Warren Budget Up 5%

The Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees met Tuesday, August 20, for an Open Hearing on the 1985-86 Budget. The Board adopted the new budget in the amount of \$3,678,162.00. The new budget represents an increase of approximately 5 percent over the 1984-85 budget. The new budget includes payment for teachers at Fred who work longer hours than teachers on the Warren campuses. The longer hours are a result of the late schedules which require Fred Ebenhauser to be dropped off first and consistency throughout the district. Teachers will be paid for the extra hours spent in the program for several years, including asking for change in the way the terms of employment scheduling. The motion was presented by Jerry Long, set aside for extra hours for principal Alan Mitchell. The amount requested for the campus is \$37,785. Fanning asked that the principals on all campuses be instructed to be sure that no other teachers fall into the extra hour category.

Can't Play A Note? Colmesneil Music Maker!

Most of us are familiar with the old question, "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?" In musical circles there's a similar question: The perplexity began when a primitive wall-painting was found in a cave in southwestern France. The painting dates to 15,000 B.C. and shows a "man" disguised under a bison skin. The man is holding a bow.

One historian of musical instruments interpreted the finding to mean that bowed instruments were the progenitor of the hunter's bow. Another expert concluded from the same painting that the hunter's bow was the progenitor of the musical bow. Finally, a third scholar resolved the impasse by suggesting that the development of the musical bow and the hunters bows were completely independent of each other.

The question is important, not so much in how the scholar's resolved it, but because it points out that music, even in the most primitive forms, has always been important to man. Today, music surrounds us and represents a billion dollar industry. As listeners we generally give credit to the musicians. However, there's another group intimately involved with the creation of sound and that's the men who construct the instruments.

James H. Pickett, who builds and repairs stringed instruments in his shop in Colmesneil, has been working with wood for the past 26 years. Until recently the work was a hobby but now Pickett is at it full time. Initially, Pickett built custom-made furniture. In 1982, however, while living in Richmond, Virginia, he began to repair musical instruments as a sideline to his career in electronics. Repairing instruments, he says, just naturally led him to begin building them.

Although Pickett is relatively new in the field, the field is not new to him. His father, the late Howard Pickett, originally of Chester, Texas, also built instruments and had over 250 to his credit. Pickett works exclusively in the category of stringed instruments. He has built guitars, violins, violas and mandolins. Of this musical family, he describes the violin as "king". It carries almost five full octaves on the fingerboard and requires approximately 70 pieces to complete. "The end product is not any better than the raw materials that go into it," says Pickett, referring to all hand-crafted instruments. "The age of the wood and the grain have a lot to do with it." For the violins and other instruments that he builds, Pickett buys specially cut woods. The tops and bottoms are made from "quarter cuts", that is, pieces of wood cut like wedges of pie. For violins, close-grained European spruce, which responds well to frequencies, is used for the tops. European flamed maple, which is known for its reflective tonal properties, is used for the sides and back. The neck is also made of maple; the fingerboard, of ebony. Violins, like any of the stringed instruments, require meticulous craftsmanship and an almost endless progression of steps from start to finish. Pickett begins by using a bending process to form the sides of the violin to a mold. The mold is then used as a template to shape the top and back. Once

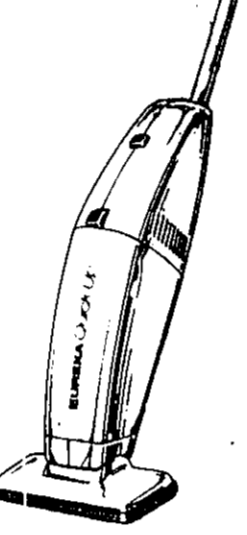

Committee Accepting Booth Applications

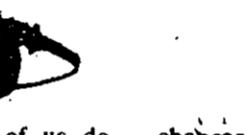

Agency Name Change

The state welfare agency assumes a new name Monday, Aug. 26. A new law passed by the 69th Legislature changes the name of the Texas Department of Human Resources to the Texas Department of Human Services.

The department services two main groups: families and children and the aged and disabled. Its programs include income assistance, health care, support services, and protection of children and the elderly from abuse and neglect.

When the agency was created in 1939 it was called the State Department of Public Welfare. In 1977 that was changed to the Texas Department of Human Resources.

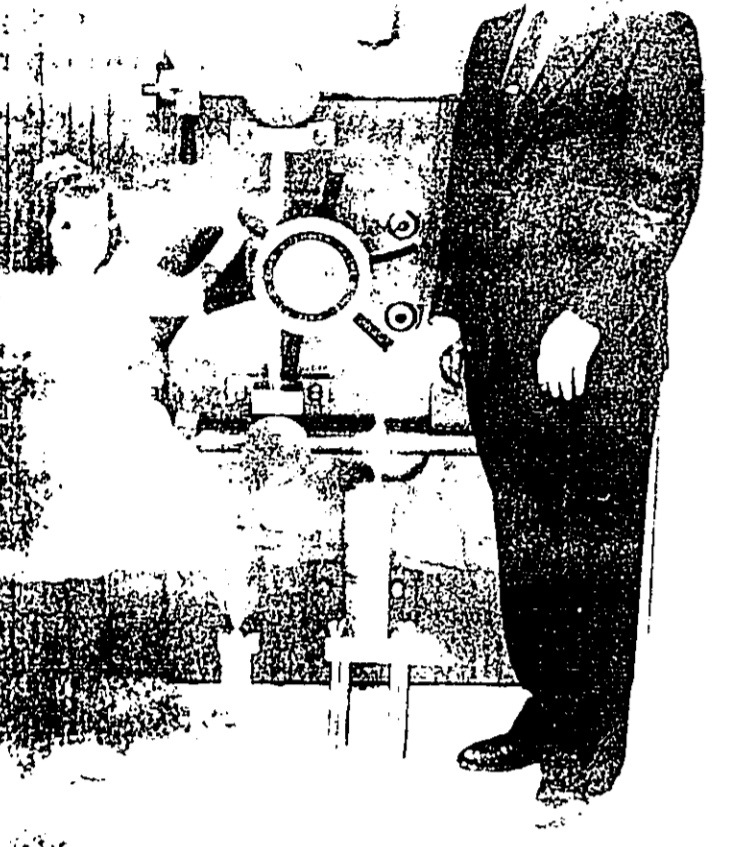

Out of the mouths of babes
Art Linkletter made millions during
his radio career letting us eavesdrop
on the ad libs of children. Mothers
in the audience died a thousand
deaths worrying about what their
youngsters might expose concerning
the family's intimate secrets.
President Reagan reminded
us the other morning that such juv-
enile talents still exist.
At a fund raiser in Los
Angeles, he commented that he had
gotten hundreds of get well cards con-
cerning his recent cancer surgery.
From one youngster he heard
"I just learned that the doctors took
two feet out of your stomach. How did
the feel get there in the first
place?"

The comment and the laugh it got
from the audience leads us to be-
lieve that we need more one liners
in the daily news. Items people can
laugh at.
Or have you noticed that the month
of August has been a steady diet of
car bombings in Beirut, plane crashes
all over the world, and a skin cancer
on the President's nose?

With few exceptions, radio, televi-
sion and newspaper commentators
can hardly wait to tell us how bad
things are. That the world economy
is going to Hades in a hand basket.
That nuclear bombs are poised at our
collective heads. That imports are
stealing American jobs.

Even that most of us are secondary
carriers of various types of AIDS.
Good grief. Something good must
be happening out there somewhere.
What we need is another news
paper columnist like Will Rogers.
Will has been gone from the scene for
fifty years now. Lost in a plane crash
in the Alaskan wilderness with a one
eyed pilot named Wiley Post.

But for years Will Rogers had been
on the lecture circuit, lampooning the
pompous, which to him were mostly
politicians. In the midst of the Great
Depression he was about the only
column in the daily newspaper ex-
cept the comics that could bring a
chuckle.

If you weren't there you couldn't
imagine the desperate straits most
people were in during the 1930's.

Yet there were a flock of people
who surfaced as experts on the dilem-
ma facing the country. And we all
knew who an expert is - anyone from
out of town.

Rogers said it better however.
"There is nothing so stupid as
an educated man, if you get off the
thing he was educated in."

Does that remind you of some of
the folks you have seen on television
and read in the daily newspaper
columns?

Will also allowed
"The Republicans have their splits
right after election and Democrats
have theirs just before an elec-
tion."

Remember now. Will mentioned
that little bromide more than fifty
years ago. It's just as true today.

Of course he also said "I only know
what I read in the papers."
But he couldn't resist a last tick-
le. "All politics is applesauce."

We need the humor Will Rogers
brought to any situation, no matter
how dire. He had the instincts to real-
ize that people coped a little better
if they had a chance to laugh at them-
selves a little more.

No person had more compassion
than he in recognizing the sorry state
most of us were in during those lean
years. Yet he always saw a brighter
dawn, a more promising future, in
stead of Armageddon. To Will
Rogers, a glass was half full, not half
empty.

You wouldn't have called Will
Rogers an educated man, in the ac-
ademic sense. He was a rodeo rider
in his youth, a trick-rope performer
at county fairs and sideshows. Cer-
tainly not born with a silver spoon in
his mouth.

But he had that curious nature, and
a love of people that let him be a
spokesman for all of us, to say in
words what we had been thinking all
along.

Will would think most of us who
report the news and comment on
events of the day have be-
come overly pompous, and he'd be
right. Most of us have.

But he had that one hallmark of
self confidence most of us can never
achieve.
He also said
"I never met a man I didn't like."

these are children.

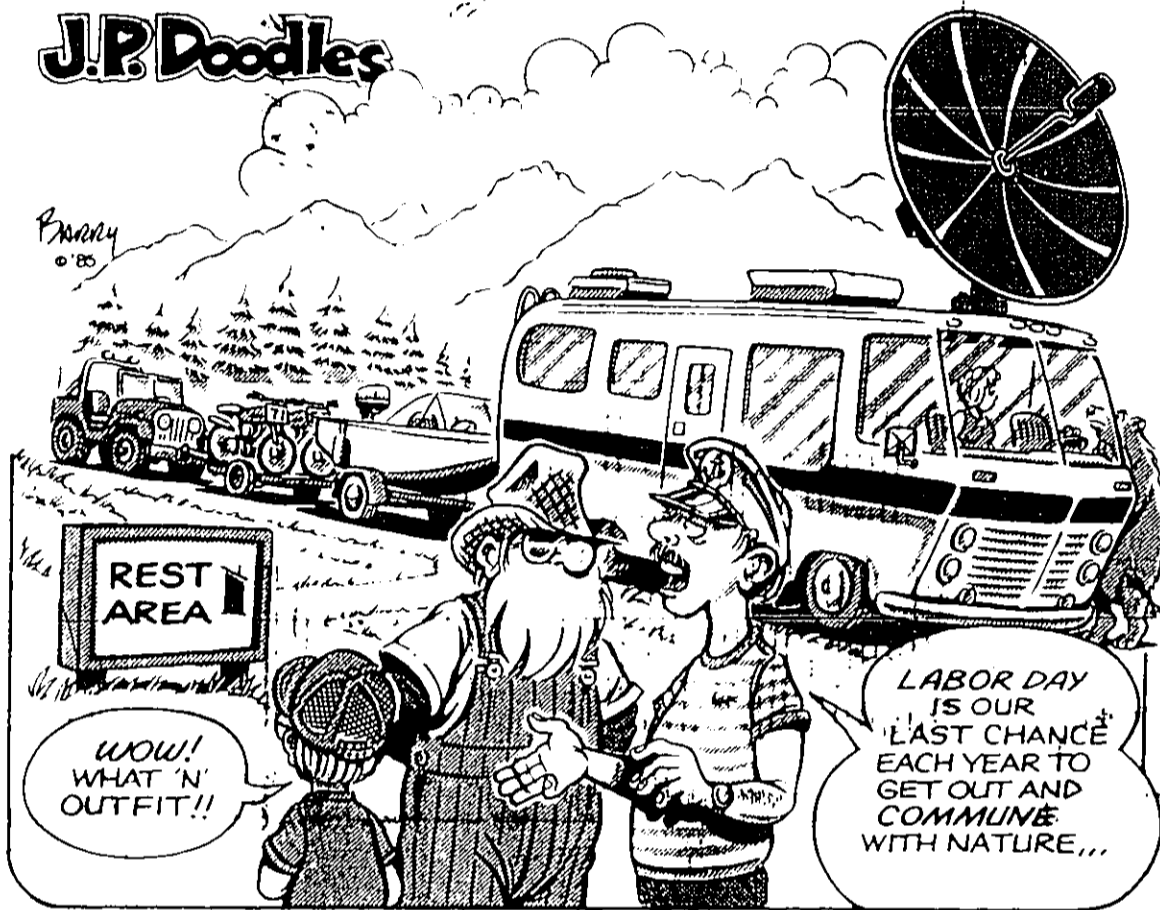
The muscular dystrophies and related

"I Am An Alcoholic Because..."

What is an alcoholic? Do they sleep under bridges? Do they ride freight trains and eat out of tin cans? Some of them may, however, out of all your typical hobos (or whoos) only 5% are actually alcoholics. The others are there because they choose that way of life.

There are five distinct classifications of alcoholics: (1) the physio paths who are emotion ally disabled. They are always going on the wa gon for keeps, they're over remorseful, and make many resolutions, but never a decision. (2) the type that are unwilling to admit that they cannot take a drink. They plan various ways of drinking, change their brand or their en vironment. (3) They al ways believe that after being entirely free from alcohol for a period of time they can take a drink without danger. (4) The manic depressive type is least understood by their friends, and a whole article could be written about him. (5) This type fits the major ity we believe. They are entirely normal in every respect, except for the effect that alcohol has upon them. They are often able, intelligent, friendly people. The disease of alcoholism is no respecter of age, so cial class, color, creed, or position. Whether you are or not is deter mined by the chemical make-up of your body and the effect that alco hol has upon it.

All these types and many others have one symptom in common. They cannot start drink ing without developing the phenomenon of craving. This phenome non of craving may be the manifestation of an allergy which differen tiates these people and sets them apart as a dis tinct entity. It has never been by any treatment of which we are familiar completely eradicated. The only relief found to be successful is com plete and absolute abstin ence. An alcoholic does not react the same way while drinking. Some will begin to cry in their beer (self pity) others will do various things, such as, laughing, jok ing, fighting or loyung. Almost everyone does different things after starting to drink, but they all have one thing in common. They trig ger the phenomenon of craving after the first drink. If you take a drink and you cannot stop drinking, you are allergic to alcohol, because normal people do not react in that manner. If you are allergic to alcohol and you take that first drink, you are going to get drunk, just as sure as your name is Bob, or Bill, or Joe, or Alice. It doesn't make any difference if we were born that way or if we developed it over a period of years of con tinuous drinking. The fact is that the symp toms are there and they won't go away simply by ignoring it. If we are allergic to alcohol, that's where we are today and it doesn't shake. Any dif ference how long it took us to get there, it's not how long we drink, or how much we drink, it's what we do when we drink that is important.

The allergy that we have to alcohol is the one thing that we have in common, and is the thing that was recog nized years ago when many problem drinkers throughout the country began to recover from this dreaded disease. The body is sickened as well as the mind. The manifestation of that sick ness is an allergy to alcohol that is manifested by the phenomenon of craving after we take the first drink.

Today medical science (sanctioned by the American Medical So ciety) has proven that the body of the alcoholic is different from that of the normal social drinker. It has been proven beyond any shadow of a doubt that the alcoholic is allergic to alcohol.

We would like to talk now about exactly what happens when the alco holic takes a drink of al cohol into his system as compared to the reac tion of a non-alcoholic as that first drink enters his body.

In our metabolism there exist within the human body such things as enzymes. The mind and the body are mar velous mechanisms. You take food into your body, the stomach in some way senses what's in it, and the informa tion goes directly to the brain. The brain in turn will send the informa tion to different organs of the body, which begin to produce enzymes. The enzymes start to work on the food and begin to break it down. The body will use what it can, the protein, the amino acid, the vita mins, etc. After is has

extracted all it can use, it will eliminate the rest of it through the urinary tract, the intestinal tract, etc. This metabo lic process goes on with anything we put in our system. The same thing holds true with alcohol. Let's look at the nor mal social drinker when they drink alcohol. Nine out of ten people that drink alcohol are at ease with alcohol and it does not seem to cause any problems. They take a drink into their system, the brain determines what's there, signals or gans of the body, en zyme production begins, and the alcohol is bro ken down into a material called acid aldehyde. After a time, it is broken down into acetic acid, then into acetone, and in the final stage it is broken down into a simple carbohydrate, made up of water, sug ar, and carbon dioxide. The sugar has calories and energy and the body uses it as such. It burns it and the excess it stores in the form of fat. These are empty calories. They have none of the amino acids or necessary vitamins for life. It is simple a form of energy. The water id dissipated through the urinary tract, the carbon dioxide through the lungs. In the normal social drinker this takes place at a rate of one ounce per hour. Theoretically speaking, the social drinker could drink one ounce, every hour, from now on, and never get drunk. The body will metabolize it, use it, dis pate it, etc.

Now let's look at the one out of ten that drinks alcohol. One out

of ten are at disease with alcohol and that is all the word disease really means, that we are separated from the alcoholic, we put the alcohol in, the brain no tifies the organs, the en zyme production begins, and the material is bro ken down. First into acid aldehyde, they into diacetic acid, and then into acetone. As you can see this is exactly what happens in the normal drinker. However, there seems to be in the body of the alcoholic an insufficient amount, or a lack of quantity or qual ity of enzymes that will not break it from ace tone to the simple carbo hydrate as fact as it does in the body of the non alcoholic. Conse quently, it lays in the body for a much longer time as acetone. Now it is a well known medical fact that acetone ingested in the human body, that stays there for a period of time will pro duce a physical craving for more of the same. In the body of the non alcoholic, it goes through that stage so rapidly that the craving is never produced. But, in the body of the alco holic, the acetone, lay ing there for a much longer period of time than in the non alcoholic the actual physical craving is produced. Once the alcoholic takes the first drink, the breakdown from acetone to the simple carbo hydrate is so slow, and with the acetone just lying there, the body immediately craves for me some more of what you just put in me. 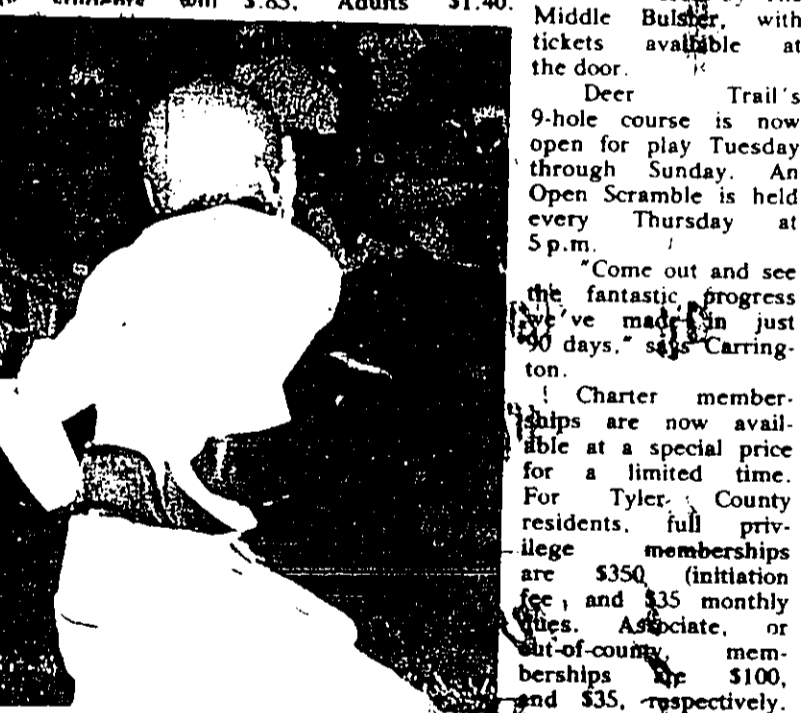
