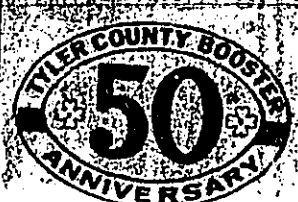

Narrowed To Three

Jail Architects Eyed

The Tyler County Jail Building Committee began its final selection process in its search for an architectural firm that will submit design proposals for a new jail to be located in Woodville.

The proposed site for the new jail is an area currently used for a baseball field and located north of Willow Street in southeast Woodville. Preliminary estimates

indicate a cost of between \$80 to \$90 per square foot for the facility which will offer 55 cells.

In an all-day conference the committee heard proposals from seven Texas Architectural firms. After hearing the qualifications and suggestions for the proposed jail facility, the committee selected three. The firms chosen include: Joslyn and Uti-

Swanson; Hiestler, Wilson and Claycomb, Inc., of Dallas; and, Creative Jail Planning Inc., of Corsicana.

"If their references meet quality standards these three firms will be able to return to present their final proposal of how the new county jail should be designed," said Chairman of the Jail Building Committee Maxie Riley.

The decision of which firm to design the

jail will be based on the architects' experience, knowledge, capability and at the minimum cost to the taxpayers," Riley added.

A date has not yet been scheduled when the committee will again meet with the final architect candidates. "We will meet again after all the references have been cleared before County Judge Alan Sturrock will proceed to set a

date for final selection," Riley said.

Wilson Signs Pledge

WASHINGTON, DC--U.S. Representative Charles Wilson (D-TX) announced today that he has signed Proposition One's Congressional Pledge of Fiscal Responsibility, signifying his commitment to making the reduction of the federal deficit his number one legislative priority in 1985.

In signing the Proposition One Pledge, Wilson said, "Reducing the federal deficit will be the most important and difficult task the new Congress will undertake this year. I am pleased to join Governor Snelling and many of my colleagues in this national effort to balance the federal budget."

Wilson encourages all Americans to take aggressive action in the fight to combat the deficit by contacting their Congressional representatives urging them to support Proposition One.

Founded by former Governor Richard A. Snelling (R-VT) and co-chaired by former Presidents Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter, Proposition One is a non-profit, bipartisan organization formed to generate grassroots support to reduce the federal deficit to zero by the end of fiscal year 1989.

Leading economists Alan Greenspan and Walter Heller, along with eight former Cabinet members including Henry Fowler, John Connally, W. Michael Blumenthal and William Simon, and the chairmen of many of the nation's major corporations are among the members of Proposition One's Advisory Board.

Management Assist Available To Employers

Personnel management assistance is still available, free of charge, to employers throughout a 12-county Deep East Texas area. The East Texas Business Institute, a division of the Nacogdoches County Chamber of Commerce, will be providing this employer assistance through June 1985. This program is funded through a grant from the Texas Employment Commission which enables the Business Institute to offer services in the areas of personnel recruitment, management and retention. The overall goal of the program is to assist expansion of employment opportunities in East Texas.

Through the Employer Assistance Program, the Business Institute will offer assistance, free of charge, to bona-fide employers. "Personnel assistance is done on a confidential, case-by-case basis to help employers plan and evaluate personnel programs," explained Patricia Boniface, program coordinator. "For example, if an employer has questions pertaining to employee recruitment, we can help by designing non-discriminatory job applications, coaching the employer on fair interviewing techniques, or selecting the best labor source for the business's needs," continued Boniface.

Another area of technical assistance covered by the program includes employee management. The Business Institute offers assistance in setting up record-keeping systems to meet the needs of a small business, information on what to keep as documentation for tax purposes and what information goes in an employee's personal file. "Some employers are at a loss when they are faced with evaluating employees," remarked Boniface. "We can show them more effective methods of evaluating employees that prove to be less traumatic for both the employer and employee and provide positive feedback on the employee's performance. Managing employees requires diplomacy and tact; often an employer may suspect that one of the employees may have an alcohol or drug problem. We can provide information on dealing with this sensitive topic by keeping in mind both employee and employer rights."

The Employer Assistance Program offers assistance in a third area, personnel retention. "Retaining a productive workforce is extremely important to an employer as it reduces the overall cost of the personnel program," stated Boniface. "The personnel assistance program can aid employers by

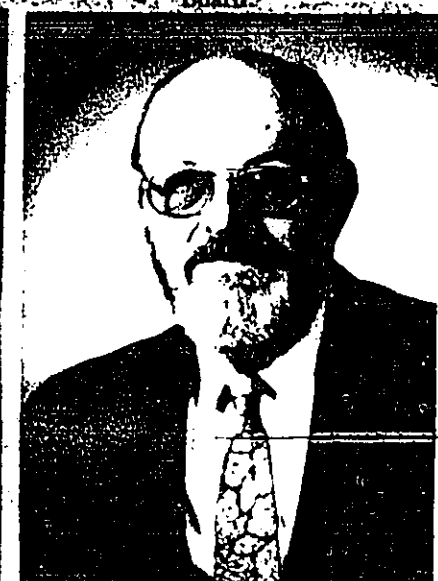
developing means to reduce turnover in a business. We can conduct employee surveys to help pinpoint why employees leave, as well as conduct exit interviews." Other areas of retention that the program covers includes training and orientation of employees, discipline and firing issues, and information on unemployment compensation claims.

Along with personnel counseling, the Business Institute will continue to conduct personnel topics seminars throughout the 12-county area. A recent seminar in Livingston covered employee motivation, unemployment compensation, alcohol abuse, and worker's compensation. Future seminars are scheduled for Lufkin, Center, Crockett and Trinity. These seminars are open to anyone interested in the personnel issues and are free or at a nominal charge.

The Employer Assistance Program covers 12 counties: Angelina, Houston, Jasper, Nacogdoches, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Trinity and Tyler. Temple-Eastex chairman, Joe C. Denman Jr. announced the appointments.

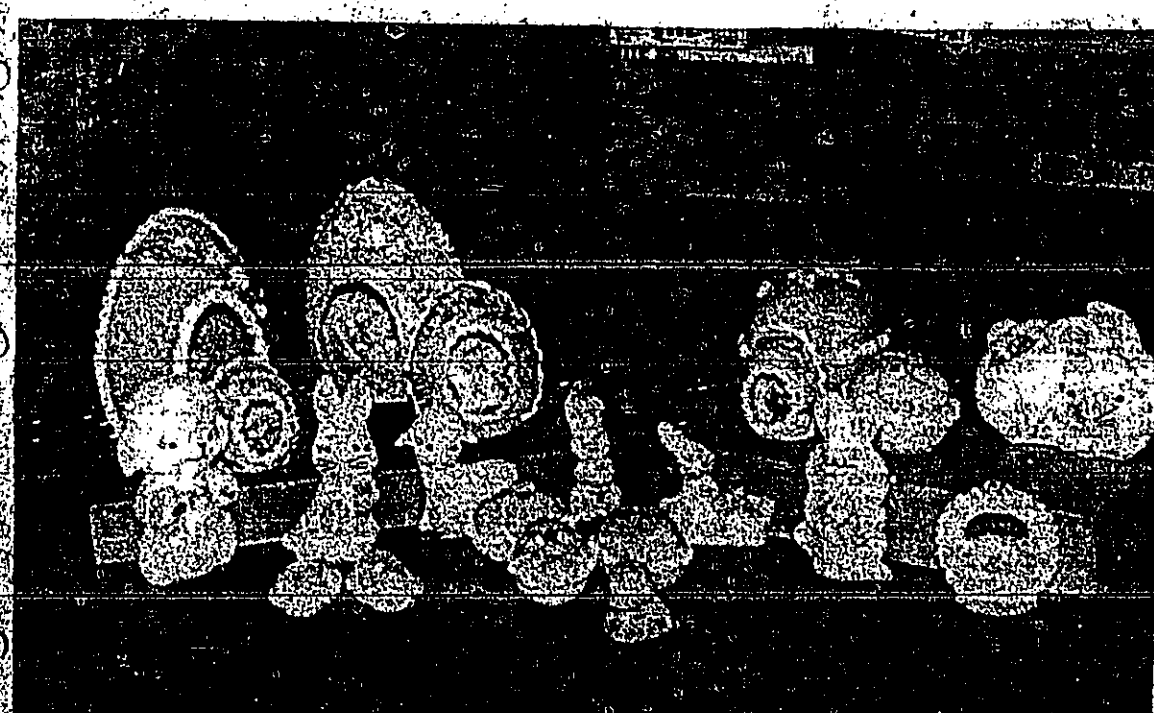

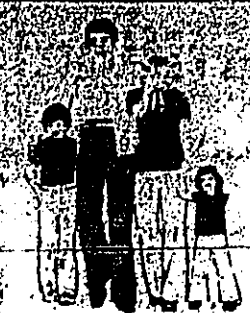

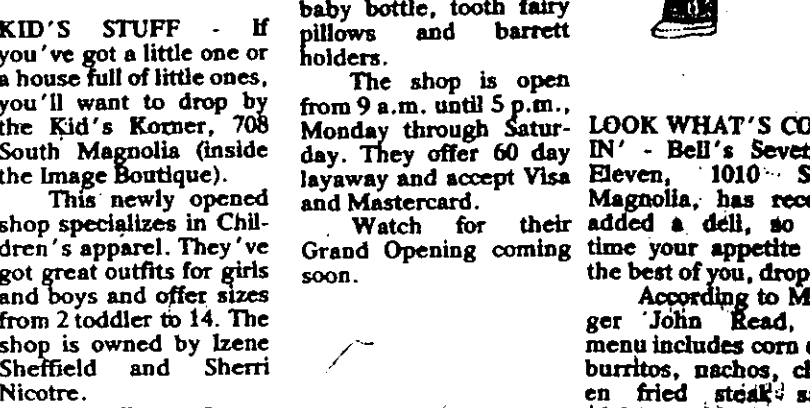

"The Big Thicket: A Crossroads in the Texas Forest" is a 30 minute documentary look at Big Thicket life and what has happened to it over the decades. Narrated by John Henry Faulk, renowned Texas humorist and folk singer, the story begins with Faulk exploring the woods and the animals and the land.

Through the eyes of the camera, Faulk explores the Big Thicket and the many roles it has played in the lives of "plants," "animals," and "men." Faulk's narration introduces ecologist Rufus S. Slaughter, who brings to life the fascinating story of how the land rose from the sea. Late Geraldine Watson, who lives in the Big Thicket, explains how the diverse ecology gave rise to the rich variety and abundance of plants and wildlife that mark

the Big Thicket's unusual character. Faulk also introduces many of the old-timers in the area, men and women whose ancestors settled in the Big Thicket before the Civil War. Through their lives we see America's traditional pioneer culture in action, a culture that, in some measure, had to tame the wilderness to survive. Changes in this culture have come most

ly in the last thirty years, as a result of rural electrification, the population boom, the enactment of stock laws ending the open ranging of livestock, the building of levees and better roads, corporate depersonalization of land use, and the advent of television. Survival today is not what it used to be. The old-timers reminisce about how encouraged to feel that the woods and wilderness are precious to us as well: their survival is our loss.

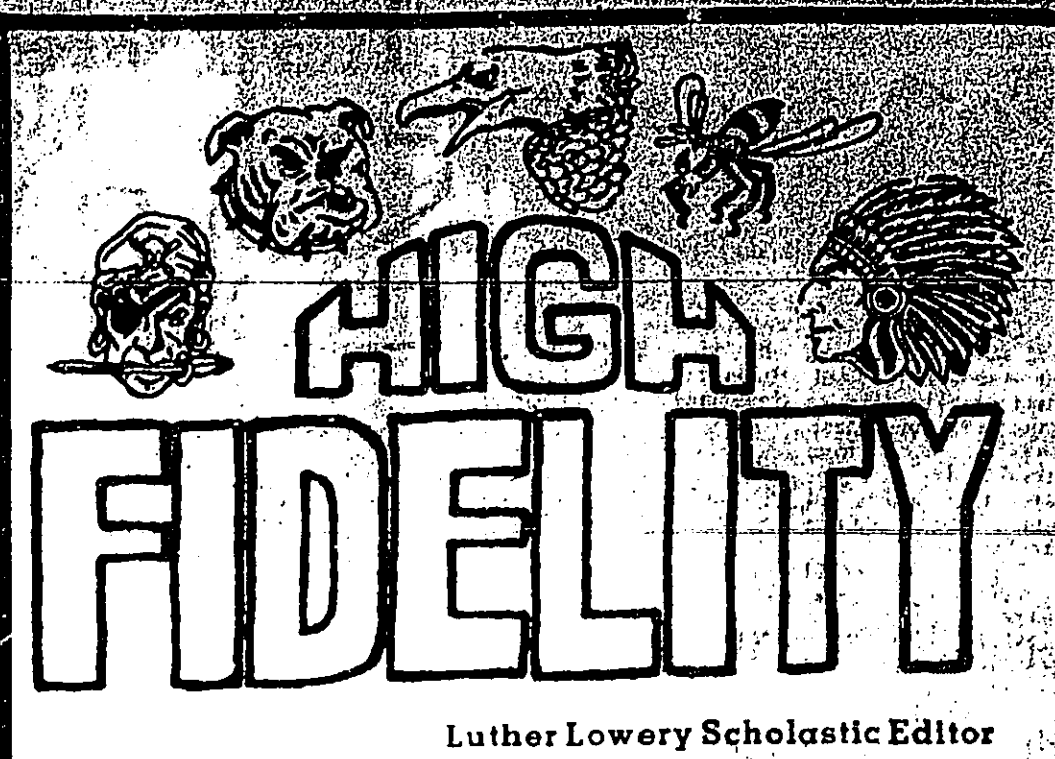

Recreation Area Fees Increased

Users will be collected from the beginning of March at selected recreation areas in 22 U.S. National Forests and 10 National Parks (see table). In January, annual fee collection is authorized by all 32 federal campgrounds, providing tent or trailer spaces, drinking water, sanitary facilities, access to trails, and picnic sites, with rates of \$1 to \$6 per day. Since 1981, basic camping fees at Fort Worth District camps have ranged from \$1 to \$6 per day and some rates will remain unchanged for the 1983 season. Rates at some sites, with rates of \$1 to \$6 per day, will be charged an extra \$2. The Corps of Engineers will provide at least one free tent site, picnic table, and fire ring at each Corps site. Facilities fees will range from \$15 to \$45 per site. Rates for the 1983 season are: Grand Canyon National Park, \$15; Grand Teton National Park, \$15; and Solida Ridge Park, \$45. The following table lists the 32 sites.

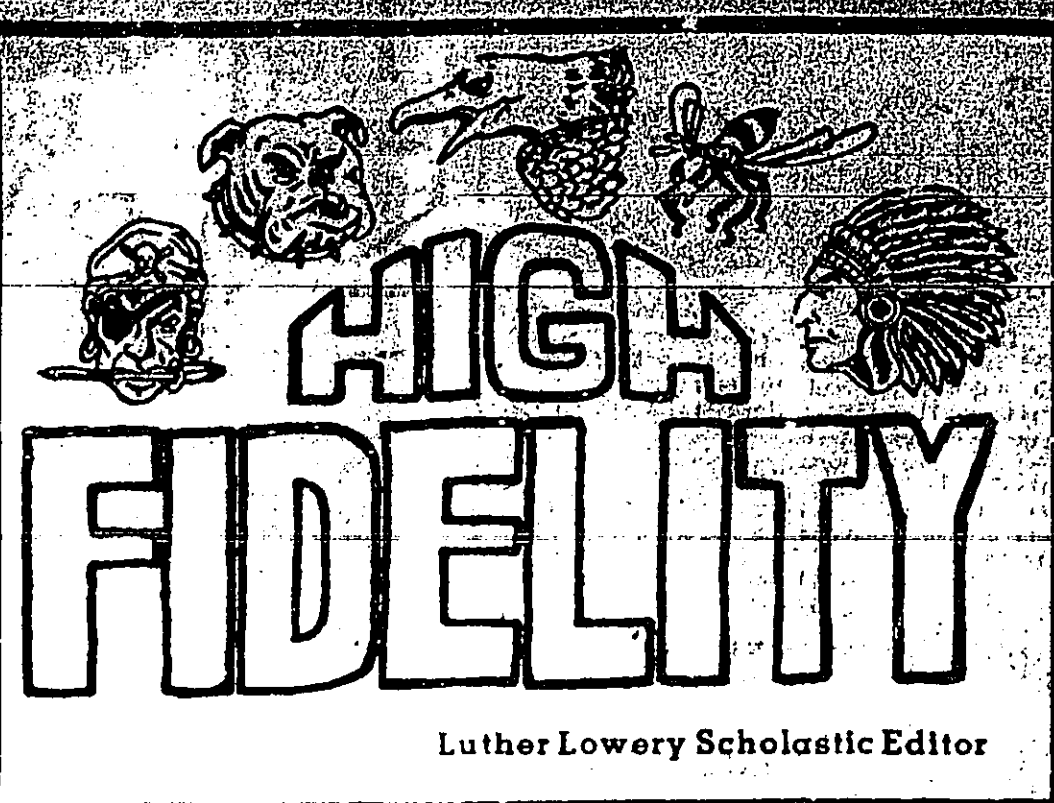

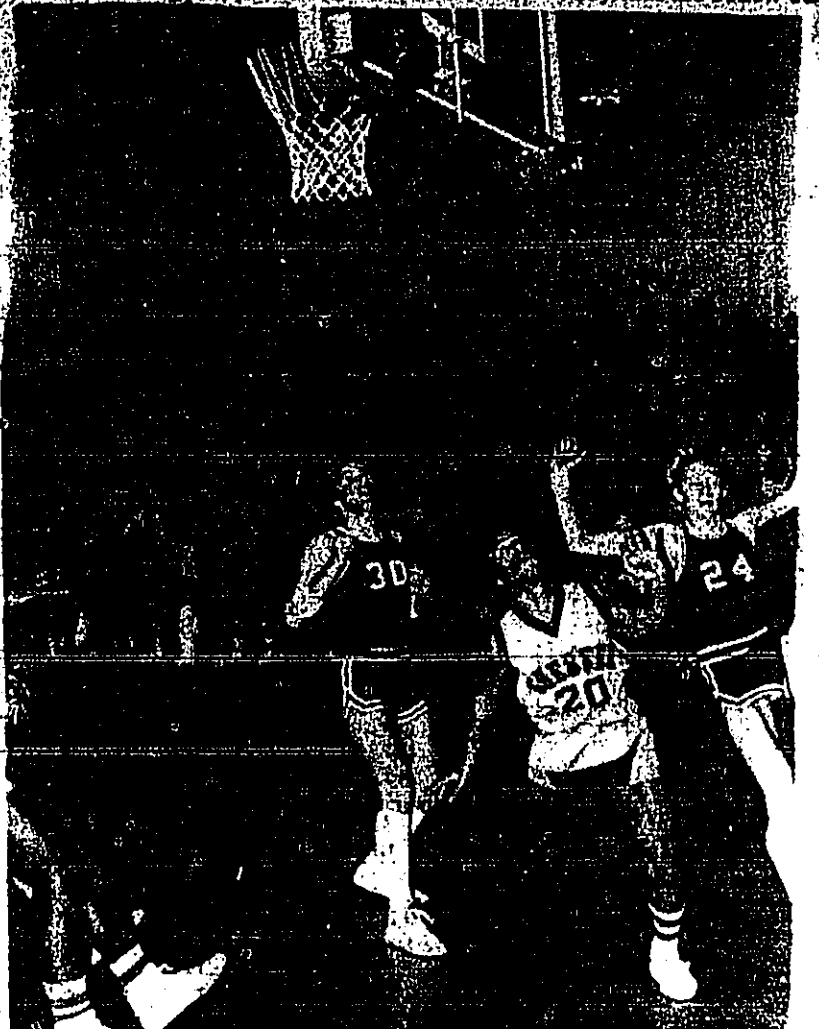

The free assistance is directed toward taxpayers who need help filing their federal income tax returns. Forms 1040-EZ, 1040A, or simple 1040. IRS-trained volunteers assist taxpayers with the special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible, such as the child tax and earned income credit. Rusk Railroad Building Up Steam For Season

RUSK, TX... When the Texas State Railroad Historical Park begins staffing for the 1985 season next spring, there will be one king-size problem--attempting to fill the vacancy left by a 69-year-old hostess who says she's "officially retired" again.

Bula Irwin, who resides at Circle R Lake east of Palestine, hung up her overalls and made her retirement official at the end of the 1984 season after helping thousands of visitors enjoy the nostalgic steam train trips between Palestine and Rusk.

The bouncy little chatterbox, who frequently worked circles around her younger TSR associates, first joined the staff three years ago. Illness forced her to skip the next two seasons, but back she came last spring "to prove that the old babe can still do the job," she said.

Although her younger peers attempted to make it easier for her, Bula would have none of that. "When I can't do my part, I'll get on back

home," she said with an extra flip of her mop.

Her only concession was her refusal to read the railroad's historical material over the train's loudspeaker system.

"I've heard my gravelly voice enough to know that our passengers can do without me on the loudspeaker," she noted with a twinkle in her eye.

Before joining the Texas State Railroad staff, she had taken a bit of time off to enjoy retirement after working 10 years for Texas Instruments in Dallas.

Upon retirement, she and her late sister, June Walker, who had retired from Southwest Memorial Hospital in Houston, moved to Palestine. A brother and sister already had located in that area. Mrs. Walker succumbed suddenly in early December.

Bula's time isn't spent in a rocking chair either. She is active in the American Association of Retired People and the Anderson County Genealogy Society, and now is eyeing the possibility of doing volunteer work at the An-

derson County Hospital here.

"Of course, I still can keep busy cutting grass, raking leaves and taking care of our three dogs," she added.

"I applied to work at the railroad because I thought it would be fun," the retiree commented, "and I wasn't wrong. I enjoyed the people and the railroad was something I'm proud of, and glad to be a part of."

If a passenger did not know it when they boarded Bula's car, they soon found out that "grouches" were not allowed in her special province.

She promoted

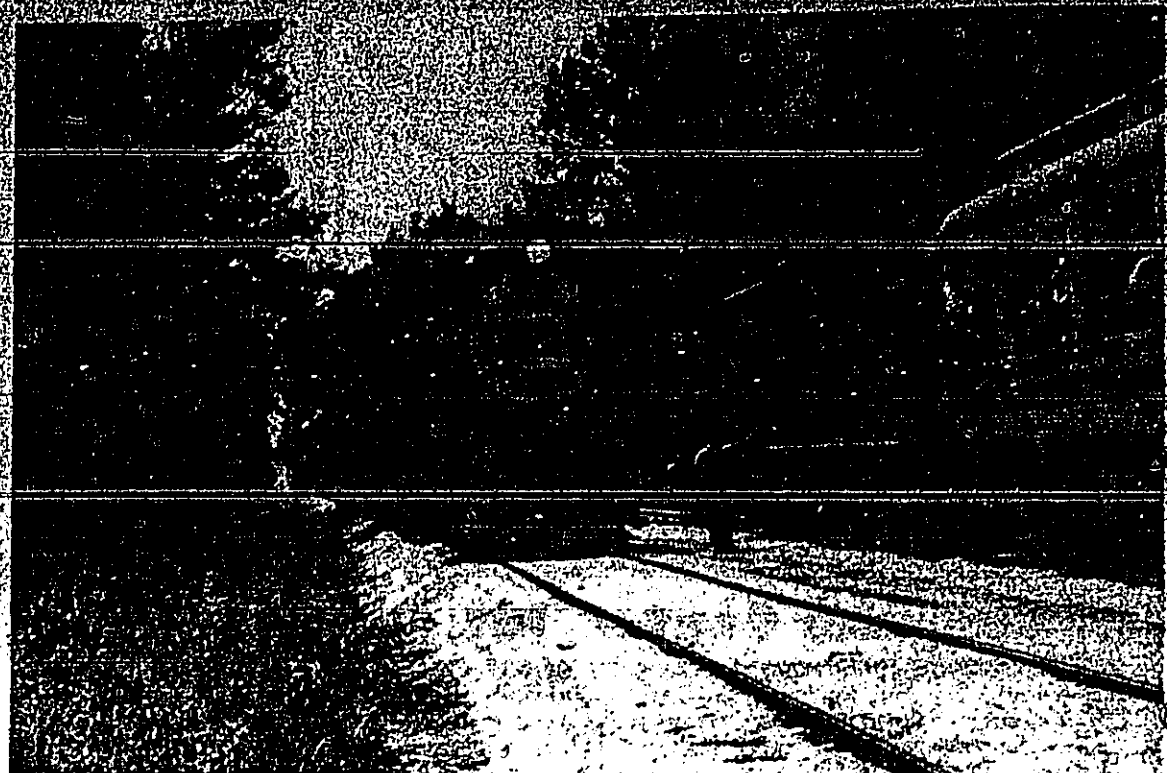
"sing-alongs" and tree branch knocked laughter every chance she got along the 50-mile trip from Palestine to Rusk and return. She especially was deft at bringing out a few laughs by picking at senior citizens and youngsters. Some of her jokes were a bit bearded with age, but her contagious laughter always seemed to make them a bit newer.

Despite the joviality she also was quick to get the attention of passengers who violated the railroad's safety rules. "I didn't badger them," she laughed, "but after a couple of warnings, I just told them that we didn't stop the train if a

tree branch knocked them off."

The spunky hostess, despite feeling the weariness of a long season, obviously hated to "call it a day" when the season ended. "I have had so many wonderful experiences on this job, met so many nice people," she commented "and it will be hard to leave the many friends I've made at the park."

"I know I'll miss this job, but I've got a bunch of catching up to do on some games of '42' and 'Spades,'" she said with a twinkle in her eye. "And I've still got AARP, the genealogical group and plenty of yard work to keep up with."

ANOTHER RECORD BREAKING season was recorded by the Texas State Railroad Historical Park, but work already is underway to upgrade and smooth the 25 miles of track between Rusk and Palestine. Some 200 cars of ballast rock will be spread and tamped before the 1985 season begins in mid-March. Several thousand ties and many lengths of rail also are to be replaced during the off-season winter months. Park Supt.
