

# Jail Site Discussed

Consideration of one of two possible jail sites was discussed at the Commission's Court meeting Friday, June 14. Ten concerned citizens were present at the meeting to tell the court of their reasons for not wanting the jail to be built in their neighborhood. Hwy 190 West, located next to the softball field.

There is also a later made room for the rodeo arena and softball field. "Now," said Riley, "The land is worth more than the court bought it for."

The court made no motions on this business, due to the fact that prior agreements had been made by the court to let a qualified architect decide which land site would be be-

lieved to be the best. The court will have to replace the microphones in the district courtroom. 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## Shopping With Diane

A couple of weeks ago I shared some traditions and superstitions connected with brides, bridegrooms, and weddings. Since there's such an abundance of tradition associated with the marriage ceremony and since June is America's favorite month for weddings, I've decided to bring you more.

According to the Census Bureau, 2.5 million couples tied the knot in 1984, and more than 300,000 of them did so in June. Although most of today's brides follow tradition, many of them have no idea that the customs they are following date back to the ancient Egyptians, Romans and Greeks.

The wedding ring, which has always symbolized unity, was used in ancient Egypt. The Egyptians probably fashioned their rings from iron and believed that if the ring was perfectly round and unadorned that it possessed magical powers.

The ancient Greeks, in a ritual to encourage fertility, threw rice and dried fruit over the bride and groom. Another symbol of fertility is the child bearing flowers—the flower girl.

Before the time of Elizabeth I, wedding cakes were made from wheat. These dry, brittle biscuits were thrown over the heads of the newlyweds because wheat was a symbol of fertility.

Later, small sweet buns replaced the biscuits and later still large cakes replaced the buns. In early Christian weddings, the priest placed a wreath of flowers on the head of both the bride and groom. This signaled the start of the ceremony. The wreaths were usually made from orange blossoms.

The "something blue" of the well known bride's rhyme dates to the ancient Israelites. These brides wore a blue ribbon as a symbol of purity, love and fidelity.

In ancient Rome, brides carried three coins, one for the husband, one for the household gods and one for prosperity.

The TYLER COUNTY BOOSTER editorially supports the Billion-dollar Rockland Dam in spite of three massive reservoirs within a 50 mile radius. Contrary to the BOOSTER'S claims, Rockland would harm the Big Thicket, cause other massive environmental damage and jeopardize the well being of Houston's future population.

Rockland's floodpool would inundate 197 square miles of magnificent forest upstream, drowning all terrestrial life there. Rockland's flood control function would dry up 216 square miles of floodplain down stream. Over 400 square miles of the Earth's surface would be altered away from its natural condition by Rockland.

(197 + 216 = 413).

The BOOSTER correctly points out that one-half of the lower Neches floodpools have already been diked by Sam Rayburn Dam, built in 1963 on the Angelina tributary. But, to claim that Rayburn justifies Rockland's construction is a habit that is alien to the BOOSTER's editorial function. According to Corps engineering calculations, a Neches river 100-year flood discharges would be reduced to 53.4 cfs by Rockland's 127-foot reduction. The

USGS topographic map show that the difference would be a two-mile-wide overflow limited to the river bank. The distance from Rockland to the Gulf is 108 cross-country miles. Using the spur flood plain as an average midway width, it is estimated that about 216 square miles would be dried-up by Rockland (108 length X 2 miles width = 216 square miles). Of this, 35 square miles are preserve and wilderness land.

Some studies of trees below existing dams have shown that these trees have continued to grow at a normal rate. This is the basis of the BOOSTER'S claim that Rockland will U.S. 69 crossing. But, these studies neglect two important factors.

First, the health of individual trees and the propagation of a forest depends on the availability of water and nutrients. Second, the health of a forest depends on the availability of water and nutrients. The lower Neches and Sabine rivers converge at Sabine Lake and discharge into the Gulf. Both rivers are controlled by dams. Over 195 flood species are harvested here. Rockland, added to Sam Rayburn and Toledo Bend, would reduce the discharge into the Gulf by 12,000 cfs annually. The resulting water shortage would alter the entire Neches river basin.

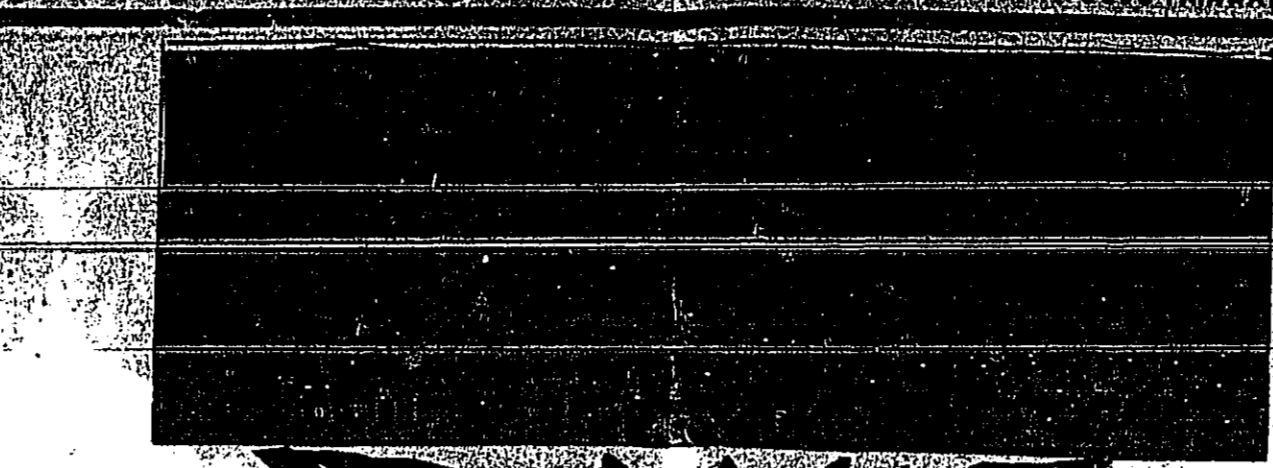

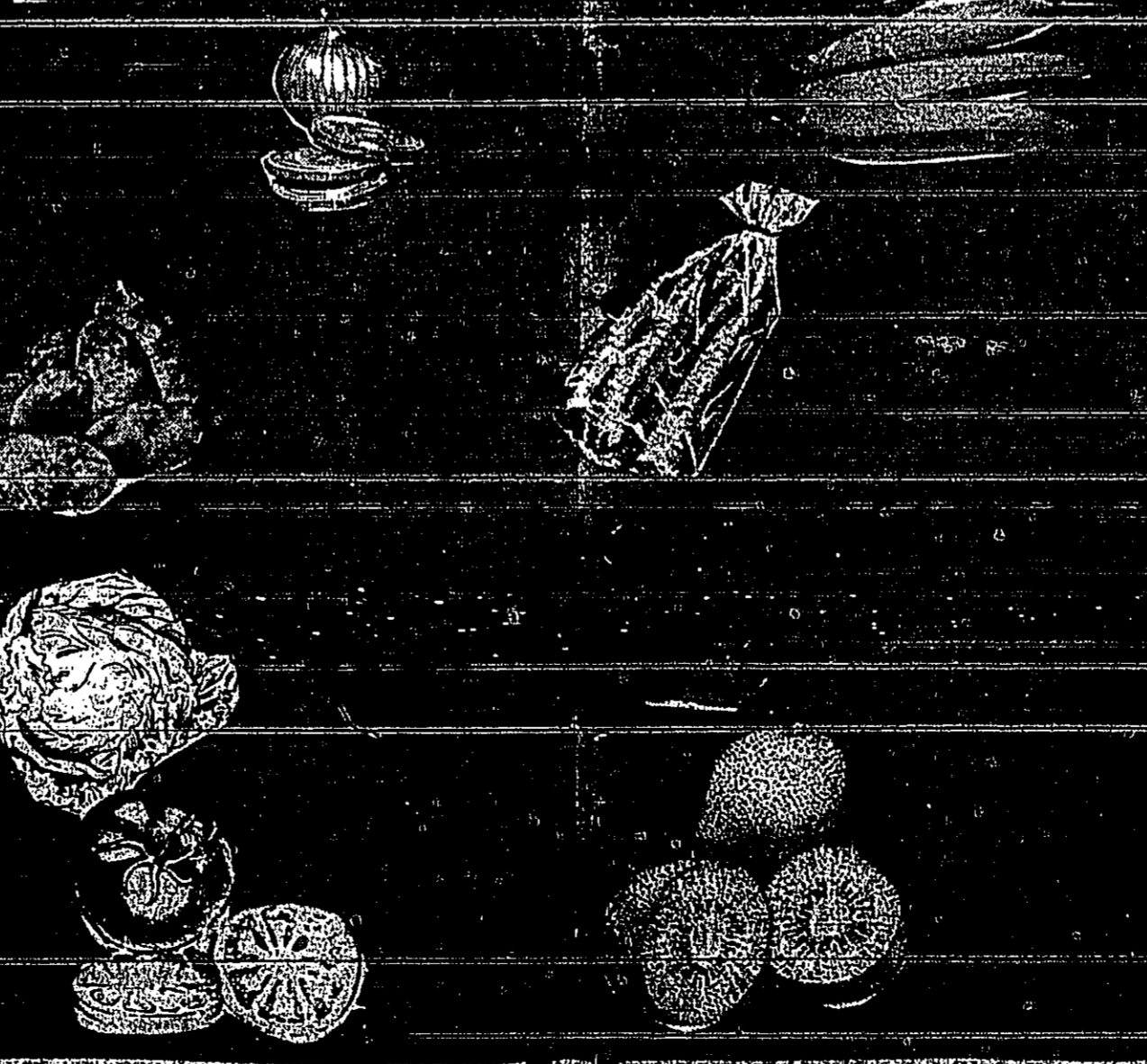

**Just Thinking**

Consider this question for a moment: "Is it possible for the Lord's church to exist today as it did in New Testament times?" To use a Bible illustration, consider the church as a plant reproduced in seed. The Lord describes the Word of God as seed, Luke 8:11.
