Woodville ISD Borrows Against 'Cash Flow Shortage'

The Woodville Independent School District Board of Trustees voted to borrow funds to cover a cash flow shortage at their meeting Tuesday, September 20, 1988. The Board approved the application to issue tax anticipation notes through the Tax Anticipation Notes Program. Through this program, tax exempt bonds will be issued through a co-op, thus enabling the participating districts to borrow money at a cheaper interest rate than through the local depository. The district will pay a maximum of 7 1/2% interest. The amount of the loan will be approximately \$635,000. There will be a \$6,000 fee to issue the bonds. The loan will be paid back by August 30, 1989. The Board employed Dr. Mattie London to conduct second appraisals at the elementary and intermediate schools at a salary of \$5,000.00. Dr. London is a retired principal from Port Arthur. Also employed was Naomi Perry for the position of Diagnostician for all grades. Superintendent Dorman Jackson reported that enrollment was up for the 1988-89 school year from 1,702 to 1,717.

School Nears Completion

It was announced at the Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees Meeting Tuesday, September 27, 1988, that the new Elementary School should be completed by October 18, 1988. According to the Timberline Constructors representative, all problems have been straightened out and the biggest job remaining is electrical. Carlton Stewart of Warren objected to the Masonic stone that has been placed in the new building. Mr. Stewart stated, "I'm not here in the role of a troublemaker, but I want some action on something I think is wrong." Mr. Stewart requested that the Board take action to have the stone removed. He said that the engraving on the stone implied that the Masons leveled the foundation for the new building and that this was not true. Board Member Kenneth Gregory, who is a Mason, said that he thought it was more than appropriate that the stone be there because throughout the history of our nation the Masons had supported education. He said that Masons had set cornerstones in many educational buildings and even in the Capitol building in Washington, D.C. Board President Walter McAlpin's opinion was, "The Board never took any action to place it there and we need to take care of it." Superintendent Yates stated, "Since the Masons are a part of this community, I think they should be allowed to put it some where else." School Attorney Jerry Hutton asked two questions, "Are we talking about a major job to take it out and how did it get there in the first place?" According to Timberline Constructors representative, "It's not a major job but it is a job. We were given instructions to put it in the northeast corner. I don't know how it got in the front door. It is not an unusual request to do this with schools and I don't understand Mr. Woodman's instructions." Mr. Hutton was that it would cost approximately \$200,000 to remove the stone. He said there would also be the problem of how to handle the hole because the wall is 22 1/2 inches thick. Mr. Hutton said that he would like to see the stone removed.

The only asbestos that will have to be removed is in the boiler area at the elementary school. The rest can be maintained by sealing it.

Doucette Union Church Community Center Full Of History

The quiet little town of Doucette, nestled in the wooded hills of Tyler County, is by far from being the oldest town in the County. But a little before the turn-of-the-century, it was the largest town in the County and the place that people in the vicinity went to, to satisfy their needs.

One of their needs was religion and Doucette had several established churches. The oldest was the Baptist Church of Christ, Pentecostal, A Methodist church was organized in 1896. In the 1920's and 30's the Methodist were strong enough numerically to elect a resident pastor with a salary ranging from \$2400 to \$2500 per year.

In 1908 there was a Union Church established in Doucette. This church was built by subscription, on the following plan: for every dollar the building committee raised, the Thompson Lumber Company gave two dollars. When first established the Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterians held regular services. In 1910 Presbyterian Church was organized. The Thompson Brothers being Presbyterian sold their holdings to Long-Bell Lumber Company and moved to New Willard as did most of the Presbyterians. However even void of the Thompson Brothers interest in preserving the grand old building in its original form for future generations of Tyler County residents, there has been some commendable restoration in Woodville, but when the Methodist Church and Masonic Lodge in Spurger disappeared we were technically down to one superb old church.

There is need for funds to restore this wonderful old structure for future use by the people of Tyler County and preserve a part of our past. 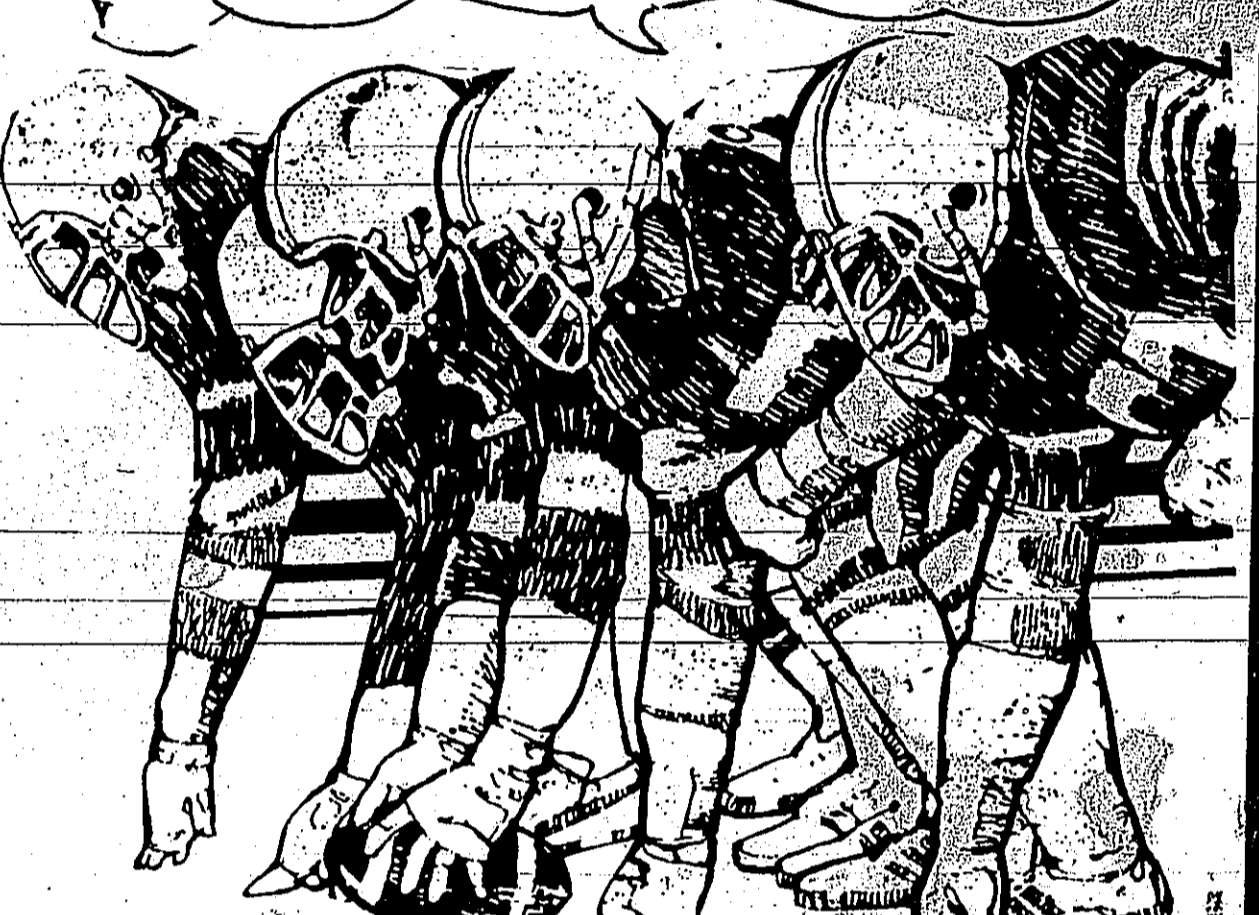

you and the LAW

Q. A neighbor talked me into joining his church. Over the next two years, he convinced me to use my credit cards and money to help people who needed their rent paid, tires for their cars, etc., and told me that I was doing it for the church. He always told me to use my credit cards as he did not want his children to know that he was

doing anything for these people. One time my SSI check did not come in and he loaned me money to pay my rent. I did not ask for the money, but I told him he would get it back. Nothing was said as to how it was to be repaid. Now he is harassing me because he wants all of the money back right now. I feel like this man owes me for what I spent

on the paper he was giving me. Can I legally get him to give me the money I feel he owes me?

A. A financial transaction in two situations are independent. Your rights to recover monies from your neighbor may be based on:

1. The existence of a written or implied contract obligating your neighbor to reimburse you for payments made to third parties at your neighbor's request; or

2. The doctrine of promissory estoppel may apply if you made the payments relying on your neighbor's promise to repay. Promissory Estoppel requires the existence of a promise designed to influence and encourage the promisee's conduct. In other words, the absence of a contract has no bearing if you made payments based upon your neighbor's promise to repay you.

To recover any of your monies based on a contractual agreement, you must show that your neighbor promised to

offer proof that your payments were not charitable contributions made to a church. Even though your neighbor may have influenced you greatly, you acted voluntarily.

If you made the donations directly to needy people, it may be difficult to prove that the donation was made on behalf of your neighbor instead of you. All of your possible remedies require the existence of a promise by your neighbor to repay you. The facts are unclear as to whether such a promise existed. Your belief that there was such a promise is, in itself, insufficient to support your claim for recovery under either breach of contract or the doctrine of promissory estoppel.

Q. My husband and I had our wills made in California just months prior to moving to Texas. Could you tell me if this will is valid in the state of Texas? Should we have a Texas attorney examine the will?

A. Without examining the wills prepared in California, it would be impossible to tell whether or not they are valid under Texas law. Normally, a will must meet all the requirements of Texas law to be valid in Texas and dispose of your property according to your wishes. Accordingly, it would be highly advisable to have a Texas attorney review the wills.

A. The law you are referring to is the Uniform Services Former Spouses Protection Act. Under the Act, divorce courts are permitted to treat military retirement benefits (but not disability retirement pay) under state law. Thus, if the former spouse meets certain criteria set forth in the Act, the military retirement benefits may be divided by the court under the community property laws of Texas.

For a former spouse to qualify for direct payment of benefits, the parties must have been married at least ten years during which time one spouse was earning credit toward military retirement pay. If the ten year requirement is not met, there is some authority for allowing the court to make the military retiree himself make payments to the former spouse.

Q. How, where, and when does the executor of an estate register the will?

A. An application for probate of a will should be filed with the County Clerk of the county in which the decedent resided. Absent exceptional circumstances, wills must be admitted to probate within four years from the death of the testator.

Q. If I go on a trip, can I legally carry a gun in my car or my motor home?

A. First of all, it is quite important to determine where you are going when deciding whether or not you may carry a gun in an automobile. If your trip takes you to another state, you need to comply with their laws. Assuming you stay in Texas, you may carry a gun in your car or motor home while you travel. However, it must not be hidden or concealed, the gun needs to be in plain view.
