Group Petitions Council For Hwy 69 Traffic Light

A request for a Hwy 69 traffic light was backed up by over 1,000 petition signatures submitted to the Woodville City Council Monday at their regular meeting. The council heard an appeal from three residents who live nearby the intersection who asked the council to "do something" to reduce the traffic hazard which they say exists at the intersection. One of the women present lost a relative in a traffic accident there some months ago. Making the appeal personally on behalf of the petitioners were: Mrs. Gladys Powell, Libby Doss and Dessa Walker.

The council had invited the Texas State Department of Highways District Engineer - Franklin Young to present evidence as to what his departments recommendations would be regarding the problem. Young reported to those present at the council meeting that "Speed signs do not control traffic...enforcement does." "Whatever speed is posted should be enforced."

Young also told the audience that statistics have shown that from 30 to 45 days after a traffic light is installed...that an accident is sure to happen."

Young blamed "18-Wheelers" as the worst speed offenders in small cities saying "They crowd and go as fast as they are permitted."

Young, who was with Resident Highway Department Engineer Paul Cook from Jasper said he considered, "The City of Woodville and the Highway Department to be in a partnership in correcting the problem." Young suggested that a 30 day survey be made to monitor speeds and strictly enforce traffic through the area. "We need a concentrated effort to enforce the existing speeds." Young told the group present that a spe-

cial exception was necessary to install a light but, he added, "whatever we do lets not create more of a hazard."

Young asked the council to do, "An indepth traffic engineering study...then we would like to come back to the council to ask for whatever exceptions were necessary."

"We need to proceed but with tougher enforcement" said Mayor Tom Knapp.

"We can solve any problem we have in a partnership atmosphere," Young concluded.

In other city business the council passed an ordinance limiting bow and arrow use within city limits and appointed Mayor Tom Knapp to the fireman's pension board.

City manager Walt Davis reported "very disappointing news on the gas and water system" saying that "The City was hopeful of getting a EDA Grant for the installation of those necessary lines, but,

Davis reported "Prisons are not privately owned and do not qualify."

Davis said his office would continue to research possibilities for raising the \$4 million necessary for the project


