## Dam-B To Get Hydropower In January '86

TULSA, Ok.—The Sam Rayburn Municipal Power Agency has been tentatively selected by the Southwestern Power Administration and Ft. Worth District office of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers to finance and to receive the power from the new hydropower plant for Town Bluff Dam, on the Neches River. The Corps of En-

gineers project is currently in the final design and engineering work and could start construction as early as January of 1986 with Congressional approval.

The Sam Rayburn Municipal Power Agency consists of several area cities including the cities of Livingston, Jasper, Liberty and Vinson Louisiana, and purchases its electricity from the Corps of Engineers operated Sam Rayburn Dam Hydropower Plant and from a coal burning plant in Westlake, Louisiana. Current Corps of Engineers plans call for operation of the proposed hydropower plant at Town Bluff by remote control from the Sam Rayburn Hydropower facility.

Ronald H. Wilkerson, Administrator of SWPA, announced the tentative selection. He said that any additional proposal received by November 11, 1984, will be considered in the final selection. Formal notice was submitted for printing in the Federal Register of October 12, 1984. "By this announcement," Wilkerson said, "we are providing opportunity for any other interested parties to submit additional proposals."

The project would add hydropower generation to the existing Town Bluff Dam on the Neches River. The dam is a few miles south of Sam Rayburn Lake and 45 miles north of Beaumont.

The plant would generate an average of 35,900,000 kilowatt-hours of electrical energy a year. Its installed capacity would be 6,000 kilowatts.

For comparison, capacity of the power plant at Sam Rayburn Dam is 52,000 kilowatts; and it generates an average of 114 million kilowatt-hours a year.

"Addition of hydropower facilities at Town Bluff Dam will cost an estimated \$20 million," Wilkerson said. "The Sam Rayburn Agency proposes to pay the full construction cost during the construction period and the estimated \$260,000 annual cost of operation, maintenance, major replacements, and administration. If the Corps of Engineers and Southwestern Power Administration give final approval to the proposal, we will sell the Agency the full output of the project."

The agency qualifies for preference in the sale of hydropower from Federal facilities. It is the first such agency in SWPA's six-state marketing region to make a formal proposal for financing the construction cost of a project to be built by the Corps of Engineers, Wilkerson.

"This proposal conforms with the policy of President Ronald Reagan to require reasonable non-Federal financing of water resource projects," he said.

The Corps of Engineers would construct, own, and operate the power plant. SWPA would market the power. Start of construction would require approval by the Congress.

Wilkerson said that the addition of power facilities to the Town Bluff Dam would not affect the Lower Neches Valley Authority's use of water from the reservoir. The Authority is an agency of the State of Texas that provided the local funds required for the construction of Town Bluff Dam for water conservation and flood control. The dam was completed in 1951.

## Woodville Attendance 'Highest Ever'

Woodville School average daily attendance for the first six weeks of the 1984-85 school year "was the highest we have ever had," according to Business Manager Monroe Prescott. With refined average daily attendance of 1,706.46, a gain of 40.32 students over last year's attendance of 97.43 percent attendance, a gain of 1.05 percent over last year's 96.38 percentages.

A report of first six weeks grades released Monday "show our highest grades in the Kindergarten through sixth grades and the lower grades in the Middle school and High School," according to Superintendent Jackson. Second grade reported 59 percent "A", 31 percent "B", 9 percent "C"

and 1 percent "F". Eighth grade reported 17 percent "A", 33 percent "B", 30 percent "C" and 20 percent "F". High School English grades were 15 percent "A", 33 percent "B", 32 percent "C", and 20 percent "F". High school math grades including Physics were 23 percent "A", 26 percent "B", 41 percent "C", and 10 percent "F".

"We have 11 students at least who would not be eligible for extracurricular activities because they have failed two or more courses had this been January of 1985," said High School principal Larry Dickerson. "It would have hurt the Band but we would have managed. We would have lost 6 or 8 out of 10."

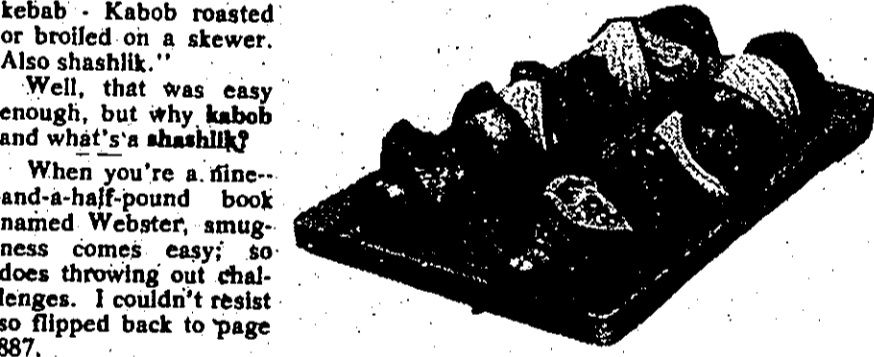

UNDER A SPELL - Shish kabab is not an easy word to spell. In fact, you won't even find it in some dictionaries. I didn't have any luck until I turned to Webster's new 2,120 page, mammoth Deluxe Encyclopedic Edition. There it was on page 891. "Shish kabab - Kabob roasted or broiled on a skewer. Also shashlik." They held the Warriors and made them punt. Buna ran the QB Keith Spivey hit 5 of 45. They drove over for their second TD in 6 plays.

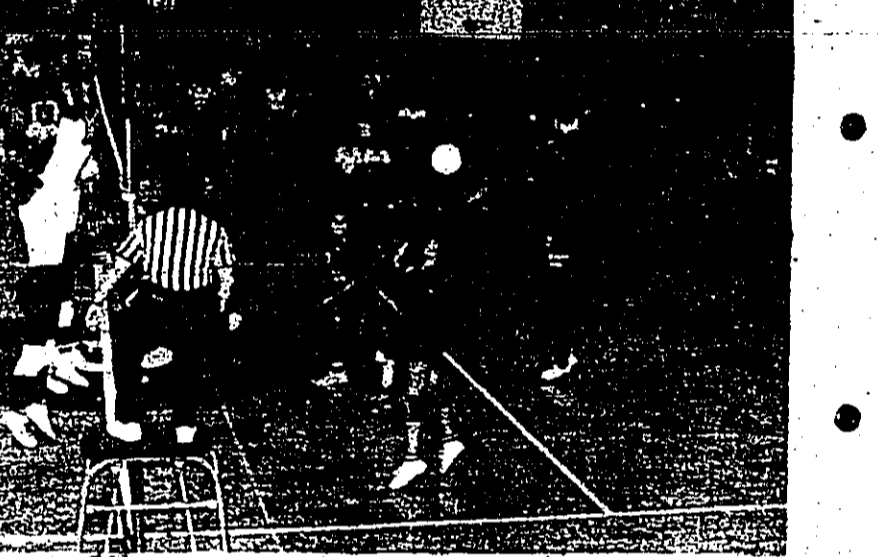

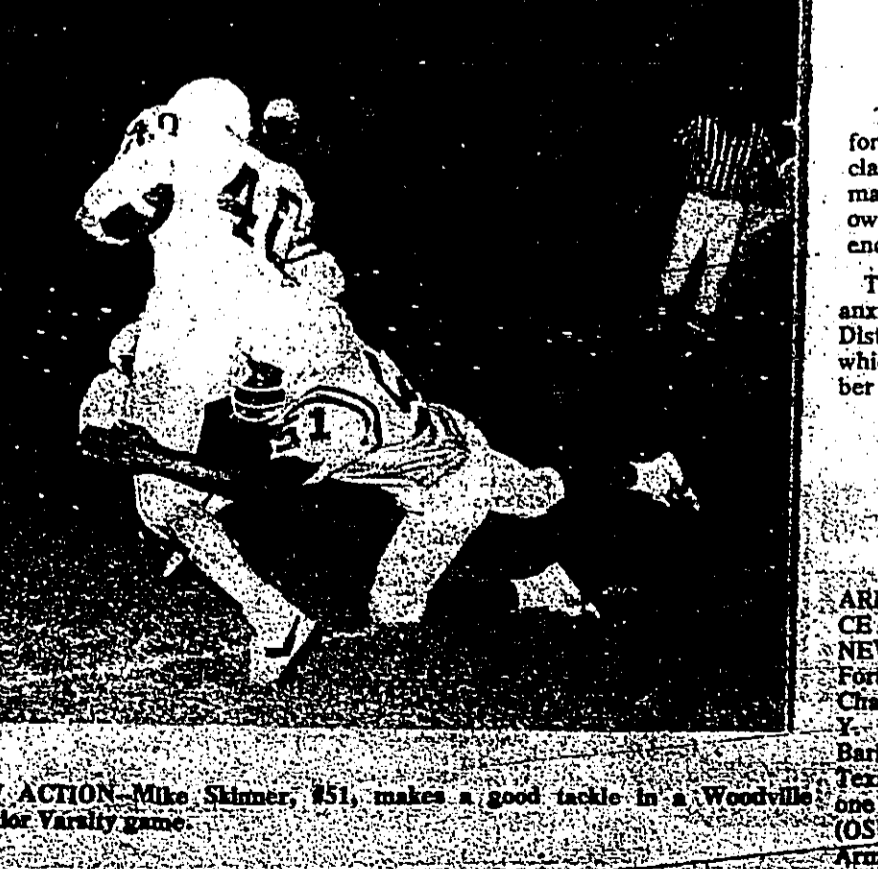

We are told by many that this new bill won't work and the bill has been in effect less than six weeks. We hear what the test this year, a scant 55 passed. 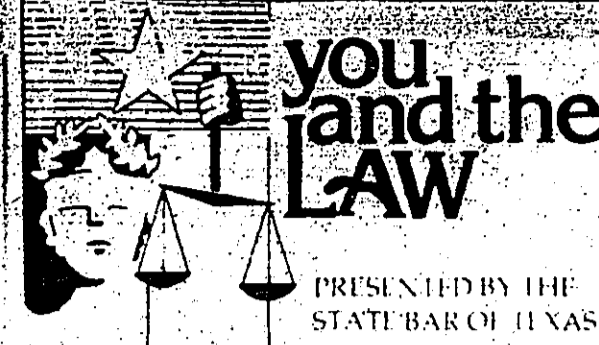

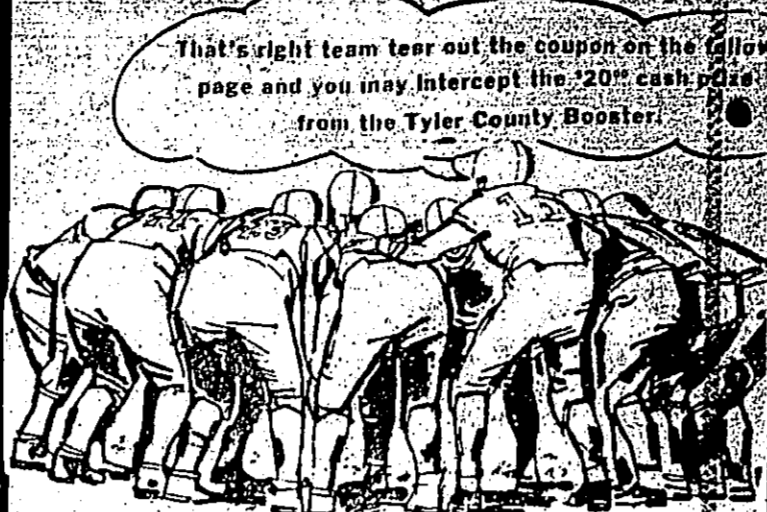



**Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington**



Texas school districts from Dallas to Brownville, and several points in between, have been hit hard by the costs of educating immigrant children.

Without a good educational background, these children cannot live up to their potential. Indeed, many will be carried from a whole host of employment opportunities.

A good education not only serves the interests of individual students but of their communities as well. A skilled work force able to compete for high paying jobs—a magnet for industry.

I have long believed that the federal government should provide some relief to school districts that must educate large numbers of immigrant children.

After all, federal immigration policies—and policy failures—have resulted in a dramatic increase in the number of immigrants that cross our borders, both legally and illegally. In fact, the courts have ruled they must be provided with admission to the public schools.

It is impossible to estimate with any precision the number of illegal aliens in this country, but according to the best calculations of the Bureau of the Census, almost twice as many aliens entered this country illegally between 1978 and 1980 as did in the five previous years.

In Texas, the state education agency estimates that this year there are about 1.1 million immigrant children enrolled in public schools. 1.1 million in Houston and from El Paso to College Station.

The cost of educating immigrant children is heaviest for Texas. It is laborious, as it is difficult to find a teacher who speaks Spanish. There are teachers who have been deprogrammed by thought, flood and Mexico's devaluations of the peso. They simply do not have the means to cope with swollen student rolls on top of all this.

In past years, I have persuaded the Senate to provide aid to school districts that have disproportionately large numbers of immigrant children. On both occasions the legislation failed to gain final congressional approval.

This spring, I joined with other members of the Texas Delegation to successfully demand that the Department of Education release \$30 million in immigrant education aid that Congress finally approved, on a one-time basis, last year. Texas schools should receive \$4.5 million this year, or 14-42 percent of the funds, second only to California.

Shortly after that, I introduced legislation to extend that aid for five years. I was able recently to persuade Senate members of a 15-member Senate conference committee to include a proposal similar to mine in an education bill.

The legislation authorizes \$30 million in 1985 for emergency immigrant education aid, then \$40 million a year through 1989. A school district must have enrolled at least 500 immigrant students, or five percent total enrollment, to qualify.

The fact is that federal immigration policies are having a harmful effect on many Texas schools. It is the responsibility of the federal government, then, to help solve a problem it helped create.
