A hummingbird is such a tiny thing. If you idn't-vatch-closely, you might never see one. Theyfly from one flower to another like a large bumblebee that busily gathers sweet nectar. Their flight seems without restriction as they hover in miniature helicopter motions and then take-off like a silent jet to paris

Considering the nesting habits of these small pirds, it is a wonder that they survive at all. High among the branches of a sturdy tree, they find a spot to build their small nests. The nests are soft, symmetrical circles. They are formed from hair-like roots and then lined with some fuzzy substance.

It was while I was out mowing that I discovcred a hummingbird's nest resting on the ground. It was under a large pine tree and lay scarcely visible among the twigs and leaves that had been strewn about by a rigorous wind. Finding the nest was a source of delight. But, as I looked high up into the tree from where it had come, I could only think about how miraculous it was that the small nest was still intact, The little nest that has served as a "house" was clearly

I began to think about the story in the Bible of he man that built his house upon the sand. When the wind and the water came in, it washed his house completely away. Obviously, the hummingbird that had built the nest thought that it was safe in the tall, sturdy tree. This made me wonder about the strength of my own 'house of faith'. If a strong "wind" of life came along, would my faith stand the storm?

In the Bible story, we are told that we should build our "house" of faith on a solid rock. Looking at that small house of a nest, I thought about the song that says, 'let Jesus come into my heart'. Perhaps, that is what the Bible story was all about too. Instead of building our house of faith in the lofty perches of the mind, it should be firmly secured with the knowledge of Jesus in the soft recesses of the human heart. Only them, will we be able to feel secure in the building of our own "house of faith"! "Yes, that is what the story is all about.", I thought, as I carried away the little nest. that once served as a house.
