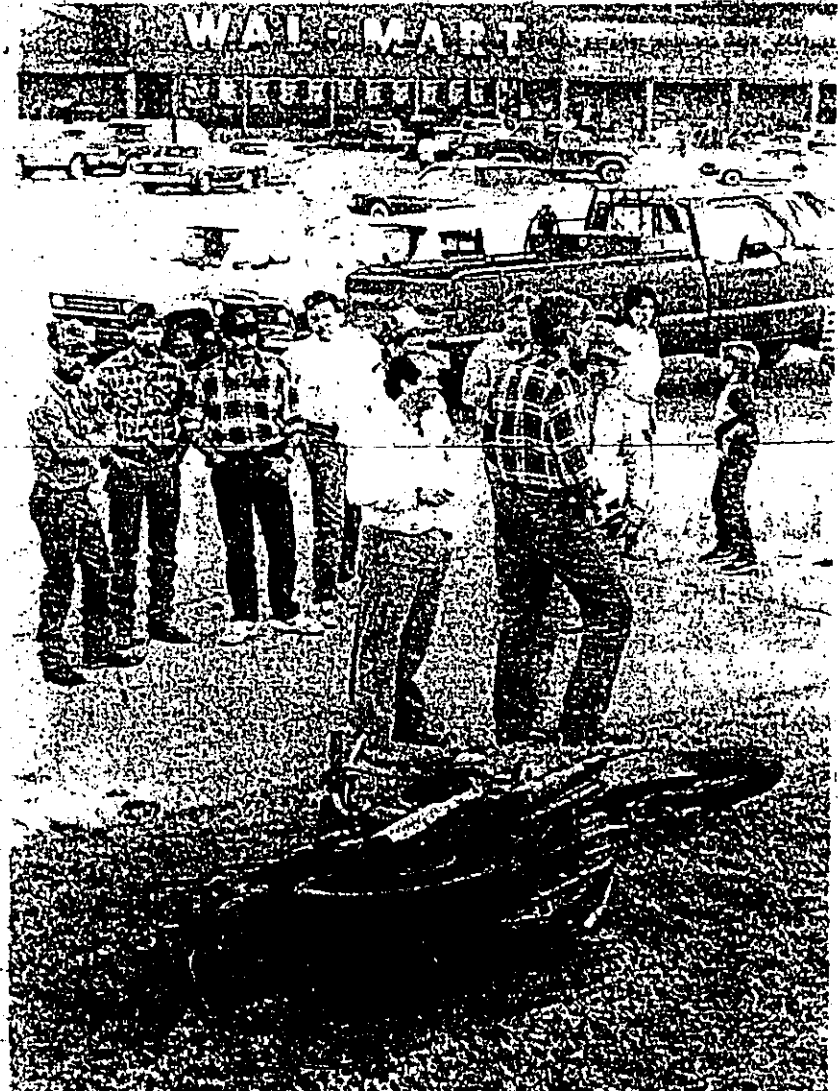

High-Tech Mill To Employ 180

Temple-Eastex, Inc. and Lufkin Industries, Inc. announced today that Lufkin Industries has been awarded a \$1.2 million contract to fabricate equipment for the new Temple-Eastex high-tech lumber mill at Buna in Jasper County.

The new sawmill, which will utilize the latest technology and design in sawmill operations, is expected to be in operation by the end of 1987.

Frank Stevenson, president of Lufkin Industries, said the company will fabricate most of the mill's equipment in the company's structural and machine shops at Lufkin. The equipment includes gearing, log decks, saws, debarkers, conveyors and other components.

"While some items, such as motors and chains, will be purchased from the outside, most of the fabricated steel packages for this project will be manufactured in Lufkin and delivered to Buna," said Stevenson.

Harold Maxwell, group vice-president of Temple-Eastex, said the company was "delighted" that the contract went to an East Texas company.

"Temple-Eastex will benefit because we're getting a responsible supplier with a strong track record for excellence," and East Texas will benefit from the money being spent at home," he said.

Stevenson said the sawmill contract represents the continued diversification of Lufkin Industries.

Warren Board Renews Contract

The Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees voted Tuesday, January 27, to renew Superintendent Joe Woodland's contract for two years. Woodland's salary will remain the same.

The Board listened to a presentation by Gary Adams from Creative Environmental Concepts, an architectural engineering firm from Lufkin, of their design for the new Warren Elementary School. The Board will have a workshop at a later date on the proposed new school building.

Board Member John Long stated that he had received many calls from Fred parents who were concerned that Fred Elementary might be consolidated with Warren Elementary when the new school is built.

According to Superintendent Woodland, "The purpose of this meeting tonight was to discuss a new Warren Elementary School and we are not planning on bringing Fred to Warren."

Board Member Walter McPherson asked that the Board reconsider the policy that required teachers to receive permission from the Superintendent before taking a second job. McPherson wanted the school to have the authority to refuse to let a teacher take a second job that might be considered immoral. According to school attorney Jerry Hatton, "The screening will have to be across the board... everybody who has a side job will have to be approved."

The Board gave instructions for Hatton to get the recommendation of the Texas Association of School Boards and for the Teacher Liasion Committee to come up with a recommendation. The policy will be discussed again at the next Board Meeting.

The Board approved a trip to Mexico for Warren Spanish students June 3-10 contingent upon the fact that all legal papers necessary for the trip are in order. Students will be visiting Mexico City and Acapulco. Ms. Walker, the Spanish teacher, is in charge of the trip.

Hryhorchuk Settlement Under Board 'Gag' Rule

According to Jerry Hatton, Attorney for the Warren Independent School District, "It is my understanding that the Hryhorchuk case has been settled." When asked the amount of the settlement, Hatton said that the amount would not be disclosed to the public because of a confidentiality clause agreed to be both parties. When questioned about the legality of keeping the amount of the settlement from the public since taxpayer funds were used to pay attorneys for the negotiations, Hatton replied, "It is legal and it is not unusual in cases like this. We did what we felt was best for the school district."

Board Members are under a self-imposed "gag order" not to discuss the case or the terms of the settlement.

Area Agency On Aging Seeking Volunteers

The Deep East Texas Area Agency on Aging is looking for volunteers to participate in the initiation of the Consumer Housing Information Service for Seniors (CHISS) program in the Deep East Texas Area. CHISS is designed to help older consumers to improve their housing situation and is sponsored by the American Association for Retired Persons (AARP) in Washington. The idea is that more and more older Americans are remaining in their homes after retirement, some 70% as opposed to other alternatives. The purpose of CHISS is to address the problems that some of these homeowners may be facing.

Shopping With Diane

Blueberries are native to the United States and grow wild from Alaska to Florida. In the early days of this country they were gathered and enjoyed by American Indians who later taught the settlers how to harvest and prepare them.

The rabbiteye blueberry, *Vaccinium ashei*, thrives in the south and southeastern United States. It flourishes in the river valleys of Florida and Georgia. It was only recently that blueberry production began in East Texas. The first documented planting was in Bama in 1967. The following year a planter was completed in Magnolia Springs. In 1971 a third was made in Overton.

Today, blueberry production is becoming an important commercial crop in East Texas. Whether you want to explore the possibilities of a large planting or want just a few plants for home use, drop by Whispering Pines Nursery on Highway 287 and talk to owners Clarence and Evelyn Schima. They carry varieties especially suited to this area, including Climax and delfino. The plants are available in one gallon, two gallon, and five gallon sizes.

According to Clarence, one of the reasons rabbiteye blueberries are suited to our area is because they require a light, well drained, acid soil. In fact, sands and sandy loams are ideal if the pH is between 4.0 and 5.0. By the way, this variety is called "rabbiteye" because the immature berries are a pink color which resembles the eyes of domestic white rabbits.

One of the major drawbacks to growing blueberries on a large scale in East Texas is that although the average annual rainfall is sufficient, its distribution pattern is not. During summer droughts blueberries must be watered. Large scale operations are irrigated.

When you are purchasing your plants remember to buy two varieties. Blueberries cross-pollinate. For home planting you can fertilize with azalea food. For more information on growing blueberries in East Texas stop by the County Extension office in the Courthouse and talk to Bob, Janie, or Diane. They have several brochures on the subject and all of the materials free.

HARVESTING KNOW-HOW

1. Blueberries turn from pink to a waxy blue as they mature and ripen. Harvest them when they are a light, powdery, gray-blue color. They will not continue to ripen once they are picked.
2. Store in the refrigerator for up to two weeks. Wash just prior to use.
3. Blueberries freeze well for up to 12 months. Do not wash before freezing.

ENJOYING THE ROUNTY

Blueberries are delicious, nutritious, and low in calories. They contain Vitamins A and C, calcium, phosphorus, and potassium. Eat them as snacks or add them to fruit salads, pancakes, muffins, or jams. Toss them into punch or blend them with vanilla ice cream. Be generous. They contain a mere 84 calories per cup.

The following recipes are from The Adventures of Buckaroo Berry, a Blueberry Cookbook by the Texas Blueberry Growers Association.

ROYAL BLUEBERRY SALAD

- 2 1/2 c. fresh blueberries
- 2 pkgs. orange-pineapple Jello
- 2 c. boiling water
- 1 c. cold water
- 1/4 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 2 c. cantaloupe, diced
- 8 oz. cream cheese
- 1/2 c. sugar

Dissolve Jello in boiling water; add cold water and refrigerate until partially thickened. Stir in blueberries and cantaloupe. Pour into mold or serving bowl and refrigerate until firm. Whip cream cheese with sugar and lemon juice; spread on salad just before serving. Garnish with blueberries.

BLUEBERRY CRINKLE

- 4 c. fresh blueberries
- 1 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 2 Tbsp. flour
- 1 1/4 c. oats (uncooked)
- 1/2 c. butter or margarine
- 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 c. firmly packed brown sugar

Sprinkle lemon juice over blueberries. Mix sugar and flour and add to the blueberries, mixing to coat berries. Spread into an 8 inch square baking pan. Combine oats, butter, cinnamon and sugar, mixing until crumbly. Sprinkle over blueberries. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes at 375 degrees. Serve warm with whipped cream or ice cream.

BLUEBERRY-APPLE BUTTER

- 6-8 lb. sliced apples
- 8 c. fresh blueberries
- 4 c. sugar
- 1 Tbsp. allspice

In a large pan, cover apples with water and cook until soft. Press through a sieve. Mix 8 cups of the apple pulp, berries, sugar and allspice together. Cook until smooth and thick. Pour hot into sterilized jars. Seal. Process in boiling water bath for 10 minutes.


