Additions to the Board of Directors are Warren

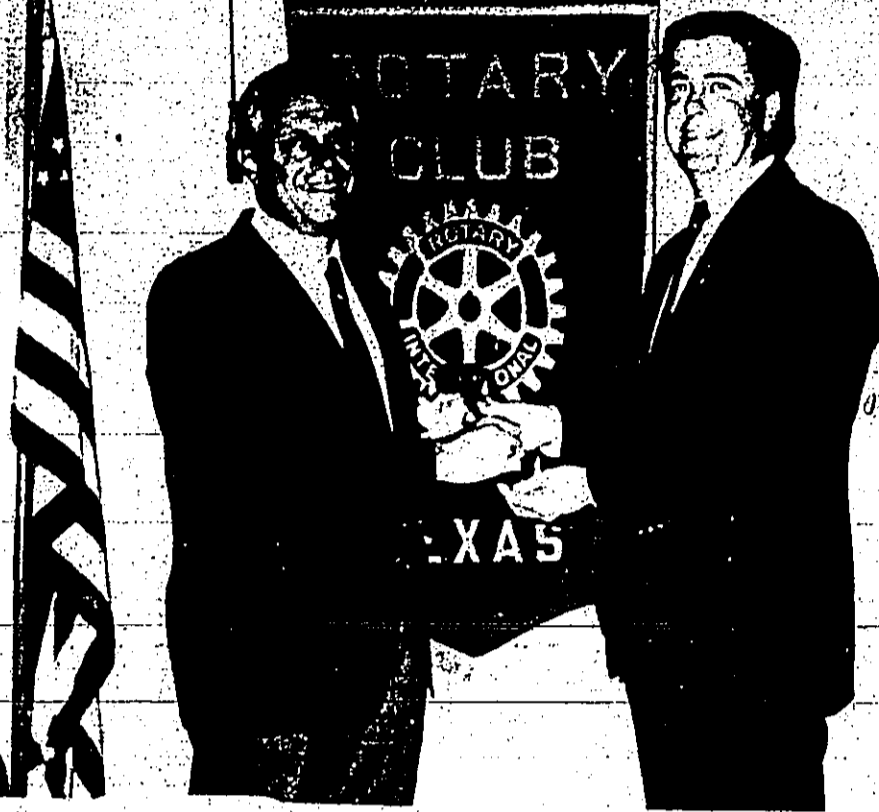
Dengler and Marcus Payne.

So why did he resign with time left on his contract? Was it because he was offered a better paying position? Would he even have been looking for another job if he had been satisfied in Warren? The Warren School Board needs to look long and hard at the keys they have lost, and let's not forget the one they threw away when they eliminated a Band Director position for the upcoming year. How many keys can be lost before the master lock is changed and the state is brought in to run the Warren Independent School District?

## Accent On Terrace Gardening

## Dies Are Magazine Feature

For some gardeners, such as Carrell and Marsell Die of Woodville, building terraces is the only solution to a tough gardening problem. The Dies and their terrace gardens are featured in the July/August issue of Texas Gardener Magazine. The article, titled "Terrace Gardens: A Solution to Sloping Sites," was written by Diane Morey Sitton of Colmesneil.

The Dies were faced with the challenge of gardening on a steep slope when they moved five years ago. Their home and restaurant (The Middlebuster) sit side by side on a parcel of land that is sandwiched between a highway and a pine forest.

According to Carrell, the slope behind the restaurant was the only site that got sunshine. However, after two years of fighting erosion and watering a garden that wouldn't hold water, the couple decided to build terraces.

Behind the restaurant, where the slope was greatest, they constructed three levels ranging from 2 to 4 feet tall. The terraces are 6 to 8 feet wide and nearly 20 feet long. Marsell utilizes these beds for vegetables and a variety of herbs, including dill, camomile, and basil. A sundial on a pedestal acts as a focal point.

The couple are currently expanding these beds by incorporating a water garden into the overall design. When completed this pool will include a fountain.

On the side of the building where the slope is gradual, they built four long terraces. These beds are 2 feet tall and

several feet wide. They are a showplace for Carrell's collection of roses and are home to several varieties of azaleas.

According to Carrell, once they decided to build the terraces, they had to select a material

to use to construct the retaining walls. Although bricks, poured concrete, stones, and lumber are all frequently selected, the Dies chose railroad ties. When braced with steel posts at each end they are es-

pecially suitable for large terraces. Their durability and low cost were two more reasons why Carrell and Marsell decided to use them.

To hold the heavy ties in place Carrell used dis-

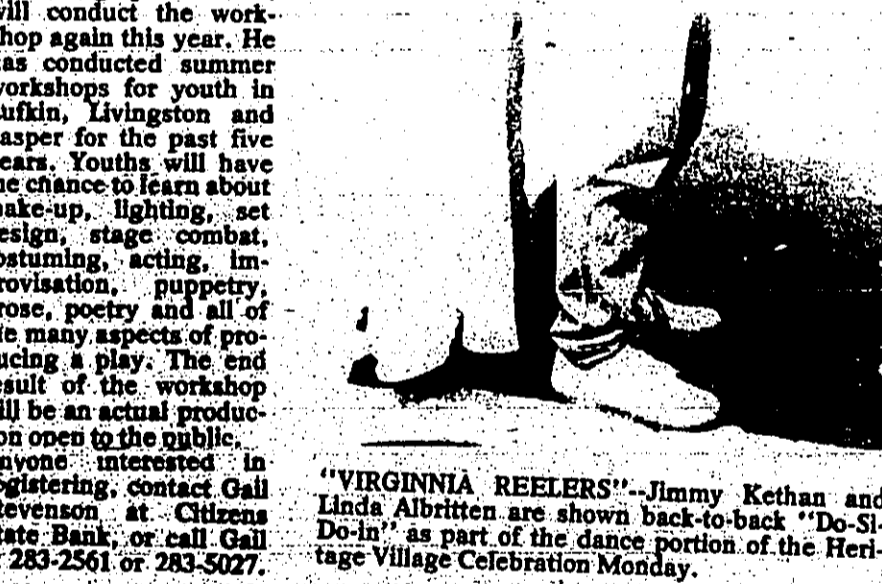
