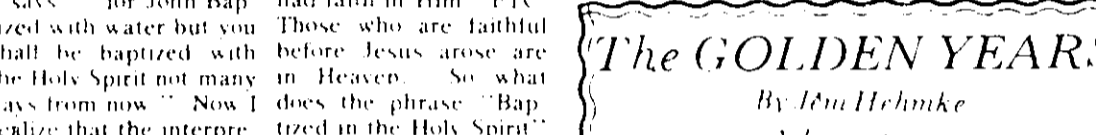

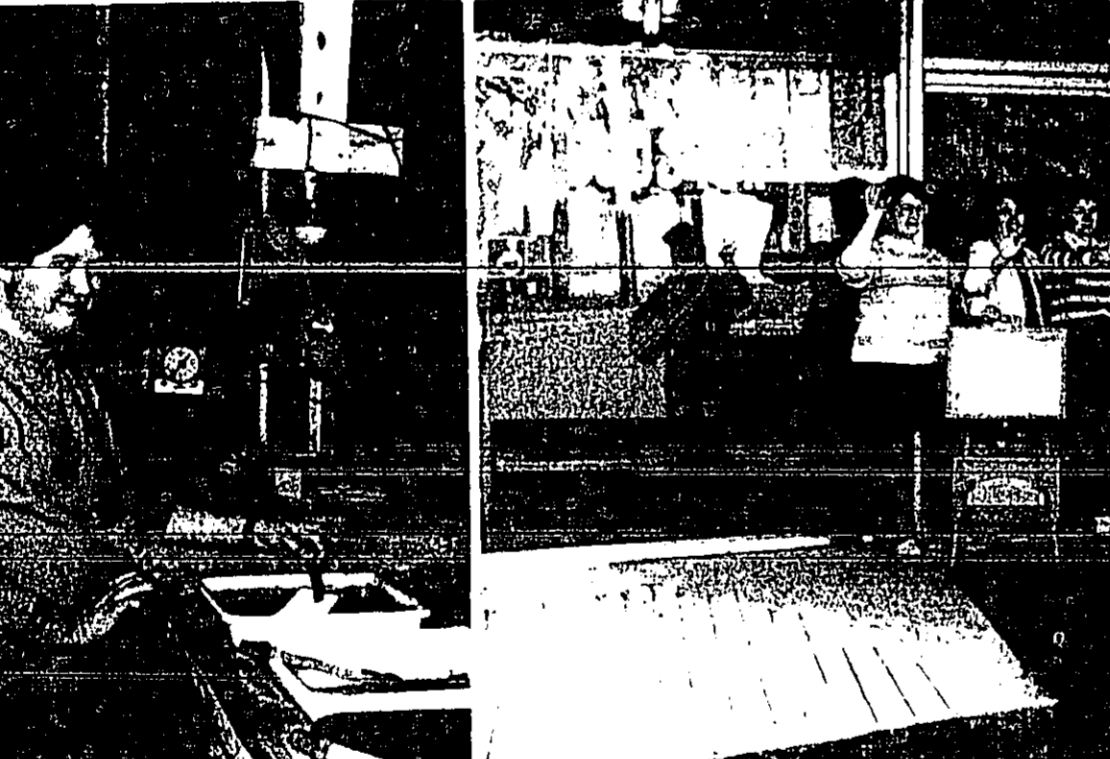
Mauui is just plain beautiful. Great surfing, elegant hotels, views that are nothing short of spectacular. Nice place to go back to in our opinion.

GEORGE KRESS

A CASE HISTORY

George Kress is a man who prides himself on being a responsible citizen. That's why, when he started his Green Bay Packaging Corporation in 1928—one year after graduation from the University of Wisconsin—he accepted responsibility for the bankruptcy of his father's firm and made it a point to repay every creditor with interest.

That's why, a half-century later in 1977, he couldn't believe that he too faced bankruptcy or certain destruction because of a class action suit charging anti-trust price-fixing filed by persons he'd never done business with.

And that's why today he's supporting an amendment to the Sherman and Clayton Antitrust laws, the Antitrust Equal Enforcement Act (S. 985). Current law makes every company named in a suit potentially liable for the total damages—even those caused by others.

It was this accepted practice of assuming liability in class-action cases that forced Kress to pay more than \$5 million to the plaintiffs even though a federal grand jury later found that Green Bay was not a conspirator.

To pursue his innocence in the civil case, instead of paying the amount demanded by plaintiffs to settle, would have meant filing a statement of potential liability of as much as \$5 billion to all creditors (and potential creditors) of Green Bay Packaging! (as much as 1000 times the settlement figure of \$5 million!)

It could have meant withdrawal of all credit to the corporation, which in turn would have prevented Green Bay from getting the funds needed to invest in and expand its business. Credit is critical to Green Bay. The potential liability would have destroyed its borrowing capability.

Kress could have sold the business and retired or could have watched 68 years of hard work slowly go under.

As Kress pondered whether to fight or settle, he had to recall highlights of the five decades of energy he had put into the operations. He also thought of the personal commitment he made to his father, and to his sons James F. Kress, now the president of the firm, and Donald F. Kress, now senior vice president.

George Kress knew he hadn't conspired to fix prices and, initially, he decided to wait and rest on that fact. But then the full ramifications of the suit hit. He learned that, by the time an offer of settlement out-of-court was made to Green Bay Packaging for more than \$5 million, 80 percent of the companies in the suit had already settled.

Under the current law, the remaining companies that had not settled were liable for the total damages, less only the amounts of the previous settlements. Reluctantly, Kress concluded that he had no choice but to settle, too.

There are currently over 900 companies involved in cases which would be affected by S. 985, now pending in the U.S. Senate.

They and the Kresses feel this legislation should restore fairness without delay both in pending and future cases.
