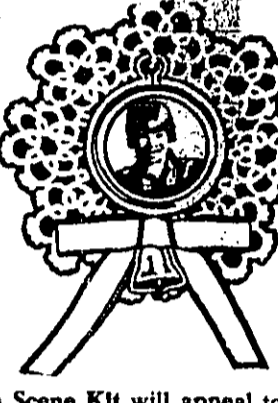

What about the immediate family? Relatives and friends of the alcoholic. Do they remain sane, responsible and untouched by all this unusual behavior? This writer would like to answer yes, but unfortunately in most cases, the family members are disturbed and emotionally drained. Statistics show that when one problem drinker stops drinking an average of twenty (20) other people also begin to get well. Out of this number of course, the most severely affected are the immediate family.

One of the greatest responsibilities of a human being will ever have is being a parent. All parents go into this phase of life with certain no experience. It is a continuous learning experience, and just

a real tough job, even when we have all our faculties about us at all times. It is an imposition, pride must be possible job, when you are drunk the majority of the time. Several studies show that living with the alcoholic is a personal disaster. It is an environment, disappointments, and continuous consternation, and it hangs on the children outside help if they ever hope to grow up.

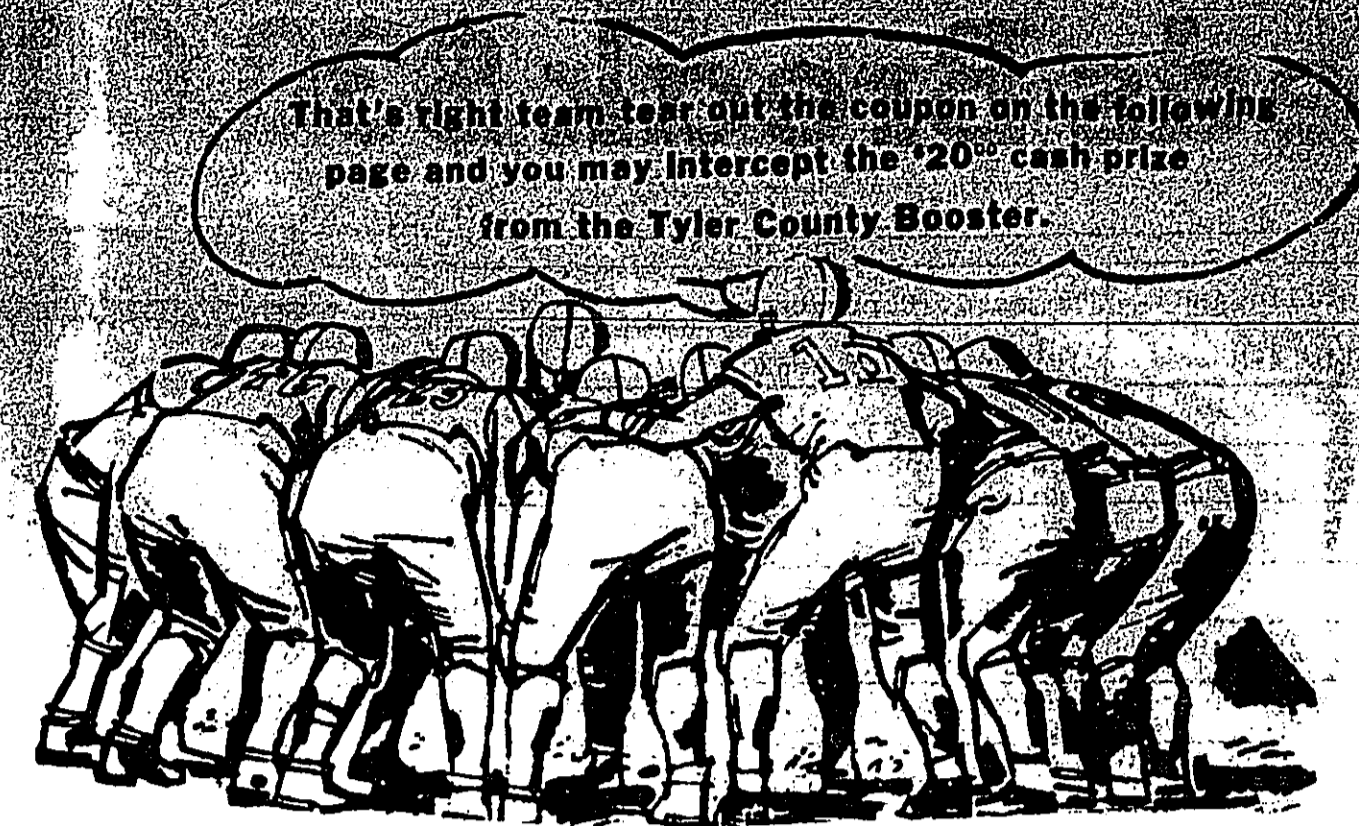

Editorial Worthy Project

At the conclusion of another year's Tyler County Fair this past week, Chairman Ben Worthy and wife Jane are already planning for next year's event. Adding a new roof to newly acquired portable buildings so "the ladies won't be afraid to bring their good stuff to show; they'll have a nice place for the youth food show and fashion review."

That's the way it's been each year for about five years now with Ben Worthy and his trusty wife heading up the County Fair. Each year builds on the successes of the year before and each year sees the addition of permanent improvements to the fair grounds. And the Worthy's should get credit for that.

This year's auction earned \$31,334.49 or about \$2,000 more than last year's proceeds. The grand champion steer sold for \$4100 this year, nine years ago after a 27 year lull.

Every worthwhile project has a person on whom the ultimate responsibility for the success or failure of that project is going to fall. Ben Worthy has been that person for the Tyler County Fair, assuming the Chairmanship initially in 1978. Worthy describes the first two years of his chairmanship as "rough," but since 1980 and the start of the steer show and "the big tent," he says "we have done nothing but grow." The grand champion steer at that first show brought only \$1000.

With that kind of record behind him, along with the support of the Tyler County community, not telling what kind of proceeds and success we can expect with at least another ten years or so of Worthy leadership for the county fair.

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QUESTION "What is GSU doing to cut costs?"

ANSWER

Quite a bit. Although we've implemented our cost cutting measures quietly without issuing news releases or holding press conferences, we're proud of what we've accomplished. We've concentrated our efforts in major areas where there is the greatest potential for savings. Fuel and purchased power account for 52 percent of GSU's operating expenses - the largest single item in the budget - and the company has been working extremely hard to save money in that area. Our aggressive fuel-buying strategies saved customers more than \$20 million during the first half of 1985 because we were able to negotiate very attractive natural gas contracts. We have built a new pipeline for our Sabine power plant that gives the company access to new natural gas suppliers and is expected to produce \$15 million in annual savings because of increased competition for our business. The list of efficiency measures goes on. A new Energy Management System that is partially implemented now and will be fully operational next year will improve the operating efficiency of our generating units and enhance our ability to make sure that our customers

are receiving the cheapest power available at any given moment. In the financial area, the company recently completed a bond transaction which will save more than \$2.2 million a year. The proceeds from a new bond offering will be used to retire some older bonds that carried a significantly higher interest rate. The company's payroll accounts for only 5 percent of our operating expenses, which means there are limited opportunities to hold down costs. During the last two years, however, the work force needed in our state operating divisions during peak periods has been reduced by 20 percent. This includes both GSU employees and contract workers. These are only a few of the steps GSU has taken to make meaningful reductions in expenses. An independent firm is in the process of conducting a management audit that was commissioned by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. This audit is examining all aspects of company operations and we anticipate that it will help us identify additional areas where the company can operate even more efficiently. We are concerned about costs and we are working very hard every day to operate as efficiently as possible
