At a previous date, the Woodville Administration requested bids for a new phone system for the administration office and high school. Bids were received from AT & T and Custom Communications Company from Livingston. The difference in costs between the two companies was Custom Communications Company, \$8,534.70 less than AT & T.

The Board approved for the administration office to use the Custom Communications Com-

pany at a price of \$2,962.15, and see if the standards were met, and if they were, the high school could purchase the service.

A contract with Keystone Life Insurance for student insurance coverage was accepted by the Board. The cost of coverages are: 24-hour coverage, \$60; at-school coverage, \$21; football coverage, \$50. This coverage includes the Middle School also.

Church Under Construction

Texas Baptist Men Retirees are in the process of building a new church in Doucette.

The Texas Baptist Men Retirees is an organization of men who go all over the state building churches, for those churches who can't afford to pay labor charges.

"This organization started out with four members and has grown to 116 members in seven years, according to Ken Howell, who was one of the first members."

George Crews and Glen Miles are the coordinators of the organization. Crews is supervising the construction of the church in Doucette while Miles is supervising the construction of a church in Hamden.

One organization is made up of retired men from all over the state with different backgrounds, but all are retired. According to Crews, this is the only group of its kind in the area.

every person contributes his part to each building.

The organization has been in effect for seven years. "We started out building one church a month, now we build two a month," said Crews.

The members of this club are not paid a salary. They pay their own expenses. They live in travel trailers 10 months out of a year. The trailers are parked on the land adjacent to the construction site if possible.

The only expenses paid by the church are the slab work, bricking, painting and the floor covering.

The only four things the organization asks from the church are: (1) provide a place for the members to park their trailers; (2) provide one hot meal a day; (3) permission to put up their sign; and (4) permission to hold a 3 or 4 day revival during their stay.

According to Crews, this is the only group of its kind in the area.

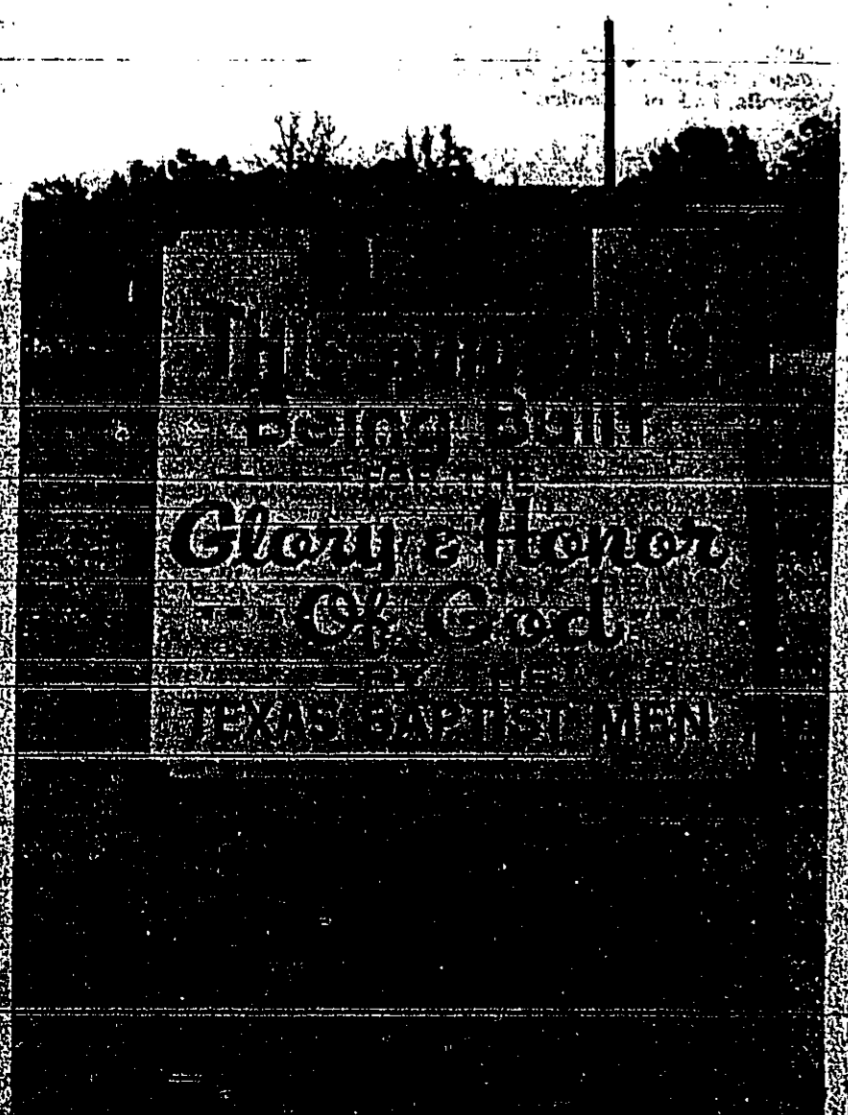

The church being built at this time in Doucette is 3200 sq. ft. and men join them in their

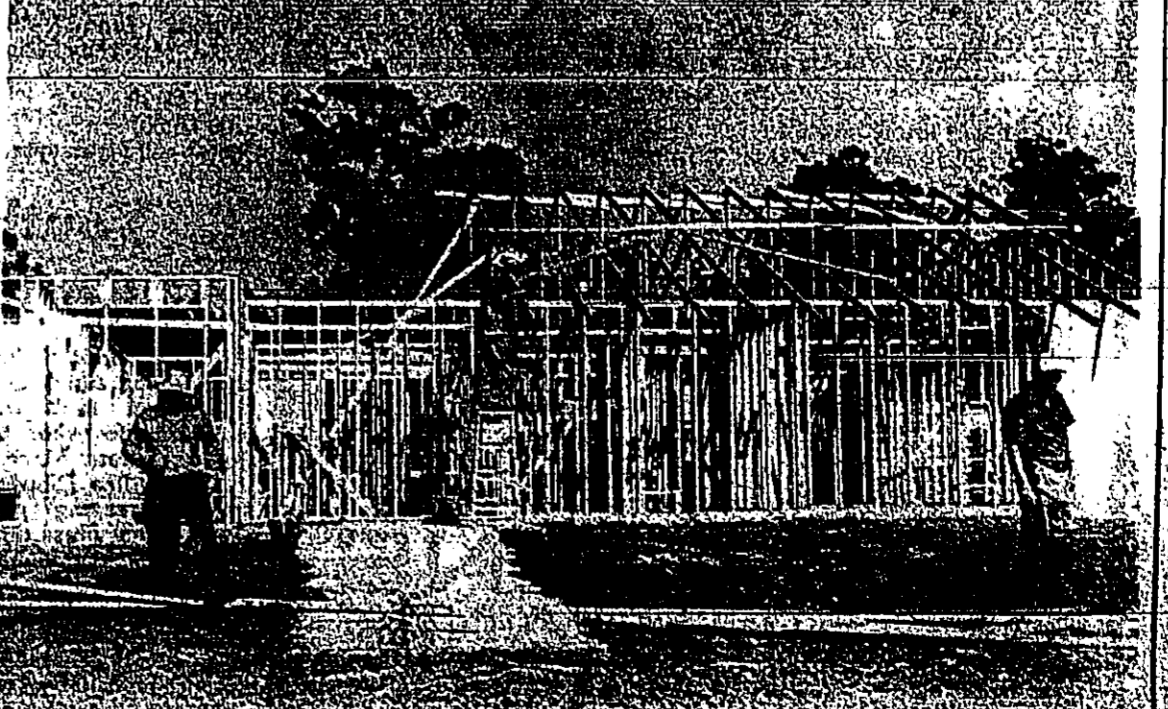
they are expected to crusade from city to city. They stay busy getting to know the people in each community.

town is waiting for the construction of their new church. "We hope to build as many churches as that are needed," Crews said over the noise of the saws and hammers.

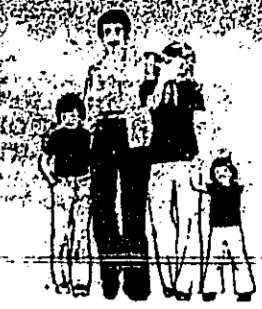


GIVE US A SIGN - Motto of church builders

Reinstate Death Penalty For Treason Says Wilson

One of the most heinous and extensive cases of espionage against the United States recently came to light in the discovery of twenty years of treasonous activities by three members of the now infamous Walker family.

This is a single case among many that have made the news in the past months. The staggering fact is that we have had more people charged with espionage in the last year than ever before in our nation's history.

To me, this is evidence that the current maximum sentence of life imprisonment for proven espionage is not sufficient deterrence against either the financial or ideological lures offered by those who would buy sensitive information from our country.

Selling information that may cause irreparable harm to U.S. national security -- to the Soviet Union or any other hostile government -- is a crime despicable enough to warrant the death penalty. Swift, severe and irreversible punishment must be the unquestioned outcome of a conviction for espionage against the United States.

The outrage felt by all Americans against the Walkers, and any other individuals who engage in such treasonous activities is reverberating through the halls of Congress. Legislation has been introduced to reinstate the death penalty for treason and espionage. My name is on each of these bills as cosponsor.

Constitutionally sound legislation imposing the death penalty for espionage and treason cases makes the clearest statement that this behavior will not be tolerated; and that those who contemplate transmitting sensitive information to the Soviets or others will be dealt with surely, swiftly and justly.

As with most of you, we have been watching the agony and frustration being played out at Beirut's airport these past few days.

Once again, masked Arabs with automatic weapons have taken American hostages, to address their anger with a third nation.

We buried a Navy man at Arlington Cemetery, killed because he carried military papers, his body dumped out of the TWA airplane in full view of millions throughout the world.

And forty or more innocent travelers on that airline now find themselves guarded by religious fanatics. None of whom can be identified as acting at the behest of any national government.

As Americans we deplore terrorist tactics. We say we don't believe in retribution unless the culprits are known beyond a shadow of a doubt.

It would seem that we are playing into terrorist hands at every turn. Any government can deny control of these activities. And the carnage goes on. Marines and American civilians killed in El Salvador. At whose direction? Who do you punish? The arms dealers that sold them the automatic weapons? The surrogate help they received from some where to get the weapons in the first place?

The presence of Americans anywhere in the world seems to encourage these random hit squads. An air base in Germany. A cafe in San Salvador. An airport in Lebanon. It's a new form of warfare that intimidates and kills with no threat of retribution. At least at the moment.

Some of our national leaders, including the military are in favor of creating hit squads that would ferret out the performers of these deeds and exact an eye for an eye. Repugnant as it seems, the way most of us would not want to see. We would not want to see our own people being played out, there would seem to be a question regarding the "odd Shiite Muslims being held by the Israelis.

Are they being held according to international law? Maybe not? But how is that relevant when terrorism in itself flies in the face of international law? Two wrongs don't make a
