Principal Alan Mitchell at the beginning of the school year which gave the definite impression that the school day had not been lengthened because of House Bills 246 and 72. Dr. James Clark was contacted at the Texas Education Agency concerning this letter. Clark stated that this reference to House Bills 246 and 72 was definitely misleading the public because the school day length had not been changed. Another area of concern was that the Fred students are being tutored in the afternoon rather than in the morning. It was felt that the students were too tired after their long school day to receive any benefit from the tutoring. Also, all the students in the classroom who ride the bus are kept in that classroom while only a few are being tutored making it almost impossible to get the individual attention needed. Downs appealed to the Board to consider making the following changes at Fred Elementary: "Change the school day to the same seven hours as the other three schools have. On tutorial days, let parent volunteers take the children who are not being tutored to another area of the school. Allow parent volunteers to take the lunch periods and recess periods so that teachers can have time to adequately prepare mind and body for their classmate. Also allow parent volunteers to be assigned to classes to help children who need extra help in drills and oral reading as well as possibly helping with art and music. Since the students are already on campus by 7:15 a.m., have the tutorials in the morning while the student's mind is still fresh." Downs asked the Board to allow the teachers to come up with some suggestions if hers did not seem feasible. The Board agreed that there was a problem and said that the matter would be looked into. ### Wardens Issue Warnings

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Game Wardens are concerned about the failure of hunting clubs and leases not complying with state law concerning Shooting Preserves. Local wardens Huey Hancock and Bob Rawls state that they continue to have problems with Shooting Preserves despite the fact that the law has been in existence for many years and despite their efforts to educate the public, the sportsman, and the hunting clubs in the county. "The Parks and Wildlife Code 43.041 states that a Shooting Preserve license is required of all lands that are leased for hunting purposes or in cases where a landowner charges a fee for hunting guests. The license fees are \$10. for preserves less than 500 acres, \$25. for 500-1,000 acres, and \$40. for 1,000 acres or more. Licenses are available at any Parks and Wildlife District office (such as Lufkin or Beaumont) or through the Austin Headquarters. The Code also states that the holder of a shooting preserve license shall certify by his signature...that the licensee will: (1) not violate any of the provisions of 43.041, subchapter D, (2.) endeavor to prevent any guest from violating same provisions, and (3.) not receive guests who do not have a valid hunting license." The law further states that "the holder of a shooting preserve license shall keep a suitable record book and shall require each guest to register. The registration of a guest must include: (1.) the name and residence of the guest, (2.) the hunting license number of the guest, (3.) the number and type of game animals and game birds killed each day by the guest." Such report is to be submitted to the local game warden by March 1 of each year. Warden Hancock states that the Department may cancel the license of a shooting preserve if the manager fails to comply with any of the provisions of the Shooting Preserve law. Additional penalties for violation include a fine of \$25-\$200, or by commitment in the county jail for not more than 90 days, or by both. According to Warden Rawls the major problems are failure to buy the license and failure of each guest to sign in and record game killed. "Many of our clubs and leases are doing a good job in compliance with the Shooting Preserve law, but some are not. The law applies equally to all clubs." Most hunting clubs keep their Shooting Preserve book inside the gate in a small box or other suitable container for members to sign in and out and register their kill. "We advise all hunting clubs to do this so their book is accessible to their members and to us so that we can check it," states Hancock.



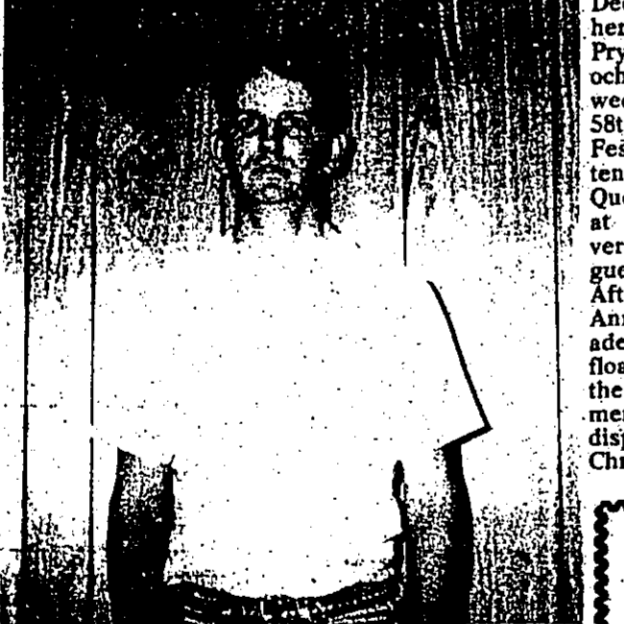

**STAYING TUNED** - There's no doubt that the future is here. Today we can watch over 100 channels of programming every day of the week. Channels from all over the United States; from Canada, Mexico, Europe and Russia.

**Care Of Kid's Sleepwear**

"Tests have been conducted on 100 different cotton children's sleepwear that was treated with wash-cycle fabric softener. The results showed that softeners and softeners added to the dryer, she explains.

## The GOLDEN YEARS

The number of states with more than a million residents each has more than doubled since 1960, according to figures compiled by the Census Bureau. The bureau's study shows that there are 15 states with that many residents over 65 years of age in 1980. The original three were California, New York and Pennsylvania. The list also includes Florida, Texas, Illinois and Ohio. During that same period, the total number of Americans aged 65 and older rose 65.4 percent to 38,149,000.

In January in July 1985, food manufacturers will be required to list the sodium content of many processed foods on their labels, according to a regulation announced by the Food and Drug Administration. The new rule is of great importance to many older Americans with high blood pressure who are on restricted-sodium diets.

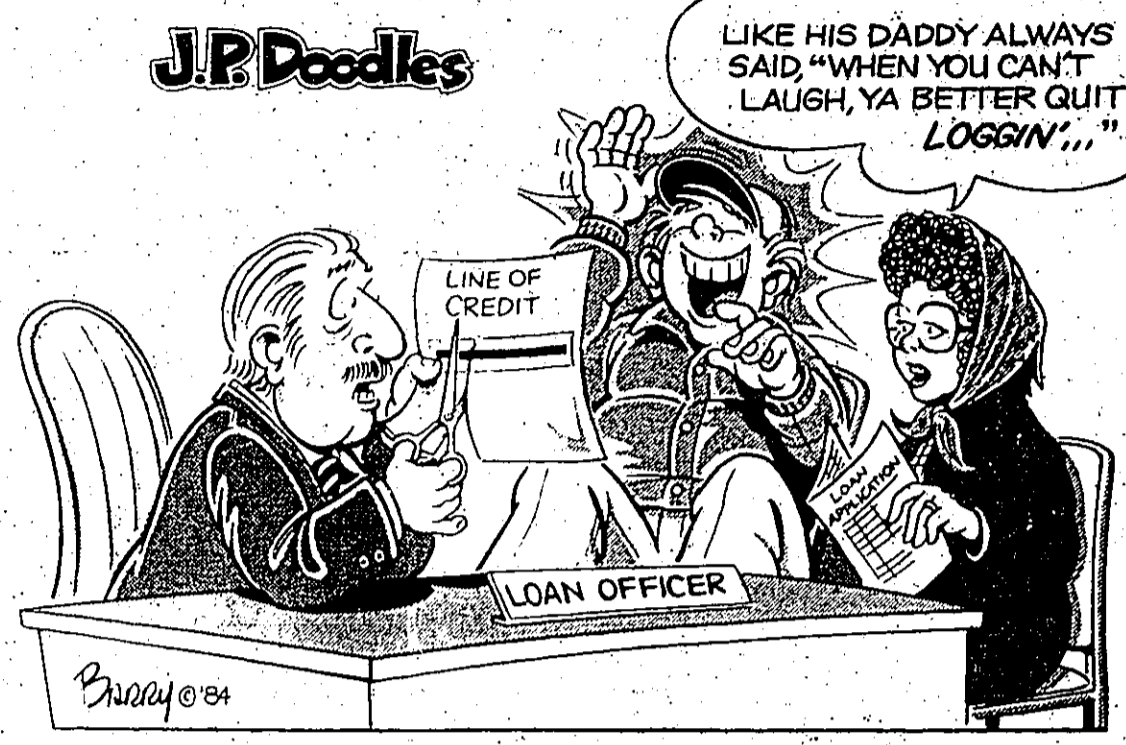
The T-Wheeler got a telephone call from Charlton Heston the other evening. Tom Landry had called just before the election. Our favorite spouse took that call.
