## Chester I.S.D. Eyes \$40,000

A contingency grant in the amount of \$40,000 has been offered by the T.L.L. Temple Foundation to the Chester Independent School District for new classroom construction. Award of the grant is contingent on the District securing the balance of the \$322,000 construction cost. Scheduled for completion by September of this year, the building project includes classrooms for sixth, seventh and eighth graders, and physical education facilities for grades kindergarten through 12. CISD Superintendent Gary Gazaway said funding for the project will require \$82,000 more than is presently available. "We are pleased the T.L.L. Temple Foundation has offered this contingency grant. We hope the additional \$42,000 can be secured from local private entities within the District," Gazaway said. The improvements to the District's facilities are mandated requirements of the Texas Education Agency. The T.L.L. Temple Foundation makes grants to public, nonprofit, organizations and government agencies throughout East Texas and was established by members of the Temple family in honor of the founder of the Southern Pine Lumber Company.

## Atom Smasher May Be Key to Economic Recovery in Texas

AUSTIN—Words like oil, rig, tool pusher and gusher are familiar to most Texans. They are terms frequently heard in the Texas oil fields, the mainstay of our economy for much of the 20th century. Less familiar to Texans are words like quarks and leptons. They may well be the basic building blocks of the atom, and they may well be the foundation for the revival of our sluggish Texas economy. Texas is a leading contender for what may be the largest research project for the remainder of this century. The name of the project—the Superconducting Supercollider—sounds as though it is straight out of the pages of a Buck Rogers script. That research effort—prized by scientists and now supported by the Reagan administration—will, in brief, explore the basic components of the atom. The effort involves the construction of a circular, 52-mile-long underground tunnel. Atoms, propelled by gargantuan magnets, will be sent racing inside the tunnel at opposite directions and at a pace approaching the speed of light. The atoms eventually will be steered on a collision path. Scientists hope that the particles that result from that collision will provide insights into the fundamental nature of matter, and perhaps even the origin of the universe. Federal officials indicate the project will have an annual operating budget of \$200 million; and that the research facility will employ up to 3,000 workers. The facility could cost as much as \$6 billion to construct, providing jobs for thousands of workers. The number of spinoff research projects for universities and colleges is mind-boggling. Now that I have summarized the work of the project, let me summarize my feelings about it: Texas wants that project located in Texas. Texas needs that project located in Texas. Texas deserves that project. I spent four days in Washington, D.C., during the latter part of February. I met with President Reagan, Vice President George Bush, top Cabinet officers and leaders of our state's congressional delegation. At each meeting this important project was discussed. They now know, I assure you, where I stand on this important subject. Texas, by all accounts, is one of the three front-runners for the project. Unlike the other top contenders, our state does not have a major federal research facility. That point was hammered continually during my trip to the nation's capital. The Texas National Research Laboratory Commission, established during the 1985 Legislature, will coordinate the search for Texas land suitable for this machine. The nine-member committee, which failed during 1986 to have a single productive session, is now being given new life, new membership and new instructions to work diligently. We, as Texans, need to pull together to offer the federal government an attractive package that will ensure our selection as the site for the Superconducting Supercollider. It does not matter whether the research facility finds a home in West Texas, East Texas or elsewhere. What matters is that we get the project, and do the legwork necessary to see that we reach our goal.

## Texas Metals Requests Industrial Gas Rate

Woodville, City Council heard a request from the Texas Metals Company here for a lower gas rate in order to accommodate a planned expansion which could easily double their average monthly 3 million cu. feet of gas they currently use. According to George Morgan, Jr., chairman of the Board, "We hope to add more forging equipment and we're fighting for our lives competitively. We burn gas to heat steel and we hope to increase what we're using. We've got to," he emphasized.

Morgan suggested the City examine industrial gas rate figures in Jasper and in other area cities. Keller, Aluminum's Will Woollen, who was also present at the Council meeting said his firm plans also to increase usage because of the installation of a Paint Sprayer System. "Our gas consumption will increase by 60 percent," he said. "We are changing from an infrared to a gas fired oven." S.E.T. Fabricators International President, Ken Ballard said his company will also increase their usage and plan expansion also. Ballard said his company began with six employees only a few years ago and now has 72. Texas Metals Company officials said they hope to move up in Woodville soon, a heat treating unit, a machine shop and a shipping department. "Quite frankly, we're struggling with the economy and we need help in being more competitive," he said. "We can give examples of a difficult startup for the company because of poor conditions here weather in 1984," he said. "If the Company has about 3 million dollars in inventory, while we have about 100,000 dollars in inventory," he said. "We want to be competitive."

## Shopping With Diane

No matter how well planned and manicured a garden or landscape, it can always be accentuated and improved by a bird bath, statue, bench, or other garden accessory. Besides adding aesthetic appeal, these features are often useful. Bird baths attract insect eating birds; benches can turn an uninviting garden into a personal retreat.

Always choose accessories that are appropriate for the particular garden setting. Remember that they are focal points and should enhance, not distract. Plants are often replaced each year; fixtures are permanent so select items that are well made and of good quality.

Figures are especially attractive in small gardens where they easily catch the eye. They are also always appropriate in formal setting, whether large or small. Usually one carefully chosen and placed accessory creates unity, to many crowded into one garden creates confusion.

### Bird Baths, Bird Feeders, Bird Houses

Birds feed on insects and are, therefore, beneficial to the garden. One of the best ways to attract them there, especially in hot weather, is by providing water. And, one of the most attractive ways to provide water is in a bird bath.



Where cats are present, position these popular garden accessories in an open area. Otherwise, tuck them in a sheltered nook and surround them with lush, moisture-loving plants and ferns. For the small garden the average height should be 2 1/2 feet.

Keep bird baths spotlessly clean and full of fresh water.

Shop for your bird bath at B & M Nursery in Warren or at Wal-Mart in Woodville.

Nesting sites, or bird houses, also encourage birds to the garden. Each kind of bird has specific nesting box requirements so make sure you select a box suitable for birds in your area.

Bird houses are available at B & M Nursery in Warren and Gardner's Greenery and Gifts in Colmesneil. Feeding stations are another way to attract birds. Place them out of the reach of cats, squirrels, and other enemies. When secured to poles, position a collar of tin several feet above the ground. Keep the feeders stocked with sunflower and other seeds, sliced apple, and other favorite foods. Feeders are available at B & M Nursery in Warren, Freeman's True Value in Colmesneil and at Sullivan's, Farmers Feed and Hardware, Whispering Pines Nursery, and Wal-Mart in Woodville.



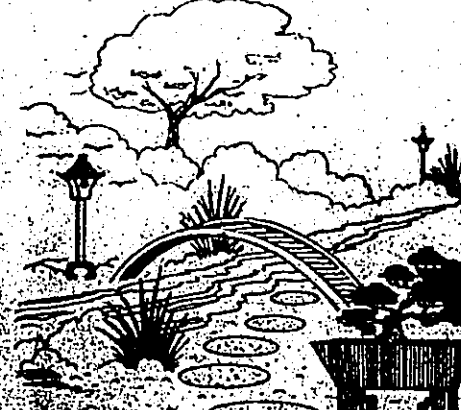
### Statues, Figures and Vases

Statues, either human or animal, add an imaginative and welcoming charm to the garden. They should be selected carefully to evoke a particular mood or theme. Place large figures at the end of a vista or near a wall. Place small figures, such as dogs, near entryways. Place cats on walls or terraces. Ducks and birds rest appropriately near pools or fountains.

Large vases can be permanent or movable. Use them to highlight a gate or pair them beside a doorway. Fill them with geraniums or other flowering annuals. Shop for garden sculpture at B & M Nursery in Warren. According to Mrs. Doris Best, owner, several concrete sculptures are available including deer, dogs, cats, ducks, and birds. She also offers concrete flower pots and planters.

### Paths and Walkways

Paths and walks link parts of the garden together or make the garden more accessible to the house. They add to the overall design of the garden and accentuate the plants along their edges.



Paths and walks can be straight or curved or they can meander throughout the garden. Whatever their form they should be inviting.

In full sun where there is little traffic, grass makes an attractive walk. Paths can also be made from brick, flagstones, concrete, gravel, pine needles, or wood chips.

Stepping stones are appropriate in formal or informal settings. Place them in straight lines or let them curve and wind through the garden landscape. Stepping stones can be made from smooth pebbles or concrete. They should always have a smooth upper surface and should not be smaller than 1 1/2 feet in diameter.

Space the stones approximately 18 inches apart at regular intervals. Set them with a thin layer of sand underneath so they will be stable. Press soil around their edges.

Shop for stepping stones at Freeman's Concrete Works in Colmesneil, Wal-Mart in Woodville, and B & M Nursery in Warren.

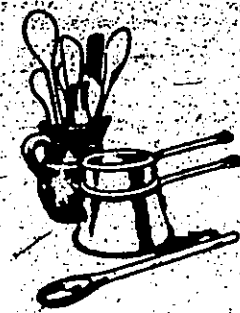

1 c. raw cashews  
1/4 c. sesame seeds  
1/4 c. bran  
1/4 c. pure maple syrup  
1/4 tsp. pure vanilla  
1 c. raisins  
1/4 c. water  
Mix dry ingredients in large flat roasting pan. Mix liquids and stir into dry ingredients. Bake at 350 degrees from 30 minutes, stirring twice during baking. Remove and let cool. Store in covered containers. Yield: 10 servings.

3 tablespoons butter or margarine  
3 beaten eggs  
1/4 c. whole wheat flour  
1/4 c. Skim Milk  
1/4 tsp. Vanilla

Preheat oven to 450 degrees, melt butter in skillet. Beat eggs in mixing bowl and stir in flour, milk, vanilla, and nutmeg. Pour batter into skillet and place in oven. 1 1/4 tsp. baking powder  
In large bowl soak oatmeal in milk for 1 hour. Then add melted margarine, egg, brown sugar, and raisins. Stir until well mixed. In medium size bowl mix dry ingredients together. Add to oatmeal mixture. Stir only to moisten the flour. Batter should be lumpy. Line muffin tins with paper liners or spray with vegetable cooking spray, and fill tins 3/4 full with batter. Bake at 400 degrees for 15-20 minutes or until done.




