

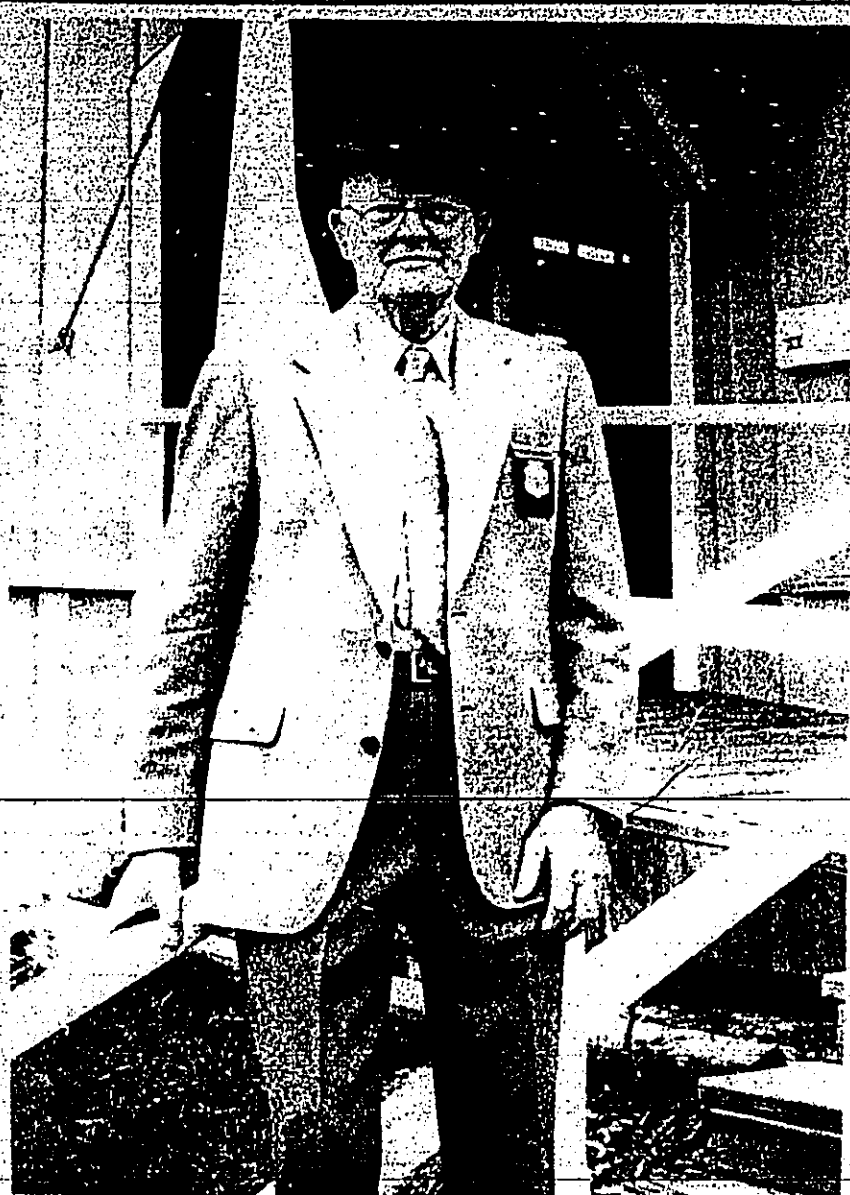

## Tyler County Highways Safer During January

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated a total of eight rural traffic accidents in Tyler County during the month of January, according to Sergeant Roy D. Enry, supervisor for Highway Patrol Area 2B-A which includes Polk and Tyler Counties.

## Graduation Requirements Revised

The Woodville Independent School District Board of Trustees voted unanimously Tuesday, Feb. 21, to revise graduation requirements for the district.

Revisions were divided into three categories. Under credit requirements, the district now requires 21 credits for a regular diploma and 22 credits for an academic or honors diploma. The revision, which will not take effect until 1991 will require 24 credits for a diploma.

According to Linda Gazaway, who presented the proposal, this will not be difficult since the district has gone from six class periods a day to seven. The revision will not affect students who are juniors and seniors this year.

The second change made concerns credits required for grade level clas-

sification. At present, five credits are required for sophomore classification, 10 for junior classification, and 15 for senior classification.

Beginning with the 1990-91 school year, six credits will be required for sophomore classification, 12 for junior classification and 18 for senior classification.

The third change was threefold; first, beginning with the 1989-90 school year, partial credit will not be given for any full year course; second, beginning with the 1990-91 school year, graduates must have completed one credit in business education or vocational education; and, third, graduates must have completed at least one class in computer operation or application.

According to Gazaway, these changes would enable Woodville students to receive not only

a better education but a more relevant and balanced one.

The Board ordered a school trustee election for positions number 6 and 7, full terms, and position number 2, unexpired term. Positions number 6 is presently held by James Jinnette, and position number 7 by Jerry Tolbert. Position number 2 was vacated by

Beth Allison and has one year remaining.

Royce Hill and Pat Thomason have filed for position number 2. The election will be held May 6.

Following an executive session, the following administrators were given a one-year extension on their contracts: Tommy

Weaver, Norman Turner, Grady Holderman, Larry Dickerson, Robert Borel, Mary Nell Rainey, Sherry Kenner, Melvin Houston, Linda Gazaway, Troy Holiman, Franklin Frazier, and Preston Broom. The extension gives each person a two-year contract beginning July 1, 1989.

## School Board Elections Set

Voters will choose 13 school board members throughout the five school board districts when the election is held on May 6.

Filing for those positions will continue until March 22. Three seats, held by Jerry Tolbert, Jim Jinnette, and Beth Allison, will expire on the Woodville board. On the Chester board, seats held by Raymond Klores and J. Steven Watts will

expire. Colmesneil board members J.R. Henderson and Jimmy Crews seats will also become available this year. Three Spurger seats, held by Eddie Norman, Willie Chapman and John Mooney Hicks; and three in Warren, held by Walter McPherson, Walter McAlpin and Marvin Fannin, will also expire.

Voting county-wide will be from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Locations are at the Ch-

ester ISD lunchroom; the Vocational Agriculture Building in Spurger; Warren Junior High, Fred Elementary and Village Mills Baptist Church in the Warren district. In Woodville voting will take place at the School Administration Building on Charlton Street.

Absentee voting county-wide will be held at the superintendent's office April 17 through May 2.

## The Way We Were

### War Was On County Residents' Minds

During this same time in 1942, it appears that a lot of Woodville residents were thinking about WWII. The "Booster" ran a column one week titled "What Woodvillians Believe of the War."

It was similar to the column this newspaper runs today called "Side-walk Soundoff," except for one thing.

The 1942 column took the name of the resident who gave the opinion, then rearranged the alphabets in the name, so that readers could try to figure out who said what.

Examples of some of the statements made by these residents, and the jumbled names, are:

"Get back to the old ways of raising more of our own foods so we can have more food for the army."

going to practice what I preach." - O b m a b l i m y r b

"Help beat the Japs. Cooperate with the government and keep a sharp eye out for fifth column activities." - L e w L i b b e r d

"Cooperate with merchants in regard to increased prices." - T h i s d v e r b o i s h

And, speaking of cooperating with merchants, and high prices, Gilchrist Grocery in Colmesneil sold 10 pounds of Pure Cane Sugar for 59 cents, a five-pound bag of KB Oatmeal for 29 cents, and a 32-ounce can of Clabber Girl Baking Soda for 19 cents.

Sutton-Fain Chevrolet in Woodville ran an advertisement in cooperation with the Chevrolet Motor Company asking readers to participate in its "Car Conservation Plan" to cut back on wear and tear on tires and other parts on automobiles. The theory was that if automobile owners used their cars less, then more rubber, steel and other goods that go into building a car can be used for the war effort.

Jay Kelly, J.B. Best and Pats and David ran a large ad with big bold letters that

read "Tires." The ad went on to say that "It is our desire to serve you as long as possible in the way that we have served you in the past. Due to the present tire situation, however, we are compelled to limit our deliveries to One Delivery A Day in order to render you longer service."

Effective February 16, the ad stated, the businesses would only make one delivery a day. Then, also in large, bold type, the ad stated Remember Pearl Harbor, and Keep Them Flying.

Another large ad that ran in every issue in 1942, paid for by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, listed four ways that Tyler County residents could help the war effort by avoiding any wasteful use of telephone facilities. The ad stated that persons using the telephone should speak clearly, because having to repeat yourself takes time, to be sure to hang the phone up correctly, so that incoming calls can get through, to answer promptly because "Even seconds are important these days," and avoid using the phone during "rush" hours.

Topics covered included judicial demeanor, attorney general opinions impacting the justice of the peace court, code of judicial conduct, criminal trial procedure and simulations, forcible entry and detainer, emergency detentions

(mental, drug and alcohol), judicial liabilities, juvenile law, alcoholic beverage laws, parks and wildlife laws, protective orders and peace bonds, rules of evidence, search and arrest warrants, duties of a magistrate, hot checks, inquests and financial management.

## Benefits For Divorcees Have Been Changing

Social Security benefits for divorcees have been around for a good many years. At one time, a duration-of-marriage of 20 years was required and a man, to receive benefits on his ex-wife, had to have been supported by her during a specific period of time.

Support was not required for a woman to receive on an ex-husband. Congress reduced the duration of marriage to 10 years and the federal courts declared the support requirement for ex-husbands to be sex discrimination—so this law was in effect abolished.

A divorcee is entitled to the same benefits he/she would be entitled to as a spouse or widower if the marriage lasted at least 10 years.
