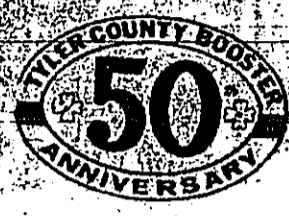

## Fees May Hurt Counties

Sam Clonts, executive director of The Texas Association of Counties (TAC) updated legislation affecting the Deep East Texas County Commissioners and County Judges Association (DETCCJA) at an annual meeting before that group on Thursday, April 11, in Lufkin.

One bill he said would be a "problem" bill included a legislation proposal concerning the increase of fees in the District Clerks offices. An extensive survey of the State of Texas was taken to determine the fees of District Clerks and to what extent they cover their expenses of office.

Harris County reports that the cost of the clerks offices are currently running more than is being collected. This cost includes only salaries and equipment.

This bill is reportedly facing difficulties in getting passed due to the fact that the state has found out that money can be raised by increasing clerk fees, in district court, and also at the justice of the peace level.

All extra money made will be for the state.

Clonts explains that this is actually "a tax collection." "The counties collect it and send it to the state," he said, "who uses this money on problems of state level."

According to Clonts,

"our goal is to get some of the revenue from these increased fees and cut back the cost sent to the state, and to avoid this type of tax increase."

Clonts discussed numerous other bills during his legislative update. One bill that was of great importance to Tyler County was the bill dealing with weight limits on log trucks. The bill was actually misworded, said Norman Troy, president of TAC, and seemed to

say that the County Commissioner's would have no authority on weight limits in their own precincts.

The bill stated that the county roads were re-

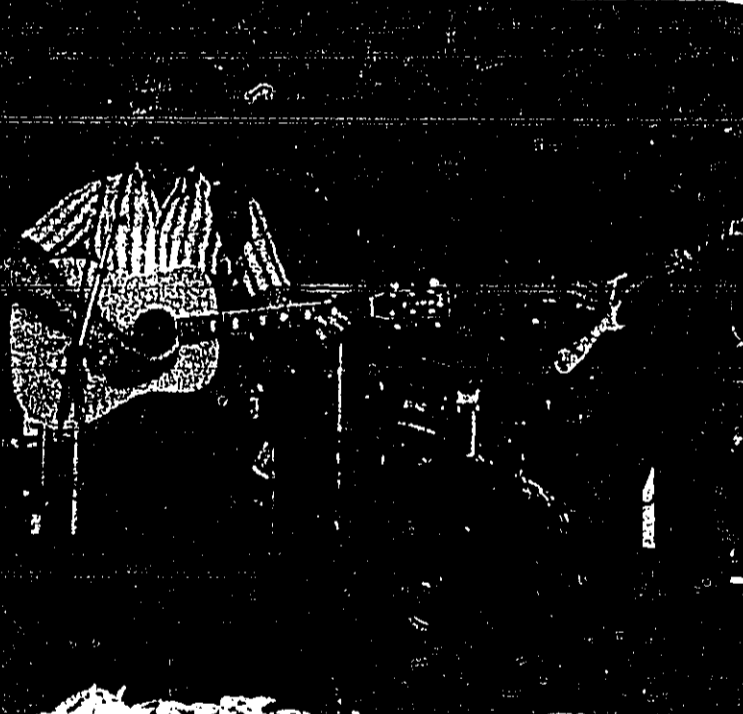
and hall, said TCYDC director Ron Decker.

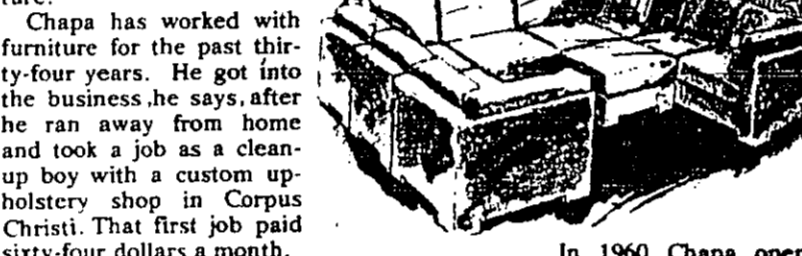

All the furniture manufactured in his shop, he says, features hardwood frames and top quality fabric. The fabric ranges from silks to wools to brocades and is ordered from decorating centers in Los Angeles, New York, Chicago, Atlanta and a few locations in Texas.  
Several types of cushions are made and, depending on customer preference can range from foam and springs to 100 percent down.  
Since he's been opened in Tyler County, Chapa has received a few orders that are just a tad out of the ordinary. A couple years ago he built a large sofa that was to be used in a private residence nearby in East Texas. The customer decided to put 578 light bulbs under it and was willing to spend a total of \$43,000 for the effect.  
Of his craft, Chapa says with a smile, "I'm doing what I really want to do. It's a great trade. I just wish that more young people would try to learn it."

## Cancer Kick Off

American Cancer Society volunteers from eight counties, including two from Tyler County, attended the 1985 Crusade Kickoff at ACS District 10 in Beaumont on March 14, 1985.  
Carole Sue Shields and Lynn Jordan of the Spurget High School FHA represented the Tyler County Unit of the ACS at the Kickoff which featured the theme "We are Winning."  
The annual meeting serves as the first official function of the Crusade--the educational and fund-raising drive sponsored by ACS volunteers each spring.  
The 1985 goal for District 10 was announced as \$170,900 which includes the Tyler County goal of \$5,200. The 1984 Crusade total for the county was \$5,397.  
According to Melinda Stryker, President, these funds will be used to continue the Society's three-fold attack on cancer through research, education and patient services. The American Cancer Society is second only to the Federal government's National Cancer Institute as a source of cancer research funds.  
In Texas alone, more than \$6 million is currently invested by the ACS in 12 major hospitals and research institutions throughout the state.  
"And all of these funds were raised by volunteers," added Stryker. Miss Stryker and Mrs. Kathy Kinton will be co-ordinating the Crusade in Tyler County this year.  
The ACS also emphasizes the educational aspect of its drive, according to Stryker. "Our focus for this year's Crusade will be the prevention and early detection of colon and rectal cancer," she said. A highly curable form of cancer, if detected early, Stryker said colon and rectal cancer will be the feature of a pamphlet called "Your Colorectal Health Check" distributed by volunteers door-to-door at as many homes as possible. April has been designated as Cancer Control Month.
