Meyers: 'Mr. East Texas'


Cited for his ability "to bring people together" as exemplified in the west Economic Summit held in Beaumont. That cities Mayor Maury Meyers was chosen "Mr. East Texas" by the Dogwood Festival Directors.

Maury Meyers, mayor of Beaumont from 1978 to 1982, was called back to that office last April - with an 85.2 per cent majority vote - to lead Beaumont out of the most devastating crisis in the city's history.

Plagued by unemployment, declining population, businesses closing, a crippling loss of \$20 million in municipal funds and a widespread sense of frustration and malaise, Beaumont turned to leadership to a former mayor whose terms had been characterized by enthusiasm, vitality and unprecedented progress.

Maury Meyers became mayor in April, 1978. Upon completion of his first two-year term, he was reelected with 83.4 per cent of the votes cast in the 1980 election. At the end of his second term in 1982, he did not seek reelection but returned to private life to devote full time to the affairs of his business as president of Accurate Business Machines, Inc. But the Meyers' years in city government had changed the face of Beaumont and the character of the community, with more improvements in more areas than any like period in the city's history. Those years saw completion of Beaumont's largest capital improvements program, including a new City Hall.

for design and construction of the facilities which, when completed, will be owned by the Corps.

The Southwestern Power Administration, U.S. Department of Energy will sell the electrical energy produced to SRMPA for distribution to its customers in Jasper, Liberty and Livingston, Texas and Vinton, Louisiana and reimburse the Corps for operation and maintenance of the facilities.

The Town Bluff Hydropower Project involves a \$20,000,000 modification to the existing B.A. Steinhagen Dam. It will have two 3,000 kilowatt generators with the capability of producing 35,900,000 kilowatts of electricity per year.

Contracts for fabrication of the turbines and construction of the powerhouse have been awarded by the Corps. The turbine contract was awarded to Dominion Bridge Sulzer, Inc., Quebec, Canada, for \$4,364,826 and the powerhouse construction went to LEM Construction Company, Inc., of Stafford, Texas for \$10,707,260. Work associated with construction of switching stations and transmission lines will be done by SRMPA and has not yet been started. Present schedules call for the project to be operational by spring of 1989.



age citizen input in community affairs.

On a broader scale, Meyers' efforts to rejuvenate Beaumont have focused directly on the problems of economic recovery and the creation of more jobs. These efforts resulted in formation of the "World's Largest Economic Development Committee," consisting of Beaumont residents from all walks of life, based on Meyers' idea that "everyone has a part to play in economic development."

A recent "Economic Summit Conference" in Beaumont's Civic Center was attended by some 5,000 Beaumonters representing a cross section of the city's population, organizations and institutions for a program to whip up enthusiasm and start the come back effort to improve the economy, looking toward a second Economic Summit in eight months to take stock of the results.

From his office as mayor, he is founding chairman of Someplace Texas, Inc., a private non-profit organization spearheading an innovative approach to economic development on a regional basis.



Some of us remember the Senator Howard Baker from Tennessee who asked the famous question at the Nixon Watergate hearings:

"What did you know, and when did he know it?"




