## Accident Fatal To Dam-B Youth

A pick-up truck—bicycle accident late Sunday claimed the life of a 7-year old Dam-B girl, Misty Diane Cowart, as the youngster was riding home on Hwy 92 from a convenience store near her home.

The accident, which occurred at about 5:30 p.m. according to police reports, occurred as the victim apparently swerved in front of a truck, owned by Rodney Pigg, 36, of Spurger. Pigg told Department of Public Safety officers that he had applied his brakes then reported skidding into the girl who was thrown a considerable distance from the point of impact. The girl was taken to Jasper Memorial Hospital by private auto after neighbors summoned the Tyler County ambulance which made a response but was informed before arriving that the victim had already been removed to the Jasper Hospital where she was pronounced dead.

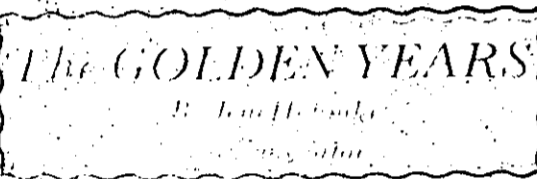
Finally, for another year, all the spooks of the world, of Halloween retreated leaving residents with yet more memories of good times shared.

Medical doctors were fighting among themselves as to whether the operation should have been performed in the first place, and dire predictions were voiced that all the animals on the globe would be in danger of becoming one big source of transplants for the human race.

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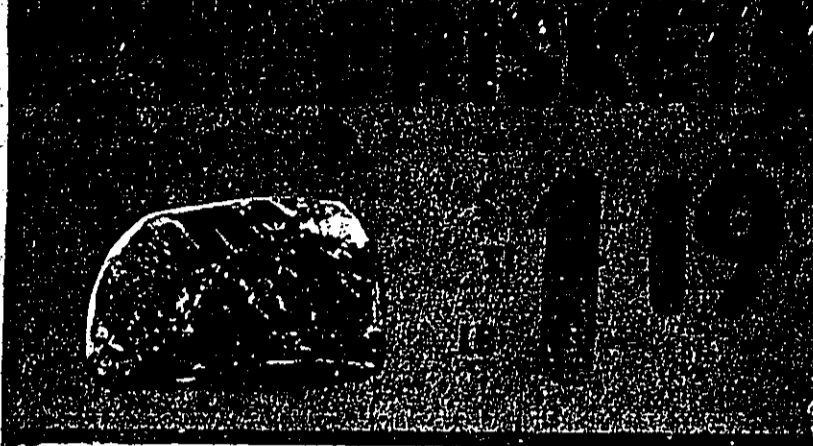

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# Render Unto Caesar... And Unto God

Render unto Caesar... and unto God. Our Gospel today provides the most quoted non-answer that Jesus ever gave. A non-answer? Yes, it never did answer the question. Let's look at the situation in which Jesus gave this famous quote.

There were two factions in the crowd that Jesus spoke to: The Herodians who covet the Roman invaders, and the Pharisees that, unlike the Herodians, were no doubt a heretic-one that did not acknowledge the Kingship of God. The Pharisees had their own political expediency. So Jesus would give any help to the Kingdom of God, and he gave his famous non-answer. "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's." That just doesn't seem to answer the question. The question is not that simple. The Herodians had to say yes. Their self-interest was heavily involved. Many held positions because of their cooperation with the invaders. Others, though not offic-

ially connected, had favored status because of this friendship. Obviously, these people were the most quoted non-answer that Jesus ever gave. A non-answer? Yes, it never did answer the question. Let's look at the situation in which Jesus gave this famous quote.

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They all became quiet. The trap was still not sprung. He walked away and they stood looking at each other. This always happens to people whose world is too simple. When someone complicates the question-one that they thought so simple-they stand with their mouth hanging open. It happens today.

All the simple answers about Church and State today are the same kind of programmed simple questions with complex answers. Some want to use this as an excuse to run inferior schools and day care centers. Some want to extend their influence into the public schools. Some want to use this

issue to provide tax dodges in the name of religion. They want to be the Herodians and in some communities they are the Herodians. Others want to use this to exclude any religion or religious influence from the public arena. They don't want to be called to answer questions on the old fashioned basis of right and wrong. They bristle whenever anyone asks "is it really right?" They want to be the secular parasites whose sovereign god is their own political expediency. So Jesus would give any help to the Kingdom of God, and he gave his famous non-answer. "Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's." That just doesn't seem to answer the question. The question is not that simple. The Herodians had to say yes. Their self-interest was heavily involved. Many held positions because of their cooperation with the invaders. Others, though not offic-

A number of Munchausen patients have several scars from unnecessary operations, a condition sometimes referred to as "Gridiron abdomen."

Munchausen's Syndrome usually begins in early adult life, although cases can arise in ado-

# AFIDA Eyes Foreign Investors

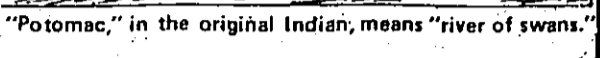
To clarify the Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA) and make it easier to administer, the U.S. Department of Agriculture recently changed certain sections of the Act. The Act requires foreign persons who acquire or transfer an interest in agricultural land to file a report with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The Act also requires that the report include the following information:

(1) a single foreign individual, organization, or government holds a direct or indirect interest of 10 percent or more; (2) when a group of foreign individuals, organizations, or governments, acting in concert, hold an aggregate interest of 10 percent or more; and (3) when a group of foreign individuals, organizations, or governments, acting in concert, hold an aggregate interest of 50 percent or more.

"We believe that percentages will give us a more accurate indication of the amount of agricultural land owned by foreign persons," Mrs. Kathy O. Lowe, said. "Previously, business entities, not normally considered foreign-dominated, filed reports resulting in a serious distortion of the total figures of agricultural foreign investments, she said.

A change in the definition of agricultural land excluded all farm, ranch, forestry and timber land not exceeding 10 acres in the aggregate. "However, if the annual sale of the farm, ranch, forestry or timber products produced on these acres exceeds \$1,000, the land must be reported."

Lowe said foreign disclosure reports will now include the date the land was acquired or transferred, the value of the purchase price yet to be paid, and the estimated value of the land. Foreign persons are also required to keep direct and indirect ownership information current, report to USDA if they cease to be a foreign person, and if the agricultural land ceases to be agricultural. "These additional provisions are necessary for us to maintain accurate, up-to-date information on foreign ownership of U.S. agricultural land," the ASCS official said. "Nationally, foreign investors reported owning 13.7 million acres of U.S. agricultural land at the end of 1983, a little over one percent of the nation's privately-held agricultural land."
