New EPA Law Guidelines Discussed

Tyler County commissioners learned Monday of a new federal law governing solid waste disposal, that could eventually "tax" the finances of county governments. The Environmental Protection Agency law was published in the Federal Register in August. And, failure to enforce the stringent guidelines could result in administrative penalties, according to Victor Cain, an environmental quality specialist with the Texas Department of Health. Cain told commissioners Monday that the guidelines under the law include: *Placing a six-inch layer of dirt, or lining, around each pit at the end of each work day. *Initiating explosive methane gas controls, such as placing vents in the trenches, which would prevent dangerous buildup of the gas. *Effective Sept. 1, 1989 there will be no burning allowed in or around the pits. *Providing 24-hour access control. Cain said that a gate or fence will have to be erected around all disposal sites to keep the public from dumping possibly hazardous wastes. *Establishing drainage control to prevent leaching into the active trenches. According to Cain the EPA expects these drainage measures to prevent leaching from a "25-year" flood. This can be done by placing dikes around the trenches. *Preventing any sort of discharge from the landfill site unless the discharge is approved under the Clean Water Act. Cain stated that an amount of rain in the trenches

pumped off the site. It has to be left on top of the site to evaporate. *Prohibiting liquids from vacuum truck waste and grease traps from being dumped at the site. *Employing a program to detect and prevent the disposal of registered hazardous waste such as PCB's. *Closure and post-closure notices must be given in the event of a landfill closing. Also, according to Cain, a maintenance period of at least 30 years will be the responsibility of the governing body for the landfill. In addition, said Cain, those governing bodies will be required to file a financial assurance to the TDH, stating that they will maintain the landfill for at least 30 years. "It's going to become real expensive to operate these sites," said Cain. He added that officials from seven Southeast Texas counties are in the process of reviewing the possibility of creating a solid waste district. This district will review alternatives to landfills, and the possibility of incineration as a waste disposal method. During the Monday meeting Judge C.J. "Josiah" Wheat said, "There's no easy answer. Waste disposal is going to be one of the biggest problems we will face in the next 100 years." Several commissioners said Monday they planned to attend a meeting in Jasper where the problem of solid waste will be discussed among officials from the seven counties. The meeting was to have taken place about press time Tuesday. In other business commissioners

*Accepted the Nov. 8 election results. *Approved a request from District Judge Earl Stover to raise Court Reporter Edna LaBove's salary by \$48 for the calendar year. *Heard from precinct 3 resident Herman Lyle on the condition of Forest Lake Road, which he said was in poor condition due to grading at the Texas Department of Corrections prison unit site. Although no action was taken, some of the commissioners agreed to survey the site and try to come up with a solution.

*Considered, but took no action, after hearing a request from Precinct 1 Peace Justice Wanda Brasher. She asked the Court to make Arvella Williams' position in her office a full-time position, with a \$50 per month increase in her salary. *Approved a resolution that states the county's support of efforts to secure funding for a boat ramp where U.S. 60 crosses the Neches River at Rockland. *Approved a request to contribute \$100 toward the purchase of a Christmas gift for a foster child in Tyler County.

Commissioners Approve 2 1/2 Cent Increase For Hospital District

Tyler County Commissioners will hold a public hearing on Nov. 28 to discuss a proposed 2.5 percent increase in the county's tax rate for 1988. County Tax Assessor Barbara Tolbert told the commissioners at a Monday meeting that the proposed rate will be a six-cent per \$100 increase over last year. Last year's rate was 43-cents per \$100, and the proposed rate, if approved, would be 49-cents per \$100. The public hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. in the Commissioners Court, located in the Tyler County Courthouse. Also, on Monday commissioners approved a two-and-one-half cent increase in the county Hospital District tax rate. It helps cover expenses in the hospital's Indigent Care Program. According to this

major John Hickory, the tax rate would offset 100 percent of the increase. The increase will help cover the

\$97,000 contract that the hospital district has with the University of Texas John Sealey Main Branch Hospital in Galveston. The contract with that hospital is designed to cover all expenses incurred from treatment of indigent, or uninsured people, below the poverty level, should they need special treatment not available at the Tyler County Hospital.

Electricity Use Topic

Illustrating the safe way to use electricity on the farm and in the home was the topic when Debbie Morrison, of the public relations department of Gulf States Utilities, spoke to the Chester Lions Club recently. Morrison cited many good uses for electric power, but also warned of the dangers of misuse, during the organization's Nov. 3 meeting. She also demonstrated the equipment used by power company linemen, using Lion Club member John Martin to illustrate.

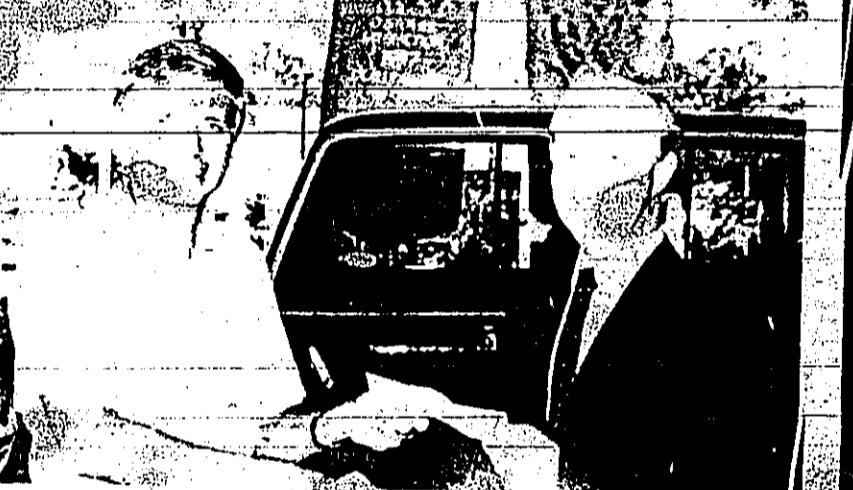

Knapp Urges Citizens To Contribute Funds

Woodville Mayor Tom Knapp issued a press release this week urging area citizens to contribute to the Prison Site Preparation Fund by Dec. 1. "We need more than 265 more jobs with an annual payroll of \$6,000,000," he said. "Our only expense is the cost of preparing the site." He added that Woodville was one of four Texas communities selected for the 1,000 man facilities. Other locations include Snyder, where the citizens raised \$1,000,000 in contributions in three weeks to pay for land to donate to the Texas Department of Corrections. The voters in Marlin approved a \$750,000 bond issue to purchase land for their prison site. "We can consider ourselves fortunate because the land for Woodville's prison site was donated by the Tyler County Industrial Foundation," he said. "None of this cost will be at the expense of the Woodville taxpayers. Instead, the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce is asking for voluntary contributions. Please consider what you can contribute for the economic future of our community." According to Knapp, anyone wishing to send contributions to the Tyler County Chamber of Commerce, 201 N. Prison Groundbreaking Ceremony Slated

Tyler County Chamber of Commerce officials are busy getting ready for the groundbreaking ceremony Monday, Nov. 28 at 4 p.m. for the Texas Department of Corrections 1,000 man Gib Lewis Prison Unit to be located just northeast of Woodville. Local co-ordinator says the "one-month" delay in the bidding activity for the actual construction phase changed from 25 square feet to 35 square feet. The Texas Department of Corrections had to re-submit new plans and re-jecting architects bids sheets should be available to contractors by early December, officials say. Woodville's Unit is the last of four similar units to finally reach the bid stage. The expected completion date of the facility is November 1989.


