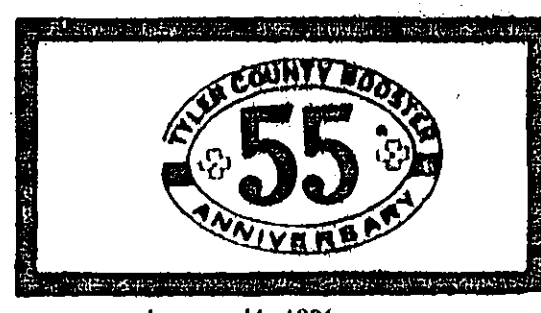


# Kid-Fingerprint Program To Fight Kidnapping

The Woodville Police Department is conducting a fingerprint program for children in order to protect their identity in the event of a kidnapping. The program, which is being conducted by the Police Dept. in the regular school day, will have a fingerprint card made for each child in the school. The cards will be kept in the Police Dept. and will be available to police if necessary or parents can have them sent to them for safe keeping. Parents are also encouraged to have their children's fingerprints taken. Children as young as three weeks may be protected by this method. Kimble does state that he prefers the production of fingerprints to be printed at a separate time. This can be arranged by contacting him at the Police Dept. Fingerprinting gives parents an unalterable way of proving a child is theirs in case of abduction or kidnapping. The seminar and fingerprint program are both free to anyone wishing to attend and every parent in Tyler County is invited and urged to come.

### Repair Costs High

Pete Dubose, Chief Engineer with the firm of Kloz and Halls, estimated the cost to repair city streets would be between \$1,700,000 and \$2,200,000 at the City Council meeting Monday, Jan. 13. Dubose said he does not have any accurate estimates at this time, however, some of the streets are in "good shape" while others are "pretty bad" because there is no base left. Before an amount can be decided upon, further studies of the amount of pavement involved will be required. Some streets under consideration for repair are Pecan, Nellus, Reid and Dogwood, which are in relatively good condition, but may require hot mix which is less expensive to use. The other roads may be in worse shape and require more expensive materials, according to Dubose. Certified Public Accountant Tommy Weaver, who conducted the audit for the fiscal year ending Sept. 31, 1985, gave a brief summary and proclaimed the City in good shape financially. He had some suggestions on how to cut back on utility spending. Weaver told members they should set deadlines for shut off of utilities on overdue accounts and stick to those deadlines. Also, there should be a fee charged to the customer who then wants the utility turned on again. This, he explained, would cut down on overdue and non payment bills. The City Attorney, Joe Wheat, informed Weaver the City did have such a program and believed it to be enforced. Also discussed was the Whitney and Grant contract which deals with the gas line, put down last year. The city is holding \$85,000 of the money still owed the company from bonds which were sold to finance the project. A meeting has been scheduled between contractors and the council for Thursday, Jan. 30 at 5 p.m. Council members decided to hold off making a decision on the proposed holding cell for prisoners item which was admitted to the agenda at last month's meeting. Walt Davis said he doesn't believe it feasible at this time for the city to build the facility as drawn up by Chief James Kimble. An alternative would be to decrease the size of the addition and locate it in another part of City Hall where outside access would be possible with out going through the main building. It will be studied more closely and discussed at a later time, Davis said. The Corps of Engineers who will be attending the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce Banquet to discuss the Rockland Dam on Thursday, Jan. 23 have agreed to meet with Woodville City councilmen earlier that day to discuss obtaining water rights from Dam B. This meeting is scheduled to begin at 4 p.m. Councilman Malcolm Radford was not present, therefore council could not hear the Tax Board Representative Report. However, the Financial Statement and minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

### Commissioners Approve New Budget

After ironing out personnel questions with Sheriff Leon Fowler, Tyler County Commissioners on Monday voted to approve a new budget for 1985/86 totaling \$2,806,265. The previous 1984/85 budget amount was \$2,812,824 of which \$2,640,385 was actually spent. This figure is \$172,439 less than was asked for, however, the county has been operating without a new approved budget for 85/86 since October. During a lengthy Commissioner's Court meeting, it was decided the Sheriff Department's request for a third dispatcher must be approved. Fowler appeared at the regular meeting January 13 to inform Commissioners that one of three dispatchers currently being shared between the county and the city and funded by the city will no longer be available for county use. When this change goes into effect in February, the county will not have a dispatcher to operate the jail. This is an unexpected expense that the county will have to come up with, but I didn't know about it until recently," explained Fowler. The budget was approved by a 4-1 vote. 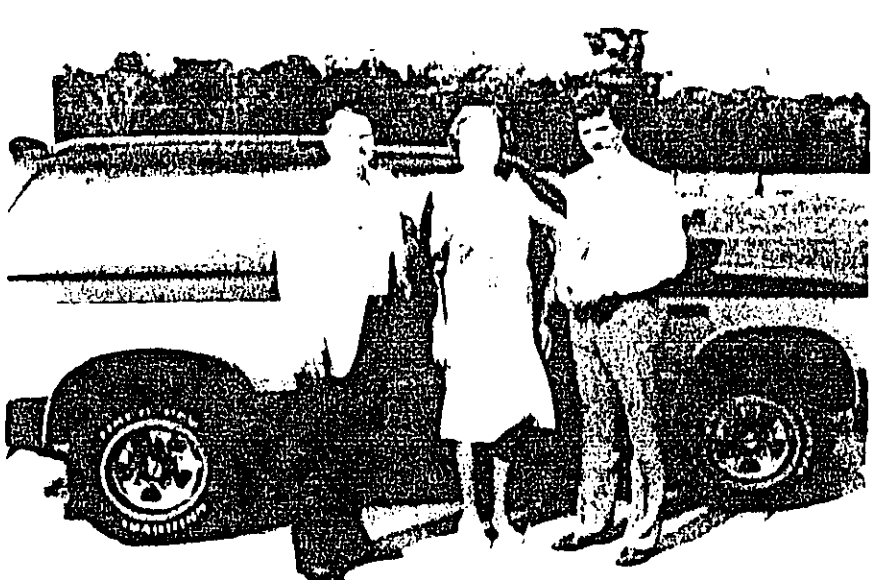

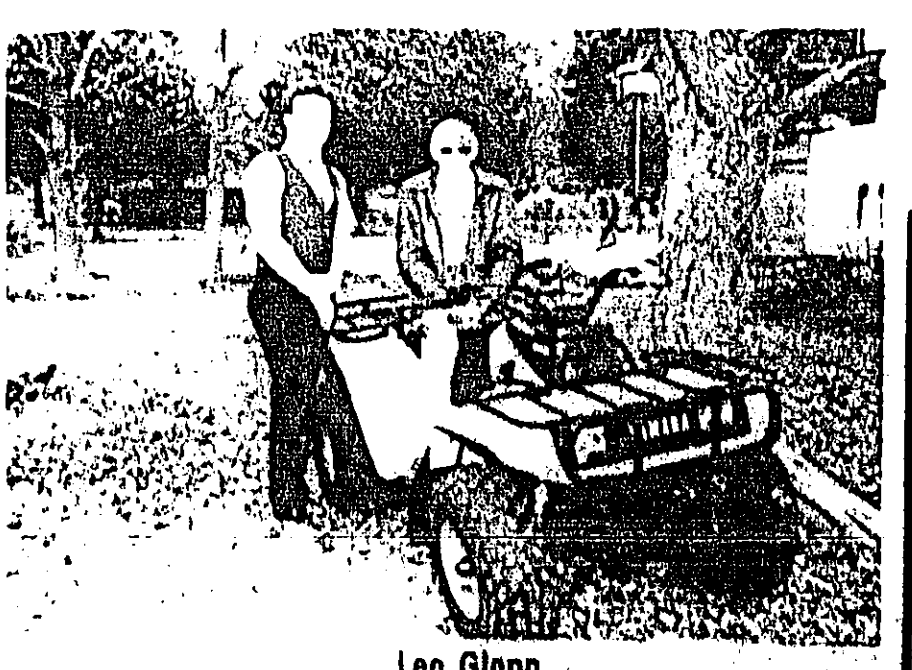

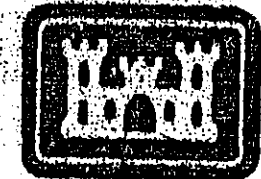
