## TDC Board Chairman Honored

About the time that construction activity is in full swing at the new Gib Lewis Prison Unit east of Woodville, the chairman of the Board of Directors for the Texas Department of Corrections will be honored as Mr. East Texas at the 46th annual Dogwood Festival.

Charles Terrell was presented a plaque this week in Austin, honoring him as someone who best "exemplifies the spirit and quality of leadership which advances, shapes, and gives direction to the growth and progress of East Texas." As the honored Mr. East Texas, Terrell will participate in the Western Weekend and Dogwood Festival parade April 1. Dr. James "Red" Duke, the Houston

surgeon who was the 1988 Mr. East Texas, will formally present the title to Terrell at that time.

The plaque was presented to Terrell by Josiah Wheat, president, and Becky Jinnette, executive director of the festival association.



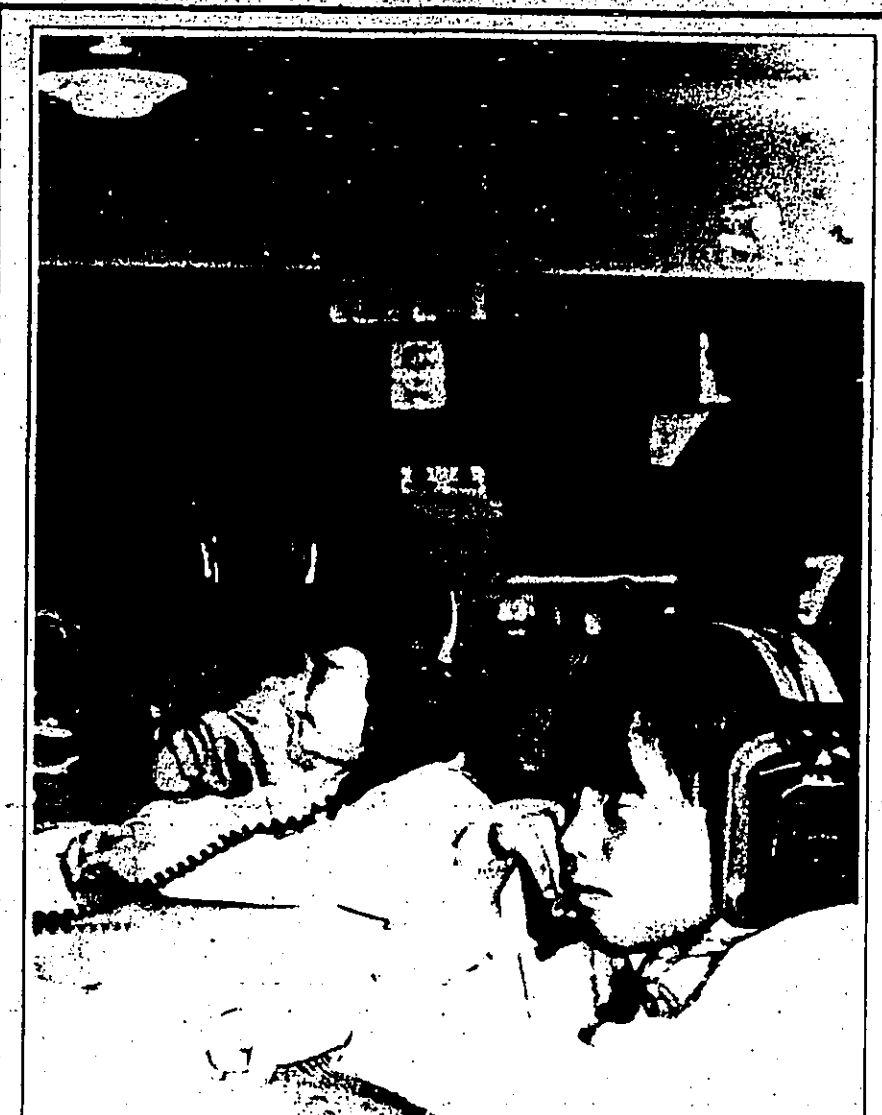

## Spurger Man Dies Of Drug Overdose

An overdose of cocaine is believed to be the cause of a Spurger man's death this week.

Drake, according to Guillory.

There was also a spoon found nearby, as well as a small bag on the corner of the bed, both of which had a small amount of what is also believed to be cocaine in them. The syringe and other items have all been sent to the Department of Public Safety lab for testing.

Kistler was pronounced dead at 6 p.m. by Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace Roy

"We believe it was a drug overdose," he said. "And a pathologist from Lufkin has determined that there was no foul play involved." No charges were filed in the incident, and an autopsy has been requested by Sheriff Gary Hennigan.

## Woodville Man Donates \$50 Lease

# Warren School Board Delays Contract Renewals

The Warren Independent School District Board of Trustees failed to take

action on five positions up for renewal in February. The board took no action on the contracts of High School Principal Harry Lister, Junior High

Principal Joanne Atkinson, Warren Elementary Principal H.K. Pitts, Fred Mitchell, and Band Director Don Stockton.

Board Vice-President Ben Read, who presided over the meeting, said that the school attorney Terry Hutton advised them not to take action on the contracts

at this time. When questioned, Hutton said, "Don't take this as anything negative...we just have a lot of things to consider before taking action on these contracts."

The board voted to begin a School Volunteer Program in the district. According to Curriculum Director, Dixie Weeks, "Goal 6 of the State Board of Education's long range plan for Texas is that dedicated volunteers be trained in non-instructional areas. We will use parents and other members of the community in this program. We plan to start small on one campus with a pilot program."

The Board adopted an Election Order to hold a School Trustee Election May 6, 1989, for places I, II and III. Position I is presently held by Walter McPherson. He has retired for that position. Position II is held by Walter McPherson who says that he will not be running again. Position III is held by Marvin Fannin. McPherson is the only person who has filed at this date for any position.

The Board rejected all bids on the Scout Hut and Rent House that the district owns. According to Yates, the bids were so low that the district will use the buildings for storage before they will let them go at the bid price.

Jana Tipton spoke in an open forum regarding substitute teachers in the district for 10 years and the salary of \$25 per day has remained the same. She said that other districts in rural areas pay \$35 per day. According to Tipton, "I feel that substitute teachers play a vital role in the district and I would like to see the salary raised." The Board agreed to take the matter under consideration.

## Elder Abuse Project Wins National Award

A statewide effort in Texas to prevent abuse of the elderly received a national award March 1 from the American Public Welfare Association in Washington.

The Texas Department of Human Services' Collaborative Elder Abuse Prevention Project is a 1989 winner in the Successful Projects Initiative Awards Program, a national competition recognizing outstanding innovative efforts by public human service agencies.

Outstanding state and county programs will be honored. CEAPP will be cited for its innovation and success

in the category of services and benefits for adults. The project brought together 14 organizations to develop a long-range plan for the prevention of elder abuse, coordinate services to abused and neglected elderly Texans and promote public awareness of the problem.

Abuse of the elderly and disabled affects an estimated 130,000 people annually in Texas. CEAPP has sponsored 13 community forums around the state to educate the public about elder abuse and encourage reporting of such abuse to DHS.

Human service and law enforcement agencies, church groups, voluntary organizations and advocacy groups were represented on the project's executive steering committee, which was headed by DHS Adult Protective Services Administrator Judy Rouse.

Rouse said the committee's work represented "a significant volunteer contribution toward human services in Texas." Organizations involved in the project included the Texas Conference of Churches, the Texas Association of Retired Persons, the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, the Coalition of Texans with Disabilities, the Gray Panthers, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service,

the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health and the Texas Medical Association. In addition to DHS, five other state agencies were involved with CEAPP, including the Texas Department of Aging, the Texas Attorney General's Office, the Texas Department of Health, the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation (MHMR) and the Texas Rehabilitation Commission.

CEAPP was funded by a \$300,000 grant from the federal Department of Health and Human Services' Administration on Aging. ## New Program Benefits Vets

The Texas Veterans Land Board and the federal Veterans Administration have formed a partnership to let Texas veterans apply for a one-time loan eligibility from 1-4th the state and federal government in one simple step. Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced recently.

Effective February 1, every Texas veteran requesting a Loan Guarantee Entitlement Form from the VA will also receive a Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program eligibility packet.

This means that Texas veterans can now apply for eligibility to use the Texas VHAP at the same time they apply for a federal VA home loan, said Mauro, chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board.

"Streamlining the application process will make it easier for Texas veterans to use their state benefits and, at the same time, make it easier for the real estate agent and the veteran to close the loan."

The Texas VHAP lends eligible Texas veterans up to \$20,000 at nine percent interest to use toward the purchase of a new or existing home. In most cases a Texas veteran can buy a home with no down payment by combining a federal JVA loan with a Texas VHAP loan.

The Texas VHAP currently has more than \$250 million in bond reserves and the authority to obtain an additional \$250 million. "The VA has enjoyed a close working relationship with the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program since its inception in 1983," said Ted Myatt, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Houston.

"The VA and the Texas Veterans Land Board share a common goal—serving our veterans," added Dr. Stephen Lomax, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

Since an application for eligibility is sent to the veteran at the same time the VA application is, veterans will be able to be

certified to participate in the Texas VHAP before they go to a lender. "This will save the veteran time because, in the past, the veteran was not certified to participate until after contacting the lender."

"By working together we've eliminated the time-consuming steps of checking eligibility for both programs at two different times," Mauro said.

Mauro noted that by combining a nine-percent Texas VHAP with a 10.5 percent federal VA loan, a veteran's overall interest rate will be lower and that will mean lower monthly payments.

"I'm convinced that certifying eligibility simultaneously will encourage more real estate agents to tell veterans about the program," Mauro said. "That will give more veterans a chance to learn about their state benefits and take advantage of them."

## Direct Deposit Safer, Simpler

According to David Bennett, manager of the Lufkin Social Security District, every month at

least, reports of lost or stolen benefit checks are processed. Then the beneficiary waits for weeks to receive a

replacement check - often experiencing financial difficulty during the wait. These situations are preventable - through di-

rect deposit. There are other advantages to direct deposits too, including: no worry about checks being forwarded when residence address is changed; it eliminates inconvenience of having to deposit or cash checks; eliminates check cashing fees; There's no need to meet the mailman on check day, and guaranteed check delivery, on time, each month.

According to Bennett, Social Security records reveal that beneficiaries using direct deposit are 10 times less likely to have a problem with timely receipt of their benefits than

those receiving their checks direct. In direct deposit, direct transfer of funds is made between the U.S. Treasury and the beneficiary's financial institution.

This is done electronically. Without direct deposit, the treasury must print a check for each beneficiary, place it in an envelope and send it through the mail - more steps in the process and more chances of problems.

Until recently, to get direct deposit, it was necessary to have the financial institution complete a form, which was sent to SSA for processing. The U.S. Treasury no longer requires this form. This means that anyone wishing direct deposit need only call Social Security.

Of course, they would need to have their checking or savings account number available. Bennett urges all beneficiaries who still receive paper checks each month to call the Social Security office, and take advantage of this convenient, trouble-free service.
