 7 ozs. for the victory. Clunn had 75 lbs. 9 ozs. for first place with second place weighing 50 lbs. 1 oz. and 3rd had a 43 lbs. 3 ozs. The victory was worth \$40,000.00.

The old record of 59 lbs. 5 ozs. was set by Clunn in 1976 in Gunterville, Alabama.

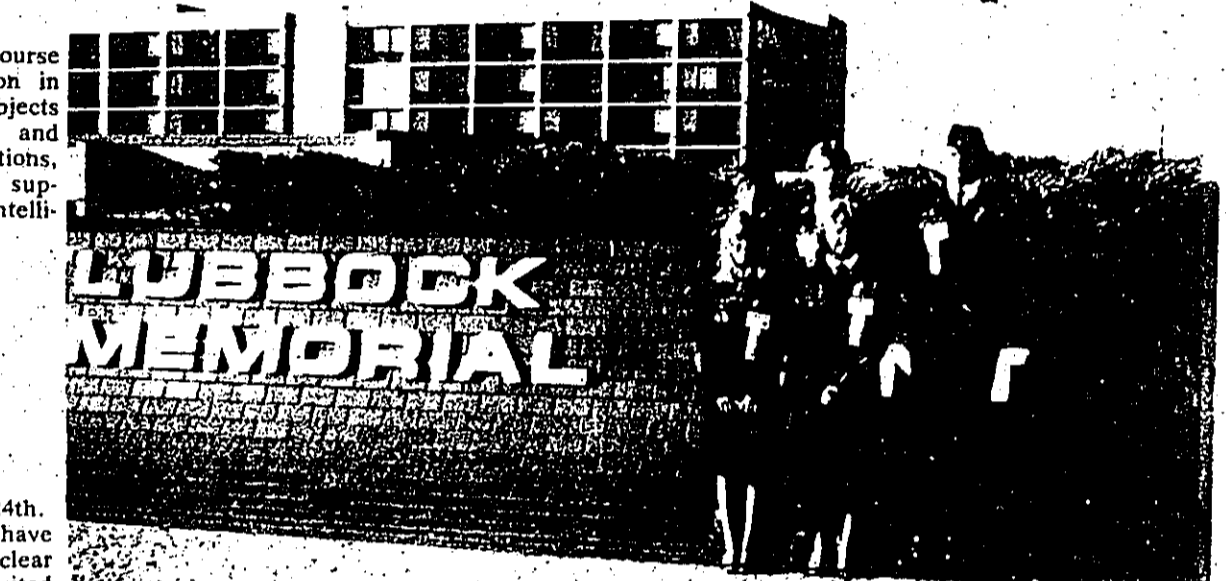

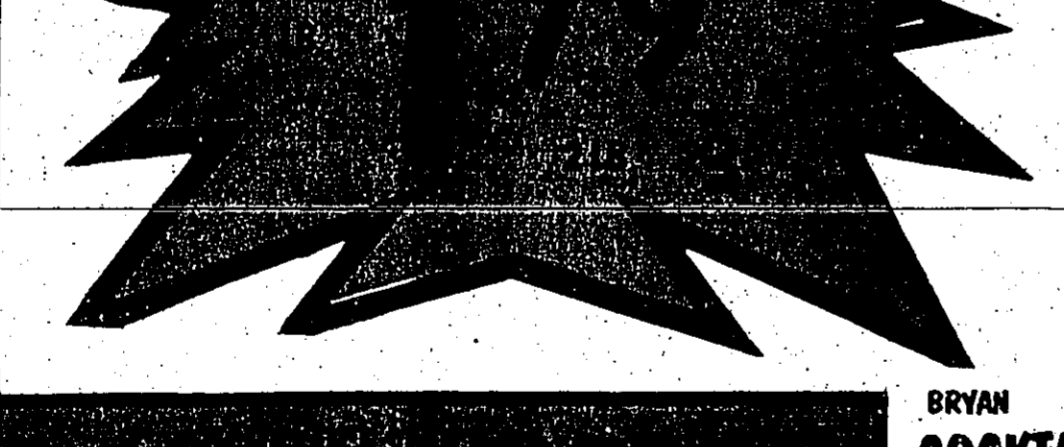
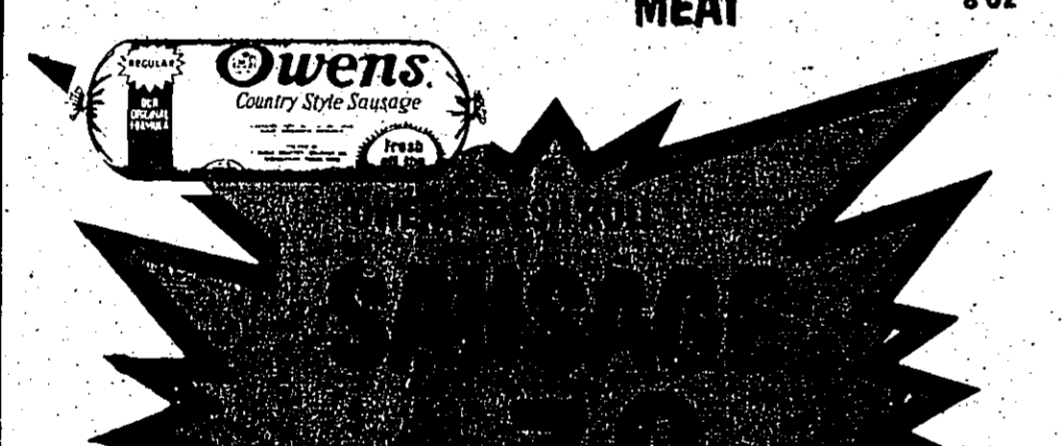

Depending upon the amount of traffic and width of the street, a single file is preferable. When a motorist sees a school bus, he should expect it to stop, especially if children are waiting alongside the road. Children should be instructed to make sure all cars approaching from both directions stop before they step into the street. Proper instruction and extra effort on the part of the motorist will bring dividends in fewer children being injured or killed.

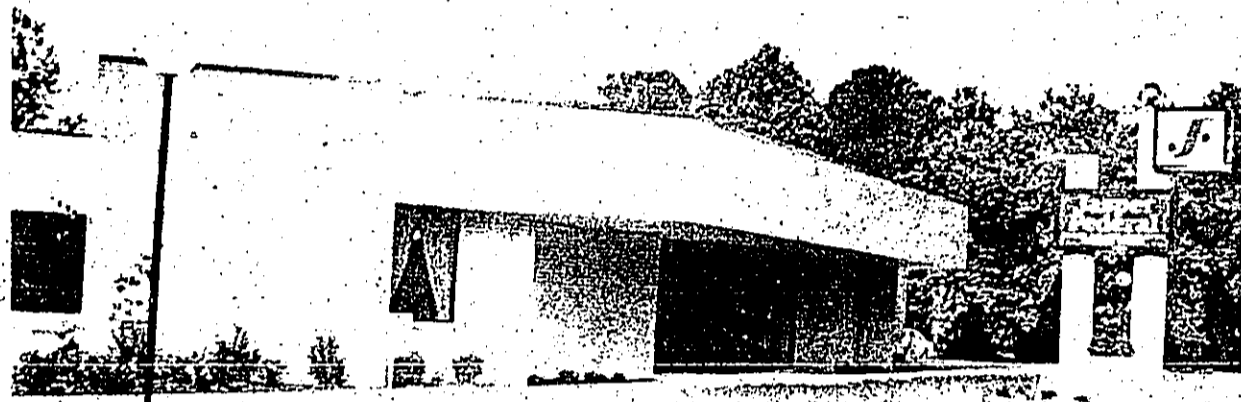

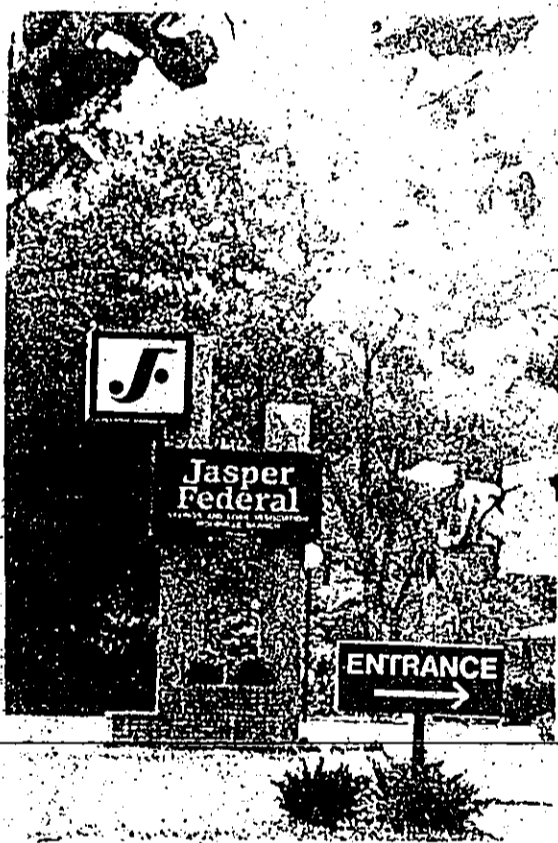
