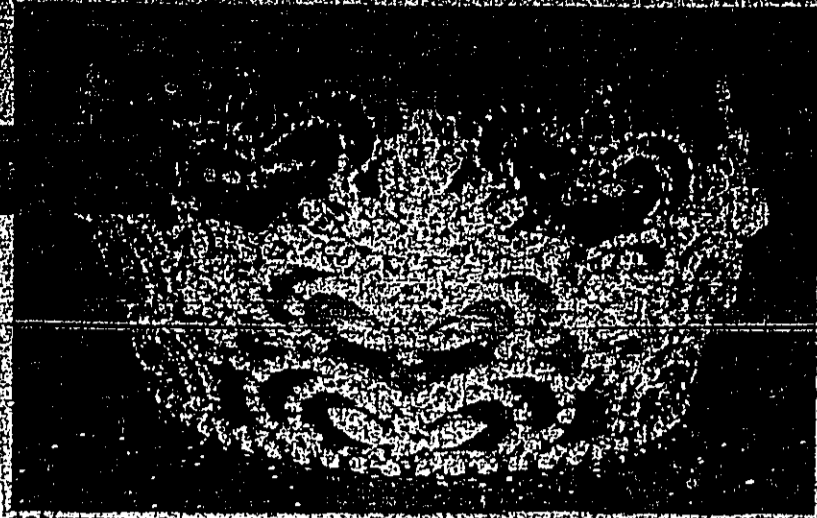


Dogwood Western Week a success

Board rejects Burrow Liason idea

"I do not recognize this," stated teacher Bonnie Burrow of the Teacher Liason Committee changes proposed by Board Member Bob Samford. Burrow, who had presented the original proposal to the Board, stated that the new policy presented by Samford, who voted against her original proposal, was, in her opinion, "setting out to completely destroy what was established at the last Board meeting." The original proposal was that the committee consists of not more than three and not less than two self-elected Board members and two faculty elected representatives from each campus. According to Burrow, "The Board accepted this proposal at the last Board meeting, and representatives were elected from the Board and teacher body. This committee met one hour before the Board Meeting tonight, set ground rules, had a very amicable meeting, and got rolling in some constructive things." She was resentful of the fact that

rather than eight teachers who could be elected from any teacher in the District. The new policy also stated that a representative from each of the four district associations in the District would be on the committee. Burrow felt "parents should have a chance to communicate with the Board, but under a separate committee because many of the

problems discussed in the Teacher Liason committee will pertain to conditions of employment and staff morale." Board Member Samford, in an interview following the Board Meeting, stated, "The organization of the committee that was presented at the last regular Board Meeting was not a formal consultation committee in regards to any

policy action of the Board. This is policy drawn to help the efforts of communication of the organization as a whole." Regarding the addition of parents to the committee, Samford said, "I feel that a meeting of the parents and teachers both involved in any committee meeting would be good for the school system as a whole." When asked about the committee already formed and meeting, he said, "I did not feel that this group was a complete representation of the teacher group here in Warren ISD." He said that he understood the Classroom Teachers Association to be "that representative group of all of the teachers involved in the Warren School District. To the best of my know-

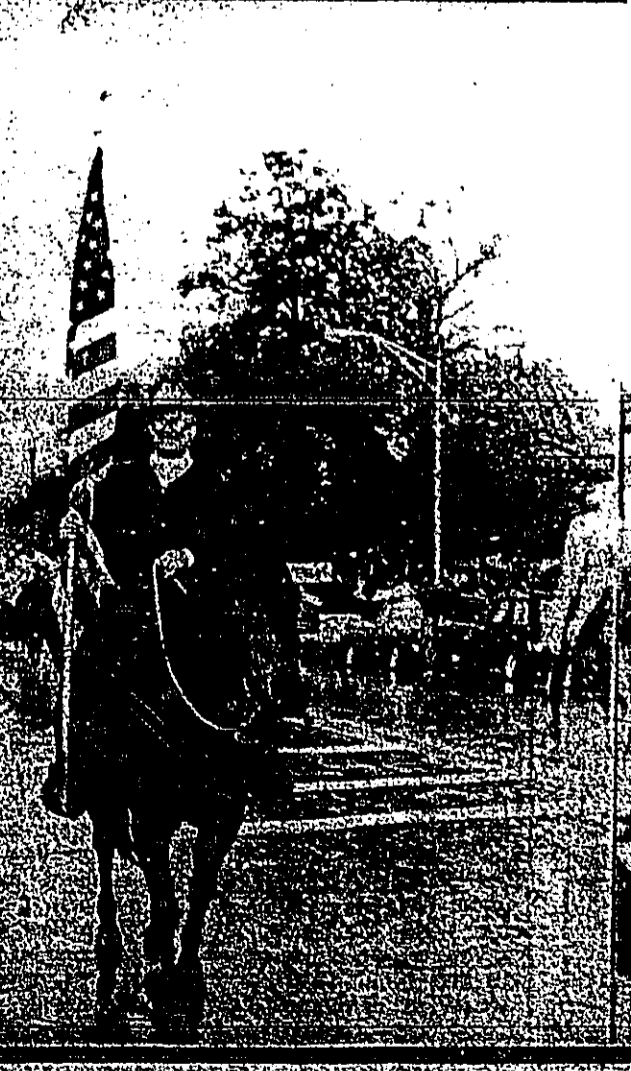

You know she's here when the days begin to get a tad longer, and warmer, and when the March breezes begin to stir through the forests and over the hillsides, gently coaxing the dogwoods from their winter sleep. Mother Nature has a passion for color and as she travels through the country, she dots her path with flowers, covering the landscape with wild violets and draping the trees with wisteria, honeysuckle, and jasmine. By the end of her stay, Tyler County is a showplace and for the past 42 years her holiday has given us cause to have one of our own. The 42nd Annual Tyler County Dogwood Festival is just a few days away and all over Tyler County festival organizers, committees, and participants are busy finalizing plans and seeing to last minute details. The festival brings with it a special shopping opportunity. The Big Thicket Arts and Crafts Fair. This week we want to take a close look at that, along with a few other interesting shopping opportunities. Let's go see!

ONE OF A KIND - It's not often you get to shop for beadwork, BBQ pits and baby quilts all in the same place, but once again you'll have the opportunity on Saturday, April 6, at the Big Thicket Arts and Crafts Fair. The Fair, sponsored by the Woodville Business And Professional Women's Club, will be held on the parking lot behind Citizens State Bank. Booths will be open from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m.

According to Pat Brown, fair director, an interesting variety of arts and crafts will be offered including wooden toys, dolls, silver and turquoise jewelry, antique trunks, macramé, brass, and needlecraft items. Food booths, which will be located on Courthouse Square, will offer BBQ on a stick, peanut brittle, gumbos, cinnamon rolls, cold drinks, and an assortment of other tempting dishes. In all, there will be well over 100 booths to visit. Funds collected by the Business And Professional Women's Club from both rental are donated to the M.D. Anderson Cancer Institute or put into the club's scholarship fund. Don't miss it!

THINKING PINK - It's hard for man to improve on nature, but occasionally through his own ingenuity, he can make the most of it. Such was the case 25 years ago when Amos Hyde of Woodville spotted a native pink flowering dogwood in a Tyler County forest. The tree, although common in other states, was a "once in fifty year find" in this county, he says. Hyde noticed buds, "switched a limb", and budded five Tyler County's native white trees. That budding, done over two decades ago, was the beginning of the "Hyde Beauty", a native pink flowering dogwood budded onto Tyler County's own white stock.

Two of the original trees still stand in Hyde's front lawn. They are now over thirty feet tall. Over the years, says Hyde, they've not only drawn attention from passersby, but several years ago prompted Texas A & M University to send researchers to the spot. According to Hyde, the team took samples of the seeds, the small trees underneath, and even the bees. If you would like your own "Hyde Beauty", drop by Hyde Acres just west of Woodville on Highway 190. Amos offers the trees in several sizes. And while you're there, look around. The Hydys grow many unusual plants and trees, including a large stand of bamboo, which got its start from a root brought from China.

NEW BUSINESS - Elizabeth's Arts, Crafts and Things has recently opened seven miles south of Woodville on Highway 69. The new business features a variety of handmade goods, including original dirt-dubber plaques made by owner Elizabeth Hayes. The plaques, Elizabeth explains, are made from weathered pieces of wood, decorated with the actual cylinder-shaped dirt nests made by "dirt-dubbers" for color. Elizabeth adds, "Brightly toned flowers and butterflies. One of the plaques, she says, captured an art show first place in the "found art" category.

In addition to these unusual wall plaques, Elizabeth offers vine wreaths, oil paintings, antique clocks, hanging baskets, zebra and cotton bins, and skeeter boxes. She also has a large selection of needlecraft, including many pieces made by Mrs. Nellie McKeary. And, at present, Elizabeth has a good inventory of dogwood pieces including pink and white dogwood pillows and vine wreaths decorated with dogwood leaves. Elizabeth's Arts, Crafts and Things is open Thursday, Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m.

JUST THINKING

The popular conception throughout the land is that all people are good people. In some respect, perhaps this is so. At least, they are good if we look at it in some of the ways we may suggest.

Some are good but not good. They are a menace to society, criminals. The Bible teaches us to obey the laws of the land (Romans 13:1). Among this class, there are those who are cold and indifferent to the needs of others, they are selfish and self-centered (II Timothy 3:1-5). Also, in this class there are those who have forgotten that God intends for man to work, tramps, those who expect to get by without making a contribution to society, they are parasites; they think the world owes them a living. Read I Thessalonians 4:11 and II Thessalonians 3:10.

Some are good but good for what? These folk do no harm in a positive way, but what good do they do? They do no good for the church. If the church had to depend on them, it would not be long until the bats would take over the buildings.

WASHINGTON—Ching legislative "in-fires" that have imposed a bureaucratic jungle on legal gun owners and collectors, Congressman Charles Wilson (D-TX) has signed the Firearms Owners' Protection Act as a cosponsor.

"Current law shows a lack of civil liberty safeguards for legal gun owners for search, seizure, and has done little to efficiently curtail illegal possession of firearms."

"Legislation is needed to re-focus the enforcement of federal firearms laws away from red-tape regulation of law abiding citizens and toward an actual law enforcement strategy aimed at those who criminally use firearms."

Wilson pointed out that the bill would make the number of key modifications in present procedures. For example, it calls for precise definitions in licensing for manufacture, importation and selling of firearms.

It establishes procedures for search, seizure and courtesy inspections and for the return of firearms after dismissal of an investigation.

It would allow the transportation of a firearm through a state or local jurisdiction which limits gun ownership and possession, if the firearm is unloaded and inaccessible.

It prohibits the sale of a firearm to a convicted felon by an individual.

Current law makes it a crime for a licensed dealer to make such a sale but puts no structures on sales by a person.

"The original intent of Congress, when it wrote the current firearms law, was to provide support to Federal, state and local law enforcement officials in their fight against crime and violence," Wilson said. "It wasn't our purpose to restrict collectors, sportsmen and anyone else who uses firearms for lawful activities. The Firearms Owners Protection Act reaffirms Congressional intent in the right direction—against criminal use and sale of guns."

AFIDA Rule Still In Effect

The Agricultural foreign Investment Disclosure Act requires all foreign owners of U.S. agricultural land to report their holdings, acquisitions, dispositions, leases of 10 years or more, and land-use changes to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"This reporting requirement is still in effect," said Kathy O. Lowe, Director of the Tyler County ASCS Office, "and foreigners who have bought or sold agricultural land in the county are reminded to report the transactions to our office within 90 days."

ASCS offices across the Nation are charged with the responsibility of keeping track of how much agricultural land is owned or controlled by foreign individuals or interests. Foreign investors have reported owning about 13.7 million acres of agricultural land in the United States, and no acres in Tyler County.

For reporting purposes, agricultural land is defined as any tract of more than 10 acres now in agricultural, forestry, or timber production. This includes land in agricultural use when purchased, as well as land later converted to agricultural use. Mrs. Lowe said foreigners who own or have an interest in 10 acres or less do not need to report unless annual proceeds from the sale of agricultural products grown on these acres exceed \$1,000. "Interest means any right, title, or legal-share of ownership in agricultural land, such as partnership, trusts, estates, or shares in a corporation that owns agricultural land."

Under the AFIDA, land owned by foreigners before February 1979 should have been reported by August 1979. Foreigners who have acquired or disposed of agricultural land since that time should have reported the transaction to ASCS within 90 days.
