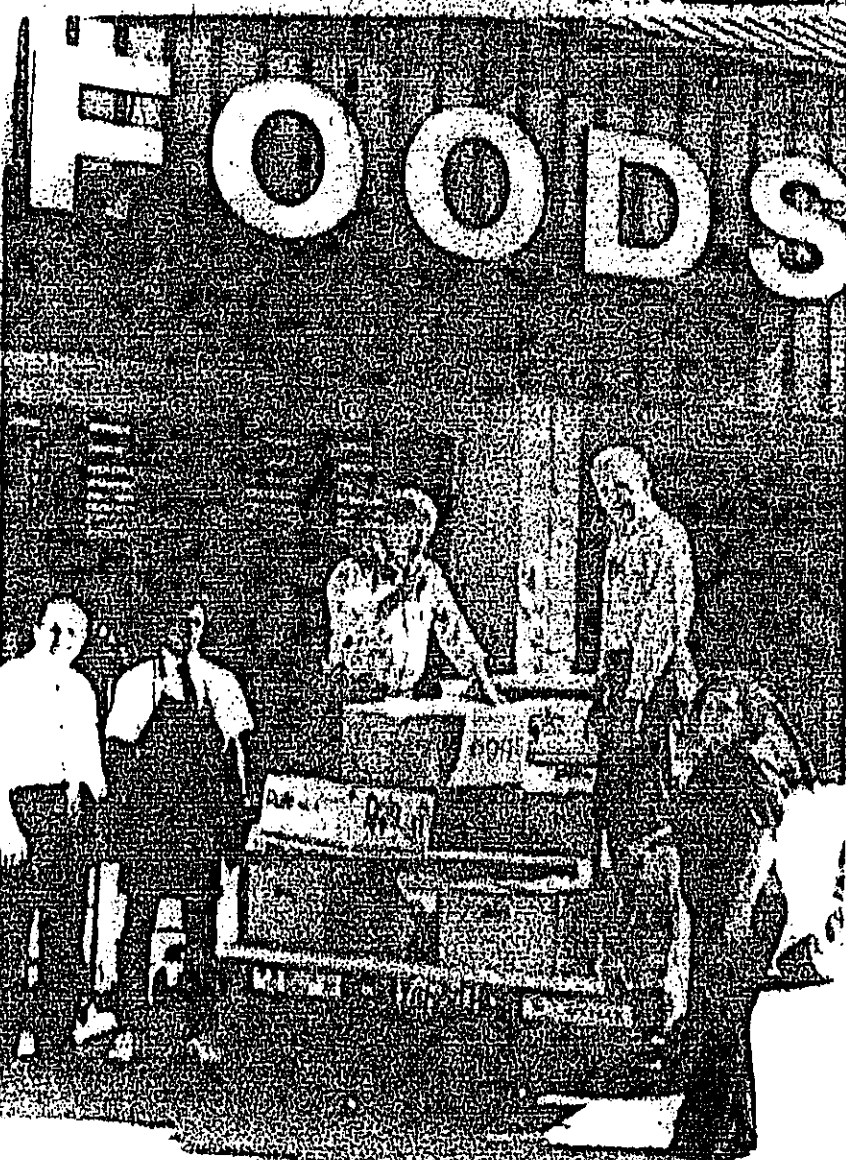

Near Twin Lakes Historical Marker To Be Set

The Tyler County Historical Society will officially dedicate a historical marker to be located two

miles west-south-west of Woodville near Twin Lakes, known as Mooney's Lake in 1909.

The marker will dedicate the area commemorating the Yale Summer Forestry Camp held there in 1909 and will be located on the grounds of the Texas Forest Service Area IV headquarters in Woodville.

as the First Chief Forester of the U.S. from 1895 to 1910.

He was accompanied by members of the newly appointed Yellow Pine Manufacturers Association Conservation Committee, including Yale Forest School Director Henry Solon Graves (1871-1951), and Texas Lumberman John Lewis Thompson (1875-1938). Both Pinchot and Thompson had studied forestry in Europe and advocated the Adoption of Conservation in American Forest lands. Pinchot, whose family

founded the Yale Forestry School in 1900, to mark that this committee meeting was the first accord among foresters and lumbermen.

The group proposed that pine manufacturers support federal and state legislation to discourage clearcutting, assure forest fire prevention, and revise taxation of forest lands. Six years later the state of Texas prescribed that forestry courses be taught at its A&M college, and established a forestry agency, the Texas Forest Service in 1926.

DPS Report: 11 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 11 rural traffic accidents in Tyler County during the month of September, 1986. According to sergeant Roy D. Henry, Supervisor for this Highway Patrol sergeant area, these accidents resulted in 0 deaths and 10 injuries. The total rural traffic accidents for Tyler County for this year is 158, which have resulted in 4 deaths and 33 injuries. The ten counties which comprise highway patrol sub-district 45-81 have had a total of 1884 rural traffic accidents this year, resulting in 67 deaths and 1236 injuries. This compares to 1847 accidents, 68 deaths, and 1152 injuries reported during the same period last year (1985).

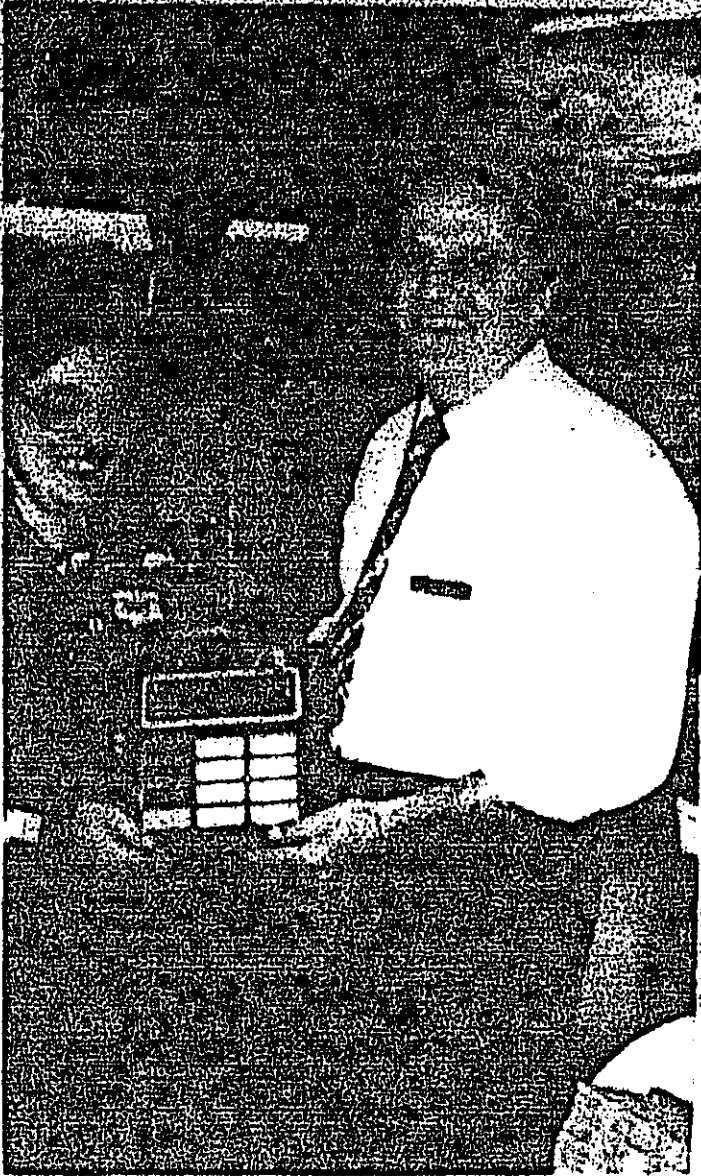

Think back to last October. If you are like most of us, you probably had only a vague notion of what the strange word "sequestration" meant. A year later I would wager that there are very few Texans who aren't familiar with the term meaning "perhaps a few of us even learned how to spell and pronounce it."

Although many people may have grown a bit weary of the festivities surrounding Texas' centennial and a half birthday, no one can deny that this event put the Lone Star State in the national spotlight. Before that attention is diverted from us, however, we have one last opportunity to show the rest of the country that Texas is a dynamic state, committed to shaping its own future. And what better way to prove that fact than by Texas voting in record numbers during the November general elections?

Few people would disagree that this year's elections are especially critical to our state. In light of our difficult economic situation, there is no doubt that the people we elect next month will be charting the future of Texas. Since each of us has a stake in this process, we must be certain our voices are heard by casting our ballot.

However, voting demands responsibility. Many would contend that it is better not to vote than to vote without a firm grasp of the issues. An citizen of this state, we have an obligation to learn about each candidate's platform so that we are able to vote with the conviction of our beliefs.

Question #2 - Is it better to levy taxes from the federal or from the local level?

Collyary #1 - Does it matter, aren't we going to end up paying the bill anyway?

One argument can be made that when taxes are paid locally, there are fewer middlemen to claim a portion of those monies. Additionally, some would say local tax revenue can be monitored more closely by local residents. Theoretically, this allows each of us to have more of a say regarding how funds are spent.

Is this type of control evident in your community? If you answered, "No," speak up at your town's next council meeting. Your elected officials ought to hear from you.

So you probably guessed, there are no right or wrong answers to these questions. This is usually the case when discussing complicated issues. However, I hope this short quiz may have started you thinking. We all need to give these kinds of topics some thought. After all, any constructive act has to begin with an idea. Perhaps something great will come from one of yours.
