Warren Board Meeting Considered 'Marathon'

A four hour Executive Session added to a three hour Regular Session resulted in a marathon meeting of the Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees August 28, 1984. After waiting until after 11 p.m., Dr. Fred Waddell, Executive Director of the district attempted to condense his review of district responsibilities and requirements for accreditation under House Bill 72. Following Dr. Waddell was John Hassen, IBM representative, who volunteered to just answer questions rather than make any sort of presentation due to the lateness of the hour. The meeting, which ended at 2 a.m., concentrated on major cuts in the 1984-85 budget presented to the Board by Superintendent Adolph Hryhorchuk. At press time, the final budget was still not available. The budget was adopted at the meeting with the changes made by the Board, but all changes, including salaries, were not made public during the Open Session. Many questions were raised concerning the budget, primarily by Board Members Marvin Fannin, Ben Read, and Harold Davis. Fannin and Read questioned Hryhorchuk closely regarding the \$3,000 travel allowance requested by the Superintendent. At one point Hryhorchuk was told that \$70 per day for a room at \$30 per day for food, "should be sufficient." He replied that, "If you stay in a place like Austin, a room is more than \$70." Read stated that he had stayed in Austin the weekend before for less than \$70, to which the Superintendent replied, "Well, if you stay in the Roadway Inn..." Read said, "We stayed in the Holiday Inn, had two double beds and four people in the room." Even though Hryhorchuk continually stated that there were many meetings he needed to attend, the Board cut the \$3,000 travel allowance request to \$2,000. The new budget allowed \$2,000 travel allowance for each principal, and this was cut to \$500. The need for keeping an attorney on retainer was raised by Fannin. He stated that he felt the District did not need an attorney at every Board Meeting and that we should pay one to attend only when necessary. School District Attorney Tanner Hunt challenged Fannin saying, "Marvin, you need an attorney twenty-four hours a day..." Read and Davis agreed with Fannin, but the matter never came to a vote, and the \$10,000 legal services item was left in the budget. The Board mixed the computer system for the central office for the 1984-85 year. This was an item which would have cost the District more than \$70,000. Other cuts were made in the Band and Athletic areas. The Band equipment request of \$20,580 was cut to \$15,580, and the Athletic supplies request of \$30,900 was cut to \$20,000.

TCYDC Personnel Flap Results In Hale Resignation

Newly hired Tyler County Youth Development Center Executive Director Jack Hale, resigned last Thursday night following reinstatement of a staff member, Mary Beth Hicks, fired earlier in the week by Hale. Hicks had been staff member on duty Monday evening when three children living at the TCYDC Shelter ran away from the facility. Hale, a former coach and teacher for the Colmesneil School District, stated lack of Board support as reason for his resignation.

Hale, in a Booster interview Tuesday, stated that the organization's manual of policies and procedures gives the Director the power to both hire and replace his staff as needed. "I did what I thought was right at the time and when the Board didn't back me up then I felt like it was necessary to resign. This is a tough job and you cannot do it effectively or efficiently without the support of your board."

Hale described Hicks as "a hard worker" just differed on the way things should be done. I didn't feel like I could bring out the specifics in a public meeting Thursday, some of that information might be confidential." According to Hale, he requested a private meeting - Executive Session - to discuss the reasons for the firing which he described as "personal and private" and Board President Brad Smith denied his request. Hale, then refused to discuss the reasons in the public meeting. Following Hale's refusal, the Board's Grievance Committee did go into Executive Session and following the Executive Session Hicks was reinstated. Hale then resigned his Director's position. Hale stated he felt the Board and staff were all "trying hard to do a good job, a very important job working with these kids."

TCYDC Board President Brad Smith, interviewed Tuesday, stated, "I very much regret the loss of Hale, we had high hopes for him as Director." Smith indicated that the Board could not accept Hale's firing of Hicks as Hale would not explain the reasons why Hicks was fired. Smith said that the Board insisted that the reasons for the firing be given in a public hearing because "to do otherwise would leave us wide open for a lawsuit."

Regarding the next Director, Hale indicated, "it is very important for the Board to back the next Director and let him do his job." Smith indicated that the Board was currently accepting applications for Hale's successor and until the position was filled Administrative Secretary Beth Spahn and Smith would share the responsibilities of the Shelter Director.

- *Dial 1+ or 0+ for long distance (its no longer necessary to dial the extra 1).
- *To call within the Warren/Wildwood exchanges, remember to dial all seven digits of the telephone number.
- *For telephone sets which are not ringing properly, the customer should contact the vendor from whom they purchased or leased the equipment.

"The conversion went very smoothly," Rose said, "however, anytime you make changes in dialing procedures, it is going to take the customers some time to get accustomed to the change."

breakdowns, such as: The Incurve (Football Type), The Spider, The Decorative, The Reflex, The Pompon, The Anemone, The Spoon, The Quill, and The Brush and Thistle. We have two methods of obtaining Chrysanthemums plants - by cuttings and by seeds. When planting Chrysanthemums from seed you will never obtain a true cultivar because of the cross pollination. The professional and show growers always plant anew from cuttings. This insures a true cultivar. On the Garden Hardy type they will repeat year after year from the same roots. When the Garden Hardy type has completed its blooming cycle and the leaves have turned brown cut them back to the ground level and mulch with straw. The plants will return in the spring.

Chrysanthemums like a slightly acid soil with a good organic base. Mums do not like wet feet but do to their best and reward you with good blooms in size and color you should never let them dry out. When planting Chrysanthemums never over-crowd them. Plant the mums on fifteen to eighteen inch centers. They will fill in the open area as they grow. Chrysanthemums need to be fed on a regular basis every two weeks to obtain the maximum in bloom and color. Remember Mums as well as other plants have to have the fertilizer converted into a liquid before are furnishing the Chrysanthemum in liquid form to begin with. Ready for the mums to use at once. If you will pinch back the Chrysanthemum you will get an abundance of blooms.

There are many Chrysanthemum shows in the fall of the year and you must remember that all the Chrysanthemums shown in the shows will be most happy and not-in-greenhouses. Through out the South and Southwest we have many Chrysanthemum Chapters that are associated with the National Chrysanthemum Society, which welcomes visitors to their monthly meetings and shows. If your area does not have a Chrysanthemum Society Chapter and there is a minimum of ten interested people, you are interested in helping you set up a chapter and obtain your national charter. 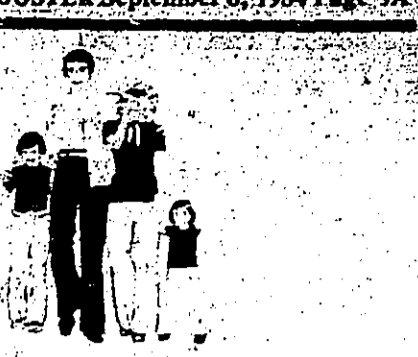

Shopping With Diane

Auctions are popular in Tyler County. You can get some great bargains. You can usually find what you've come for, and often, something you didn't know you needed. They're fast moving, they're full of surprises, and they're fun. This week we've visited a few local auctions. Let's go see what we found.

SOLD TO THE HIGHEST BIDDER - In the market for lawn mowers, wheelbarrows, clown dolls or power saws? How about a barley twist at the Auction Block, 4105 South Magnolia.

Drop by during the week (closed Monday) looking the merchandise over and get ready for the real action which begins at 7:00 p.m. every Thursday night. According to owner-auctioneer Larry Grammer, once it starts it doesn't stop until everything is sold. If antiques are your thing, you'll want to get on over to Groveton on the second Saturday evening of every month. Larry's auction there features antiques and collectibles shipped in from England. The facility is large and there are usually up to 300 pieces offered for sale.

If you've got something to sell at auction, you can drop it by The Auction Block during the week. Items are taken in on consignment. "There's a little something for everyone," says Grammer, "and that's the fun of it."

ON THE HOOF - Every Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. the auctioneer lowers the gavel, the crowd quiets and the action begins at the Woodville Livestock Commission. It's a tradition that's been in the Dee Fortenberry family for the past 40 years.

According to Mrs. Dee Fortenberry, if you've lived in Tyler County for a while, you're likely to remember the first barn - a small one - that was near Tyon Feed. Later, after the auction grew, a new facility was built on Highway 287. Not to many years ago fire damaged part of that building, but it was rebuilt and the auction is now going stronger than ever. Today, on any one Tuesday afternoon, as many as 400 head of livestock are apt to be offered for sale. And it could be that you'll be in luck whether you're in the market for sheep, goats, hogs, horses, cows or calves.

If you've got livestock to sell through the auction, you can take it to the barn anytime on Monday and Tuesday. According to Mrs. Fortenberry, special arrangements are required to bring livestock in on Sunday.

Whether you're buying, selling or looking, drop by the Woodville Livestock Commission on Tuesday afternoon. A lot of your friends and neighbors will be there. And, if you work up an appetite, the Corral Restaurant is open for lunch (5 days a week).

NEW BUSINESS: In case you've missed the news, The Larry Treat Chrysler Center, Inc. is now open and ready for business. The new 7,000 square-foot facility, located on South Highway 69 in Woodville, presently houses a showroom, parts department and service department. HB-72 Will Deal With Social Promotion

The fourth report on the education reform bill HB 72, which deals with social promotion, student testing and tutorials - HB 72 - was introduced in the House on September 4.

A district may not grant social promotions. Students may be promoted only on the basis of academic achievement.

An elementary student who has not maintained a grade average for the school year equivalent to at least 70 on a scale of 100 may not be advanced from one grade level to the next and a student in the upper grades may not be given credit for a course in which the student has not maintained a grade of at least 70.

Social promotions have been advanced from one grade to the next or from one course to the next have continued to be a problem in many schools. The bill requires that a student must provide overall poor performance of high school graduates. Although it will likely take a number of years to realize the full impact of this change in direction, we should see some improvement in the next few years.

There will always be some students who will consistently be unable to meet promotion requirements. The State Board of Education will adopt rules prescribing alternatives to social promotion for these students.

At least once every six weeks, a district will be required to give written notice to parents of students' grades in each class or subject. The notice must provide for the signature of the parent and must be returned to the district.

If, in any class or subject, a student receives a grade less than 70 on a scale of 100, the notice must state the need for a conference between the appropriate teacher and the parent.

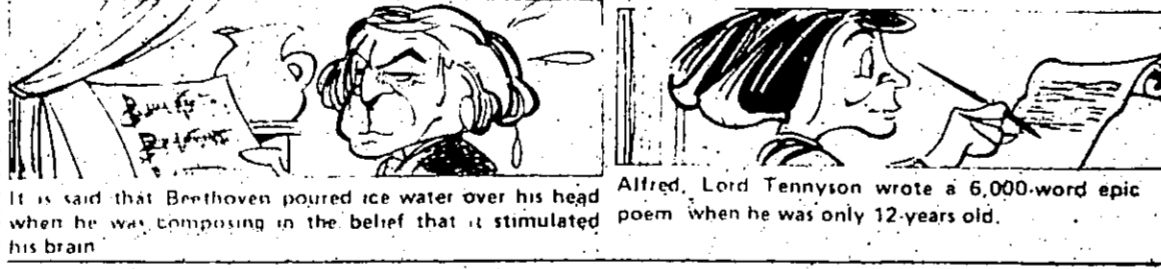
Several changes were made with regard to testing. One requires that all students shall be required to take final examinations. Districts shall not schedule activities which conflict with final exams, nor shall they exempt students from taking them on the basis of academic achievement or any other basis.

Another change will allow students to take advanced placement examinations for each primary grade level and for secondary school academic subjects. The exams will be locally developed and administered using State Board of Education guidelines but will require Board approval. The guidelines must provide for the examinations to thoroughly test comprehension of the information presented in the applicable grade level or course. A student in a primary grade level can be given credit for a grade level if the student scores in the 90th percentile or above on each section of the examination. The State Board of Education will give written approval.

A student in Grade one or above shall be given credit for a subject on the basis of scoring the 90th percentile or above on a Board approved advanced placement exam. If a student is given credit on the basis of an examination, the score shall be entered when the student's transcript is prepared.

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Educational Reform

By Senator Roy Blake

Current law requires that students entering teacher training programs at colleges and universities perform satisfactorily on a basic skills entrance exam. The law also requires satisfactory performance on a State Board of Education approved examination as a condition of certification for graduates of teacher training programs.

HB 72 extends this requirement for satisfactory performance on a Board approved exam as a condition for continued certification of teachers and administrators. This exam must be satisfied before June 30, 1986. The exam must be satisfactory to a minimum of 75 percent of the test items that a teacher is expected to teach. It is true that the intrinsic qualities of a good teacher cannot be measured, but it is true that the basic knowledge of a teacher is a measurable matter not only can be but is measured daily in all walks of life.

Obviously, a teacher should be expected to perform as highly in chemistry as in high school chemistry. There were a number of requirements made insofar as the development of the tests are concerned.

One key requirement that will be common in all of the tests is that each must measure the ability of the examinee to read and write with sufficient skill and understanding to perform satisfactorily as a professional teacher or administrator.

The State Board of Education is charged with the responsibility of developing the test and is required to solicit and consider the advice of classroom teachers and administrators.

Each candidate for teacher or administrator certification shall be provided with an opportunity for Board-developed preparation for the certification examination.

Those who are unsuccessful in passing the exam shall be provided an opportunity to perform satisfactorily on the exam, but the State Board will limit the number of times a candidate who fails the examination can take it.

One examination will be designed to test knowledge appropriate for certification to teach primary grades. The other must be designed to test knowledge appropriate for certification to teach secondary grades. Secondary teacher examinations must test knowledge of each examinee in the subject areas in which the examinee will be certified to teach.

In other words, all teachers will be tested on their ability to read and write with sufficient skill to perform as professional teachers, and they will be tested further on the knowledge of their specialized areas of certification.

Administrators' examinations must test administrative skills and knowledge in subject areas other than those as the State Board of

A QUICK AND EASY SHALLOW WELL

Perhaps you have a situation similar to Al Adams, a reader of THE MOTHER EARTH NEWS magazine. The well he had drilled to a depth of 3-1/2 feet. The shallow well he devised at his new home. Al and his wife used the well water for household purposes, but they had to make expensive system could also be used to augment a water supply for livestock or a garden.

Al said he began his project by hand-digging a three-foot square hole at a point on his property where a natural spring "seep" as he described it was located. He hit bedrock at a depth of 3-1/2 feet.

Next, Al acquired two 58-gallon drums (which had formerly held glue) with locking ring-sealed removable lids. He borrowed a friend's oxy-acetylene torch to remove the bottoms of the two barrels, and then brazed the cylinders together, and used to produce a sturdy steel tube about two-feet in diameter and six feet long.

We strongly recommend that you know what substances were in your used barrels before you start torching them. The drums could contain flammable fumes. In fact, you may prefer to alter Mr. Adams' practice by using heavy plastic barrels that are approved for food storage.

To clean his liner, Al built a hot outdoor fire under the container. Within an hour the paint and glue had been vaporized by the intense heat, and after waiting for the metal to cool, Al wire-brushed it and rolled the assembly down to the hole.

Before installing the barrel liner, Mr. Adams set up a simple filter system. He shoveled a one-inch-deep layer of washed pea gravel into the bottom of the hole, set the double barrel on top of it, and poured another foot of gravel around the outside of the lower drum. Clay-heavy earth was filled in around the cylinder.

To mount the hand pump, Al bored holes in one of the drum covers to attach the mounting hardware on the pump - here, then cut a 2" x 2" square of 3/4-inch exterior grade plywood and bored openings in it to match those in the lid. The wood was sandwiched between the pump and the barrel lid to make a sturdy assembly.

After fishing a few leaves out of the water, Al lowered the pump and cover unit into place and then pumped until the murky water became clear. To chlorinate the water, he mixed one quart of household bleach with an equal amount of water, dumped it into the well, and resealed the well with its locking ring and silicone caulk. The well was pumped until a strong smell of chlorine was evident at the outlets, and then Al let the purifying chemical do its work overnight. On the following morning, he pumped the well out a few more times to remove all detectable traces of bleach, and the well was ready to use.

Al reported that his metal drums did eventually introduce some rust into the water, which forced him to install a filter. And we suggest that you have any new supply of water tested for purity if it is to be used by humans. You might also want to install a locking assembly on the lid to prevent children from opening the well.

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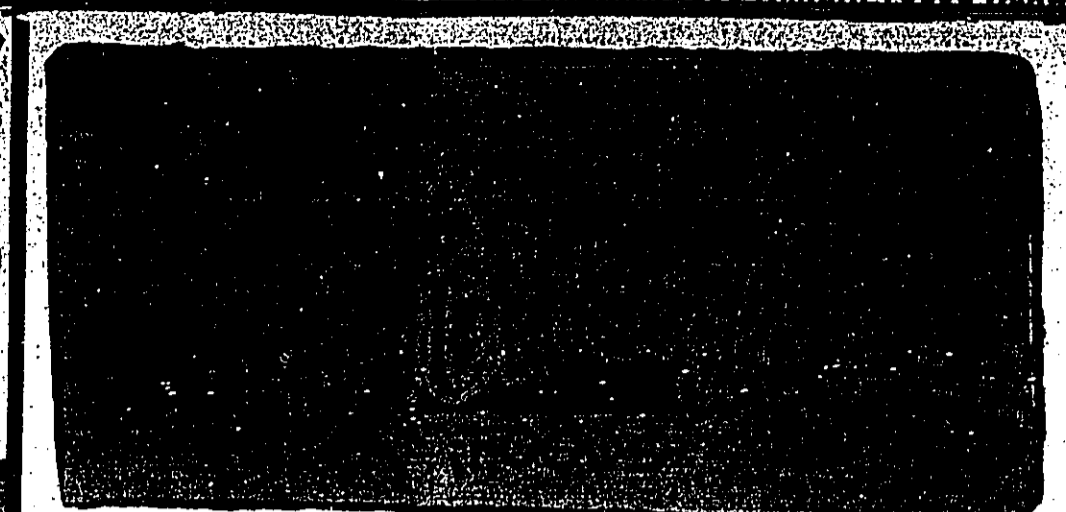
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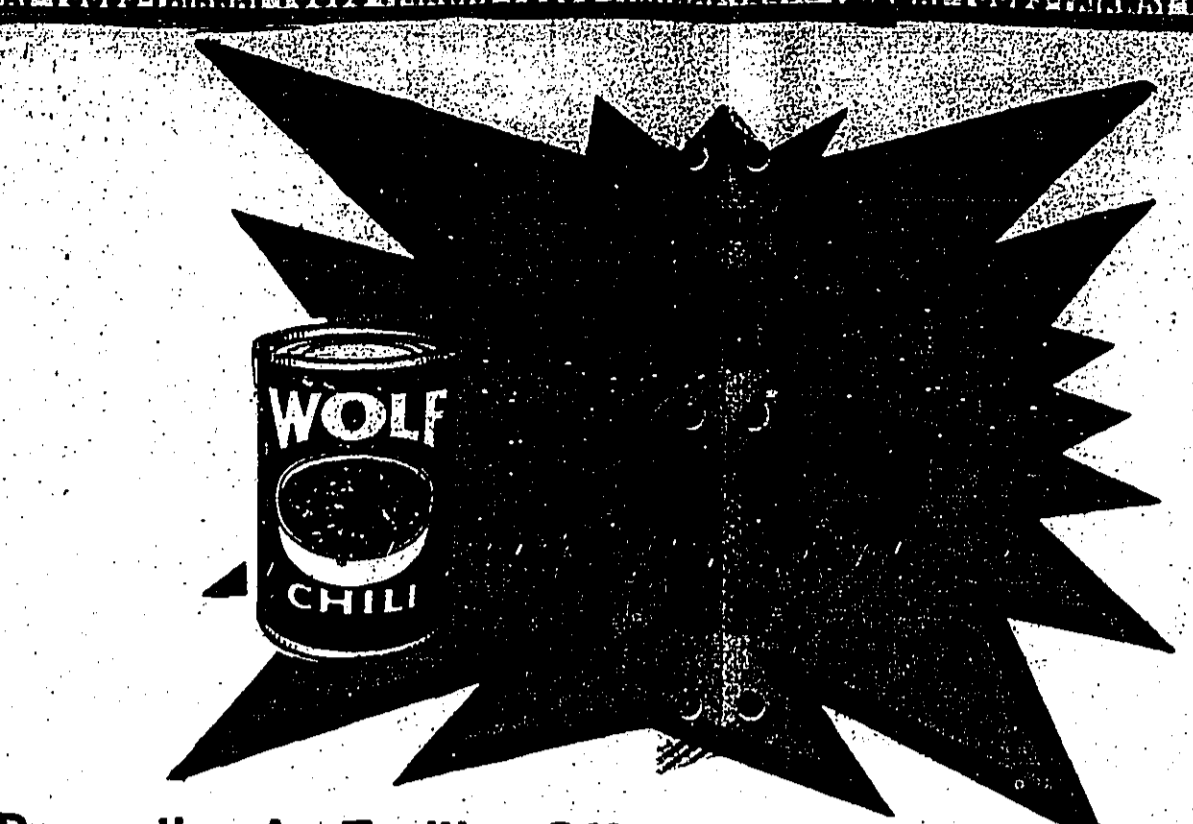

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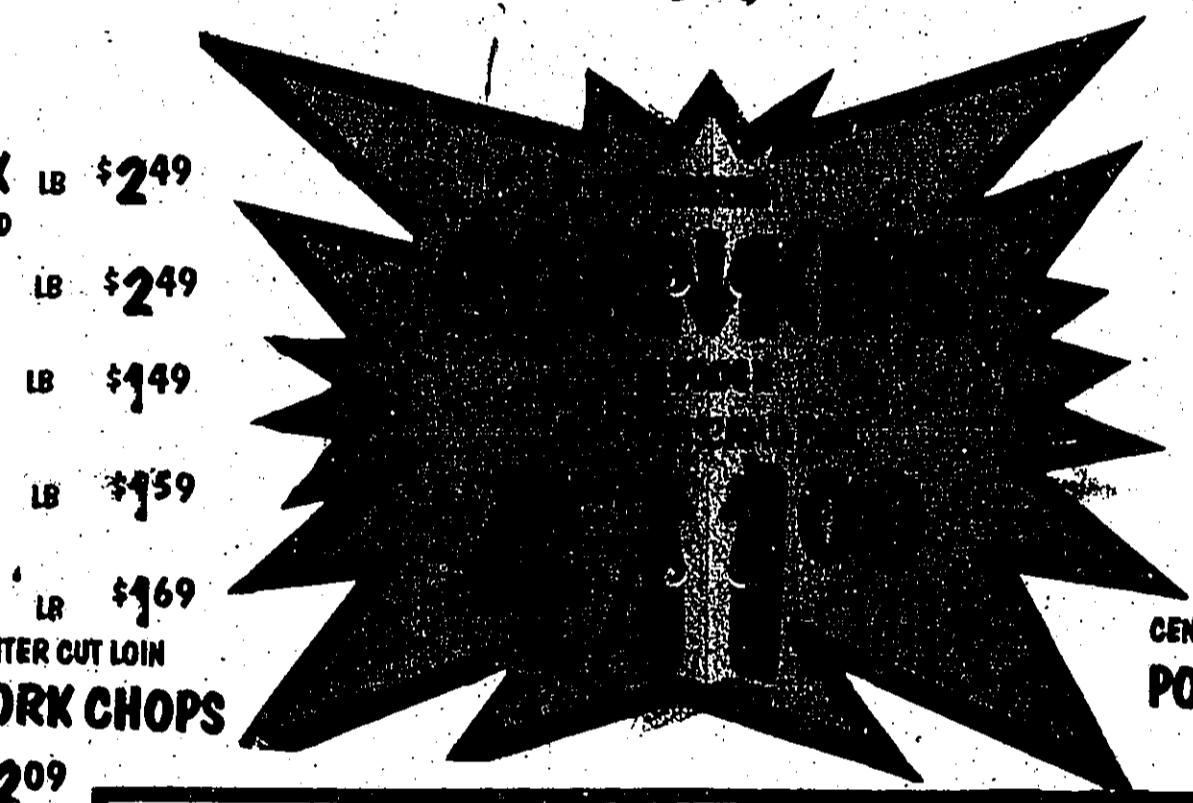

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East Texas Seen As Houston's Water Supplier

LIVINGSTON, East Texas river basins are expected to supply the water needed to offset projected water shortages in the Houston-Galveston industrial complex in the next 36 years, according to projections by the Texas Department of Water Resources.

By the year 2020, the TDWR estimates water use in the upper Gulf Coast and Southeast Texas region to be 8.111 million acre feet per year, the majority for municipal and manufacturing use in Houston-Galveston.

The available water supply in the region is estimated at 8,979 million acre feet per year, provided a number of new reservoirs are constructed.

The TDWR's plan also calls for the construction of conveyance facilities (canals, pipelines, etc.) to move surplus water from the Neches, Sabine and Trinity basins to the San Jacinto and Brazos basins to satisfy the demand.

New reservoirs proposed in the Trinity Basin include the Wallisville project, Bedias Creek, Hurricane Bayou, Tennessee Colony, Teahuacana, Richland-Chambers and the expansion of Lake Ray Roberts.

The Wallisville and Richland-Chambers projects are currently under construction and the Trinity River Authority has begun joint studies with the United States Bureau of Reclamation on the Bedias Creek project.

The TFA says the Tennessee Colony project is on indefinite hold because of the presence of lignite deposits that would be flooded by the proposed reservoir.

In the Neches River Basin, the plan calls for the construction of Rockland and Weches reservoirs on the Neches River and Ponta and Cherokee reservoirs on the Angelina River.

The Rockland project was reactivated by the U.S. Corps of Engineers last year for study but no construction funds have been budgeted due to a lack of support from the Lower Neches Valley Authority which would have to supply local funding.

The other three projects are not even in the planning stage.

The plan calls for construction of Prairie Creek, Carthage, Bon Weir and Big Cow Creek reservoirs in the Sabine River Basin. All of the Sabine Basin projects are classified as potential sites.

The construction of Lake Creek and Cleveland reservoirs in the San Jacinto Basin is also seen as imperative for the future of Houston's water supply.

The TDWR says the Houston-Galveston complex must become more self-reliant on surface water because of subsidence problems already being caused by the use of ground water.

The Gulf Coast Aquifer is incapable of supporting any more demand for ground water and is already being depleted more rapidly than it is being recharged.

The depletion of the ground water has already caused areas of Baytown and Pasadena to experience severe subsidence problems, the report says.

Lake Livingston was built by the Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston as part of the answer to Houston's future water needs and is currently under construction.

But the TDWR says Houston will still begin experiencing severe water problems in the early part of the 21st Century unless additional reservoirs and conveyance facilities are constructed.

TFA Spokesman John Jadrusch said the needs are there, but "big projects have big problems."

Jadrusch said the time needed to construct large reservoirs has increased since the enactment of legislation on both the state and federal levels requiring impact studies on the environmental and other effects of large reservoirs.

As an example, Jadrusch said, the existence of the port of Swarthout would have delayed the completion of Lake Livingston by as much as 10 years if the project was a new one.

The Rockland Reservoir would require 10 years of construction and filling time after work is begun, according to estimates by the Corps of Engineers.

Even without any snags, planning work on Rockland and the preparation of impact statements would have to be underway in the next few years in order for the project to meet the goal of supplying water by 2020.

Rockland and Tennessee Colony are the only projects in the two river basins that have progressed beyond the "potential site" stage of planning.

The conflict of interests inherent in the construction of large reservoirs is going to substantially delay the construction of any more dams on major rivers in East Texas.

The forest products industry is "not enthusiastic" about the removal of any more acreage of timberland from future production.

The Rockland project would inundate about 125,000 acres of timberland and an additional 50,000 acres would have to be taken for mitigation purposes.

Federal law requires the replacement of certain habitats when they are destroyed by federally-financed projects.

"When an acre of timberland is flooded, it is lost forever," former Texas Forestry Association executive vice-president Ed Waggoner said.

The TFA and the Texas Forest Service economic forecasters are even ready predicting shortages of pine timber in East Texas in the early years of the 21st Century if additional land is not converted to timber production.

Reservoirs also take out of production the major hardwood producing areas along the river bottoms and the best farmland in an area.

Environmental considerations include the removal of unique plant and animal communities found only in lowland areas and the effect of slowing down stream flow on downstream areas.

The Texas Committee on Natural Resources has already objected to the creation of Rockland on the grounds areas of the Big Thicket National Preserve required periodic flooding to survive and the building of the reservoir would reduce downstream flooding to the point these areas would die from insufficient moisture or be radically altered in their make-up.

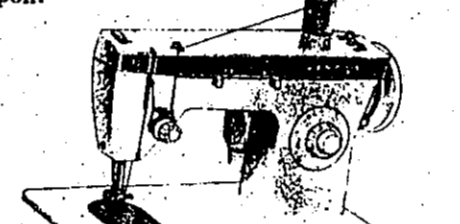
One of the "strange bedfellows" arrangements to arise from the proposed creation of more reservoirs in East Texas may be an alliance between the TFA and various environmental groups like the TCONR that have opposed each other in the past on issues such as wilderness set-asides.

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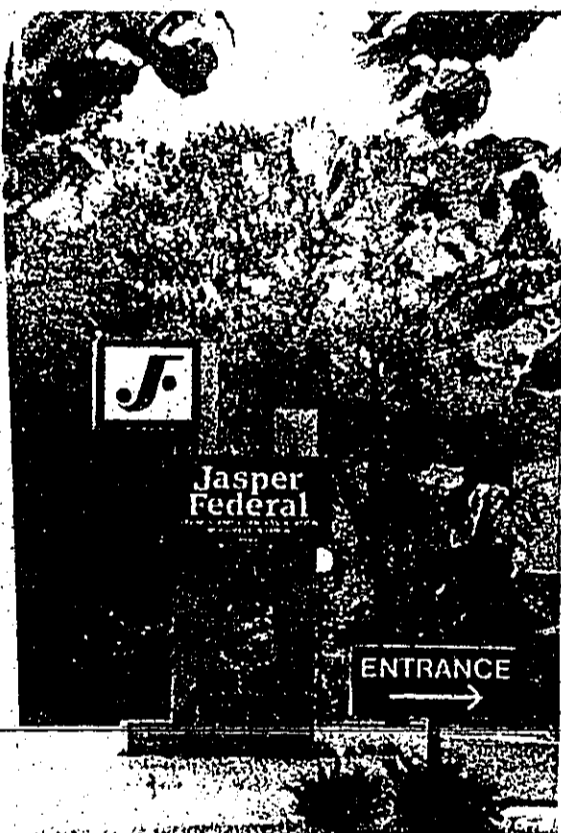
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
