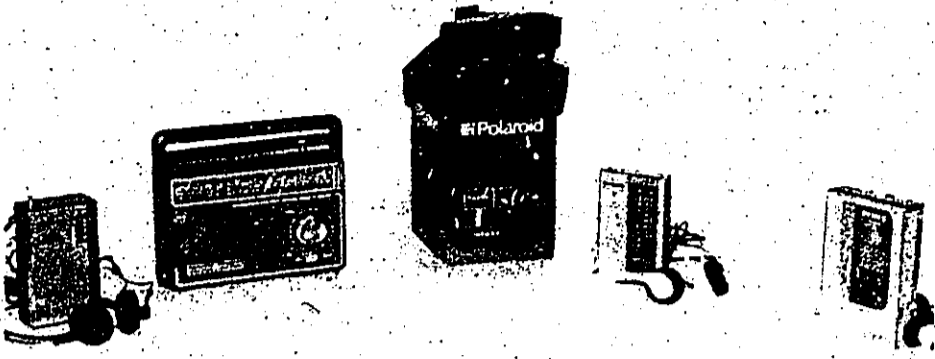

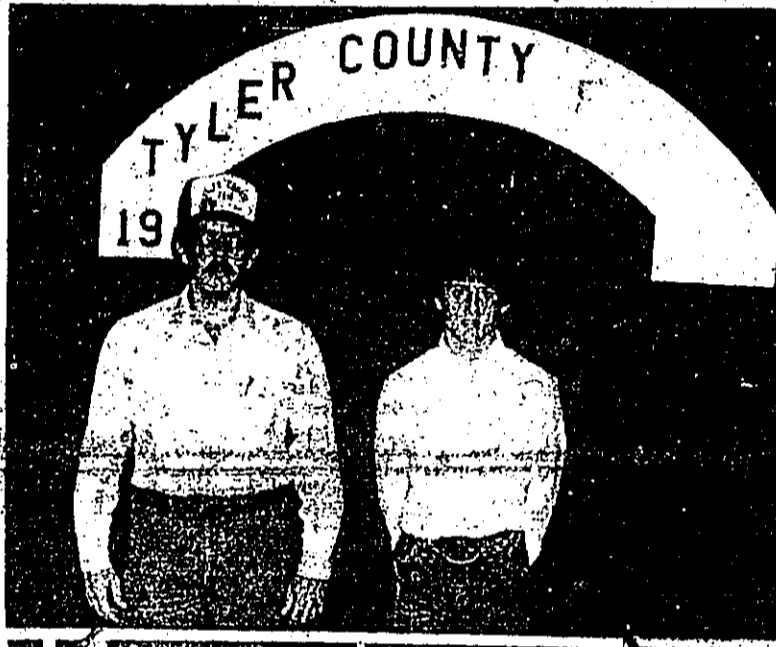

Court Approves '85 Budget

The Tyler County Commissioner's Court Monday, October 8, approved a 1985 County Budget of \$1,472,017. The 1985 County budget which includes a ten percent pay raise for all non elected county officials, represents a 2.86 percent increase over the nine month 1984 County Budget of \$1,132,567.

In addition to the employees pay raise Court House Justice of the Peace Pet. #1. Wanda Brasher received a \$569 per month pay increase reflecting the full time requirements of that office. Commissioner's set the 1985 tax rate at 23.5 cents per \$100 valuation on County General Property Tax. 9 cents on the County Special Tax, and 5 cents on the County Hospital Tax, for a total tax rate of 36 cents per \$100 valuation; a 7 cent decrease over last years 43 cent rate. This should produce a tax revenue from the two county property taxes of \$1,107,136 or a decrease of \$1,983 over the \$1,178,819 in revenue produced last year.

County Commissioner's granted a one year 40 percent discount on Property Tax valuations on homesteads; a \$3,000 homestead exemption on the County special tax for those who have already applied for it and an \$11,430 over 65 exemption on both the County General and Special - Ad Valorem Taxes. Valuation of County Property totaled \$672,415,346 but after all exemptions are subtracted except for certain revisions, on timber and agriculture land productivity values and disputed tax valuations on county banks, the County's Total Taxable Money value is \$424,891,749 according to County Tax Assessor Collector Barbara Tolbert.

In other business, Commissioner's approved deputations for current deputies in the Sheriff's office and approved a \$5,000 bond for B. J. Vardeman, as Criminal Investigator in the Criminal District Attorney's Office.

Warren Faces TSTA Legal Action

"We hope that the Warren School Board will see fit to extricate itself from this situation," said area Texas State Teacher's Association (TSTA) Uniserve representative Pat Morahan Monday commenting on an announcement by Pat Long, President of the Warren TSTA that her "local" had filed a complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) in Houston on behalf of James Wolf, a recently terminated black teacher and coach. Morahan said that "TSTA is already pursuing a breach of contract suit against the district and if the EEOC files a lawsuit that will make two suits" Morahan also said several other lawsuits against the Warren School Board and Superintendent Adolph Hryorchuk were "possibly in the works".

Pat Long, President of the Warren TSTA stated Monday "Warren Independent School District has for too long kept its teachers and other employees 'in line' through fear tactics." "James Wolf deserves credit for his tenacity in pursuing this injustice," she continued.

Wolf, the first black teacher to be hired by Warren ISD in the 18 years since desegregation was abruptly terminated by the chief school officer, Adolph Hryorchuk, in August. Hryorchuk claimed Mr. Wolf lacked proper certification, yet the teacher Mr. Hryorchuk subsequently hired as Language Arts teacher, who was white, also lacked certification. Wolf and TSTA are claiming that Hryorchuk is holding Wolf to a different and higher standard than that applied to white teachers. "I don't see how they would hire an uncertified person as my replacement, yet, tell me I needed certification for the same position," Wolf stated.

In a separate, but related matter, the Board of Trustees of Warren ISD had initially rejected Wolf's demand for a hearing on a non-renewal grievance. TSTA has requested that the board reconsider its response. "We are committed to defending a member to the fullest extent possible," Long concluded.

Superintendent Hryorchuk, contacted Tuesday said that he was not aware of the pending EEOC complaint. "As Mr. Wolf is no longer an employee of the Warren Schools, all matters pertaining to him are being handled by the Warren School District's Attorney Lamar Hunt."

Warren School District Attorney Lamar Hunt contacted Tuesday afternoon said "I am not aware of an EEOC complaint against the Warren School District. However if it was filed in the Houston office it may take several days for them to notify us and no lawsuit has been filed against the Warren District yet in the Wolf matter."

Woodville City Budget To Increase 13.49%

The City of Woodville approved the 1985 Budget of \$1,776,233 representing an increase of \$217,365 or 13.49% over last years Budget of \$1,558,868.

City Fathers also approved a 1985 property tax rate of 25 cents per \$100 valuation or a decrease of 13 cents from last years tax rate of 38 cents per \$100 valuation. This tax rate, in light of increases in property tax valuation should produce \$108,069 in tax revenues or approximately the same revenue as last year.

Woodville council also approved a protest of the Tyler County Tax Appraisal District 1985 Budget provision of health insurance coverage for the family's of District employees.

Appraisal District Board Director from the city, Dr. Malcolm Radford, reported that the Board of Directors of the Appraisal District had changed the termination of four employees of the District to a "two week suspension without pay" pending further action of the Board of Directors of the

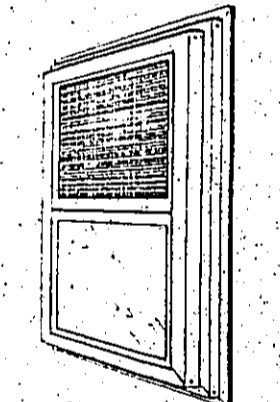

I received a 28 pound bag of spanish peanuts from Grapeland, Texas which is located north of Crockett, a few days ago. The oil is on it and you stir it up and do taste good. We use to raise a good many peanuts and a good many peanut products. I have a paraded peanut and some homemade syrup candy were the very thing setting around the fireplace-out on the creek. We raised some hog peanuts. They were 3 to 4 to the hull and the hulls were tuff and the peanuts were of dark red color. They tasted different from the spanish peanuts. They were called hog peanuts because of the tough hulls and were left in the field for the hogs to eat. I haven't seen any of them in several years. I think the seeds originally came from Mississippi. Spanish peanuts are easy to raise if you have some sandy loam soil. They require no fertilizer. Several by-

Politicians like to tell us, especially if they are behind in the polls, that we voters don't really get into elections until after the World Series.

Yet we find that the first of the Presidential debates comes before the World Series even starts. We mention this of course because the "presidential debates" are supposed to be the occasion when Mr. Mondale meets a bumbling President Reagan.

On the other hand we have a challenger who has been in public life all his professional career, served as Vice President, voted thousands of times in the Senate of the United States on issues that pretty clearly state his political ideology.

As in most debates of course, the incumbent President has to run on his record, with the challenger free to offer any pie in the sky he can think of that will attract voters to him.

The advantage in the debate format as structured by the League of Women Voters, and posed by the media folks offers little in "new news" with each debater hoping to high heaven that he can catch his opponent in some kind of a gaff and enhance his own position in the final weeks of the campaign.

We will assume that for a lot of folks, the debates are meaningless claptrap thought up by professional politicians, and much ado about nothing. That the independent television stations will counter-program with blockbuster movies, and many usual network watchers on a Sunday night will use the occasion to walk the dog.

When you think of the tens of millions of dollars that are poured into election campaigns in this country, and the perception that the Presidential winner will be decided in a pair of Sunday night debates in October, the cost effectiveness of political campaigns would seem to need closer scrutiny.

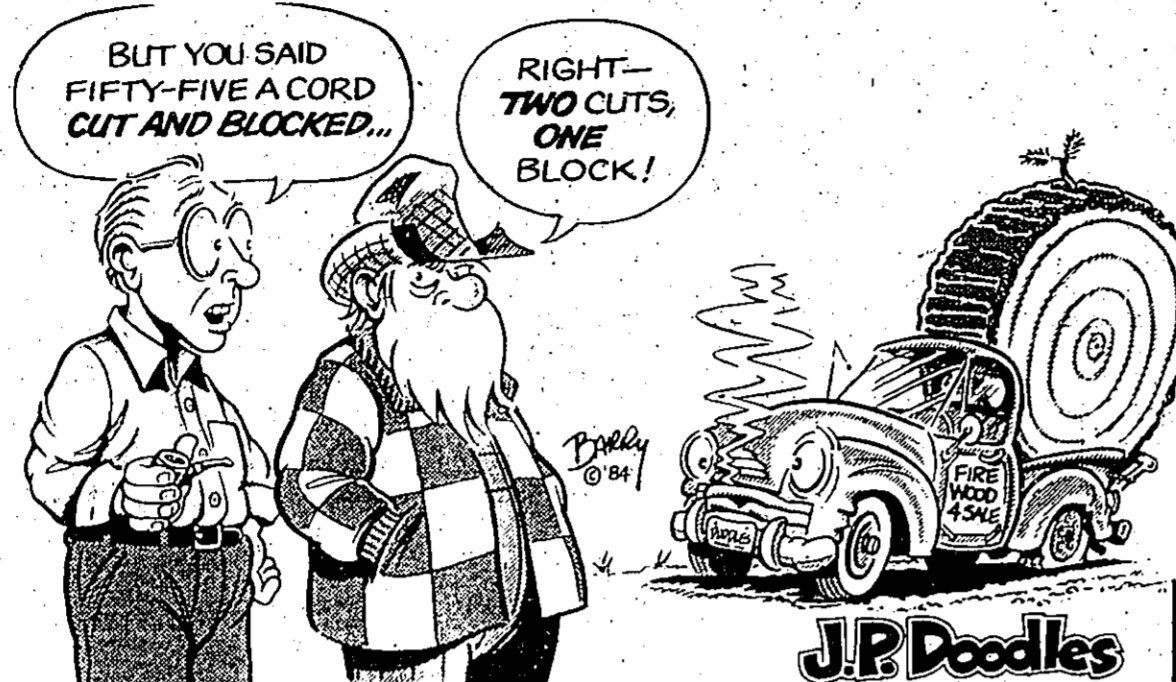
On the brighter side, most of us must approve of the way elections are promoted, or we wouldn't put up with such nonsense. As with the national debt, the cost of electing keeps going up, the quality of legislation gets more tenuous, and most of us still feel the "Government ought to do something."

Why Plant Trees

The reasons for planting trees are numerous. Landowners with the Texas Forest Service in Woodville. Tax incentives are one reason why investment-minded landowners are interested in tree plant-

ing, the agency forester declares. Landowners who plant trees as a crop qualify for a 10 percent tax credit in the year of planting. This amount, up to \$1,000, can be subtracted directly from the amount of tax owed. Also, 95 percent of the total cost of planting—up to \$10,000—can be deducted from gross income on a prorated basis over a seven-year period.

Timber growers are eligible for other tax benefits as well. Forest land can be taxed on a basis of its productive potential for growing trees instead of being forced into other uses, such as real estate development, by rising taxes. Provided certain conditions are met, timber sales income can be taxed at a rate usually lower than that for ordinary income. Timber also has substantial marketing flexibility. If a temporary sag in the timber market occurs, a woodland owner can simply allow his trees to continue growing slowly and value.





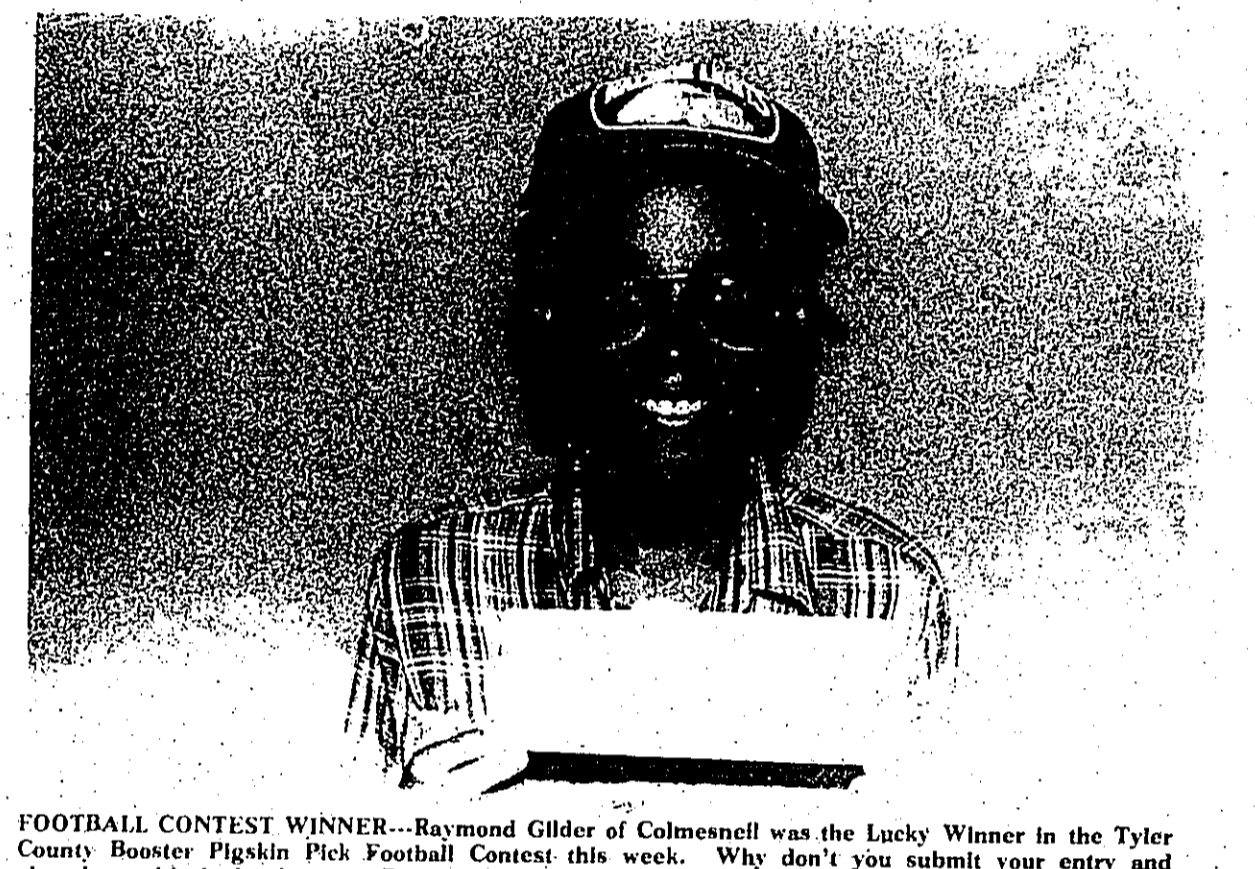

Get Ready For 'Old Man Winter'

By Ted Brice
Even though the first freeze may be several days to months away we need to be getting ready for 'Old Man Winter' and then we had the extreme cold weather that

hardest winter in our history with almost three hundred continuous hours below freezing. Last year we had a very dry summer and fall and then we had the extreme cold weather that killed many plants. Some of our trees are just now showing the damage from last winter. This year we are even drier at this time than we were a year ago. With the lack of rain it will not take a very hard freeze to do more damage this year. If you haven't received any rain you should be watering very HEAVY. In fact, I am suggesting that you insert your root feeder about ten to twelve inches in the ground at the drip line of your trees and let the water run from one to two hours and to go around the drip line of your trees until you have completely encircled your tree.

as your leaves begin to fall do not burn them. Place those leaves in your compost pile and then use your compost in your garden as a mulch which will not only conserve the moisture for your plants but will also act as an insulator protecting the plants from freezing weather. If a freeze is predicted be sure to water all your plants heavy just before the freeze. This offers your plants an insulation barrier against the coming freeze. It is time to lift any plants that are not cold hardy and bring them inside. Remember when you bring these plants inside try to duplicate the outside conditions as closely as possible.

The Economic See-Saw

Quite often insight and understanding can be obtained in one field of knowledge by making a simple comparison with something already understood.

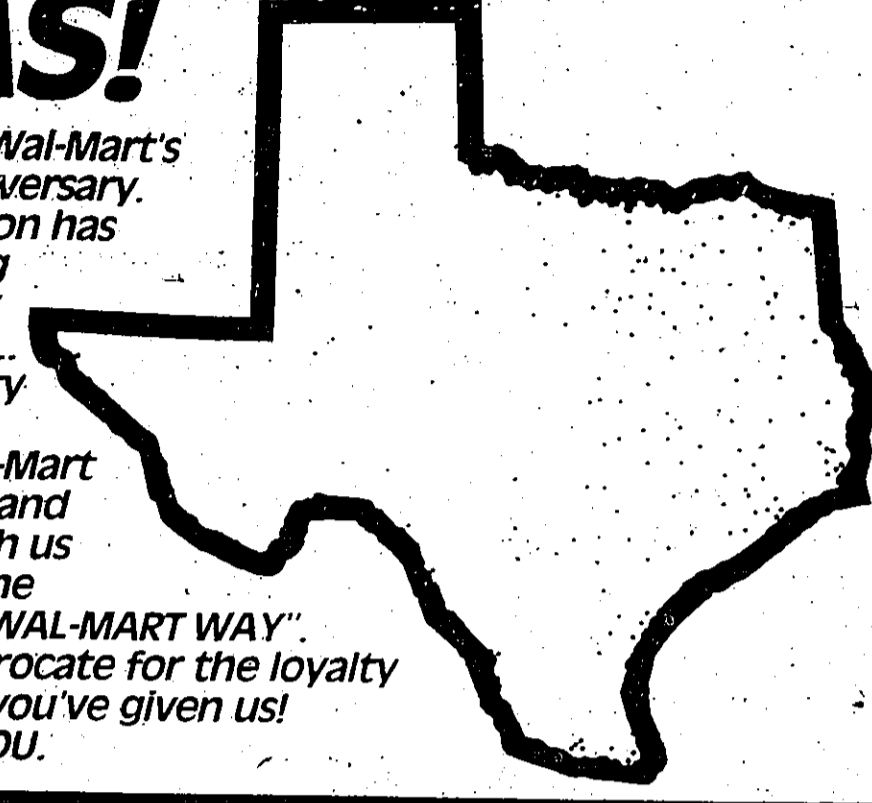
