Begins Job

Sheriff Names New Deputies, Terminates Former Ones

As the new Tyler County Sheriff entered office this week, he terminated three former employees, and named four new men to his staff.

Deputies Wade Skinner and Walter Riley, and jailer Hubert Umsworth have already left the department. The new jailer, Charles Hoffa, and deputies Ray Stewart, Lester Johnston and Tracy Ferguson have already begun their duties in the Sheriff's Department.

Samuel Bible, who replaced Skinner as chief deputy, has also begun his new duties.

Bible and Ferguson have both been employed with the Woodville Police Department for about six years.

Johnston, 33, has worked with the Jasper County Sheriff's Department and the Huntington Police Department, since graduating from the East Texas Police Academy in March, 1986.

According to Sheriff Gary Hennigan, there were no particular infractions that resulted in the termination of the former employees.

"I ran for this office with the idea that if I was elected, I would staff the most qualified people I could find," said Hennigan. He added that he had the new employees in mind during the time he was running for office.

"I feel these men are well qualified to do the job that the public expects us to do," said Hennigan. "The main thing is to give the public the best possible police protection, and law enforcement I can."

Hennigan added that other objectives he has for his office is to upgrade and professionalize the office, to work with the county commissioners closely to stay within his budget, and to provide the best law enforcement possible to the citizens.

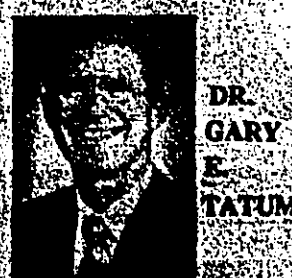

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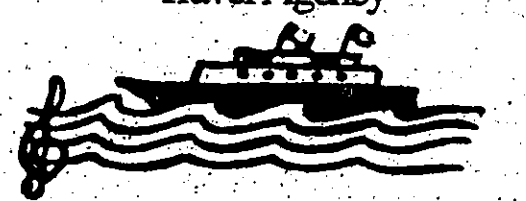

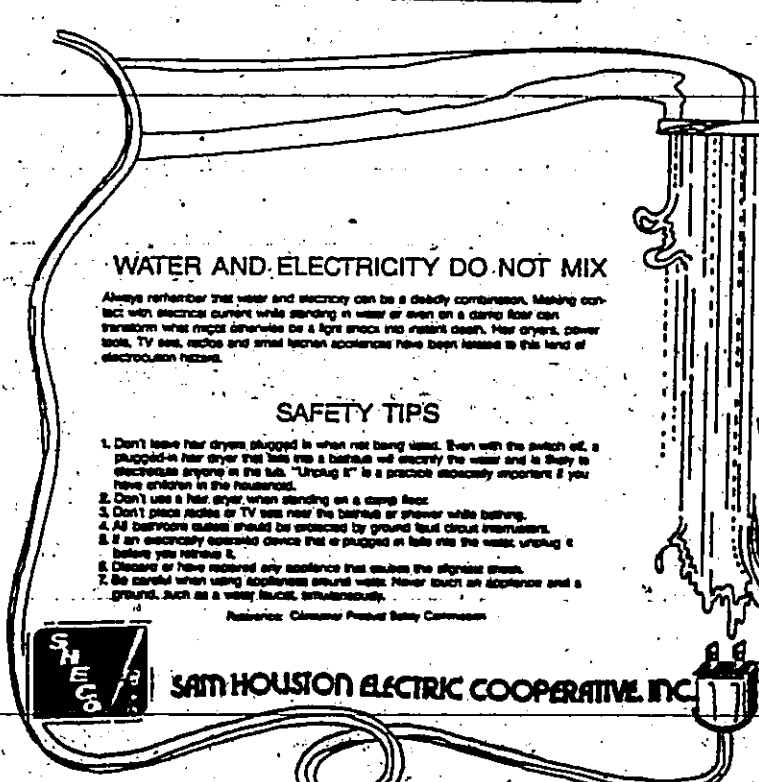

Emergency Funds Are Available

Emergency energy about 1,500 elderly Texas families totaling \$25,346.29 were distributed to 362 Texas households during the third quarter of 1988 by Project CARE (Community Assistance Relating to Energy), reported a Gulf States Utilities Co. spokesman.

Project CARE was established through the cooperation of Gulf States and community leaders throughout the GSU service area in Texas and Louisiana. The program provides emergency financial assistance on utility bills and certain weatherization and repair projects for the needy elderly.

From Our Files.....

May 30, 1935

Sheriff Nicholson reports to the "Booster" that in a series of recent raids he has captured three white men, one white woman, and two black men. On June 17 he came into possession of a still, one of the most modern and complete stills ever taken in a Tyler County raid, when 18 gallons of whiskey, 450 gallons of mash, and other paraphernalia was confiscated. This still was electrically equipped with gas burners, copper coils and boiler, fans and everything else used in the manufacture of booze.

March 28, 1937

Six residents of Peachtree were poisoned accidentally Sunday when they ate cornbread which was made from meal containing arsenic. The family of E.P. Brooks were entertaining a large number of friends at dinner, and all of those who partook of the cornbread were affected immediately. Those affected were Mr. and Mrs. E.P. Brooks, two daughters, Misses Gertrude and Odessa, and Miss Mattie Lanier and Joe Henrick. According to Mrs. Brooks, the arsenic which was the cause of the poisoning had been purchased for the purpose of poisoning trees, and in some unexplained manner a part of it fell into the meat barrel.

July 15, 1943

Woodville suffered a severe electrical storm and down pour of rain Thursday and we heard a minister say Sunday that he understood that some folks were frightened and

Much Gained In Life Of My Father-In-Law

It would be easy for me to view the death of my father-in-law last week as a missed opportunity.

I missed getting to know such a fine man better.

But I have gained so much since becoming a member of his family. A family I'm proud to be a part of.

My husband and I have only been married since last August, and I didn't get to spend any time with my father-in-law, Wayne Seldon Pettijohn, until we moved here in November.

But for the four years I've known my husband, I've known a replica of his father. And, although I can never again see Mr. Pettijohn sitting in his recliner, smoking his pipe, I can see him in all of his five children.

Mr. Pettijohn was born in Birchtree, Mo., in 1899. Fourteen days after he turned 18, he joined the Army.

It was 1917, World War I was raging in France. Mr. Pettijohn, who once told me he thought it would be exciting to join the Army, found himself in a muddy, cold foxhole there.

He said he had to grow up fast, as he lay in that foxhole with bullets exploding all around him.

At the end of that war he was awarded the "Victory" medal. He had fought three major battles, the battle of Alsace-Mame, St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne.

At 22, he married Delora Buckley, settled down in Forrester, Ark., and had five children.

Orange, Banana Bread Easy To Make, Eat

From the time you grate the fragrant orange peel and mash the mellow, smooth bananas until you take it hot from the oven, Orange Banana Bread is a sensation for your senses. One bit of this richly moist loaf will have you putting a big star by this recipe.

Take a look at how simple the recipe is. Most of the mixing is done in an electric blender, then gently stirred into the dry ingredients. If you can resist cutting a slice from the warm loaf, remember that this-as with most fruit breads-is even better if cooled, wrapped tightly, and kept until the next day.

Wow, could any thing that looks, smells and tastes this inviting be nutritious too? First of all, it uses three Texas Oranges, one of the most popular sources of Vitamin C. Both sections and juice, which are included here, are a good source of calcium, phosphorus, Vitamin A, thiamine, niacin, and riboflavin.

Secondly, this loaf is an excellent source of dietary fiber. Consider that one slice contains the natural fiber found in whole wheat flour, wheat germ and pecans, as well as bananas and oranges.

This recipe could easily be baked in smaller loaf pans to make a size just right for giving. Add a small crock of butter seasoned with grated orange peel for a gift that anyone would love to receive.

Below is a recipe for banana bread made with orange peel:

Combine 3 or 4 Texas Oranges, 2 ripe bananas, 1 cup sugar, 1/3 cup vegetable oil, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup whole wheat flour, 3/4 cup all-purpose flour, 1/2 cup wheat germ, 1 teaspoon baking soda, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup chopped pecans.
