

# Rockland Dam Hearing: 7-1 'Against'



**"SHOCKED"**—Dr. Joe W. Dickerson, a native of Tyler County, "raised on the Neches" and a supporter of the Rockland Project asked other speakers to "tone down things a little" as he indicated his personal support for the dam project study.

**WHAT ABOUT US?**—Frank Trojanowski, a resident of flood-prone Barlow Lakes, spoke for the Rockland Project whose flood control would help flooding problems of Neches River residents.

Land owners who might be inundated by the proposed Lake Rockland and members of various state-wide and area environmental groups opposed to the project turned the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers public hearing Thursday on a one-year re-evaluation study of the recently reactivated project into a forum for the vocal and emotional expressions of opposition to the estimated \$700 million water resource project.

The hearing held at Woodville's Kirby High school auditorium drew an estimated 350 spectators to hear the 47 speakers against the project, seven speakers for the project and two neutral speakers.

A number of land owners spoke against the project including James Smith and Billy Carlton of the Alabama Creek area of Trinity County, Carlton indicating that his family had owned property there since 1859. Mike Harbordig, a spokesman for Temple, Eastex Forest Products indicated that the company was not persuaded that the project was needed

or sound. It was concerned about the jobs that would be lost if 149,000 acres are flooded. Harbordig indicated that Temple would lose some 40,000

acres of land to the reservoir project. Members and spokesmen from environmental groups based predominantly in Dallas and also in Houston, such as

Sierra Club, American Big Thicket Conserva- tion Association, and the Audubon Society, spoke against the 149,000 acre project and many supported instead the creation of another

144,000 Federal Biological Preserve in the bottomlands of Angelina, Tyler, Polk, Trinity, and Houston Counties. Other speakers objected

## Woodville Rockland Dam Resolution Due

Woodville city fathers in a special called meeting Thursday afternoon met with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and agreed to contract with

the Lower Neches Valley Authority (LNVA) to guarantee the city rights to a future surface water supply from the Neches River Basin and unan-

mously approved a resolution supporting building of the Rockland Dam and Reservoir Project. The meeting was held just a few hours before the Corps of Engineers public hearing on the Lake Rockland Project began.

The resolution was recommended on a motion by Dr. Brian Babin and seconded by Alderman Doug Tolbert. All voted "Yes".

During the meeting councilmen questioned the Corps of Engineers as to the possibility of drawing water from the water storage pool of Sam Rayburn Reservoir. Lt. Col. Robert Keenan Deputy District Engineer of the Port Worth District Office explained that that would not be feasible due to federal restrictions on use of that water.

The main purpose of the discussion according to Mayor John Gilchrist was to compare the costs of drawing water from Rayburn's pool or from drawing it from the bay supply in general.

## W.I.C. Program

The Texas Department of Health in Woodville has recently begun the W.I.C. Program, a supplemental food, health care and nutritional education program for women, infants and children. Bill Lockhart, M.A., L.D., a licensed nutritionist from Houston, is in charge of the service, which is available to pregnant or breastfeeding women, infants and children from one to five years of age.

In order to qualify for the program, an economic and nutritional need must be proven. Lockhart works with individuals to determine this need. The program, which began in January, is an amendment to the Child Nutrition Act of 1966. According to Lockhart, many of the birth defects children are born with could be prevented with proper nutrition during the first trimester of pregnancy. For infants, the program provides for special formula for those not able to tolerate milk. Rather than provide food, the TDIH will give the applicant a voucher which specifies what kind of food may be purchased. Anyone who believes they, or members of their family, are not getting nutritional meals, should contact the Texas Department of Health at 263-2929 or by going by the 717 W. Bluff office. This program is non-discriminatory.

## Shopping With Diane

If you've been planning to start an orchard or plant a few fruit trees, now through the end of February is the time to do it. Several types of fruit and nut trees are suited to our area including peach, pear, plum, apple, persimmon, pecan, walnut, and crabapple. Before you buy, however, study the varieties offered and compare them for growth characteristics and soil needs. Then check this against your needs and the type of soil at your planting site.



If you're planting a single tree, make sure it's self-fertilizing if you don't know, and also, it pays to purchase first class trees. Select those which are medium size for their age and which are well shaped. The trees should be stocky with straight, clean trunks and strong, abundant roots. Check carefully for borers and injuries and reject trees that show evidence of either. In the case of budded trees, the union should be very near the ground.

Highest is not always best. Instead, select trees that are vigorous and stocky. Trees should also show firm, hard growth. Experts often point out that the toughest and best trees are medium in size.

Age of the tree is also important. The proper planting age varies, of course, depending on variety and other circumstances. However, in general, the younger trees withstand the shock of transplanting better than older trees.

Selecting the planting site is as important as selecting the correct tree for your area. Before you decide, consider the soil, soil drainage, exposure to sun and exposure to winds. Plant trees in fertile, well drained soil. Plant them where they'll be accessible so you can water, mulch, and fertilize them without a problem.

Don't plant fruit trees in low lying, swampy spots or where there are frequent extremes in temperature. Also, house sites that have a good circulation of air.

Another important rule to remember is that fruit trees are wild feeders and should never be crowded. The root system of the average tree footers about equals the extent and volume of its system of branches. It is generally recommended that apples be spaced 40 feet each way, figs, 20-25 feet.

It is also time, of course, to plant other trees and shrubs. In addition to enhancing the home landscape, many of these varieties attract birds (and other wildlife) by providing places to feed, sing, court, rest, nest or hide.

Holly (Ilex spp.), for instance, is used by 28 species of birds including mockingbirds, robins, bluebirds and cedar waxwings. Pyracantha (known as firethorn) is used by 10 species of birds including redstarts, brown thrashers, mockingbirds and cedar waxwings. Flowering dogwood (Cornus florida) is used by 45 species of birds including woodpeckers, robins, bluebirds, thrushes, cardinals, and mockingbirds.

Other varieties that attract birds include redcedar, crabapple, hawthorn, cherry, wildplum, oak, and honeysuckle. Several businesses in the county have large inventories of trees and related supplies. They include the following: Thomas Florist and Nursery, Highway 69 South Hyde Acres, Highway 190 West; Whispering Pines Nursery, Highway 287; J and J Nursery, Highway 287; Winters Nursery, Highway 287; Woodville Feed and Supply, Highway 190 East; B & M Nursery, Highway 69 (North of Warren); Farmers Feed and Supply, Highway 69, Woodville; Tyco Feed, Woodville; Wal-Mart, Highway 69, Woodville.

You might also want to ask for the book "Growing Fruits, Berries and Nuts in the South" by A&M expert George Ray McCachorn. It's available locally and is said to be one of the best.

A trip to the County Extension Office, Tyler County Courthouse, is another good idea. All kinds of brochures and information are available and if they don't have it, they'll make every effort to get it for you.

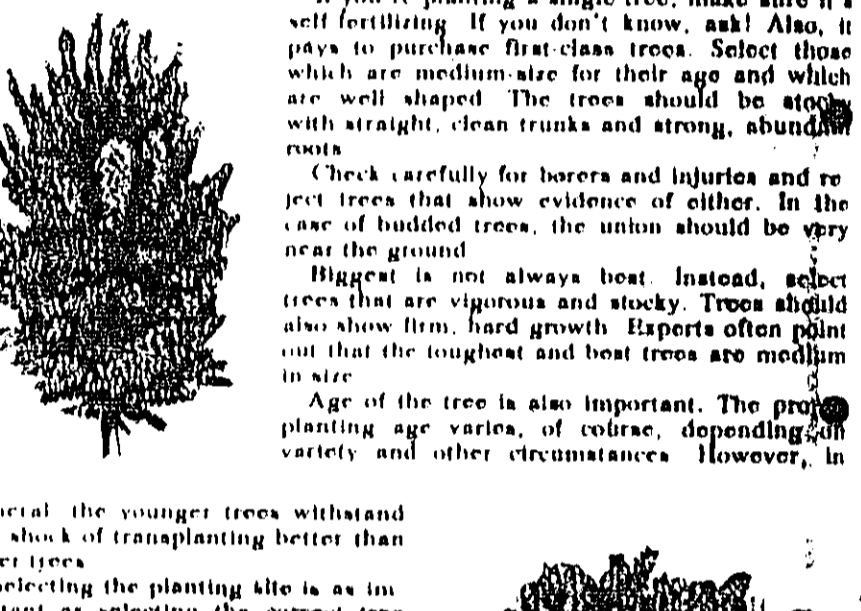

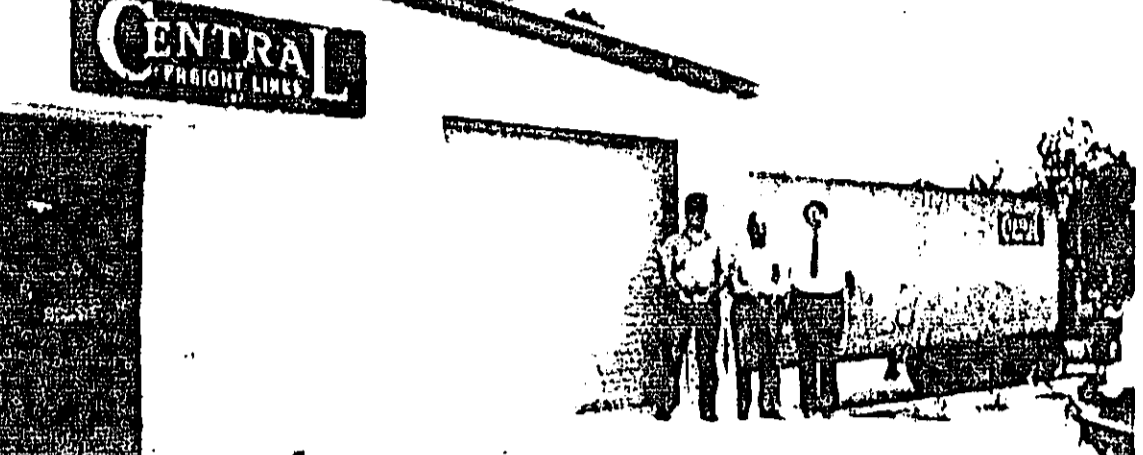

**For Rockland Dam**

A couple of weeks ago I was asked to speak and give a fisherman's view on the Rockland Dam Project before the concerned citizens and the representatives of the Army Corps of Engineers. This was on January 30, at 10:00 p.m. in the Kirby High Auditorium.

As fate would have it, I show up a little early and sign in as wanting to speak. It turns out that I'm number one on the agenda. Now it is time for me to speak. I've been listening to all these strangers beforehand enough to figure out that they're after blood.

I don't live in the area but I do visit here once very four or five years. I like to canoe down the upper Neches and look at all the beautiful sights. I belong to a hunting club that has this lake with partly cover up. I just don't think you ought to take our hunting area from us like the adults in the Chamber personally and professionally, I believe the politics of the organization are rather weak. ## Doucette Gas Ass'n Meets

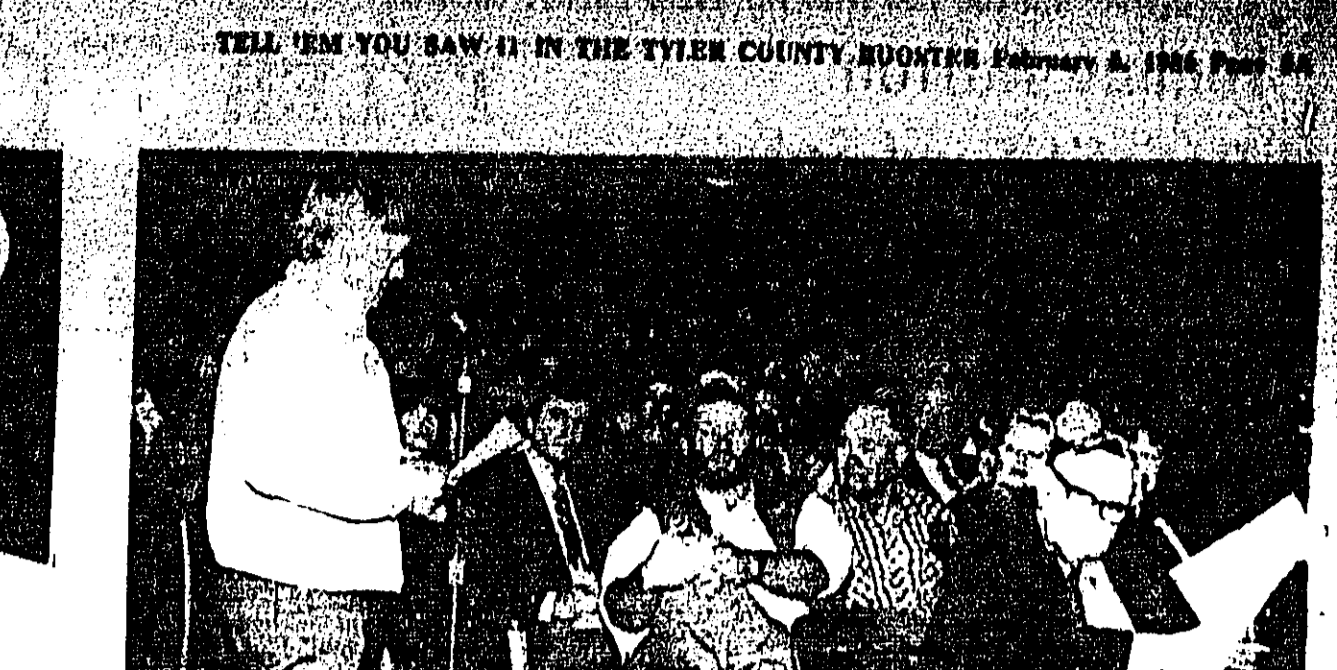

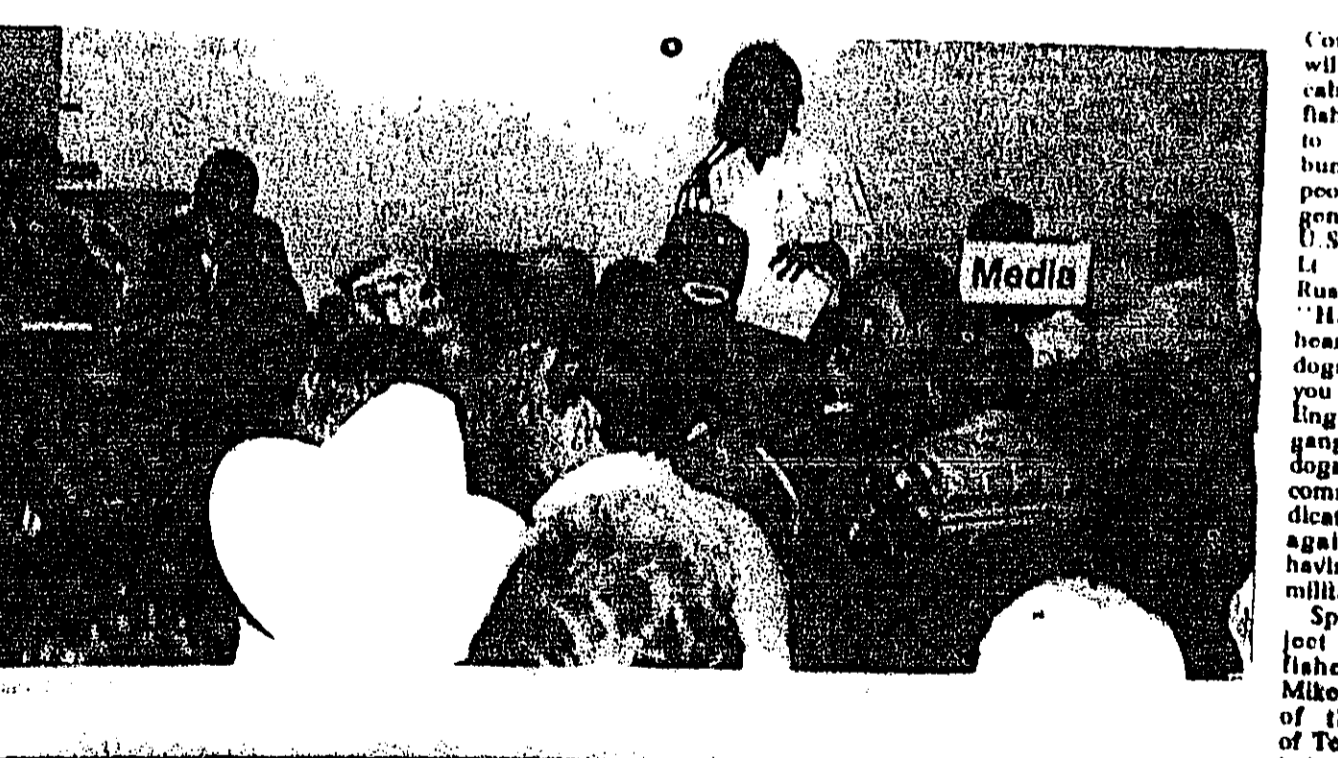

The Red Devils boys, Undra Van and Bellini of Chester, really went after the Pirates in the final quarter to make the final score 53 to 31 for Spurger.

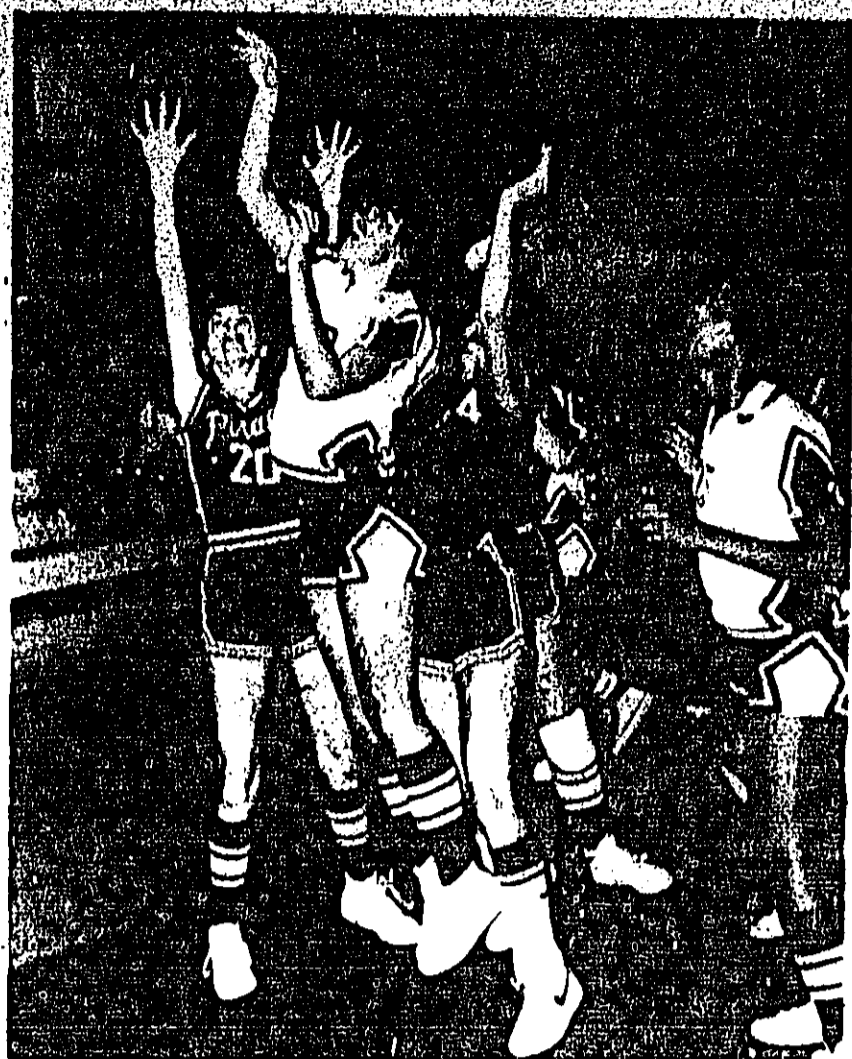

The \$5 stamps are now required of all persons except those exempt from fishing license requirements who fish in the salt waters of Texas for recreational purposes.

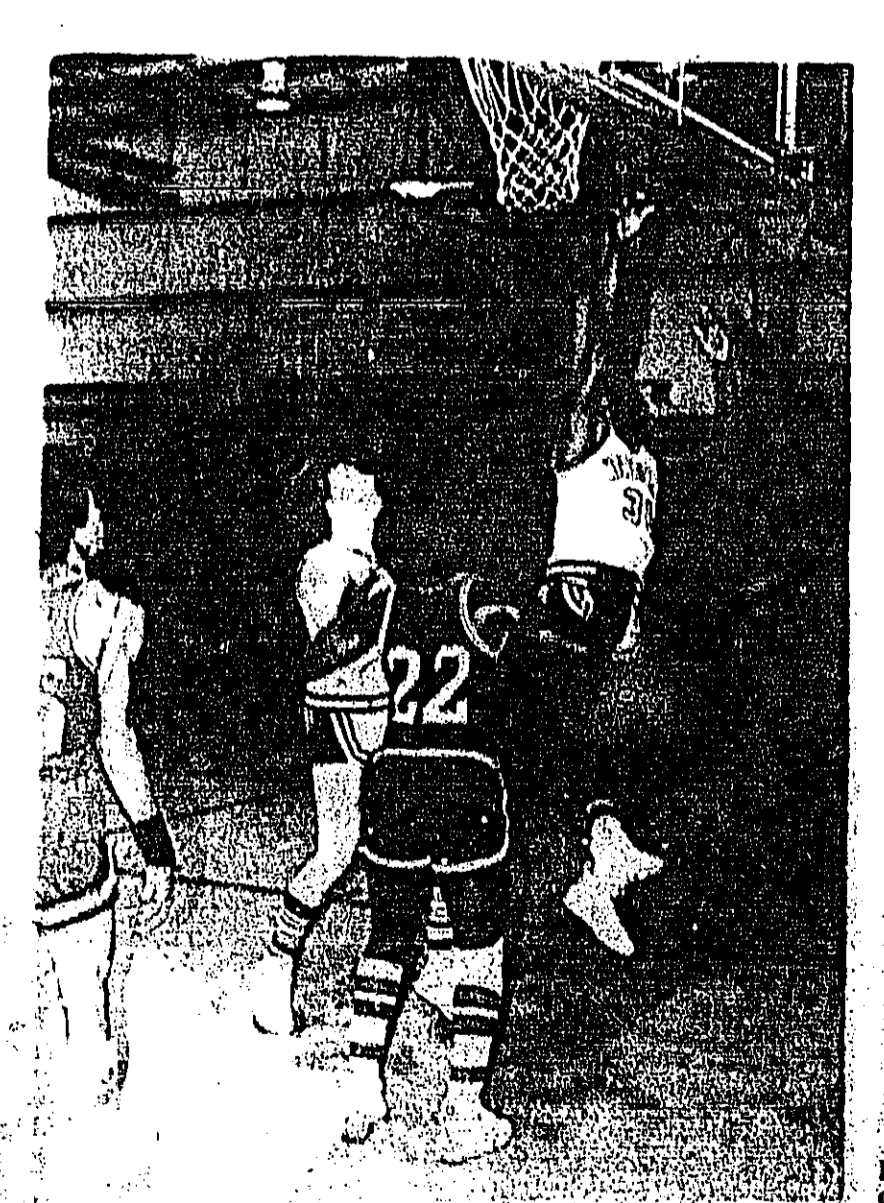
Revenue from sales of the stamps will be used to enhance the coastal fishing resource through law enforcement and fishery management programs.

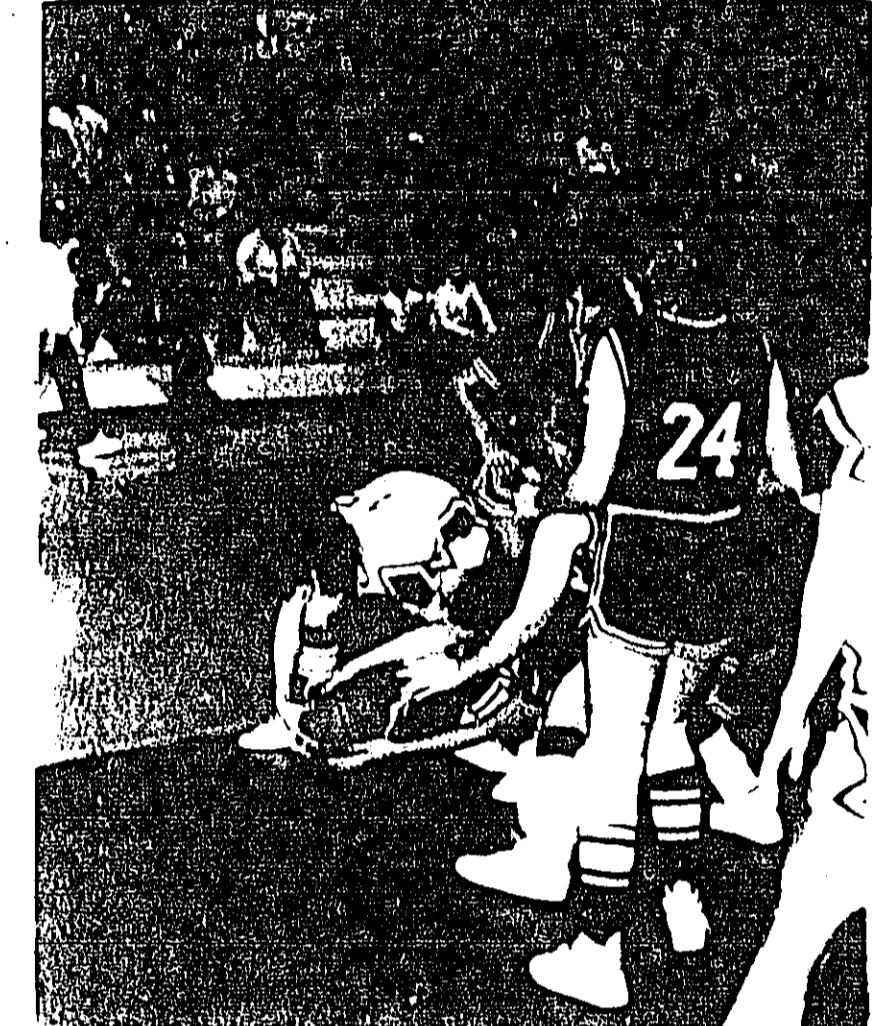

# Rusk State Railroad To Observe 90th

**RUSK, TX.**—While the Lone Star State is celebrating its 150th birthday, the Texas State Railroad is doing a bit of celebrating of its own this season.

The popular steam railroad this year will observe its 90th birthday.

Of course, the TSRR did not operate continuously during those nine decades. Part of that time, the line was leased to other railroads, but, in the past 10 years, since it resumed operations as a state park, its popularity has steadily grown.

More than 72,000 persons relished the Golden Era of Steam Railroad this last season and even more are predicted to share the nostalgic 50 mile trip in 1986 noted Nupt Curtis Pruitt.

Reservations for the new season will be taken from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. seven days per week beginning Monday, Feb. 1. The steamers will begin regular runs on Saturday, March 22.

Bookings may be made by calling 1-800-432-8951, in Texas or 214-683-2561, added Pruitt.

The Texas State Railroad Historical Park made a few trips in 1975.

In 1971, the state prison smelters shut down

a segment of the state parks system after laying dormant for many years.

But this unique facility actually has a history dating from 1896, when the first five miles was constructed to transport wood and iron ore to the iron smelter at what was then the East Texas Penitentiary at Rusk.

The prison smelter used the native iron ore for the manufacturing of iron and steel. Historical data indicates that the Rusk prison fabricated the framework for the state capitol dome in Austin.

From that inauguration beginning, the track was extended westward to Maydelle in 1901 and regular train service was opened between Rusk and Maydelle four years later.

In 1907, the track was stretched further ultimately linking Rusk and Palestine two years later. The 30-mile short line railroad thus became a link connecting with the Cotton Belt Railroad at Rusk and the International and Great Northern Railroad (Missouri Pacific in Palestine).

In 1911, the state prison smelters shut down

because new processes of producing pig iron made the Rusk operation unprofitable. The railroad continued to operate at a loss for the next eight years, but a major up-grading of rails was completed in 1921 and the line was leased to the Texas and New Orleans Railroad (later becoming the Southern Pacific Railroad). The line was operated by the NO until 1962, and the Texas Southeastern Railroad leased it for another seven years.

In Oct. 1972, convict labor again was used to renovate the state railroad as the first step in offering visitors a sample of steam railroading as it was practiced in the early years of this century.

The first tentative trips were made in 1975 and a full schedule was initiated a year later. Since that time an estimated 500,000 persons have shared this nostalgic trip and countless others have visited the park.

The railroad provides a nostalgic trip into the past for older visitors who grew up during the period when trains were the primary means of travel. For the younger crowd,

it is a chance to stop back into time to a less hurried past and to savor the sights and sounds of days long both Rusk and Palestine. Both trains depart at 11 a.m. and return to the starting point at 3 p.m. There is an hour-long layover at the opposite depot for the locomotive cab to talk to the engineer and obtain sandwiches, chips and drinks from the park concessionaire, or they may bring their own picnic lunch.

Prior to departure, visitors have an opportunity to make a tour of the locomotive cab to talk to the engineer and fireman, and to take photographs.

The superintendent emphasized that it is wise to make advance reservations, especially in the spring and fall when the trains operate only on weekends. "We hate to have visitors travel many miles, only to find that the train is full," he added. "This often is the case when we are on our weekend schedule."

Competition in the Astro dome ends with qualitative competition in the showing. The event involves the turning loose of 28 energetic youngsters and half as many wild calves in one arena.
