Incredibly Friendly People: New Zealand

"New Zealand is one of the most beautiful places to visit with almost every kind of topography you can imagine on the islands. It has incredibly friendly people," says Dr. Raymond A. Parker, who, along with his wife Bobbie, have just returned from a trip to Australia and New Zealand. Parker adds, "It was a wonderful trip and I'm grateful we were able to go."

Also seen were the water falls of Melford Sound, a fiord on the South Island. Among the most impressive sites the travelers experienced were "snow-capped volcanoes, emerald green hills and rain forests which took your breath away," says Parker. Another attribute is there are no snakes at all in the forests. There are deep glacial lakes which run 1,200 to 1,300 feet deep, gouged by retreating glaciers long ago.

Texas Metals Cranks Up

Woodville has a new major industrial plant starting to roll with the opening of Texas Metal Works on Highway 69 North of the city limits. Students Up To Rule

The new No Pass-No Play rule has caused problems for many students throughout our state who wish to participate in extracurricular activities. Under the

new rule, any student who fails a class cannot participate in any extracurricular activities until he or she brings the grade up to passing level on the next report card. Extracurricular activities include all sports, band, twirling,

drill team, cheerleading and others. The new No Pass-No Play rule has hit Texas schools hard. Statewide, 15 percent of high school football players are ineligible to participate because of failing

grades. The Beaumont Independent School District had 20 percent of their students unable to participate in extracurricular activities due to failing grades. Warren High students realized that this rule

meant exactly what it said. The students have really hit the books, and it shows. Warren High is proud to say that it will have no students ineligible to participate in extracurricular activities in the boys varsity or Junior Varsity athletic program, the girls Varsity athletic program, the High School Marching Band, Twirling and Cheerleading. That means every student in these programs passed every class. Out of the entire school, only one person in Girls Junior Varsity Athletics and one in the Music program lost their eligibility. Rob Sarles, a junior at Warren High, says, "The new rule gives students the incentive to try harder."

Author Visits School

"You write if you have to write, if there's a drive that says you have to, otherwise there are easier ways to make a living," says Tom Townsend, author of "Where the Pirates Are" and other children's books, while making a guest appearance at Woodville Middle School on Thursday, Oct. 17. Townsend is considered the foremost authority on Texas shipwrecks and sunken treasure since he began writing about them in 1975.

His life has been filled with many unique adventures such as living with bandits in the Mexican mountains while searching for Aztec artifacts and hunting

for Nazi war treasures while living in Germany with his family as an "Army brat". He was also a body guard for a Houston antique dealer of which he says "the pay was good, but it was not fun." Townsend currently teaches a class on how to be a body guard aboard a ship or yacht and states he would rather teach it than be one.

The students in Mrs. Fortenberry's English and Reading classes were given a chance to ask questions of the author and one interested pupil asked what inspired Townsend to write his books. He responded, "The fear of entering the job market at 42, and not being a writer." Townsend estimates he spends 14 to 16 hours a day in writing related activities.

Shopping With Diane

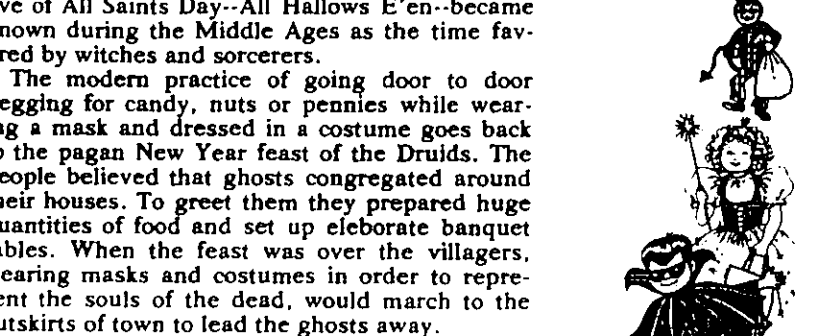
On Halloween children dress in frightening costumes, carve jack-o-lanterns, go "trick-or-treating" for candy and other special goodies and take great glee in trading ghost stories. While some of the practices are modern, others trace back for centuries to the New Year celebrations of the Druids. For the Celtic tribes who followed the religion of the Druids and inhabited Wales, Ireland and the Highlands of Scotland, November 1 was New Year's Day. It was also a joint festival honoring their Sun God and Samhain, the Lord of the Dead. It was common for the festivities to include human sacrifice.

In the eighth century Pope Gregory III moved the church festival of All Hallows, or All Saints' Day, to November 1; in the following century Pope Gregory IV decreed that the day was to be a universal church observance. It was in honor of all the saints who had died with or without official church recognition of their sanctity. The eve of All Saints' Day—All Hallows' E'en—became known during the Middle Ages as the time favored by witches and sorcerers.

The modern practice of going door to door begging for candy, nuts or pennies while wearing a mask and dressed in a costume goes back to the pagan New Year feast of the Druids. The people believed that ghosts congregated around their houses. To greet them they prepared huge quantities of food and set up elaborate banquet tables. When the feast was over the villagers, wearing masks and costumes in order to represent the souls of the dead, would march to the outskirts of town to lead the ghosts away.

As Christianity spread, people attempted to give the costume and mask ritual a more Christian background. They said that the ritual got its beginning from the costumed parades of children who went around on the eve of All Soul's Day offering to fast for the departed souls in return for money or an offering.

Another explanation is that the costuming stems from the medieval practice of displaying the relics of saints on All Hallows. The poorer churches could not afford relics and so had processions with the parishioners dressed as the patron saints; the extras dressed as angels or devils.

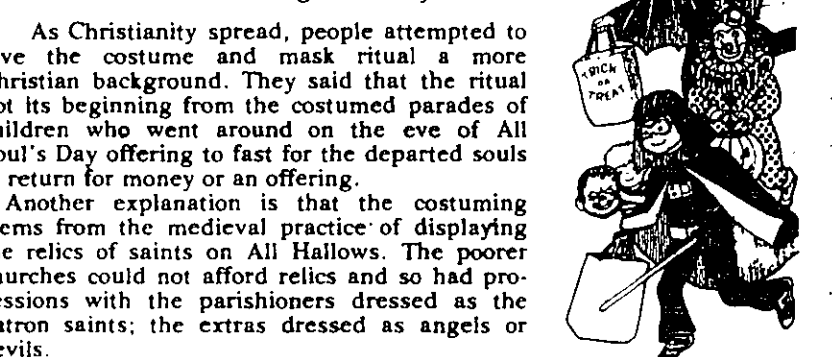

- CARAMEL POPCORN BALLS**
- 8 cups popped corn (about 1/2 cup unpopped)
 - 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 - 1/2 cup brown sugar (packed)
 - 1/2 cup light corn syrup
 - 1/2 cup water
 - 1 teaspoon white vinegar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 cup butter or margarine

Measure popped corn into large bowl. Combine sugars, corn syrup, water, vinegar and salt in 2-quart saucepan. Heat to boiling over medium-high heat, stirring frequently. Cook, stirring constantly, to 260 degrees on candy thermometer (or until small amount of mixture dropped into very cold water forms a hard ball). Reduce heat to low; stir in butter until melted. Pour syrup in thin stream over corn in bowl, stirring until corn is well coated. Cool slightly. Butter hands; shape mixture into 3-inch balls and place on waxed paper.

CARAMEL APPLES

Wash 4 or 5 medium apples and dry thoroughly. Remove stem and blossom end of each. In top of double boiler over hot water, heat 1 package (14 ounces) candlelit 1/2 teaspoon salt and 2 tablespoons water, stirring frequently, until caramels are melted and mixture is smooth. Keeping sauce over hot water, place each apple in hot caramel sauce spoon sauce over apple until it is completely coated. Insert wooden skewer in stem end; remove from sauce and place on waxed paper. Chill until caramel coating is firm.

I Am An Alcoholic Because...

In order to solve any problem in our lives, we must first diagnose the real problem, find out the solution, and then find an efficient way to solve the problem. This formula to success holds true with anything that is part of our life. However, we of course, are confining our discussion today to our number one problem, Alcohol.

The first thing we have to do is find out what our problem is.

Too many times we make the wrong diagnosis of our problem and we try to fix everything except what is actually broken. For example, you are driving to work in your car and it suddenly stops running. The fact that the car stopped running is not the real problem at all. The real problem is what caused it to stop running. If you know anything about the electrical or ignition system, you may soon determine that you have a bad coil. Now for the first time, you know what the real problem is. However, you are still not a whole lot better off, because you're standing there with a bad coil in your hand and the car still won't run. Then you say, "Hey, what am I going to do now? Then you decide to flag a car, go to town, and buy a new coil. After completing this plan of action, you hit the starter and, lo and behold, the car starts. First we found the real problem, then we decided that there was a solution and what that solution would be, and then we executed a planned program of action to bring about the solution. What would have happened if we had decided that we had a dead battery? We would have made a futile effort, because even with the best battery we could find the car would still not start. So many times we overlook our real problem (alcohol) and we try to fix all the little pieces, and things that we believe to be the problem. Therefore all of our efforts are in vain because our real problem (alcohol) has not been attended or treated and it continues to flourish and progressively becomes more and more of a problem.

The previous example shows us that there are basically three steps to recovery. Un doubtedly, the most important and difficult step for a problem drinker is to first diagnose and admit the real problem. Secondly, we must know and believe that there is a solution and find out what that solution is. Finally, we find and accept a planned program of action to bring about the solution. The first step must be taken by the alcoholic on his own, and then if he is willing the second step can be made partially on his own and partially on the basis of one of thousands of recovered alcoholics that have dedicated their lives to helping others to recover. Through this contact, the third step, or the planned program of action, can be initiated.

For many years, recovered alcoholics have used the one on one confrontation, to help bring about the recovery of vast numbers of other problem drinkers. This method always has been, still is, and always will be the best route to recovery. However, in our endeavor to try to speed up the process, we have begun to use the news media to get our message to a greater number of people. By doing this, if our problem drinker does discover his real problem, he will have a chance to know that there is a solution, and also how that solution can come about.

There are many people throughout the world who are concerned with the disease of alcoholism, and do offer help to those who seek it, such as doctors, psychiatrists and other special groups. Some of these are good and they do help some people. However, there is one group that is proudly boast over 70% recovery, and have found a planned program of action, that will enable any problem drinker to live a happy, contented, normal life.

The fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous celebrated their 50th Anniversary at a week long convention in Montreal, Canada, in June of this year. There were 114 recovered alcoholics and 114 different languages in attendance. However, there was one universal language spoken there that everyone understood perfectly, the language of the heart.

The primary purpose for this regular article is that we believe with more exposure, such as this paper so generously has given us, hopefully more problem drinkers can be reached. Maybe some can recover at a much earlier age, and the general public can be better informed about what AA is all about and of the services that we offer to the community and to mankind.

If you are thinking about drinking, those thought patterns can be reversed in a flash, and you can be part of the solution instead of part of the problem.

Get Most For Clothes Dollar

Clothing prices increased at a lower rate than prices for other items over the last few years, but when the effect of inflation is removed, U.S. Department of Agriculture figures show the percentage of personal expenditures for clothing and shoes is at a 25 year high. Part of the increased spending for clothes is due to higher prices, but more people are buying more clothes than in the past. *Get organized for shopping. Set a budget and shop with a list.

*Remember that separates are a relatively new concept. They tend a wardrobe, since items can be mixed and matched.

*It doesn't cost anything to try on "trendy" clothes, but be careful when you buy them. Make sure the clothing is suitable for you, and that the trend is new, rather than on the way out.

*Try on every item of clothing you plan to buy. This is important both for children and adults. Sizes are often a little more than a guideline since they vary too much from manufacturer to manufacturer to be entirely reliable.
