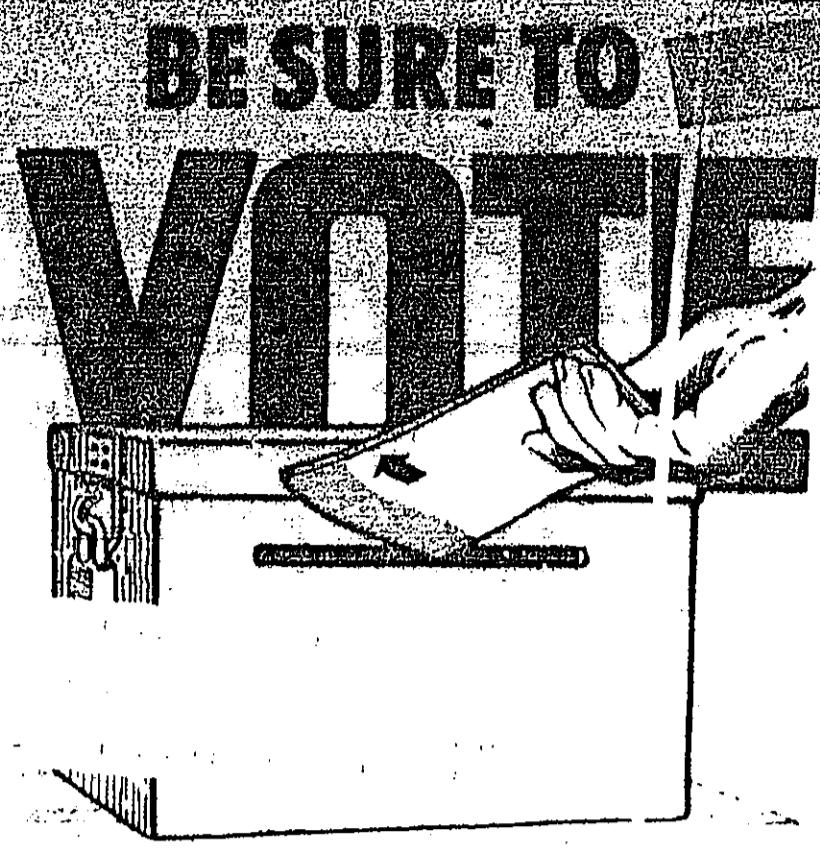

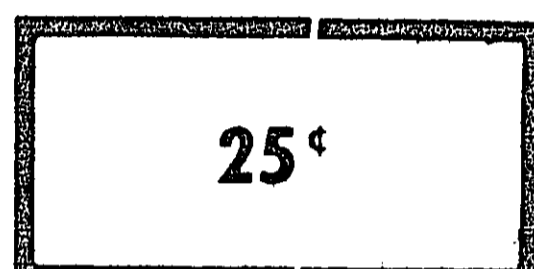

Local MHR Volunteers Honored

Volunteers from the 13-county region served by Deep East Texas Regional MHR were honored at an Oct. 21 banquet at the Lufkin Civic Center. Heat oven to 200 degrees. Divide popped corn between 2 ungreased baking pans, 13 1/2 x 2 1/2 inches. Heat sugar, butter, corn syrup and salt, stirring occasionally, until bubbly around edges. Continue cooking over medium heat 5 minutes.

Remove from heat; stir in soda until foamy. Pour on popped corn; stir until corn is coated. Bake 1 hour, stirring every 15 minutes.

The T-Wheeler pulled something almost as bad last week at a very formal luncheon. Lunches are when you eat with paper napkins. This was a luncheon.

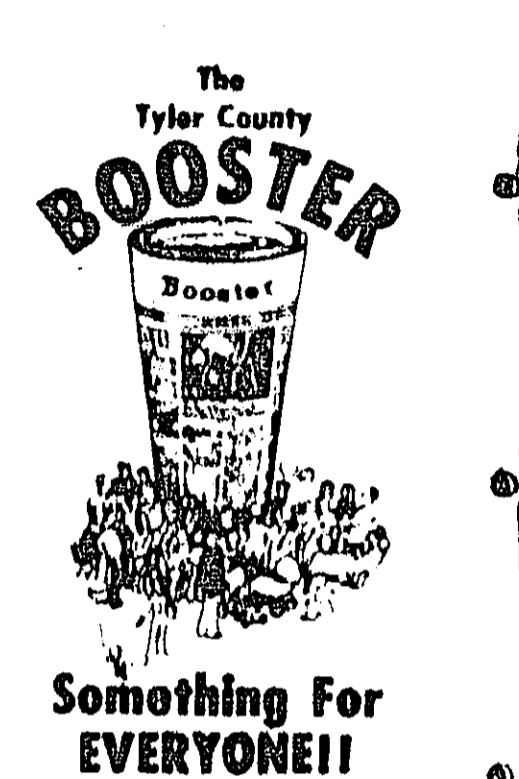

The Long Leaf SCS and Water Conservation District began operation on February 20, 1986, when an appropriate board of directors began work on planning a program and plan of work. The District covers over 700 farms and ranches to plan and install conservation practices.

The Soil Conservation Service provides technical assistance through the District to farmers and ranchers as well as a conservation plan is developed with the landowner and approved by the directors.

The long leaf SCSWD has the same boundaries as Tyler County. The District is headed by a Board of Directors, who are local elected landowners, and serve four-year terms. The directors have the common interest of treating each acre of land according to its needs, and they receive no compensation for their services.

The directors meet regularly on the fourth Tuesday of each month at 10:00 a.m. at the Soil Conservation Service Office at 407 Pine Street in Woodville. The meetings are open to the public, and you are cordially invited to attend.

Much progress has been made in improving our basic soil, water, and wildlife resources since formation of the District. However, more work is needed on proper woodland management, pasture management, land management, and wildlife management. We will continue to work for the betterment of our national resources in Tyler County.

We, the Directors of the Long Leaf SCS and Water Conservation District, wish to take this opportunity to report on the conservation activities and accomplishments in the District this past year. 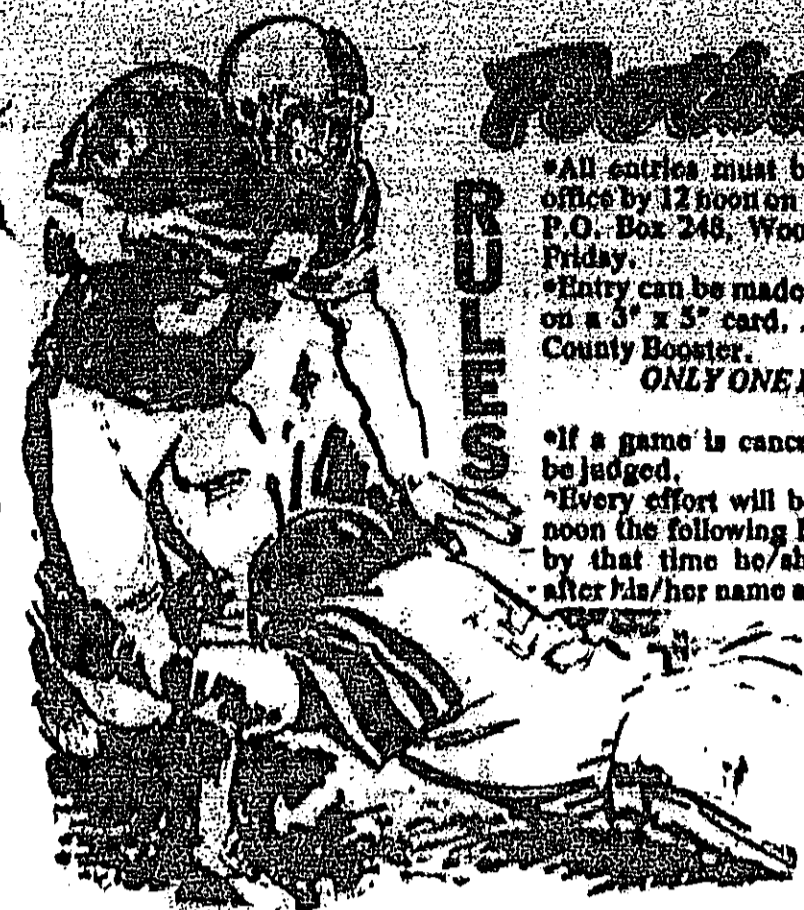

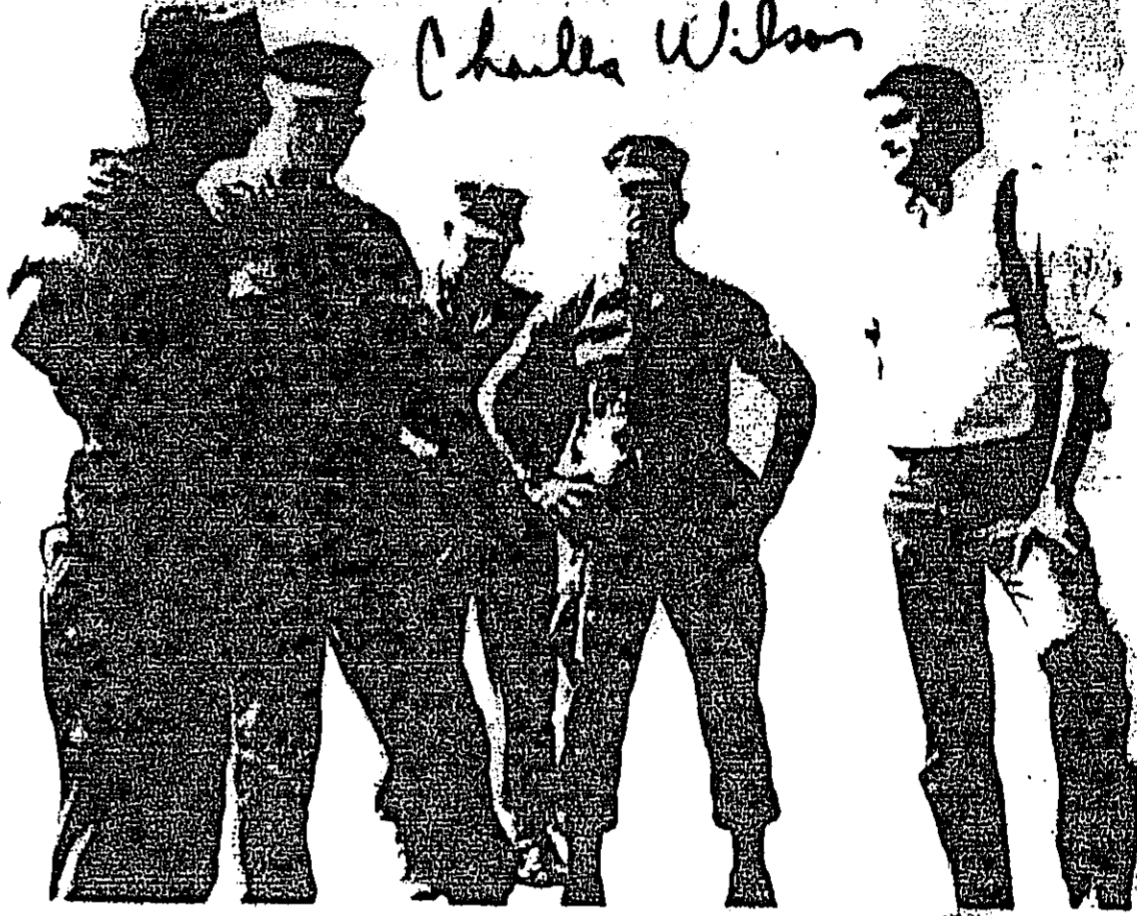

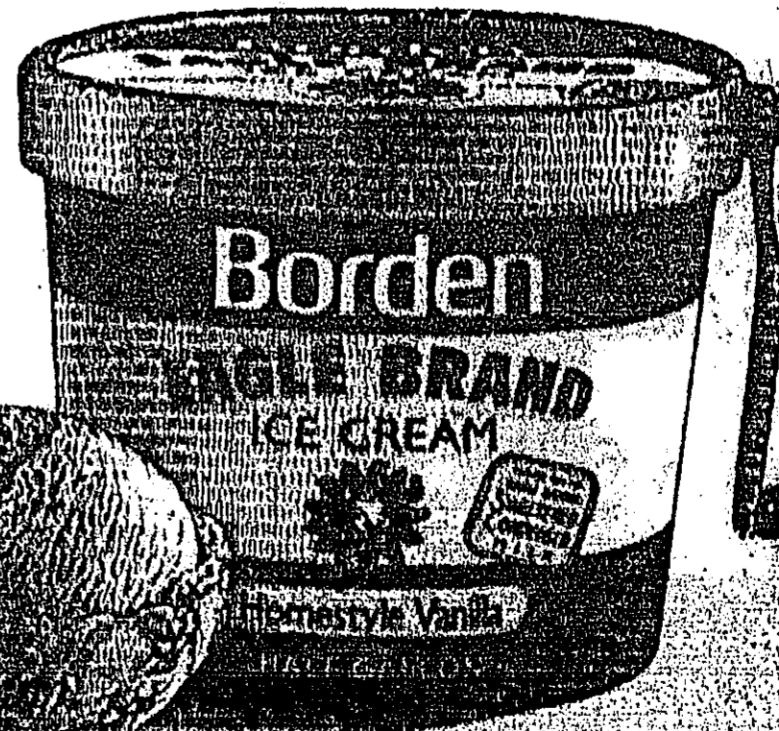
