Dear Editor, It is not unusual for speakers to move beyond the common bounds of reason, particularly on International Telecast. During the recent Republican Convention in New Orleans, La. President Reagan and Senator John McCain of Arizona alleged as a part of their speech that Governor Michel Dukakis, of Massachusetts vetoed a bill that would have required the children of the schools of that state to say the Pledge of Allegiance in school. Later in the day, the matter was passed off as a serious discussion of issues.

In the April 18, 1988 copy of Enterprise, Page 4b, John Kanalis set the record straight and it seems reasonable that the people of Tyler County should read the Beaumont Enterprise.

"The issue is not whether Dukakis took the right to recite the Pledge from the children. It is that the legislation in 1977 would have imposed a criminal penalty on teachers who failed to have children say the pledge. Moreover, Dukakis vetoed the bill only after the Massachusetts Supreme Court issued an opinion that said the bill violated the Teachers freedom of speech."



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
