Warren took the lead in the first quarter with quarterback Andy Foster capping off a Warrior drive with a one yard run for a touchdown. The point after was no good and Warren held a 6-0 lead. Neither team could score again until about the middle of the second quarter. Gerald Blair ran a sweep from the Warren 41 yard line and went all the way for the Warriors second touchdown. The extra point failed again to make the score 12-0 for Warren.

The third quarter was scoreless but Gerald Blair changed that in the final quarter. Ricky Moore and Blair worked the ball

down to the 4 yard line and Blair blasted over from there. Point after no good. Score 18-0 Warren. Gerald Blair scored again for Warren in the final quarter by running it in from the 15 yard line. The extra point try failed for the fourth time for the Warriors.

Deweyville finally scored a touchdown but missed the extra point to make the final score Warren 24 Deweyville 6.

The defense held Warren tight with only two touchdowns. Mark Woodward, Mark Lee, and Lee Sporkins and David Dinkins.

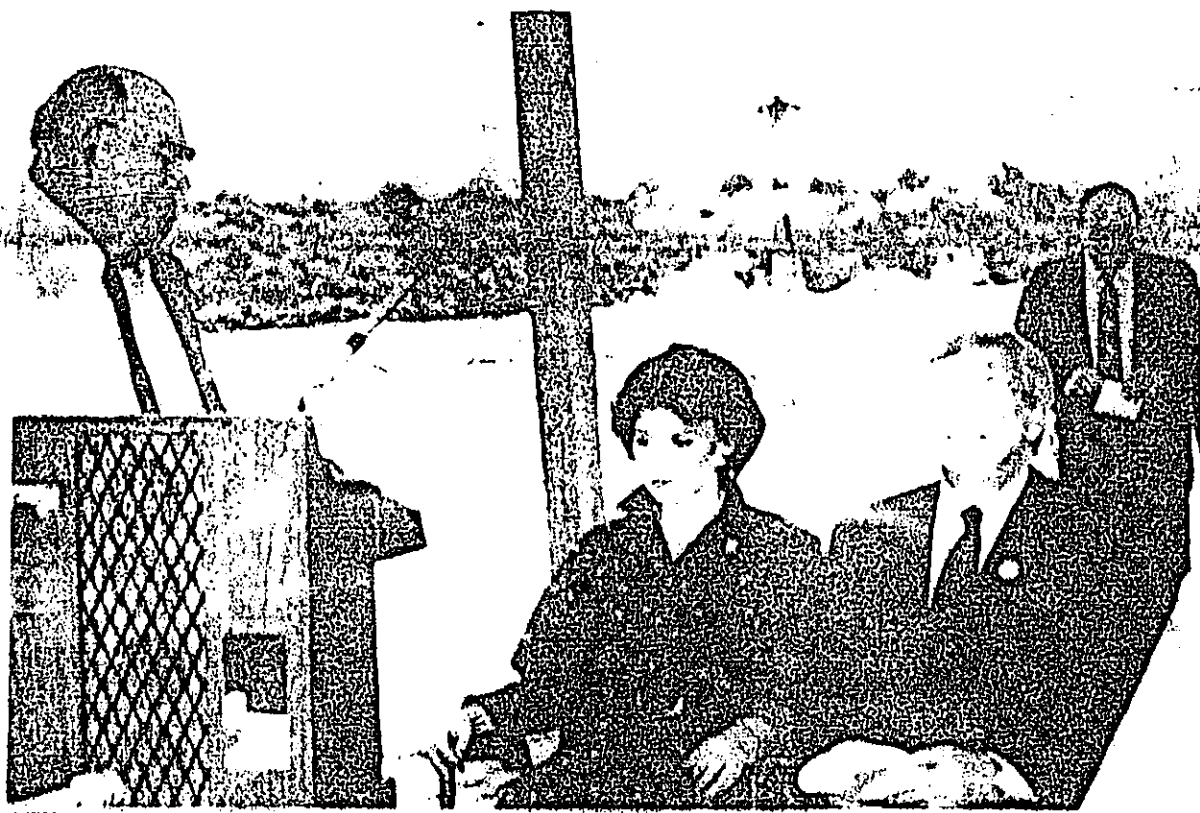

Seton Gala Honors Maralice Shivers

AUSTIN—Maralice Shivers, Texas First Lady for eight years, philanthropist, community leader, wife, mother and grandmother, is being honored for her life accomplishments and for her efforts on behalf of Seton Medical Center. A gala evening of tribute will be held Sunday, Sept. 28, at Austin's newest and most elegant hotel, the Wyndham Northwest.

The \$700-a-person formal dinner-dance will benefit Seton's Neonatal Center and the Seton Central Texas Heart Institute. It is the opening gala for the Wyndham Northwest, Dallas-based developer Transwell Crow whose company recently completed the luxury hotel and adjacent offices-Abbottum office and retail complex, is expected among 200 guests at a seated dinner in the ballroom.

This is the ninth annual gala arranged by the Seton Development Board to raise more than \$750,000 over the years. Previous galas sponsored by the 90 Central Texas women on the board have honored Bob Hope, Steve Allen and Jayne Meadows, and Phil Donahue. Gala Co-Chairs this year are Mrs. William Koen, Jr. and Mrs. Frank Kresover, and Mrs. Albert Tate is board chair.

Mrs. Shivers, widow of three-term Gov. Allan Shivers, has a special interest in the Seton Neonatal Center. The intensive care unit for premature and sick infants from a 10-county region of Central Texas cares for more than 400 babies each year.

"The idea of helping the Neonatal Center touched my heart because of my own experience," said Mrs. Shivers, referring to the loss of a baby in the 1940s. "Now a neonatal center can make a real difference in the lives of premature babies."

Mrs. Shivers helped organize the fund-raising and promotional arm of Seton 10 years ago at the request of then-Seton administrator Sr. Mary Rose McPhoe. "Sr. Mary Rose is so hard to say no to, and I was just doing my part," Mrs. Shivers said modestly. "Of course, the Neonatal Center is such a wonderful cause, and now the gala will benefit the Central Texas Heart Institute, as well."

The Seton Central Texas Heart Institute is the leading center for cardiac diagnosis and treatment in the 10-county region, and its facilities include an 11-bed coronary intensive care unit, 14-bed surgical intensive care unit, 64-bed cardiac care unit, a \$1.2 million special procedure suite, and two special suites for open heart and transplant surgery. Two patients who received new hearts this year at Seton continue to improve following cardiac rehabilitation and after-care at Seton.

Another reason for Mrs. Shivers' dedication to Seton, a Daughters of Charity hospital, is her strong Roman Catholic faith and upbringing. She attended Catholic schools and graduated from Our Lady of the Lake College in San Antonio. "Back in my day, when

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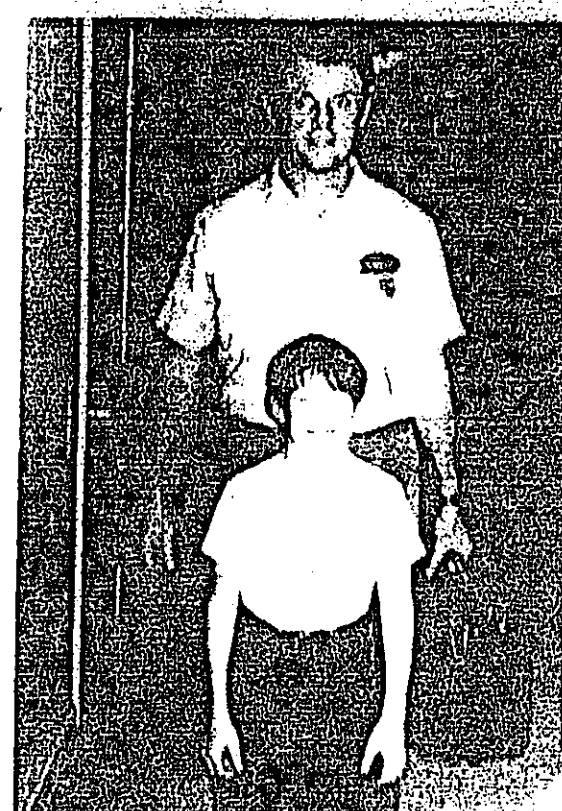

Shopping With Diane

GARDEN TO ORDER: Its time to plant some of your favorite fall crops. Stop by Farmer's Food and Hardware, 600 North Magnolia for seeds and young plants. Seeds are sold in bulk. Their supply includes: turnips, mustard collards, kale, beets, radishes, spinach and carrots. For convenience, young plants are also available. The selection includes collards, broccoli, peppers, cabbage and onions. According to Leslie Hicks, it's also time to plant oats and eye grass. Farmer's Food sells these seeds in 50 pound sacks. While you are there, ask to see the Food All Grain Dispensers. You can also pick up your own. In case you've never planned these fall crops, see in bulk at the following: CARROTS: Carrots, rich in Vitamin A, originated in Afghanistan. The purple carrot vegetable was recorded in the first century by Greek physicians and recommended them for upset stomachs. Further documentation shows that the 13th century carrots had become a favorite of the French and Italian. Two centuries later European botanists recorded red, yellow and purple carrots. Like all root crops, carrots require a fine, well prepared soil. For a 10 to 12 inch carrot, remove stones, sticks, roots and other debris. Carrots grow best in a bed of between 3 and 7 1/2 inches. Plant the seeds 1/2 inch deep in rows 16 to 24 inches apart. Sow 1/2 inch of seeds at a rate of 100 seeds per square foot. Usually one package of seeds will plant 175 square feet. With good results 25 feet of row will yield 25 pounds of carrots. Once planted tamp the soil, then gently water. Keep the bed moist until germination. When carrots reach 2 inches tall then to 1 foot apart. Most carrots reach 6 inches tall then to 2 inches apart. Plant the seeds 1/2 inch deep in rows 16 to 24 inches apart. Sow 1/2 inch of seeds at a rate of 100 seeds per square foot. Usually one package of seeds will plant 175 square feet. With good results 25 feet of row will yield 25 pounds of carrots. Once planted tamp the soil, then gently water. Keep the bed moist until germination. When carrots reach 2 inches tall then to 1 foot apart. Most carrots reach 6 inches tall then to 2 inches apart.

2 cups sliced beets
1 small onion, sliced in rings
1 small green pepper, sliced in rings
Marinate 4 hours
1 cup tomato soup
1 cup sugar
1 cup salad oil
1 cup vinegar
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Cook carrots until tender, set crisp. Drain and cool. Add soup to the pot. Mix the marinade. Pour over vegetables and marinate for 4 hours in refrigerator. Drain. Serve chilled.

SPINACH: If you didn't know that almost half of the world's supply of spinach is grown in Texas, that's right, and most of it is grown in Crystal City, located about 100 miles southwest of San Antonio. In fact, Crystal City houses the largest spinach canning plant in the United States. Spinach was grown in Texas as early as the late 1800's and had become a commercial crop by the early 1900's. The ideal soil for spinach is between 6.0 and 6.5. Sow seeds in a well prepared bed in rows 14 to 18 inches apart. Sow 8 to 10 seeds per foot. Seeds should be planted 1/2 to 3/4 inches deep. Generally 1/2 ounce of seed is required for 25 feet of row. With a good yield each 25 feet of row will produce 10 pounds of spinach. Thin when the seedlings first appear. Later thin to 3 to 6 inches apart. SPINACH SOUFFLE: 2 cups cooked spinach, finely chopped
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1 cup milk
1/2 cup butter in saucepan. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Stir constantly. Remove from heat. Stir in milk. Boil 1 minute. Add spinach. Let cool enough not to burn. Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold into mixture. Pour into buttered dish. Cook in 325 degree oven 25 minutes. Cook until smooth, bubbling. Stir and cool. Beat egg whites. Pour into...

Wallace B. Dally Jr., maintenance construction supervisor at Woodville, counts himself lucky to be head of the Tyler County Maintenance Section. After all, W.B. is a native of Tyler County and a 1962 graduate of Woodville High.

W.B. attended the Southwestern Business University in Houston and started work with the department in Beaumont as a draftsman in the district headquarters. He left the department to work in Houston in 1964, but came home to Tyler County five years later. He went back to work for the department as a laborer on the sign crew and later was assigned to the section office. He became assistant foreman in 1979 and took over as maintenance foreman in 1985.

As assistant foreman, he worked on a program to adapt rest areas to reflect the outstanding natural features of the area. At a rest area on US 287 with rock-rimmed walls and native stone steps, he added a retaining wall on a steep slope, leading to a natural spring. This allowed him to control erosion and to encourage the growth of grasses complementing the native dogwood.

The construction of additional covered picnic arbors with rough-hewn logs in a pleasant encouragement to tourists visiting Tyler County during the annual Dogwood Festival.





Forestry Museum To Broaden Appeal

Lufkin, Texas—The Texas Forestry Museum has launched an effort here to broaden its appeal to a greater segment of the East Texas area.

By establishing the Texas Forestry Museum Society, which will serve as a public support group, the Museum hopes to create a greater public awareness of its exhibits, historical collections and services.

Joe C. Deenan of Dill, president of Temple Forest, Inc., who served as temporary chairman of the new Museum Society, said the Society will work to develop a broad-based membership of individuals, families, corporations and institutions throughout East Texas.

"We want to make the Museum a regional attraction, rather than just a local museum in Lufkin," said Deenan.

Founded in 1976 by the Texas Forestry Association and the Lufkin Kiwanis Club, the Forestry Museum is one of the largest of its kind in the nation. It houses relics and exhibits from the early lumbering days of East Texas, as well as contemporary displays.

Comments Asked On Forest Management Publication

Lufkin, Texas—The public is invited to comment on a draft booklet published by the U.S. Forest Service about how wilderness areas are to be managed in the National Forests in Texas.

Deadline for submitting comments is Oct. 25. "While there is nothing radically new about wilderness operations in the draft booklet, according to Jim Morpheus, Recreation Staff Officer for the U.S. Forest Service in Texas, "it does outline in detail how we plan to manage the five designated wilderness areas."

Morpheus said the booklet, "Wilderness Management Supplement to the Land Management Plan for the National Forests in Texas," took six months to write and will be part of the overall forest plan which is expected to be completed early next year. The forest plan encompasses management of the National Forests in Texas from every aspect including timber, recreation, minerals and special uses, grazing and all other operations on the forest.

The booklet was developed as a result of the Texas Wilderness Act of 1984, which mandated that the wilderness management be outlined for public inspection.

Q: My father inherited 100 acres of land from his mother. He died without a will. Before he died he gave a deed for 10 acres to the three children from his second marriage. There are seven of us from his first marriage who received the rest and divided it among ourselves. We agreed to give our respective 10 acres and the house, however, our three half-brothers will not sign a release because they say they all have money coming to them. Do you have any suggestions?

A: My suggestion would be for you to see an attorney about having your father's estate settled through an administration of the estate. The statute of descent and distribution will control

the disposition of your father's estate because he died without a will. According to the statute of descent and distribution, your father's last will, will pass to all of the children in equal shares. Your stepmother, however, will be entitled to a "life estate" in the house of the land. This means that she would be entitled to live on one-third of the land for the remainder of her life, and then the one-third will pass on to the children.

Q: My fiancé has a 5-year-old son from a previous marriage. How do I keep custody of him if my husband-to-be should die after we are married? Can I adopt? What is involved?

A: In order to keep custody of the

child of your fiancé, you must adopt the child. To adopt the child you must have the written consent of the natural mother of the child. If the natural mother has not been terminated or she sues to adopt which includes a request for involuntary termination of the parent-child relationship, the court must find "improper conduct" on the part of the nonconsenting parent and that the termination would be in the best interest of the child. This is a hard thing to prove.

Since your fiancé is also a parent of

the child, he must join in the petition for adoption. You should consult an attorney about the procedure involved in adopting the child or any possible alternatives.

Q: Can a husband force his wife to sign a deed and not use the husband's name?

A: No. Not without some kind of fraudulent intent.

Q: Based on a will he probated before it became legal? A woman died and left her house to her husband but never had the will probated. He had an only child by his first wife but did not mention the child in the will. Was the sale of the property legal? Could the man who bought the property get a clear title?

A will must be probated before it can be used to convey real property. The estate of a woman who died without a will will be administered by the court. If the man who bought the property is not the child of the first marriage, he may not be able to obtain a deed from the child of the first marriage.

If there is an necessity for administration of the estate, the court may admit the will to probate as a Muniment of Title.

The problem with this may be caused by probating the will. It is possible, or by obtaining a deed from the child of the first marriage.
