Country Kitchen

Are you tired of the same meat and potatoes menu day after day? Would you like to cut down on food cost as well as fat in your diet? The solution can be well balanced combinations of foods which provide the essential amino acids needed to make new protein. Some vegetable sources, such as beans, seeds, and grains, contain excellent protein when eaten together. Eggs and low-fat dairy products are also good sources.

Some helpful hints when cooking dried beans are:

1. To improve flavor add herbs and spices to simmering mixture.
2. Avoid oversteering - it can cause mushiness.
3. Use any leftover beans - lock for soups or stews.
4. Cook a large enough quantity of dried beans to freeze some for future recipes.

The following recipes are taken from The American Heart Association Cookbook, which can be found in your local library.

- Hearty Baked Macaroni**
1 16oz. can tomato puree
1 cup water
2 tablesp. Italian Seasonings
1 tablesp. garlic powder
1 1/2 lbs. low-fat cottage cheese
1/2 tablesp. onion powder
1 8oz. package Elbow Macaroni, uncooked
4oz. mozzarella cheese, sliced
In a small bowl combine tomato puree, water, seasonings, and 1/2 tablesp. garlic powder.
In another bowl, combine cottage cheese, onion powder, and remaining garlic powder.
Spray with vegetable cooking spray a 9 x 9 x 2 inch casserole dish and spoon in 1/2 of tomato mixture. Layer 1/2 of macaroni, all of cottage cheese mixture, and 1/2 of tomato mixture. Add remaining tomato mixture. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Uncover and top with mozzarella cheese. Bake uncovered until cheese melts, about 5 minutes. Let stand 10 minutes then serve.

 - Quick and Easy Baked Beans**
2 16oz. cans vegetarian baked beans in tomato sauce
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 tablesp. molasses or brown sugar
2 tablesp. dry mustard
2 tablesp. margarine
1 cup tomato sauce
2 16oz. cans barbecue beans
Combine all ingredients and place in a 3qt. casserole dish. Bake at 350 degrees uncovered for 45 to 60 minutes.
Yield: 24 servings
Approx. calories/ serv: 100
 - Lentil Spaghetti Sauce**
1 med. onion, chopped
1 clove garlic, minced
1/2 cup oil
1 1/2 cup dried lentils, washed
1 dried hot red pepper, crumbled*
Freshly ground black pepper
4 cups beef broth
1/2 tablesp. dried basil, crumbled
1/4 tablesp. dried oregano, crumbled
1 16oz. can tomatoes
1 16oz. can tomato paste
1 tablesp. vinegar
Sautie onion and garlic in oil for 5 minutes. Add lentils, red pepper, pepper, and broth. Cover and simmer for 30 minutes. Add remaining ingredients and simmer uncovered about 1 hour, stirring occasionally.
*If leave the red pepper out.
Yield: 12 servings
Approx. calories/ serv: 150 (or 250 with 1/2 cup pasta)

Now Mr. Bush is kind of forced into saying that he backs the President all the way, except in a few things.


He probably also knows that darn few Vice-Presidents have ever been elected to the White House, and right now the odds look long.



Spotlight on health

Every month, 36,000 ailing U.S. veterans are turned away from Veterans Administration (VA) hospitals that just don't have room for them.


In the last two years, says Veterans of Foreign Wars Commander-in-Chief John S. Staum, "thirteen thousand VA hospital beds have been eliminated. Gone! In 1986 hospital and nursing care beds will not be the 30,000 mandated by Congress. There will be only 88,666 beds. And, the government's Office of Management and Budget has announced that it intends to eliminate 8,000 nursing care personnel by 1990. Right now there are 8,000 fewer health-care personnel than the VA medical system must have to operate properly. Many veterans will be dumped on the failing Medicare-Medicaid system, straining taxpayers."

A recent Veterans Administration report entitled "Caring For the Aging Veteran" pointed out that where today there are three million veterans over age 65 there will be nine million by the year 2000, or 37 percent of all living veterans. To provide adequate care, the report estimates a budget of \$30 billion to \$41 billion is needed for 154,000 hospital beds and 114,000 nursing home care beds. None of this appears likely to be forthcoming.
