Champion Opens Hiking Trails For Visitors

Champion International Corporation invites all visitors to the Tyler County Dogwood Festival to enjoy the natural beauty of the East Texas Pine Woods by taking a hike on the Long Leaf Pine Hiking Trail.

The Long Leaf Pine Hiking Trail is located just 21.5 miles northwest of Woodville on FM 62, between Barnum and Chandler.

The trail features one of the finest old growth stands of long leaf pine remaining in East Texas. The timber here is indicative of the forest of the turn of the century. Many of the pines are over 100 years old.

The 1.8 mile main loop trail follows an old logging road along Kimple Creek where many different species of native hardwoods can be viewed among the towering longleaf, loblolly, and shortleaf pines. Trail signs identify the predominant tree species. The area abounds with deer, squirrel, raccoon, armadillo, and many varieties of birds.

Evidence of these can be seen by their tracks along the trail. The most famous residents, however, are the rare red-cockaded woodpeckers, who make their home in the old growth pine. Trail markers indicate the locations of the woodpecker colonies. The well-drained, sandy soil is typical of the East Texas Piney Woods and makes for easy, comfortable walking. In addition to the main loop, the trail has two "short-cut" loops for those with limited time and/or stamina. All loops are well marked and maintained. Parking and picnic tables are available at the trailhead and benches are provided along the trail.

The Long Leaf Pine Hiking Trail is owned and managed by Champion International Corporation. It is part of the Texas Forestry Association's Wood-

## Hospital Lab Features Expert Testing

**Editor's Note:** This is the second in a series of guest columns detailing the services offered at Tyler County Hospital.

The Tyler County Hospital Laboratory, which is staffed by four fulltime and two part-time technologists, is open 12 hours daily for routine testing.

Technologists are on call at night for any emergency.

Doctors on the hospital medical staff may request any of about 150 tests, which will be done within this lab and completed the day of request.

Other specific tests will be sent out to a reference laboratory with most results being reported within 48 to 72 hours.

The testing done in TCH lab includes blood counts, coagulation studies, (platelet counts, prothrombin times, bleeding & clotting times); blood chemistry (glucose, cholesterol, cardiac enzymes, bilirubin etc); and serological testing for Urine, feces, spinal fluid and sputum are examined for any abnormality and reported to the doctors. Therapeutic drugs are tested daily.

Within the Microbiology Lab all cultures are expedited, and drug sensitivities are run on any positive culture.

A comparison of the drug which the patient is taking is made to be sure only the necessary drugs are being administered.

All tissues removed in surgery are sent to a reference pathologist for examination and ruling out malignancy. The reference pathologist also oversees the functions of our laboratory checking monthly quality control reports and CAP Survey results.

The quality of TCH laboratory testing is thus constantly monitored and compared with other laboratories in the state and nation.

## April 2-8: Week Of The Young Child

"Who is caring for the children?" should be a question asked by all concerned Texans.

With almost half of Texas mothers with children under age six employed outside the home, there's no doubt that child care issues are important to the future of Texas' young citizens.

April 2 to 8 has been designated by the National Association for the Education of Young Children as the "Week of the Young Child." This is a special time for building public understanding and support for the critical importance of good services during the early years of life.

Affordability, availability and quality care are the key concerns of young parents. Day care is typically the second highest expense for the average American family, just below housing. For a limited income family of three, the cost often represents one-third to one-half of the total income.

In some cases, even when parents can afford the fees, there are inadequate child care resources. Many rural and poor urban neighborhoods offer few quality facilities.

In areas where child care is available and affordable, there is still the challenge of selecting a proper child care facility. One that meets both the child's needs and the parents' schedule.

Many parents need help in making child care decisions. They need information about the criteria for quality care; about management of costs as a part of the family budget and about employment policies that may affect their child care decisions.

In addition, they need resource and referral information about availability near to home or work sites. Families with school age children and children with special needs often face the reality of finding few sources available.

Answers to the "child care crises" will not be found totally in governmental policy. Parents, employers, providers and communities must come together to analyze and deal with local concerns.

Action can be taken by parents in analyzing and evaluating child care facilities. The owner should be given to provide information concerning child care options.

Providers need to analyze continuously the quality of their programs and seek informational sources for professional improvement. Community leaders need to examine local support systems and obstacles impacting the availability of child care.

## Different Factors Involved In Managing Farm Pond

The Tyler County Commissioner's Court is once again offering Amador Fire Ant Bait at a reduced price. The cost is \$3.25 per lb., and the bait is available in the County Extension Office.

Managing a pond for recreational fishing and maximum enjoyment often means understanding some facts and separating them from certain ideas.

One of the most common "ideas" is "pouchers have caught all the big fish out of my pond."

Though this may happen, almost all of the blame for catching only bass less than 12-inches in length must be on the pond manager.

A pond can be overfished, but usually small bass are an indication that the pond owner is overstocking the fish. Limited fishing allows the bass to become overabundant and slow-growing.

Such ponds yield few really large bass because most die before reaching "trophy" size.

Often a pond owner can improve the population of stocked bass by allowing smaller sizes to be harvested. Channel catfish, stocked into such a pond should be at least eight inches long to escape being eaten by bass.

Weeds or aquatic vegetation also cause some misconceptions among pond owners. They are not automatically bad. Such plants are the basis for much of the oxygen supplied to the pond which is necessary for fish growth.

In addition, the insects that live in or on the plants provide food for fish. Most aquatic plants also help stabilize the shoreline to prevent erosion and are attractive to waterfowl.

Of course, too much vegetation will interfere with swimming and fishing. Vegetation should be controlled when it covers more than 15-percent of the pond surface.

More information on controlling aquatic weeds or other phases on pond management is available from the County Extension Office.

## Local Tax Rendition Forms Due This Week

March 31. That's the deadline for local property owners to complete, sign, and submit rendition forms to the Tyler County Appraisal District.

A rendition form is a document on which a property owner lists taxable property. The owner can also estimate the property's value on the form. It's filed at the appraisal district office at 806 West Bluff in Woodville. Property owners who ask in writing for an extension before the deadline have 30 extra days to file the rendition.

Property owners who own or manage income-producing tangible personal property must file renditions. Examples of such property are business inventory, office furniture and fixtures, and business vehicles.

Filing a rendition is optional for other property owners unless the chief appraiser required them to render their property. If so, the property owner will receive an explanation from the chief appraiser along with a rendition form.

Why file a rendition? "There are several good reasons," Lewis said. "The first," she said, "is that rendering is a means for a property owner to record an opinion of the property's value."

Then, if the Chief appraiser proposes a higher value for the property, state law requires the Chief Appraiser to notify the property owner. With this information, the property owner can decide whether to protest the appraisal district's value to the Appraisal Review Board.

Also, the property owner ensures that the tax ceiling will be increased to include the improvement adds to the house.

If the over-65 spouse dies and the surviving spouse is at least 55, the homestead tax ceiling on school taxes stays in effect as long as the survivor owns and continues to occupy the homestead.

Tax Deferral

Another tax benefit for older homeowners is tax deferral. They can postpone suits to collect delinquent property taxes on their homesteads by signing a deferral affidavit at the Tyler County Appraisal District office. Homeowners at least 65 may file the affidavit.

After the form is signed and filed with the appraisal district, taxing units can't force close on the home of an over-65 person to collect property taxes. The protection lasts as long as the person lives in the home and claims it as his or her residence homestead.

Tax deferral only postpones paying taxes. Penalties and interest will accumulate, along with taxes," Lewis said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax, penalty, and interest."

Homestead exemption forms and forms for claiming a tax deferral are available at the appraisal district office.

## Agricultural Appraisal Saves

If you're a landowner looking for a way to reduce the property taxes on your agricultural land, the solution may be as near as the Tyler County Appraisal District office.

By filing an application by May 1 and qualifying for agricultural appraisal on your farm or ranch, you can reduce your 1989 taxes.

Property taxes are usually based on market value. That's the price you would get for the property if you sold it on the open market under normal conditions. Agricultural land, especially near developing areas, often sells for more than the land would be worth if it could only be used for farming or ranching.

The Texas constitution allows qualified farm, ranch, or timber land to be taxed as its productive value, a value based solely on the land's capacity to produce agricultural goods.

Your land must meet the following qualifications in the year you apply for agricultural appraisal:

- You must use the land principally for agriculture. This includes producing crops, livestock, poultry, fish, and other products of the soil.
- Your farm or ranch must meet "degree of intensity" standards designed to make sure you are putting in at least as much investment, labor, and material into your operation as is typical for producers in your area.
- You must have used the land for farming, ranching, or timber production for five of the past seven years.
- Once your application for agricultural appraisal is approved, you usually don't need to reapply for following years unless the chief appraiser requires you to.

Another section of the Texas Constitution provides a second way to qualify for agricultural appraisal, but its qualifications are more restrictive and it requires an annual application. Ask the chief appraiser for details.

There is a disadvantage to receiving agricultural appraisal on your land. You'll pay a special rollback tax if you change the use of the land. In some cases, you'll also pay the rollback tax if you sell your land.

There will be a baseball game here on Friday at four o'clock against Big Sandy. We would like for everyone to come out and help support the guys!



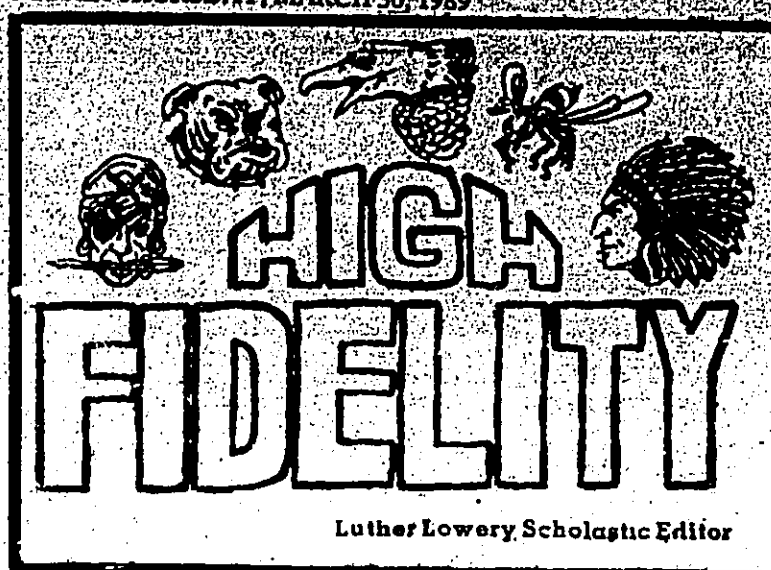

## Exit Level Tests To Be Given In Woodville High School

May 2 and 3, 1989, the Exit Level Tests will be administered in the Woodville High School cafeteria beginning at 8:15 a.m. on both days. During this May administration, the English language arts test will be administered on Tuesday, May 2 and the mathematics test will be administered on Wednesday, May 3. Individuals both in school and out-of-school who have not previously passed both sections of the Exit Level Tests may make the section (s) not passed.

Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and wish to register to retake the exit level mathematics and/or English language arts test (s) may pick up a registration packet at the Woodville High School campus. Registration forms must be completed and returned in the pre-addressed envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5 p.m. April 7. The Texas Education Agency and National Computer Systems will not be responsible for registration forms that are delayed or lost in the mail. It is suggested that individuals registering for the test make arrangements with the appropriate postal agent for a proof of delivery notice. Questions concerning out-of-school examination testing should be directed to the Texas Education Agency, Division of Student Assessment, 512-463-9536.

Again, these registration packets are only for individuals who are not enrolled in a Texas public school and have not previously passed both sections of the TEAMS test but have met all other graduation requirements.
