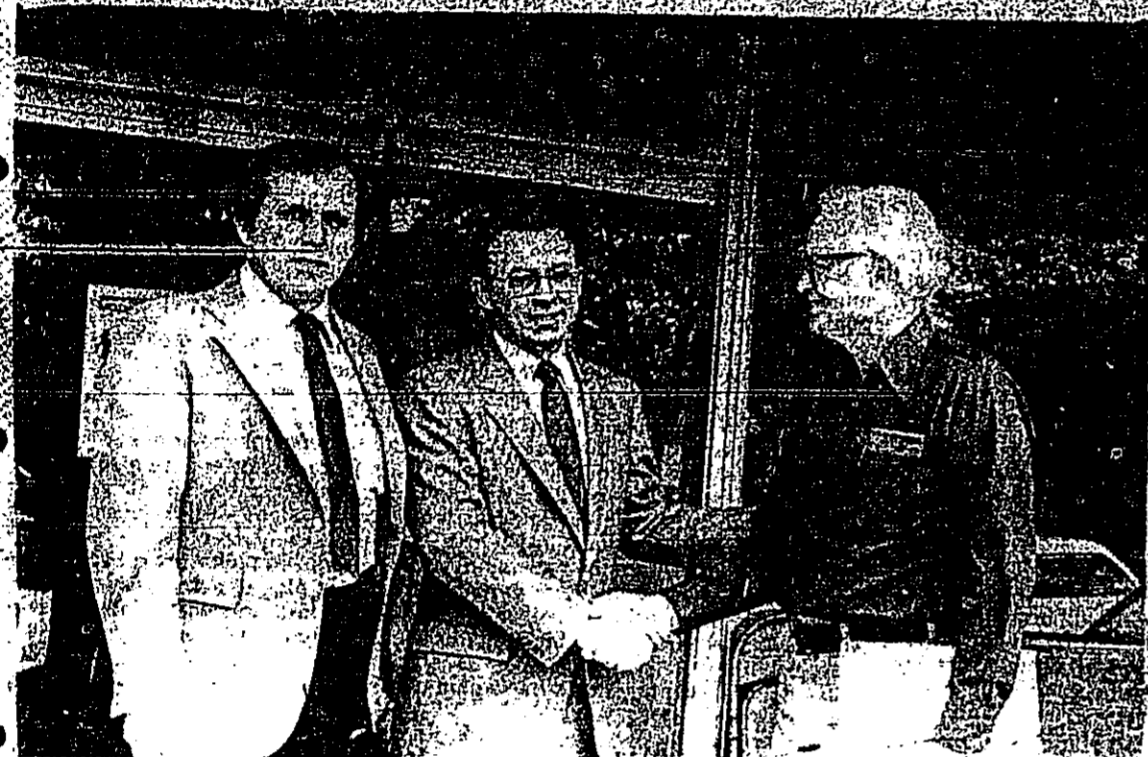

District After Delinquent Taxes

"More than just a friendly reminder" was the way Woodville School Trustee Dr. Jim Jinnett described the Woodville School District's forthcoming efforts to collect delinquent taxes at the Tuesday, February 19 Wood-

ville School Board meeting. Tax collections of 82.7 percent of taxes owed the Woodville district were reported at the end of January 1985 and district officials indicated that notices would be mailed to delinquent taxpayers indicating that after a certain date

attorneys would be hired to collect the back taxes plus penalties and interest owed in addition, a 15 percent collection fee would be charged on all delinquent taxes collected after the deadline date set by the District.

In other business, Woodville Board mem-

bers heard presentation by curriculum Director Mary Nell Rainey of the District's plans to meet requirements of House Bill 72 on assessment of students minimum skills and of requirements of Title 19, Chapter 75 curriculum changes.

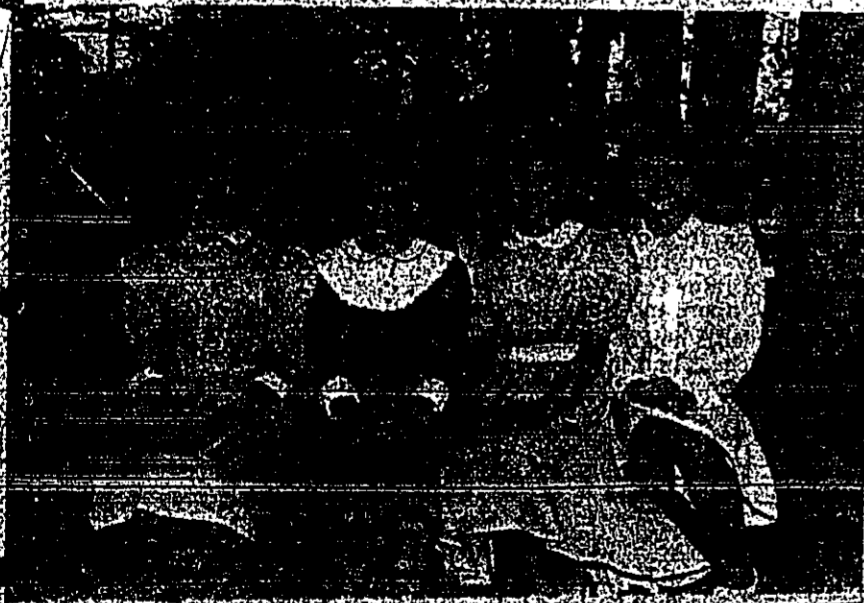

Cats—those independent, insolent and aloof creatures that are so adept at getting their own way—have an unusual effect on people. Most of us either love them or can't stand the sight of them; very few of us can look at them with indifference.

Historians generally agree that the cats' association with man began in Egypt about 5,000 years ago. When small cats came in from the wild to feed on rodents in the granaries. By 1,500 B.C. Egyptian cats had become so favored that they were protected by law, raised to the rank of deity and memorialized in every form of Egyptian art. Cats were portrayed in all kinds of activities and sculpted in every substance from gold to mud.

By 850 B.C. Bastet, the Egyptian female cat goddess, had taken precedence over all other Egyptian goddesses. She was believed to control the fertility of humans and their livestock; to determine the yield of crops; to heal the sick and to guard the souls of the dead.

During this era if someone was caught killing a cat, they were executed. Elaborate cat funerals were held and cats of the rich were mummified. The Greeks became interested in cats to help control the rodents in their granaries, and even though removal of cats from Egypt was punishable by death, cats eventually spread throughout the Mediterranean countries.

Romans adopted the cat and carried it on missions of conquest. Eventually, cats were introduced into Great Britain. By the Middle Ages the cat was in trouble. Even though cats continued to kill the rats whose fleas were spreading bubonic plague across Europe, the Christian faith associated cats with paganism, Satan and witchcraft. As the supposed practitioners of black magic were hunted down and executed, so were cats.

By the 19th century, cats had again climbed into favor in Europe and the western world.

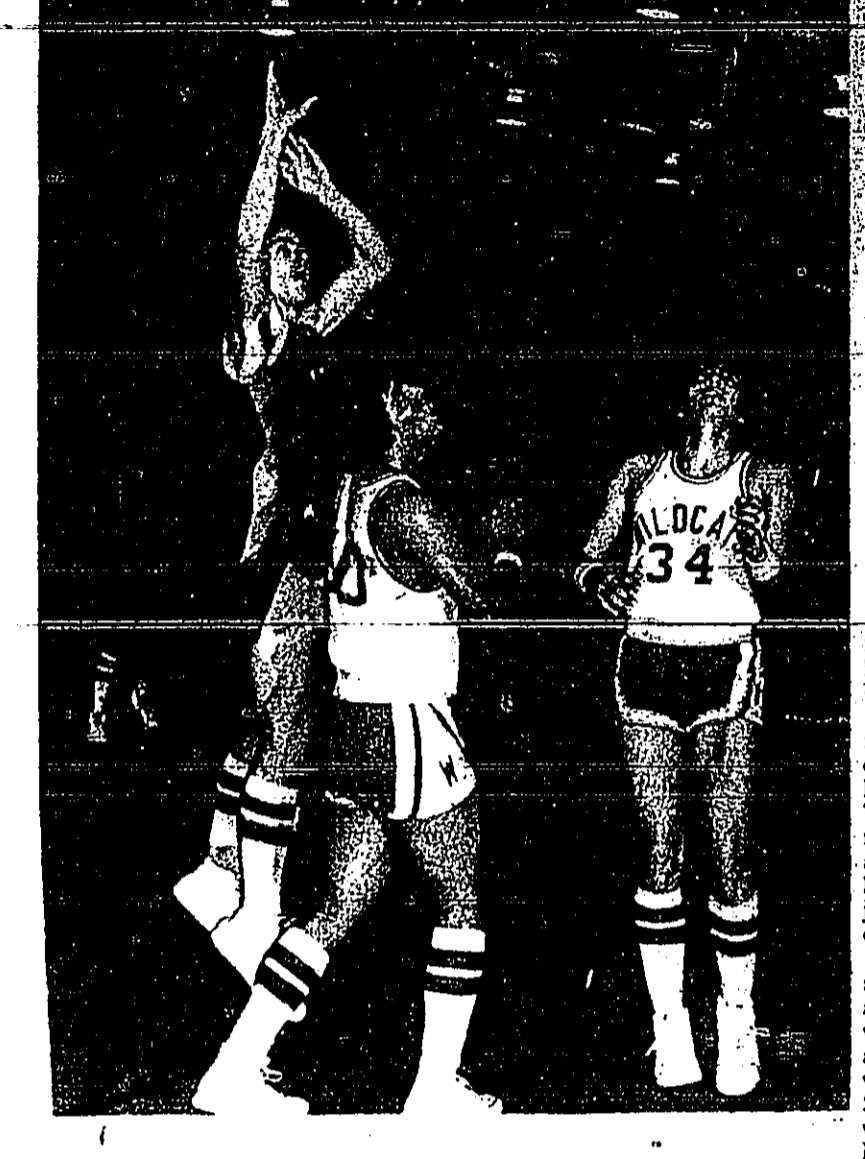

We see by the newspapers that Galveston and Corpus Christi are in the running as a navy base as home port to the battleship Wisconsin, and her accompanying flotilla of support ships.

The Wisconsin being one more of a number of fleet battleships being returned to active sea duty after years in a mothball fleet far from the public view.

In listening to the news reports, we were initially more than a little confused to hear commentators saying Houston was to be home base. We tried to imagine a battleship navigating forty miles of ship channel from the Gulf coast, and finally decided that Houston just didn't want Galveston hogging all the publicity.

The lo and behold, up comes the Governor's office with a proposition guaranteed to get the Navy Department's attention. The State of Texas was willing to push some \$300 million on the table, if the Navy would forget they had even considered ports of call in Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana and Florida.

Apparently all of a sudden the U.S. Navy is big dollars and we should encourage them to drop anchor within our territorial borders.

The Governor of course expresses no preference as to whether the Navy selects Galveston or Corpus Christi, you understand, he's maintaining a geographical neutrality on that score.

What we were wondering when all this came about is what the reaction would have been in the 1960's if the Navy—or any other segment of the military establishment had decided that they wanted to locate a battleship group anywhere in the United States. Perhaps the only hospitality would have been Kodiak, Alaska or Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

All of a sudden showing the flag is back in fashion.

We would also imagine that we will hear from Fidel Castro and the heads of government in Nicaragua fairly soon however. Each will assume that the Wisconsin will head their way disgorging Marines on the beach and throwing eighteen inch cannonballs into Havana and Managua.

Then again, certainly the shopkeepers on the Gulf Coast will greet

the Navy with open arms. More than 4,000 sailors will be a part of the task force, we understand, and there are all those folks who sell fruits and vegetables, skivvy shirts and bell bottoms. They stand to make a buck.

In fact Governor White tells us that the \$300 million the state is willing to put on the table to get the Navy to locate here will be back in our collective pockets in almost no time.

The Wisconsin just may be arriving in the nick of time for another reason.

We understand that the battleship Texas is resting in the mud on the bottom of the ship channel there at the San Jacinto monument. That somebody is going to have to pay millions of dollars pretty darn soon to rehabilitate the old girl, or the visitations on board will be cut short because of the water rising in the hull.

Not to mention that rust has attacked the ship from stem to stern, and she really looks pretty shabby.

What we're getting at is that when the Wisconsin is past her prime, and ready to be decommissioned, it would certainly be easy to just paint Texas in bold letters on the bow, and slip her into the Texas anchorage.

In the meantime the arm twisting will go on up in Washington, as the states on the Gulf Coast wine and dine the VIPs in the Navy Department telling them all the reasons the Wisconsin should be in Texas, Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana or Florida.

For the Navy, it must be pretty heady stuff to be wanted.

We can remember asking for leave to go home after sea duty in World War Two, and finding out that we needed a special pass from the Shore Patrol to even enter the city limits of our home town.

Seems some rowdy fly boy from a Naval Air Station close by had taken advantage of some young ladies a few weeks earlier, and the town was off limits to all military.

So a word of caution to the sailors of the Wisconsin and her support ships. If per chance you find your home port in Galveston or Corpus Christi, the natives may be friendly at first because of all the jingle jangle in your pockets. But keep your noses clean, or you may find yourselves standing liberty in Old Dime Box or El Paso.

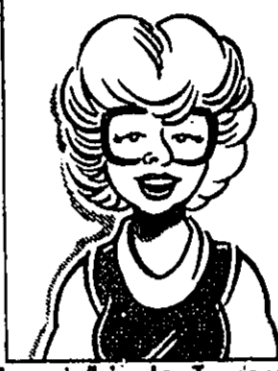

Under House Bill 72, "satisfactory performance" will be required on an exit level examination in English Language Arts and Mathematics for 1987 High School seniors to receive a diploma. The exit exam will be given to eleventh grade students in October 1985 for the first time with students not performing satisfactory having three additional chances to pass the exam before the end of their Senior year.

Part of Title 19, Chapter 75 curriculum changes have resulted in offering of "regular" and "advanced" course

programming which is already in effect for this year's freshman high school class. Woodville School District will also initiate beginning with next year's eighth grade class an optional "advanced with honors" academic program not required under Title 19, Chapter 75.

Wilson McKewen Center: East Texas Challenge

LUFKIN—A \$1.3 million challenge grant from the T.L.L. Temple Foundation has been awarded to the Wilson McKewen Rehabilitation Center. Blake Enters Trucking Bill

SEN. ED BLAKE (D-TX) today introduced legislation to streamline the process of entering the trucking business in Texas.

The bill is designed to remove the most difficult and unprovable element in the application process to become licensed by the Texas Railroad Commission as an intrastate carrier. The adequacy test would no longer be required by those seeking certification.

Currently, a certificate permit cannot be obtained unless, by substantial evidence, it is shown that the applicant is qualified to provide the public with safe and efficient services and facilities of existing carriers are inadequate. The last element requires an applicant to provide shippers being served by a single carrier to testify that the carrier is doing a poor

job. The bill would remove the "adequacy test" and still determine if the issuance of new authority would be in the public convenience and necessity. The proposed legislation would not impair the Railroad Commission's ability to protect service to small communities. However, the bill does open the application process to persons who now desire to go into the trucking business. The bill will open the process to minorities, to small towns and rural applicants, and to people who currently pay someone else for permit use.

Since 1946 only one new general commodity carrier authority has been granted by the Railroad Commission. Sen. Blake said, "Texas has obviously grown tremendously."
