Compliance To Regulations Is Expected

In response to new state regulations governing solid waste disposal landfills, the new Commissioner's Court has set new hours for the Woodville site, and plans to set hours at the three satellite dumps soon.

During a special meeting

new regulations that become effective February 1.

Cain said, after touring the four landfills with commissioners Monday, that he feels the four Tyler County landfills will be in compliance with state regulations by that date.

The new operating hours for the Woodville facility will be from 7 a.m. until 6

be required to provide solid waste disposal for their residents. Counties with populations under 30,000 are not required to provide these services, however.

Cain also discussed the possibility of the county providing stationary compactors at the three satellite facilities, and after the wastes are compacted, they

for these compactors to be used, said Cain, and their use could cut the costs of operating a landfill at each site.

"The cost to operate landfills is going to go up," said Cain. "It will cost anywhere from \$30,000 to \$40,000 just to get permitted, and take anywhere from 15 to 18 months."

meeting that the efforts of Commissioners Pete Barnes and James "Bo" Jordan at looking into the possibility of a regional incinerator is "On the right track."

Concerning the problem of state compliance at the landfills, Commissioner Jerry Mahan said, "Whatever action we take has to be an action that the people support." He added that no action will work unless the people make it work.

The commissioners did not set a date to determine what the other landfill sites operating hours will be. They did, however, say that the new hours would be set before February 1.

Forse's Vision Became Reality When Bush Became President

About 28 years ago Don Forse said he had this feeling this premonition about his friend George Bush.

He thought that some day Bush would be president of the U.S.

Bush just settled into his new job as president this

week. And Forse, who has been a Tyler County resident for about six years, was with his friend at the ceremony that made it official.

Their friendship began about 28 years ago, when Bush was Harris County Chairman. Forse said he met Bush at the court house.

"Few people in Harris County liked him (Bush) at that time," said Forse. "But I saw something in the man, I knew someday he'd be a winner."

Their friendship flourished, as both of them were active in Harris County politics.

And later, at the 1968 Republican convention,

Forse made a move that may have helped to change the course of history.

He was a Ronald Reagan delegate at the convention. He said he didn't want to see Richard Nixon get the presidential nomination.

Nixon then picked Agnew for his running mate. Forse said he decided to submit Bush's name for nomination of vice president. He discussed it with Bush, and together they decided "Let's do it."

Forse said he went down one aisle and Bush went down another trying to get someone to nominate Bush. By the time they got to the back of the convention hall, he said, they gave it up as a bad idea.

"I told him then, 'One day you'll be president,'" said Forse.

According to Forse, Bush replied, "That's ridiculous. It'll never happen."

"I've reminded him of that statement many times since then," said Forse.

During Nixon's inaugural, Forse said he called (now First Lady) Barbara Bush on the phone and said "Do you realize one day you and I are going to the inauguration of George Bush as president?"

She told him, according to Forse, "Don, George tells me you're crazy, now I believe it."

This past week Forse and his wife Bennie, their daughters, Janice and Oleta, son Donald and son-in-law John Meridian, Glen Payton and Joel DeMont attended the Texas Ball and the inauguration. Forse and his wife also attended the "swearing-in ceremony" where the man that Forse had dreamed of being "president" became such.

What kind of friend has Bush been to Forse, and why does he call this man one of the finest friends a man could have?

"He's down to earth," said Forse. "I know a lot of big shots, but George Bush isn't one of them. If you have him as a friend, he's a genuine friend. He's the kind of man that stands up for what he believes in."

Forse said that contrary to the picture that some painted of Bush as being a "wimp" during his vice-presidency and his campaign for president, he is an honorable man who conducts himself with dignity, even at the risk of being portrayed as non-assertive.

"While he was vice president, he conducted himself as such," said Forse.

Forse tells about the time about 30 people, including Forse, met with Bush at the Houstonian Hotel, where Bush announced he would run for president. He asked the group for its input into what strategy he would take.

"About 10 people recommended he disassociate himself with Reagan, and come out on the issues that he differed with Reagan on," said Forse.

Forse said that Bush listened to the group, then stated that maybe he shouldn't seek the presidency, because, since he was vice president, and Reagan was president (at the time) there was no way he would dishonor the president by disagreeing with him publicly.

According to Forse, this was conduct Bush felt was becoming for a vice president. He said Bush went on to tell the group that if dishonoring the president was what it took to become the next president, he'd never fill that position.

"Now that he is president," said Forse, "You'll see that he differs with Reagan on some issues."

As a friend of both George and Barbara Bush, Forse recalls many moments where the character

of this nation's new president became apparent to him over the years. According to Forse, during one of the most dramatic periods in his life, the Bush's had time to be his friends.

"They are consistent friends," said Forse. "I've seen many times politicians who, once you help get them off the ground, and flying on their own, they forget all about you."

But not George Bush. According to Forse, he had a particularly rough time battling cancer a few years ago, and while he was a patient at M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston, Bush called him every week.

"He didn't have an aide do it," said Forse. "Out of all the politicians I've known, only Bush and Secretary of State Jim Baker both called me weekly."

Forse added that the Bush's are not strangers to tragedy—they lost a daughter.

(about two years old) to leukemia, and to this day Barbara still grieves the child's death.

Barbara Bush, according to Forse, will be one of the most popular first ladies ever to grace the White House.

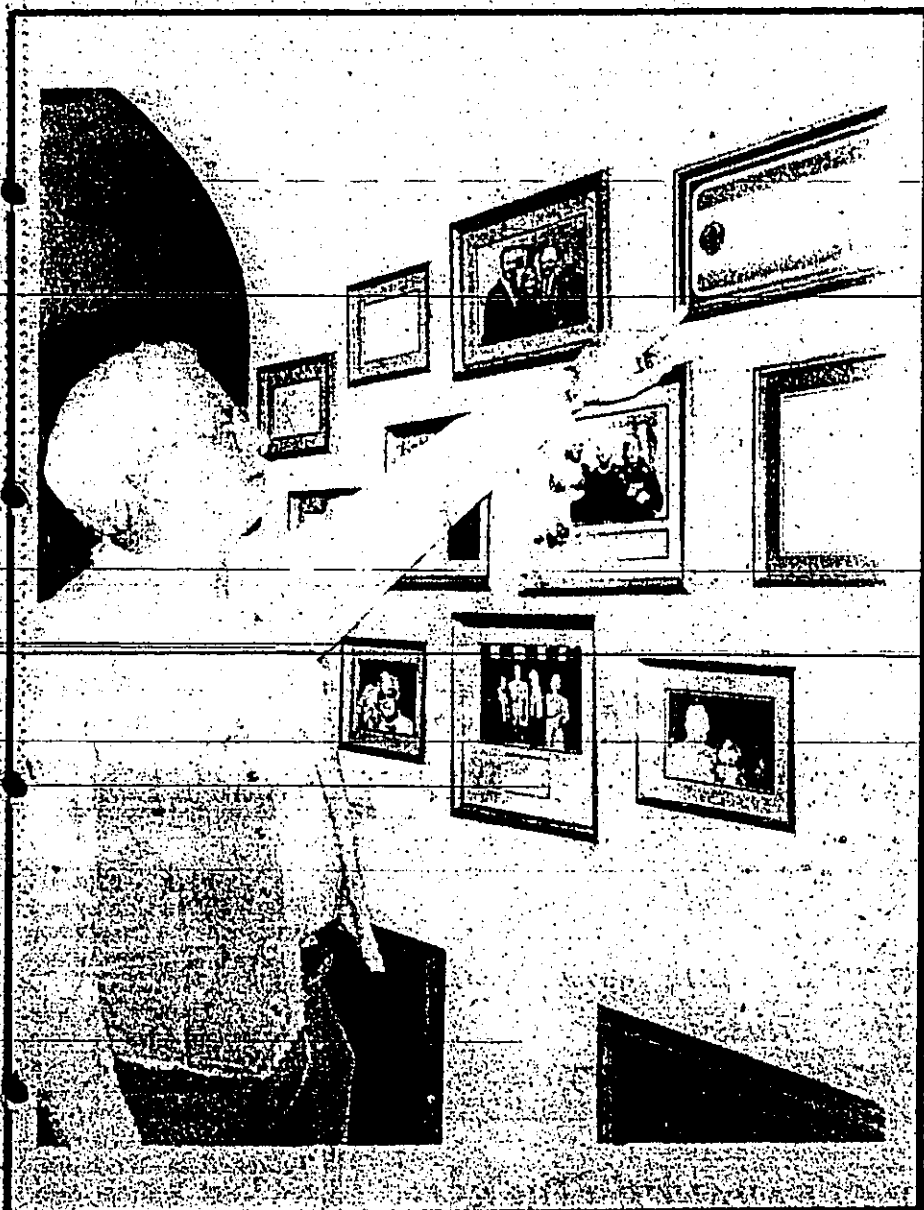
"There is nothing fake about her," said Forse. "She is a mother and grandmother, and presents herself exactly as that. She's educated and sophisticated, but in a plain, down to earth manner. You can tell from being around her that her husband and family are first with her."

He added that if people

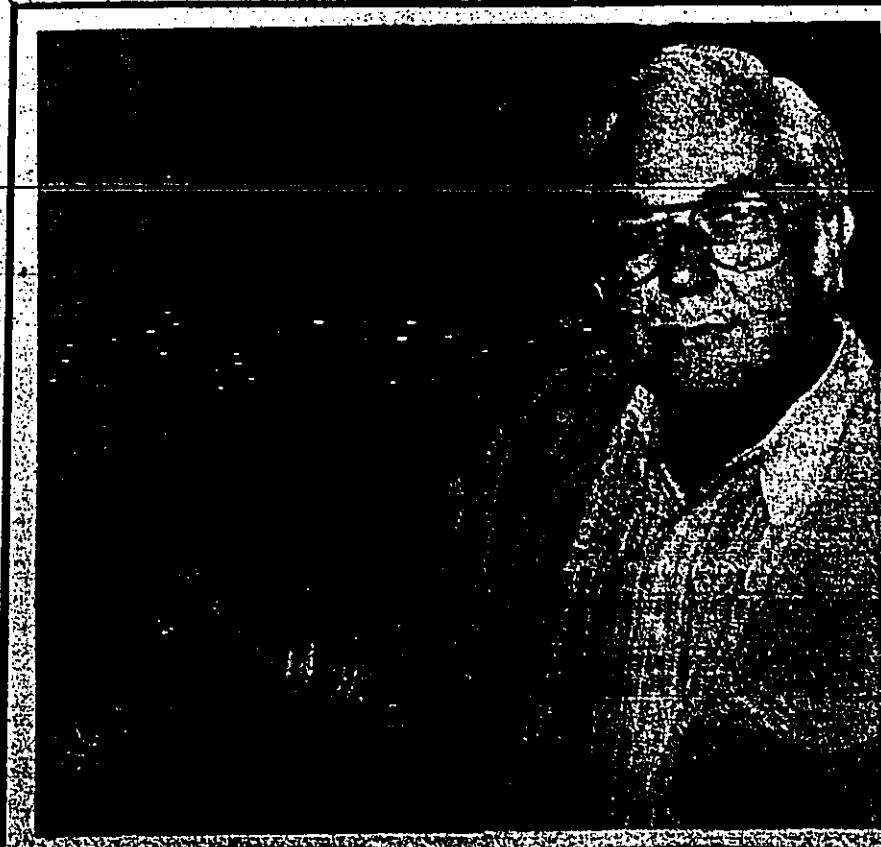
(particularly the media) will look beyond beautiful, fancy clothes, make-up and glitter, they will find that the plain, unpainted Barbara Bush is the most beautiful first lady this country will have ever had. "Her personality is already beginning to show through," said Forse. "She is warm and caring, and has just as much dignity and strength as her husband."

Just as Don Forse and his family were there at the Bush's beginnings in the political arena—he feels confident that this friendship will continue through many more years.

And, according to Forse, the new president, who had his political beginnings in this state, will never forget those beginnings, or the people who helped put him where he is today.

New Book Includes Canning Tips

For today's creative cook, new or experienced, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has issued a new publication titled "Complete Guide to Home Canning."

With information on new varieties of fruits and vegetables, dozens of new home canning recipes and new diets, the guide will help you decide what to can and how much.

The new 172-page canning guide, produced by USDA's Extension Service, is the 23rd home canning publication released by USDA since 1904, according to current records.

Over 20 million USDA home canning publications have been distributed over the years.

Dr. Wells Willis, food safety specialist with the Extension Service, said, "The new publication required intensive research and updating of old information to deal with current thinking of food microbiology, the causes of food poisoning, new canning equipment on the market, new varieties of fruits and vegetables, and the diet preferences of today's public."

The publication also contains 25 or more new home canning recipes, representing different regions of the country and the nation's increased interest in healthful eating, including special diet needs.

A companion publication, "Principles of Home Canning" (AIB-539-1), 40 pages, contains the first section of the "Complete Guide to Home Canning" and is designed primarily for teachers who need only the basic theories and principles of home canning, not detailed how-to instruction or information.

The increased interest in home gardening and canning in the last decade has led to a need for updated research in food processing by USDA. An increase in the cases of botulism caused by home-canned foods in the mid-1970's also was a factor in this decision.

In 1984, the Extension Service provided a grant to Penn State University to establish a "Center of Excellence" in food technology. Dr. Gerald Kuhn, Penn State food science professor at the center, led the effort to develop the new USDA publication, along with now retired Extension food safety specialist Dr. Milton Baldauf.

As part of the four-year process to develop the new publication, sections were shared with Extension Service and related government agency and industry personnel. Recipe ideas were contributed and extension food safety and nutrition specialists in all states reviewed the material.

"Complete Guide to Home Canning" (AIB-539) sells for \$11. "Principles of Home Canning" (AIB-539-1) sells for \$2.75. Send checks, along with the title and publication number, to the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. After bulk quantities of the publication are made available, ordered, and distributed, copies also will be available through county or city Cooperative Extension Service offices in the Spring.

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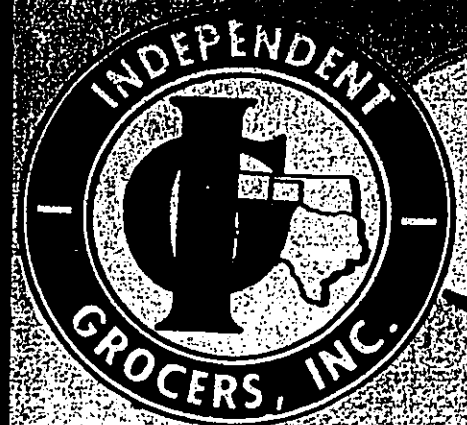
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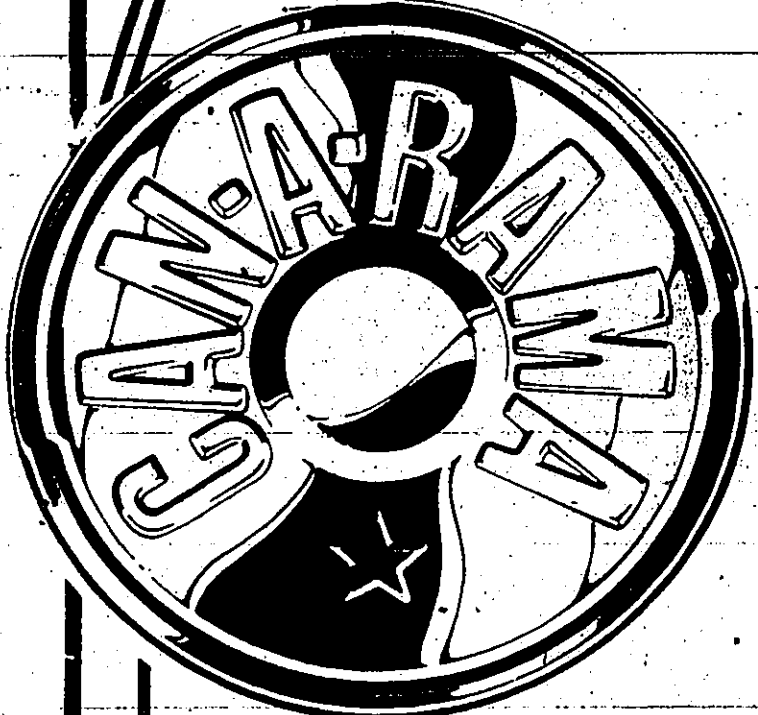

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The proposed change in permanent rates results in a decrease of \$3,405,410 or 0.61% in the rate revenues collected for the adjusted test year over the revenues collected under the present rates as annualized for the otherwise unadjusted test year. When the annualized present rates are applied to the adjusted test year, reflecting the reduced purchased power costs that result from an increase in retained generation in Nelson 6, the revenue collected decreases by \$7,920,108. Therefore, in the test year increase of \$4,514,699 or 10.35% is shown after this reduction in the present rate revenues. This 10.35% increase is not truly representative, however, of the annual change in the level of revenues expected. The 6.61% decrease is more representative of the expected change in the level of permanent rate revenues.

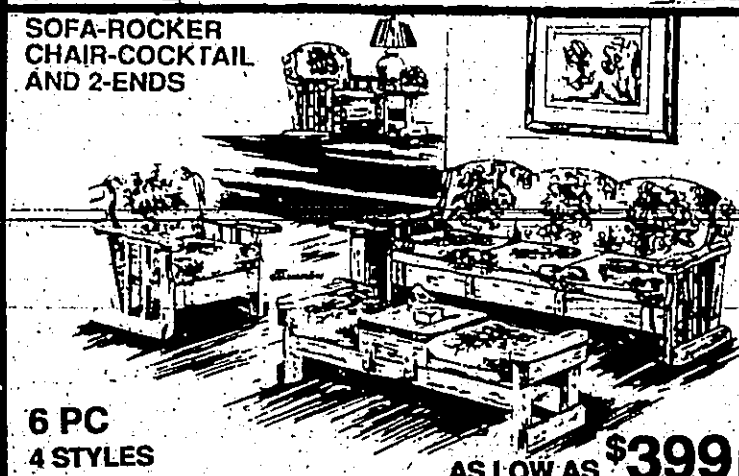

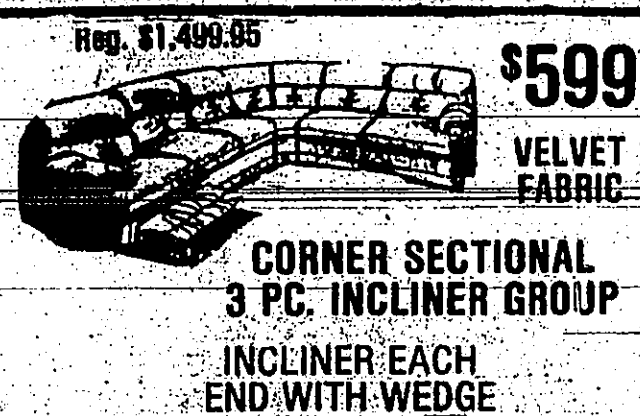

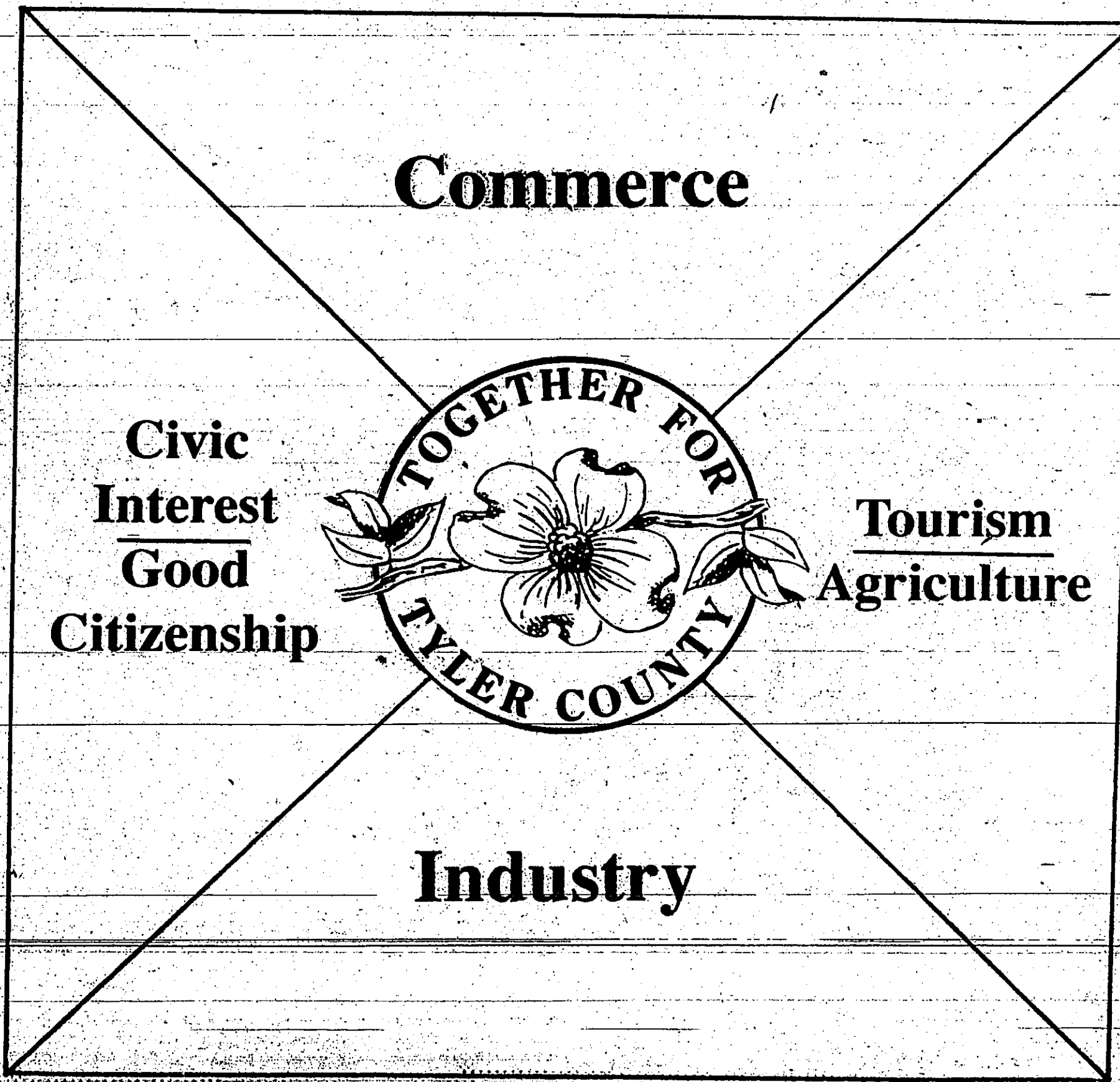

He is a former chief operating officer of the Jim Coker Companies, a \$45 million commercial real estate development firm. During that time, he was responsible for over \$1 million in sales, \$18 million in acquisitions, and \$30 million in project and working capital financing. As chief operating offi-

cer, he also negotiated the acquisition, and was directly involved in, the management of White Music Company of Dallas and J.R. Reed Music Company of Austin, retail music companies with annual sales of approximately \$4 million.

Prior to that, he was president of WordSmith Publishing Systems, Inc., a corporate communications company producing publications for a number of large, corporate clients, including Texas Commerce Bancshares, Inc., and Pizza Inn, Inc. Previous experience includes television and radio production and book publishing. He has a B.S. in radio-television-film from the University of Texas at Austin.

'Need Community To Work Together'

The community working together is what in-coming Chamber of Commerce President Don Forse sees as the key to creating jobs and economic harmony in Tyler County during the coming years.

According to Forse, there are a lot of possibilities for economic growth in this county. And since returning from a recent trip to Washington, D.C., he feels confident this county has the backing to grow.

"My number one priority in this job," said Forse, "is to create jobs. And to do so, we need the will of the people to work together."

He added that a good example of what this community can do when its citizens are united is the Gib Lewis Prison Unit.

"So much can be accom-

plished if we can bring the leaders of this community together, and have them consider, more, what they can do for their fellow man and devote their energies to making this community better for everybody," he said.

Forse said he wanted to see small industries, that this county can support here. With these industries the young people of the county won't have to move away to make a living for their families.

He also said that during his recent trip to Washington, D.C., to attend the Texas Ball, the Presidential Inaugural, and swearing-in of his long-time friend, President George Bush, he talked with Sen. Roy Blaine and some state officials about the possibility of securing a second state prison unit here and with some federal officials about the possibility of

securing a federal unit.

"He (Blaine) and other officials said they would help us with these efforts," said Forse. "I take them at their word."

Forse added that he hopes he's not being too optimistic, but if the people of this county want a second unit, he feels that could be accomplished within the next three years.

"We've broken ground with the Gib Lewis unit," said Forse. "And a federal unit would add to the pluses it can bring to this economy."

"In my opinion, Tyler County will grow in the next three to five years," said Forse. "I don't expect it to become a large metropolitan area like Houston, but it will experience some growth."

He added that Tyler County has a lot of things to be proud of, but more must be done to create new

attractions for tourism to flourish here.

"The more that Tyler County builds, the more that we'll have for tourists to be attracted here," he said. "We have a lot of things to be proud of, like the Dogwood Festival and Heritage Village, but we need more in order to make tourism a vital industry in this county. So far, we've just scratched the surface."

Forse said he needs to attract more businesses like restaurants, and recreational facilities, especially for the youth of this county. "It makes me sick at heart to drive through Woodville and see cars after cars of teenagers with no place to go," said Forse.

"I hope that the people in this county will start to think about our young people, they need a place to go, a safe, supervised place to have fun," he added.
