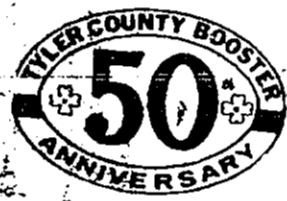

City Council Says "Yes" To Hwy. 190 Parking

Woodville residents received a temporary break on taxes Monday, Nov. 11, when the City Council voted to reduce the tax rate by four cents per \$100. Although this is a three percent increase, taxes will be less because property values have been reduced.

A request by Paul Cook, resident engineer with the Texas Highway Department in Jasper, to eliminate parking on 190 West from Village Street to outside city limits was turned down for the third time. Council, after much discussion with business owners along West

Bluff, voted to leave the streets as they are for the present time. Cook says the Highway Department will begin stripping the pavement this week.

Fred Sullivan requested that the problems on Highway 287 be checked into by the Highway Department and Cook agreed to look into the

matter. Walt Davis made a suggestion that the Council approve the purchase of a used 1974 street sweeper from the City of McKin-

ney, Texas for \$2,250. Davis explained this was an excellent price and shouldn't be passed up. Council members ap-

proved the purchase. Councilmen were dis-

appointed to learn that Don Force has with-

drawn his petition for annexation due to the City's procrastination in acting on this matter.

Force indicated to Walt Davis that he would install his own sewer and water lines to the new sub-division housing units he is planning to build on Hwy. 69 South just outside the city limits. City leaders asked Jim Dillion to speak with Force in order that the city may take action to annex. They have set the first public hearing date for November 25. In the meantime, council suggested the city sign a contract of intent with Force and begin the sewer lines to the area.

In other action, Council approved Cathy Smith as Tax Assessor-Collector for Woodville on Davis' recommendation. SMITH is a previous

employee of the city. Also approved was the hospitalization for the city-The new policy will have the same benefits except instead of a \$100 deductible it calls for a \$200 deductible.

Believe Council dismissed. Jim Dillion asked to approach Council members with a suggestion. Dillion said he was concerned about "his adopted city of Woodville as it seems to be dying". He would like to see the city advertise this area in the hopes of bringing more residents in.

Dillion offered to spend his own money and time in any way to help generate interest in Woodville. Mayor Gilchrist suggested picking a committee with Dillion as head to find ways of promoting this area.

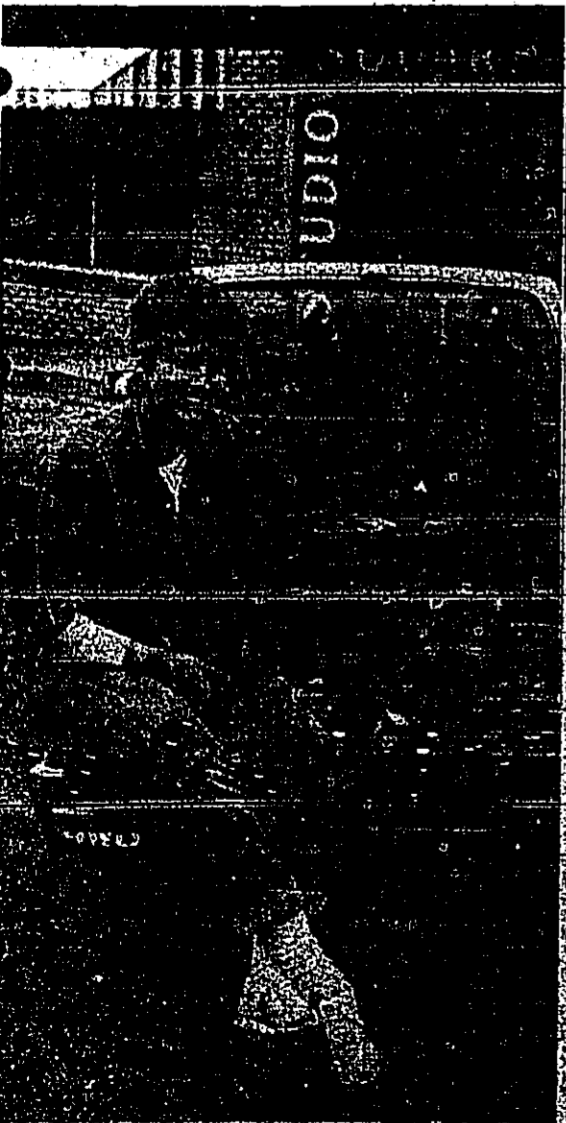

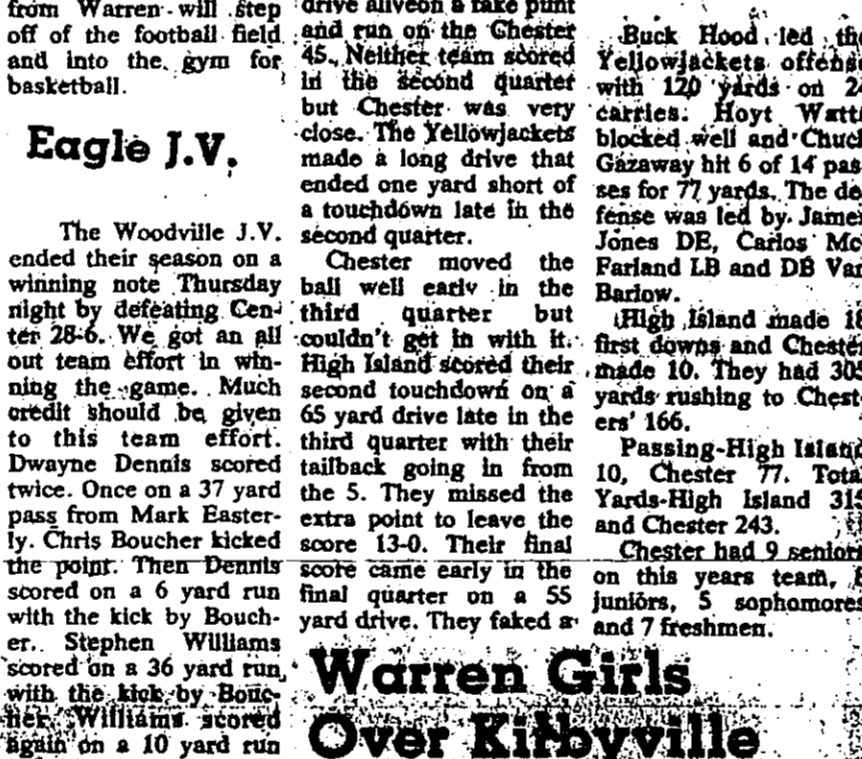
