Silver Haired Legislature

Vote Is May 24

May 24th is election day for candidates to the second Silver-Haired Legislature, with absentee voting to be held during the week of May 16 to 20. Both absentee and regular election day ballots will be cast at the Senior Citizen's Centers in the county. Elected representatives to the Silver-Haired Legislature will meet at the capitol in Austin September 19-21, 1988. The issues they will be considering are expected to influence Texas legislation concerning senior citizens during the 1989 session of the regular legislature.

The two candidates who have filed for election from District II* Jasper, Polk and Tyler Counties, are Frances H. Easley and Lenert H. Tiemann, both candidates being from Jasper. Election judges from District II are Eddie Dell Johnson or designee from Polk, Sue Saul from Jasper and Mr. E. George from Tyler County. Robert Doolittle of Onalaska is the retiring Silver-Haired Legislator from District II. Traditional Jewelry Is Hand-Made Here

Heritage Village Jewelry Features Master Craftsman And Live Demonstration

When jeweler, John Killam, found himself devoting most of his time to the business end of the jewelry business he owned in Northern California rather than in the design and creation of sterling silver jewelry, he closed two stores and sold the third and moved back to Texas.

Joining his parents and brother at Warren, he started working on a wholesale jewelry line, when he suddenly realized that there wasn't another jeweler capable of designing and producing custom jewelry, sizing and repairing, within 40 miles.

About that time, he began reading with interest the plans of the Tyler County Heritage Society, which had recently purchased Heritage Village, and their desire to attract artisans, who worked in old art forms, to open shops within The Village.

Since John had worked a great deal with the old 'lost wax' method of jewelry design and especially enjoyed demonstrating and explaining his work to others, he felt eminently qualified to be part of the historical and educational purposes of the Society in its operation of Heritage Village.

A graduate of Westbury High School in his native Houston, John attended San Jacinto College before heading to Mexico

Peach Tree Village Is Rich In History

One of the most interesting and historically significant sites in Tyler County is Peach Tree Village, where the great Indian and pioneer trails once crossed, a few miles Northeast of the present town of Chester.

In the late 1700's, the Alabama Indians made their headquarters here, calling their village "Ta-Ku-La", which means "peach tree."

With the coming of the white settlers, the Indians withdrew, making room for one of the most influential men in Texas History, John Henry Kirby, who was born at Peach Tree in 1860.

It was here that Kirby, working on father's farm, attracted the attention of a young Woodville lawyer named Bronson Cooper, who became his mentor. Kirby attended Professor Crow's school in Woodville, Southwestern University briefly, then studied law under Mr. Cooper, who later became a state senator and U.S. Congressman.

During his service as secretary to Senator Cooper, Kirby became interested in the timber industry, and when Eastern in-

dustrialists approached Cooper looking for someone to look after their newly purchased ranch property on the Neches River, Kirby took the job and soon convinced them that timber was more profitable than livestock.

That was the beginning of what was to be a long and illustrious career in the timber, railroad and oil business that took Kirby and his bride to Houston in 1890, where they remained the rest of their lives.

Kirby, however, never forgot his roots in Tyler County and returned as often as possible to Peach Tree Village, where in 1912 he built a magnificent Gothic Chapel facing his boyhood home, dedicating it to his parents, John Thomas and Sarah Payne Kirby, and consecrating it to "The Freedom of the Christian Religion and the Promotion of Education."

Today, Peach Tree Village has resorted to its original name, as members of the Fellowship Baptist Church of Nederland, to whom it has been deeded, work to restore this historic site as Camp Ta-Ku-La, with plans to

open it in the summer of 1889 as one of the finest Christian encampments in East Texas.

Kirby's boyhood home is being restored to house a museum, library and gift shop, other buildings to serve as dormitories, a cafeteria and commissary. And, the towering red brick chapel with its arched glass windows, which has been designated as a Texas Historic Site, will serve as the Village Hall, available for services, weddings and the like. Although the chapel remains under the

jurisdiction of the Commissioners Court, having been given to Tyler County by the late Governor Allan Shivers, during his ownership of Peach Tree, the Nederland Church has taken on the responsibility of restoration, preservation and maintenance.

To reach Camp Ta-Ku-La at Peach Tree, which is not yet open for tours, take Highway 287 Northwest out of Woodville to Chester; turn East on FM 2097 by the Post Office and proceed 2 miles. The camp will be on your left.

Heritage Village's Pickett House Is Unique

Little did the Texas Highway patrolmen realize, as they sat down to lunch at the Woodville Inn that day back in 1965, that on the other side of town Old Midway was moving slowly but surely into its final resting place at Heritage Village.

Everything was ready for Old Midway. Clyde Gray had bought it from Charles Dickens, who had operated a grocery store in it for several years after moving it up on Highway 190.

When the proper permits didn't arrive in time for the move, the movers, who already had the old building on board, just waited for the right moment, lunch time, and slipped it into place, to be known ever more and nationwide as The Pickett House, purveyor of country cooking served boarding house style.

Old Midway started out as a two-room school house in 1909 near the Midway Church in Polk County. It was built by local residents on 2 1/2 acres of land, donated to Common School District No. 10 by members of the Adams family.

In 1949, school officials transferred Midway's students, along with those from other small schools in the area, to the consolidated Big Sandy District. The school then stood empty until Charles Dickens purchased it in 1960, moved it up on the Highway and opened up his store.

Today, Old Midway turned Pickett House still lives up to its reputation as one of the "must" stopping places in East Texas. Now owned by the Tyler County

Heritage Society, who purchased Heritage Village in its entirety in October, 1987. The Pickett Houston continues to serve quality country style food in a colorful boarding house atmosphere.

And, where did The Pickett House name come from, you might ask. Not from the pickett fence in front of the restaurant, as many presume, but from C.

A. Pickett, who was mayor of Houston in the early 1940's. As a friend of Clyde Gray's, he was instrumental in later years in securing the financing Gray needed through the Small Business Administration to put Heritage Village into operation and on the map.

Summer hours for The Pickett House are 11:30 am to 8:30 pm, seven days a week.

Geneological Research Register Is Here

1.—**PARKING LOT** for visitors to Heritage Village & Museum Store, Fickett House and Big Woods Nature Trails.

2.—**PICKETT HOUSE:** Country Cooking served Boarding House style in the quaint atmosphere of an old time school house. Open daily March thru August from 11 am to 8 pm.

3.—**MUSEUM STORE:** Entrance to The Village is through the Village Museum Store, where you'll find a unique collection of gift items in keeping with the historical, educational and ecological themes presented in The Village.

4.—**JEWELRY SHOP:** Custom jewelry designer John Killam will demonstrate his artistry in silver, karat gold, precious and semi-precious stone to Village visitors during regular hours. He will also be open to the general public by appointment through a separate entrance from the parking lot.

5.—**JUSTICE OF THE PEACE:** In the old days, the Justice of the Peace held a very important post. His duties included assaying minerals as well as performing marriage ceremonies and handing out punishment to criminals. The JP office is housed in a building, donated by the Bert Hensarling family of Woodville, which once stood behind the old Raney Hotel, serving at various times as a drummer's showroom and a hotel laundry.

6.—**BAND STAND:** This is a miniature copy of the old band stand that once graced the square of almost every small town. Here, townspeople gathered on a summer's evening to hear the local band perform or a politician test his oratorical skills. Next to the bandstand is Woodville's first piece of fire-fighting equipment, donated by the Woodville Volunteer Fire Department. It was chemical in action and pulled by the fire fighters themselves.

7.—**PAWN SHOP.** The old-time mechanical money banks in the window only hint at the artifacts within. On the right is a wagon pantry, the forerunner of the Chuck Wagon, which has spaces for flour, sugar, salt, coffee, just about everything a family needed moving West. The stage coach money box and old-time hard-hat diving equipment are among the hundreds of interesting objects in the shop.

8.—**TEXAS DINNER BELLS:** In the old days, a blacksmith might not have been able to cast a bell, but he could always forge a triangle. Consequently, the triangle rang out across pioneer lands both as an alarm and as a 'Come and git it' at chow time. Once again, these reminders of a past era are being made and sold at Heritage Village. They are also being wholesaled to other tourist attractions throughout the state.

9.—**POST OFFICE:** Willie Reinhardt was the last postmaster of this authentic Post Office, which was moved from Pluck, Texas, once located off Hwy. 287 near Corrigan. Of special interest is the Spencerian script on the wall, a common style of writing in the old days, using a split-nib pen, that is impossible to duplicate with today's ball point pen.

10.—**BARBER SHOP:** If you had stopped in at this Barber Shop in 1888, you would have had your choice of two chairs, both of which could be laid back and revolved, but not raised and lowered. You could have enjoyed looking at the pin-up girls decorating the walls - these are originals from old Coca Cola calendars - and, if you really thought it was necessary, you could have gone a step farther than a shave and a haircut and taken a bath in the 1836 copper tub in the back room, which once belonged to a famous Jefferson, Texas, blacksmith, and was donated to the Village by Arledge Colman.

11.—**SHERIFF'S OFFICE AND JAIL:** Every town had one of these, of course, but this one was built especially for children and picture taking. You're even invited to write your name on the wall.

12.—**BLACKSMITH SHOP.** Soon to be operational again under the leadership of Charles Schultz, a third generation blacksmith with a masters degree in metallurgy, this shop was in use in Colmesneil, Texas, in the late 1800's. Donated by the Milton Durhams of Woodville, the shop features a 7-foot bellows, large enough to heat and make gun barrels, a hand-operated drill press, tire shrinker for wagon wheels, gin saw sharpener and rocking chair press. Mr. Schultz' plans include the production of decorative items, to be sold in the Museum Shop, and weekend classes.

13.—**WAGON SHED, CANE GRINDER AND SYRUP MILL.** By the walkway behind the shed, the cane grinder and syrup mill bring back sweet memories of cane being fed into the mill, the juice being extracted, as a horse went around and around turning the grinders, then the slow process of cooking it just right to produce a delectable syrup. The Wagon Shed was a catch-all for everything from horse collars to hen's nests. The wagon, donated by the J. Wood Fains, was used for freight from Beaumont to Woodville. The buggy, donated by Allan Shivers, boasted a luggage rack and a lantern that could be carried or hung on the back.

14.—**TOLAR KITCHEN:** Built by Robert Tolar as his first home in Tyler County in 1866 and donated by his ancestors, the Tolar Kitchen is the only structure in The Village to be awarded

the medallion by the Texas Historical Commission. Except for the chimney, the kitchen was moved intact from Hillister, where the Tolar family used the kitchen into the 1950's, providing sumptuous meals, prepared over the open fire, for any traveler who stopped along the old road from Woodville to Beaumont. The bedroom, featuring an antique bed with rope springs, thick

mattress and feather mattress, was used as a pantry after the main house was built. The quilt chest is handmade with no nails in it and, of course, every bedroom had a chamber pot for those cold winter nights! The Smoke Room off the back porch was used to store meats and to prepare foods for canning.

15.—**BIG HOUSE:** Here you'll find a variety of larger articles: washing machines such as the old hand operated 'rocker' which sloshed clothes back and forth, an antique loom with string beddles and four harness, set up by Catherine Mowery of Woodville, a spinning wheel donated by Dr. Howell Grimes, and a complete 1886 newspaper print shop,

donated by the Garner and Watson families of Florence, Texas, where the Florence Vidette was once hand set and run on the old flat bed press.

16.—**RAILROAD STATION:** The materials for the depot came from the 1890 Hillister, Texas, Station. Most of the artifacts inside were donated by Millard F. Martin of Houston, others by C. H. Hartwell and J. A. Summers. The loop hanging on the wall held the Order Stick. When a train came through without stopping, the station manager would hold out the Order Stick so the conductor could pick up his orders without slowing down. These orders would provide information such as any work being done on the tracks before the next station, such information coming in over the 'wireless.' Any outgoing mail would also be attached to this order stick. Incoming mail was thrown onto the station platform from the moving train. The colors of the railroad lanterns on display in the Museum Shop speak for themselves, except that a red lantern also meant 'hands off,' and that car could not be touched until the lantern was removed.

17.—**Z.C. COLLIER STORE:** Much of the original materials and furnishings are included in this reconstruction of the Collier store, which was built in Town Bluff in 1863 by Zacharia Cowart Collier and catered to the needs of travelers up and down the Neches as well as to the growing number of families crossing the river into Tyler County by way of the Collier Ferry. This historic general store, which also served as post office, bank and pharmacy was rebuilt at Heritage Village by Virginia Collier Howell and her husband, Charles A. Howell, as a tribute to her grandfather. Mrs. B. C. Richardson, a member of the Barlow family who purchased the store from the Colliers, contributed many artifacts, as did David Collier of Woodville, and Joseph Barlow, who lives on the site originally occupied by the Collier home, donated timbers and bricks that were part of the original store.

18.—**COTTON GIN:** The principle of this miniature cotton gin, donated by the Jerry Tolar family of Doucette, is the same as a large one. Only the purpose is different, and at one time it was an important local industry. Cotton filled mattresses, which had become soiled and lumpy, were brought to the company, which owned this machine, to have them cleaned. The cotton would be removed, reginned to clean it and make it soft again, then covered again with new ticking. The Seed Separating Machine hanging on the wall was used to separate various sizes of grain or to cleanse corn, beans or what-have-you from dirt before sending it to market.

19.—**APOTHECARY.** Here, in an old time drugstore, without the extras, only prescriptions and home remedy materials were sold. The paneling on the left was contributed by the Wood-

ville Methodist Church, and the glass for the prescription counter, from a drug store in Rockland, was donated by the late Dr. and Mrs. Kuebler of Port Arthur. The 'electric shock' machine, which was supposed to cure everything, actually was a quack remedy and did nothing at all.

20.—**DOCTOR'S OFFICE:** A tribute to the many doctors, who have contributed to the health and welfare of Tyler County residents over the past 130 years or more, this typical doctor's office is a composite collection of many, including Dr. John Shivers of Woodville and Dr. N. E. Laidacker of China. The Woodville Medical Community, headed by Dr. Gayle Burton, is making plans to renovate this office.

21.—**CHAIR FACTORY.** Until 1964, this chair factory was in operation at Burkeville by Dallas Miller, who was not only ingenious in fabricating machinery but was considered the best chair maker in this part of the country. To be noted are the lathe on which Mr. Miller turned the chair legs, the hole puncher for his hides and the drying racks for his chair backs. The factory, which Mr. Miller built almost entirely of wood, was donated to Heritage Village by members of his family.

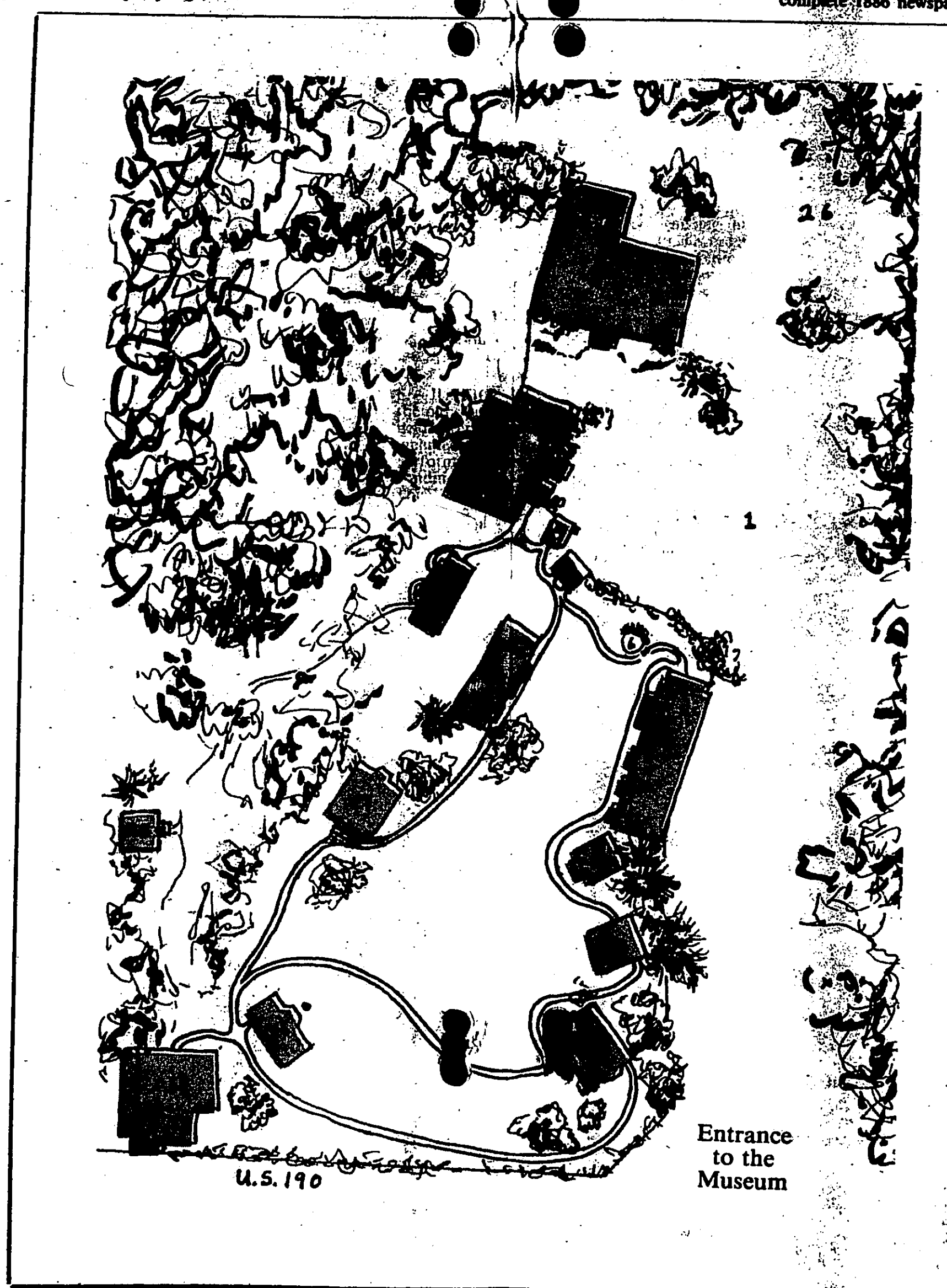
22.—**MUSIC SHOP:** Much of the musical history memorabilia to be found in this shop came from the Bubba Ross collection. Old sheet music was contributed by the Fred Bennett family. One of the very first phonographs can be seen in the window.

23.—**SEAMSTRESS SHOP.** Many a young woman, who learned to sew a fine seam at her mother's knee, found that a seamstress shop was a genteel business by which to make a living. In this collection you'll find many of the tools of the trade, including old pattern books, sewing machines and trimming materials.

24.—**LEATHER SHOP.** Whether you needed a fine leather saddle, a pair of leather boots or a pair of ladies leather shoes, you would have looked for a shop such as this. The machine used was made especially for leather, and the leather maker made use of his scraps for belts and whips and other small goods.

25.—**LITTLE RED SCHOOL HOUSE.** This is a typical one-room school, where all grades were taught by one teacher. The plantation bell outside was for calling students to class.

26.—**THE BIG WOODS:** This 11.5 acres of woods and hiking trails, recently donated by Jack and Manie Whitmeyer of Colmesneil, offers all the delights of the Big Thicket on a smaller scale to Heritage Village and Fickett House visitors.



Heritage Village Smithy, Docents, Artists Are Active

If you think nothing's happening at Heritage Village, you haven't looked beyond the obvious.

Take Louisiana Pacific, for instance. Not only have those good people given the Heritage Society easement rights on a 15 foot strip of land along the West fence line of The Village property all the way to the North line of the added 11.5 acres, they also had the timber removed and cleaned the area up, making it accessible for wagon and foot travel. Eventually this acreage will be used for access to a series of craft shops within The Village and a new parking lot.

But, that's not all. Gene Meyers, Senior Forest Manager for the Southern District of Louisiana Pacific, made it a point to tour The Village personally before presenting a check for The Village to Heritage Society president, Christine Sanders. He also instructed John Nelepovitz, LP's District Forester, to help Heritage Village, whenever and however possible.

Now, that's the kind of commitment we need more of. Thank you, gentlemen. Thank

you, Louisiana Pacific. And thank you, Hayward Fetner, for the loan of your equipment and your employee, C. J. Ogden, to spread some much needed rock to fill in some of those horrendous chuck holes in the present parking lot. Helped a lot.

Blacksmiths Fill The Village

And, talking about action, would you believe three—that's right, three—blacksmiths mixing it up in the Village Blacksmith Shop?

There they were, Master Blacksmith Charlie Schultz, Ed Cotten, who by any other name [he turned out to be Joe in the last column] puts on quite a show, and Mark Hester, talking up some ideas to really put The Village on the map, all the while laboring over the forge and hammering away at the anvil and entertaining Village visitors, who never seem to get enough.

Docents To Go Back To The Indians

To follow up on Tuesday evening's Docent Meeting at The

Village, when Jack Whitmeyer addressed the group on Indians in Tyler County, all docents and friends are reminded that this Saturday is Docent Field Day, starting at Heritage Village at 9 a.m.

From The Village, the group will travel to the home of Christine Sanders in the Harmony Community, from whence they will visit the old Indian Ball Park and later stop by the historic home of Blanch Risinger, which was built by the first Indian Agent in Tyler County.

All interested persons are urged to attend this interesting day's tour. Just don your 'groaties' and bring a sack lunch and some fun!

More Docents Needed

It may sound like a broken record, but Heritage Village does need more people willing to volunteer their time as Village Docents. [That's a Guide, you know.]

It's amazing how much more meaningful a tour through The Village can be for the visitor, who has someone to tell a little of the background of The

Village, Tyler County and the people who live here.

It wasn't only the paper work, John admits, or the fact that he was employing 7 jewelry designers who were doing most of the work. It was that working only in sterling silver was becoming almost stultifying. His creative juices were aching to reach out into other metals, semi-precious and precious stones. And, so he made the big move that brought him back to

Texas after 12 years on the West Coast.

Now that John Killam is firmly established Village Jeweler, open six days a week [except Monday], there is no limit to his creative outlets, as he lets his customers browse through the various books and catalogues he keeps on hand to get ideas, then creates jewelry to the individual taste, in keeping

with the lifestyle of the person who is to wear it.

For custom work, John Killam, jeweler, has a private entrance onto the Village parking lot. As John Killam, Village Jeweler and Artisan, he is always available to talk with visitors touring Heritage Village, through his entrance into The Village proper.

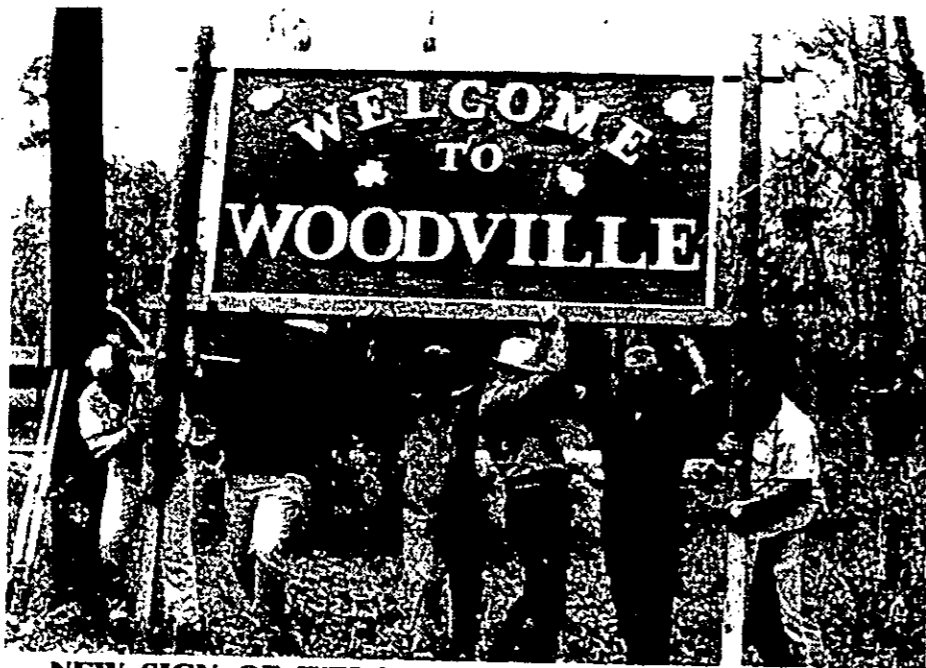

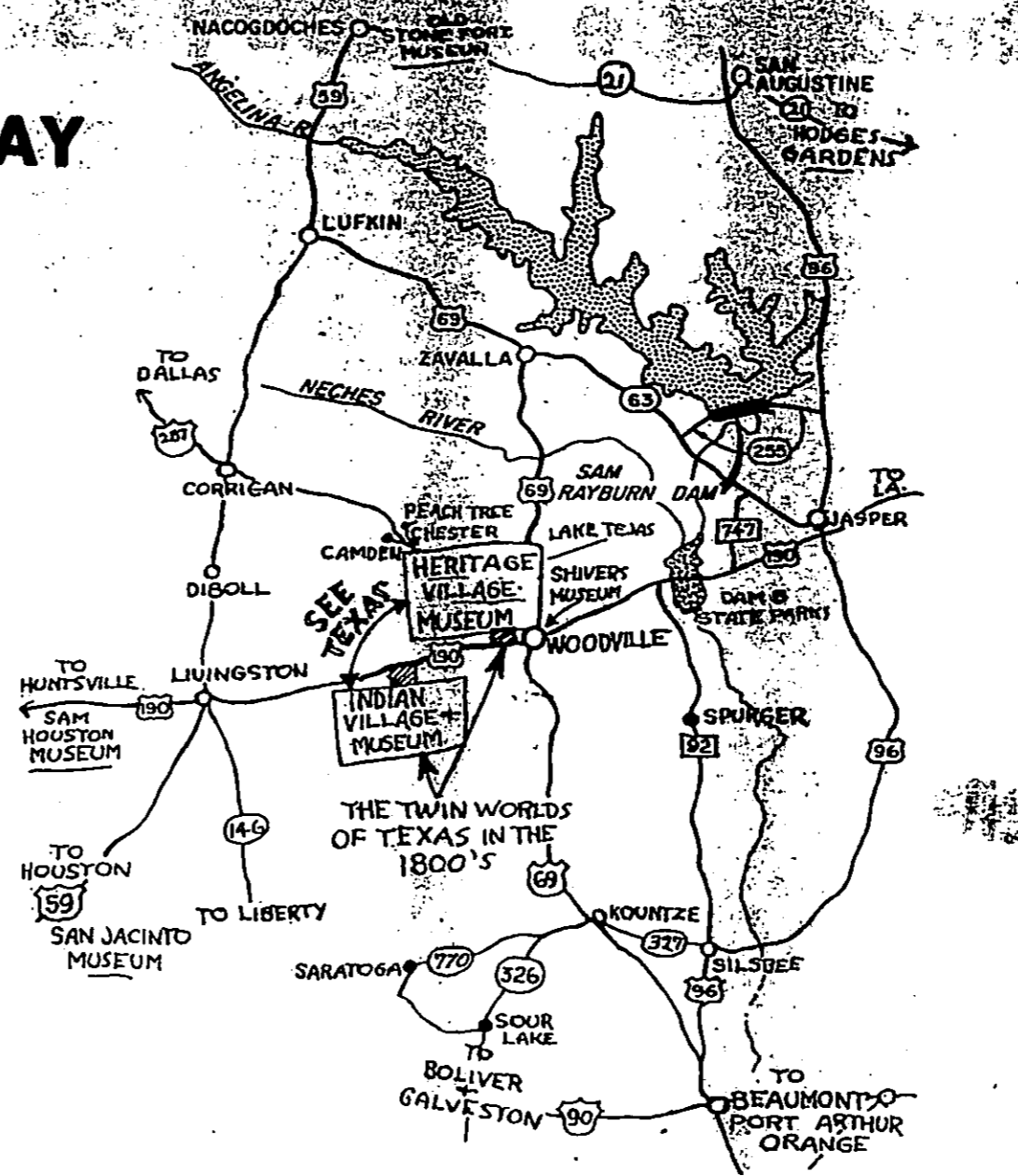

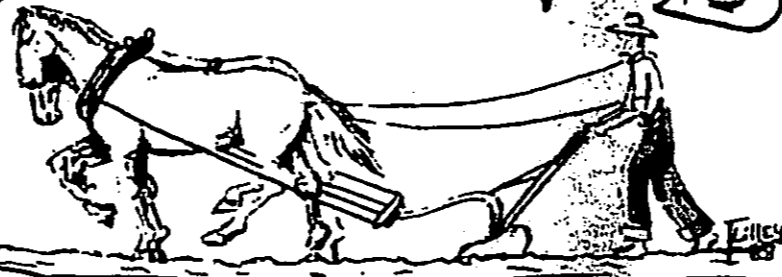
