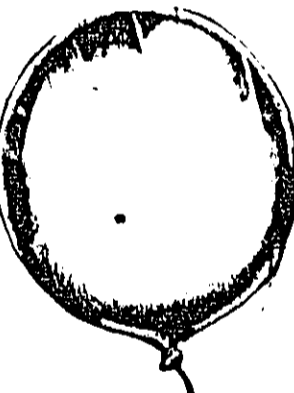
Now I will tell you some things about myself.

Possible \$1000 A Day

City Faces Sewer Violation

The City of Woodville is taking steps to curtail the possibility of a fine for violating the permit for the old sewer plant, according to Walt Davis, City secretary.

During Monday's City Council meeting, Davis informed the Council that the City had violated the permit four times in a row. Davis, Mayor Tom Knapp and engineer, Dave Ferrell attended a mandatory hearing with the Water Commission in Austin last week, said Davis. The Commission has yet to decide whether the City will be fined, but the three city representatives must attend two additional meetings before a decision will be made. Meanwhile, Davis has secured a sand truck and will attempt to filter out

the sewer plant, which may appease the Water Commission Board. However, if this action is not accepted by the board, the fine could be as much as \$1,000 per day.

The new sewer plant is scheduled to be in operation by October. A feasibility study will be conducted to determine if a petition

to extend the City's water line north of Keller will have any impact on a grant request the City has applied for. The petition from Daniel Mitchell, requests the water line be extended to seven houses north of the Keller plant, which is about 2,000 feet, according to Davis. The City will begin

advertising for bids to purchase a new police car and pickup truck. The police department has two vehicles now, one of which was recently wrecked and the other is old and in need of much work.

The sewer contract is a estimate number eight in the amount of \$219,975.70 was approved for payment. The amount was higher this time due to more materials being kept on hand, according to Pete Duloae, City engineer.

The election order to call for a special election to choose an alderman for the unexpired term was approved and the date has been set for August 9, 1986.

Warren Holds Exec Decision

Despite a two hour Executive Session, a decision on a Superintendent for the Warren Independent School District was delayed until the May 27 Board Meeting. According to Board President Harold Davis, there are still some details to work out before a selection is made.

The Texas Education Agency Monitoring Team visited the Warren campus last week.

According to Superintendent Joe Woodland, the Team was here for a routine visit monitoring the Special Education, Compensatory, and Vocational Program. Woodland said that the Team was very complimentary of the District's Programs and found no

violations and no discrepancies. Two minor corrections were needed but the Team felt that for a school its size, the Warren District had done an outstanding job meeting all their requirements.

The Board approved Woodland's recommendation to allow school to be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. May 15, 22 and 29. The purpose of the early dismissal is so that teachers may work on curriculum documents, Board members Ben Read and Walter

McAlpin approved the recommendation. The Board accepted the resignation of Cafeteria Director Norma Werner. Mrs. Werner resigned for personal reasons effective the end of this school year.

County To Continue With Commodities

Tyler County Judge Allen Sturrock recommended to Commissioners that the county "continue its participation in the Tri-County Community Action Commodities Distribution for as long as is feasible."

The recommendation came during Monday's regular monthly Commissioner's Court meeting and was approved unanimously.

According to Marie Riley, Commissioner for Pct. 1, the Federal Government has reimbursed counties five percent of the charges when distributing the commodities. But as of May 21st, this reimbursement will be discontinued until at least October, which is the beginning of a new fiscal year for the government.

This means the full cost of distribution will fall on the counties. Tyler County is one of six counties in the area who participate through the Tri-County Community Action.

Each Commissioner's Court from these counties will decide whether their county will continue in the program.

Without Government reimbursement, says Sturrock, Tyler County's cost would run about \$1,200 from now until October.

There are about 24 families in the county who receive the

commodities according to Riley.

In other action Commissioners approved the county Extension Monthly Report the Probation Department Monthly Report the County Auditor's Travel Allowance Report and also approved bond for Delb Haxvill.

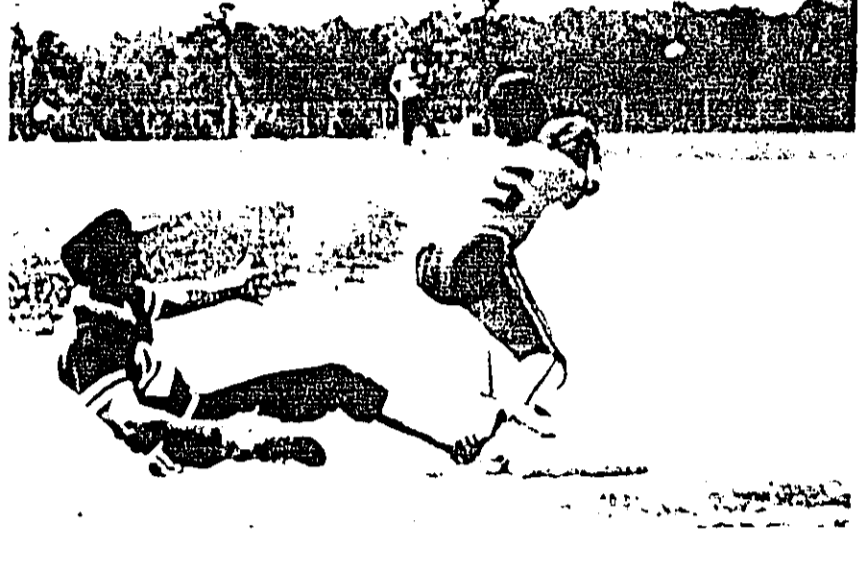

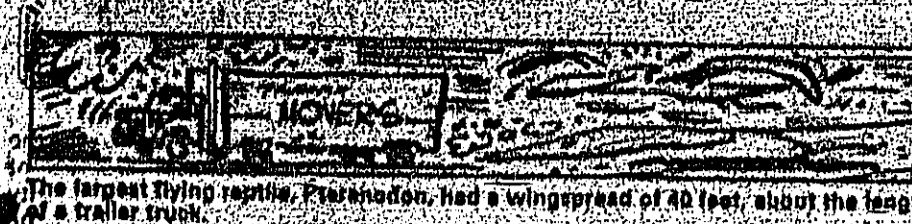

mark-up becomes a modest mark-up result in a \$11,000 pay-out, applied to a \$10,000 purchase price, then the high mark-up cost the rest of the economy \$2,000 in purchasing power. 

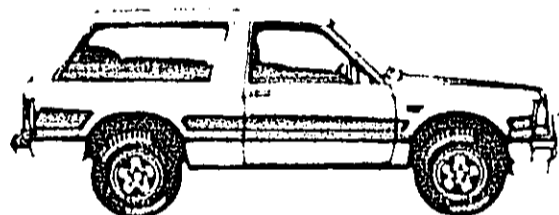
