Discipline Complaints Aired

Parents of several Woodville Junior High athletes were at the Woodville ISD Board Meeting Tuesday, October 18, 1988, to voice their objections to the Discipline Policy being enforced in Jr. High football this year. According to Allan Bell, father of an 8th grade athlete, his son made a failing grade for the week in an academic class, and was told by the football coach that if he did not take a lick in athletics for the low grade he would not be able to play any football games for the rest of the season. Bell felt that paddling a child would not help bring up his grades. He said, "It's the way you buy your way into football for a week." Charlotte Fox, another parent, said that her son was five points off of his conduct grade and had to take a lick to play football. Fox said that she wasn't against anyone taking licks but felt that the punishment should be given by the teacher of the class where the bad conduct took place and not by a coach. There was concern because some students were receiving double punishment, once from the teacher of the class where they made a low grade of misbehaved and again from the coach. According to Athletic Director Melvin Houston, "We are talking about extra-cur-

ricular activities. A kid is there by choice and abides by the rules that are there. Kids have a choice...they don't have to be there. The rules were explained to the kids. They are not assigned to athletics...it was their choice. These are my rules...if they don't want to abide by them, they don't have to be in there." Principal Bob Borel, who supported Houston's policy said, "We do everything we can to see that we help these kids. We keep the parents informed by sending home disciplinary reports. If a kid behaves himself in class, what we are talking about tonight is a mute point. I feel like Melvin set this policy to help the students in the classroom." After a lengthy discussion, Board President Tolbert said that the matter would be taken under consideration and any action, if taken, would be at a later date. Following the Board Meeting, several parents said they planned to go to the Texas Education Agency with the matter.

Grady Holderman, Maintenance Supervisor for the District, presented the Asbestos Management Plan Report. According to Holderman, "If you have to have asbestos, ours is the best kind to have. Where it is and the kind it is, we are going to be able to deal with it with a minimum amount of dollars." According to Holderman, the majority of the money to get rid of asbestos in the District would be spent training people and buying

equipment necessary for the removal. Cost for the removal is estimated to be somewhere between five and ten thousand dollars. They hope to have all asbestos removed within three years. The asbestos report is available to the public.

Four Woodville High Students made a presentation on leadership training workshops that they participated in. The program began this past summer and was the idea of Eleanor Holderman. Other teachers who worked with the program were Pam Risinger and Linda Gazzaway. It is a voluntary program that any high school student can enroll in and involves leadership training in two Saturday sessions. Making the presentation at the meeting were Reid Jinnette, Collette Holderman, Julie Jarrott and Cindy Birdwell. Woodville High School has thirty-three charter members in this program.

The Board presented a certificate to the Yearbook Staff for their contribution to the school and community. Accepting the certificate were Dana Kinnon, Editor-in-Chief; John Branch, Assistant Editor, and Michelle Vinson, Advertising Manager.

In a Special Session Monday, October 24, 1988, the Board set the tax rate for the 1988 tax roll at \$1.11 per \$100 evaluation.

Last year's tax rate was \$1.21. The Board also elected Charles Spurlock as director for the Tyler County Tax Appraisal District Board of Directors.

I began to wonder about the acts of kindness that I had shown to others during the week. Somehow, I felt that I had done as much for others as they had done for me. I decided that I would have to be more mindful of that next week.

I also began to wonder about judgment day. I wondered if this is what the basis of our judging will be upon us. I know that when it comes time for us to go to heaven, whether we will be "first" or "last", is not really important. The really important thing might be a test that we did for someone else. Money, or time, will probably have very little part to play in it. More than likely, the most important part of our life will be considered from a simple act of kindness.
