QUESTION

"How long will GSU have the highest residential rates in Texas?"

ANSWER

Went down 2.5% on September with our reduced fuel factor and will drop another 15% in November when

the lower winter rate takes effect. Electric utilities traditionally have had seasonal rates that were higher in the summer than in the winter. Other Texas utilities recently dropped their seasonal rates, which helped give GSU the dubious and temporary distinction of having the highest residential rate in the state. On November 1, we will drop from the No. 1 spot.

As part of our next rate case, GSU will ask to join other Texas utilities in doing away with the seasonal rate. Such a step will help partially offset any prior to next summer. In addition, GSU is going to continue aggressively negotiating for natural gas in hopes of producing additional fuel cost savings and lower rates

The 2.5% rate reduction that took effect September 1 was a direct result of our fuel-buying strategy. If we are able to lower fuel costs even more, this would help further offset any rate increase that might take effect by next summer.

In the future, GSU's rates should be more stable than other Texas utilities. which unlike Gulf States, are not at the end of their construction programs and face the prospect of seeking more rate increases in the coming years.
